

more than 93 million telephones throughout the United States and Canada.

All customers will receive by mail before September 10 an instruction booklet which tells precisely how to use the new service. Persons who have not received an instruction booklet or anyone needing additional copies may obtain them by calling the business office during regular office hours, McCullough stated.

The equipment making this new service available is located in San Angelo, McCullough said. Plans for, modification of, and changes in local equipment were begun more than four years ago. In addition to installing the intricate EDDD facilities in San Angelo, the overall project involved constructing new central office buildings in Carlsbad, Christoval, Eldorado and Sonora and placing new central office equipment in the buildings. Additional long distance circuits have been added between San Angelo and area towns so customers in the network can have access to the equipment.

McCullough pointed out that General Telephone customers will have a more advanced type of long distance dailing service than most. "All customers having E-DDD service can dial station - to -station long distance calls; however, the equipment we have also permits customers to dial their own person - to - person, collect or credit card calls."
