

Bronte Takes Regional Flag



Tactics Like This by the Longhorns Ruined Wilson's Offense

A powerful Bronte Longhorn football team lived up to its boast of being the No. 1 Class B team in the state last Friday night when its members ripped by the Wilson Mustangs, 36-14, to win the Region 1 championship. The game was played at Tiger Stadium in Snyder.

The contest was a grand climax to the Longhorns' 1967 perfect season and gave them a 11-0 record, with a giant 476 total points. It might also be said that this regional victory was the cli-

max of an era in Longhorn football fortunes, as the big maroon and white team had knocked at the door for the regional championship for the third straight year, only to lose out at the very top in 1965 and 1966.

Three of the five touchdowns in the game were made by Doug McCutchen, while Charles Masterson made two. Two of the counters came on pass plays from the arm of Quarterback David Glenn, who tossed one to McCutchen and one to Masterson.

First Quarter

Wilson took McCutchen's kickoff on the 11 and returned it to the 33. It didn't take long for the Longhorn defense to take over the situation, as the Mustangs fumbled and lost 8 yards on one play, then threw two incomplete passes to bring up a 4th and 18 situation. The punt went to the Wilson 43 yard line, carrying only 24 yards.

McCutchen immediately moved the ball 15 yards to the 28, then Glenn carried for 5 more. McCutchen went for 8 more and a second first down on the 15. Glenn made 4, Masterson lost 2, and McCutchen went 4 more, to bring up a 4th and 4 on the 9 yard line. It was a crucial play for the Longhorns, but they were equal to the occasion, as Glenn waited for McCutchen to move to the left side of the end zone, where he placed the ball in the big tailback's hands. Glenn kept the ball and went through the Mustang middle for extras and the score was 8-0.

McCutchen's kick went to Quarterback Johnny Scott on the 8. He was caught on the 24 by Manfred Thompson on a shoe-string tackle. Gary Crews was downed by Randy Barbee and Victor Brock on two carries but

Beef Short Course Is Set For Area

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held Dec. 11-14 under the sponsorship of the Robert Lee and Bronte high school vocational agriculture departments, according to Superintendent Jimmy Bickley and LeeRoy McDaniel, teacher of vocational agriculture, both of Robert Lee.

Frank C. Litterst, beef production specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Litterst is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a degree in Animal Husbandry. Much of his work was done in livestock production.

The short course will be held at Robert Lee High School and is scheduled to begin Dec. 11 at 7 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Dec. 12, 13 and 14. During the dates the short course is in progress, Litterst will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-farm instruction, according to McDaniel and J. T. Ballots Must Be Postmarked By Friday On Cotton Marketing Quotas Voting

Coke County farmers were reminded today to return their ballots on marketing quotas for the 1968 upland cotton crop, by mail or in person, to the ASCS county office in Robert Lee. Frank Percifull, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said that the referendum began last Monday, Dec. 4 and will close Friday, Dec. 8. Ballots must be postmarked no later than the closing date.

Percifull said every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allotment-quota program, so the referendum may reflect the considered opinion of all voters.

At issue also are the "domestic allotment" diversion program provisions, under which growers may qualify for price-support and diversion payments — in addition to loans — by diverting their cotton acreage at least 5 percent, up to a maximum of 35 percent, below the farm's allotment, putting the diverted acres into a conserving use, and meeting other program provisions. This part of the program can be used only if marketing quotas are approved.

Lease or sale of cotton allotments is included in the 1968 cotton program, regardless of the outcome of the marketing quota vote.

Eligible to vote are all producers who shared in the 1967 cotton crop or its proceeds, and the owners and operators of allotment farms where no cotton was planted in 1967. Approval by at least two-thirds of the voters is necessary if the quotas and the upland cotton program are to be effective for the 1968 crop.

Growers who elect not to participate in the diversion program may apply for a share of an export market acreage reserve and grow and export all their cotton without government assistance and without marketing quota penalties.

If the vote is not favorable, there will be no quotas or penalties applicable to the 1968 upland cotton crop, no price-support or diversion payments, no export market acreage reserve, and price-support loans to growers who do not exceed their acreage allotments will be at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

AD-LIB-BEN

The most successful Bronte Longhorn football team of all time wound up the 1967 season in the same position it began, No. 1 in Texas. The Harris Rating System placed the Longhorns in the top spot in their first prediction of the season back in early September, and there they have remained for three months.

The final report was received this week by Coach Cecil Toliver, and it showed Bronte's playing strength still on the same mark as it has been for several weeks, 110.3.

Toliver noted an interesting fact about the ratings: only four Class A schools are rated above the Longhorns, and those by only a few points.

In completing the 1967 season, the Longhorns in 11 games racked up the tremendous total of 476 points, while holding their opponents to 98.

Coach Toliver said Wednesday that he would like to write a story about this team for The Enterprise. We suggested that in addition to his personal comments about the team, that he compile some statistics about performances of the team members. We believe Enterprise readers will be interested in reading this information.

FHA MAKES LOANS IN COKE COUNTY

The Nolan-Coke County office of the Farmers Home Administration made one loan and two grants for construction or improvement of water supply and waste disposal systems in 1967, according to Alton R. Pyburn, county supervisor. About 75,000 Texas farm and other rural people benefitted from such loans and grants last year, estimates Pyburn.

Texas led the nation in total activity, advancing \$23,275,870 in loans and grants to develop or improve 139 water or waste disposal systems during 1967. The Texas projects, in 97 counties, were financed with \$22,304,600 in loans and more than \$971,270 in grants.

The rural water and waste disposal systems are organized through local initiative by town governments, public bodies, or private nonprofit associations formed by prospective users in communities of less than 5,500 population. The loans are repaid from earnings of the systems during periods of up to 40 years at 5 per cent interest.

only after he had picked up 11 yards for a 1st down. Brock and Keith Morris were responsible for the next two tackles which netted the Mustangs a total of 2 yards. A pass play was called for, but Masterson was waiting to intercept it. He was downed almost immediately on the Wilson 41.

Masterson carried for 3, McCutchen made it a 1st on the 30, then Bronte drew 15 yards for clipping, placing the ball on the 43 with 25 yards for a 1st. Three unsuccessful pass tries brought up a punt for the locals. Barbee was the man for the job as he got off a beauty that sailed 51 yards into the end zone.

Wilson took over on their 20. Delton Moore made 4 yards in two carries, and Scott kept on the third effort, but Davis Corley stopped him for a gain of only 2 yards. Scott had to punt. It went 25 yards to the Bronte 48.

Two ground carries gained only 4 yards, then McCutche tried a long pass. Things didn't work out, however, as Crews intercepted on the 20, zigged and zagged and was finally stopped with a runback of 9 yards. Scott carried for 6 to end the quarter.

Second Quarter

Crews made 6 yards, then Don Steon was stopped by Brian Richards and McCutchen for a yard gain. Steon tried again, but David Scott was hot on his trail as he fumbled and picked up the ball but lost 16 yards to bring up a 3rd and 25. Scott threw a 14 yard pass to Crews, but the Mus-

tangs were still short of a 1st by 11 yards. Scott punted to the Bronte 20 yard line.

Masterson went for 11 and a 1st on the 32. Next play was a give away, as a fumble was recovered by Leland Zant on the Bronte 49.

Moore went for 6 and Crews made almost 4, but not a 1st. The next play was a good one, however, as Scott tossed the ball to Gary Moore for a 1st on the Bronte 16 yard line. The Mustangs were knocking at the door. Brock stopped Scott for no gain, then Scott threw what looked like a cinch for a touchdown, but Barbee jumped high and came down with the ball on the 11 to save the score.

McCutchen went for 15 and a 1st on the 26. Glenn picked up 4 and Bronte drew a motion penalty on the next play. Masterson, on a draw play covered 8 of the needed yards to bring up 3rd and 2. Slippery fingers let go of the ball on the next play, and G. Moore recovered for Wilson on Bronte's 34.

McCutchen stopped Crews for a 3 yard loss. Scott then tossed a 5 yard pass to Delton Moore. Barbee reached up and intercepted the next toss, but pass interference was called, giving the Mustangs the ball and a 1st on the Bronte 20.

Time was at hand for a strong stand by the Bronte defense. Delton Moore went for a yard, Scott threw an incomplete pass, then on 3rd down completed one to Crews for 8, bringing up 4th down and 1. Scott decided he could make the yard, for he kept the

ball, but he failed to reckon with Keith Morris, Brock and McCutchen, who all had a hand in throwing him back for a yard loss and giving Bronte the ball on the 12 yard line.

Masterson went 15 yards for a 1st on the 27, McCutchen added 7 more to the 34, then Masterson made a 1st on the 40. This set the stage for one of the long runs for which McCutchen is famous. He took the ball, got good blocking, and headed for the double stripe, 60 yards away. He got past all the defenders, except Crews, with relative ease, but Crews was in hot pursuit and threw a tackle into McCutchen just before he crossed the goal line. It was too late, though, for the Bronte back had plenty of momentum to carry him on a cross. Try for points was not good. Score: 14-0.

The Mustangs realized that the first half was running out as they took McCutchen's kick on the 15 and returned it to their 45. Passes were the order of the hour. They picked up 6 yards on their first try. Second down saw Scott pitching it to Crews, who passed it back to Scott for 10 yards and a 1st on the Bronte 39. Scott then tossed a long beauty, but the defending by Barbee was just as pretty as he knocked the ball down before it got to the receiver. As the seconds ticked off, Scott saw he only had one play so he wanted another long try. He never got it off, for Corley was after him and forced him to keep the ball for a no gain run. Score was 14-0.

Third Quarter

The Mustangs put the ball in play on the 36 after taking the kick to start the second half. A 26 yard pass to G. Moore moved the ball to the Bronte 37. Steon went for 2, Scott threw an incomplete pass, and Crews lost 3 yards to bring up 4th and 11. G. Moore made a fine catch on the 4th down try as he took Scott's throw on the 5 to bring up 1st and goal. Crews was not to be denied on the 3rd down, as he went in for the counter. Try for points failed. Score: 14-6.

Keith Weid booted Wilson's first kickoff of the night to McCutchen on the 10 and he ran 25 yards to the 35. A penalty moved the ball on to the 50 and from there McCutchen dashed to the Mustang 22 for a 1st. Wilson drew another penalty for tackling McCutchen by the face mask, moving the ball half the distance to the goal, on the 11. From there Masterson plowed through the middle for the third Bronte counter. A pass conversion try was no good, and the score was 20-6.

McCutchen's kick went to Crews on the 20 and he was pulled in on the 34. Delton Moore carried for 2, then Scott threw a pass which was picked off by David Glenn on his own 43 yard line. He dashed to the 32 of Wilson, but a clip was called, moving the ball back to the Bronte 31.

McCutchen ground out 10 yards on four tries to make a 1st. Masterson went for 30 yards, but another clip was called, moving the ball back to the 35. McCutchen decided this was a good scoring position, so he carried the ball around the right side and headed for pay dirt. Glenn went over the left side for the conversion, to make the score 28-6.

Scott took the kickoff on the 20 and was downed on the 34. A couple of fine tackles by Don Hageman and Corley put the Mustangs in the hole some 21 yards bringing up a 3rd and 31, and the 3rd down didn't help any as Brock nailed the ball carrier for no gain. Scott had to punt and it went to McCutchen on the 40. A clipping penalty moved it back to the Bronte 41. The Mustangs held the Longhorns to 6 yards on three plays, so the locals were faced with a punting

situation.

Fourth Quarter

Barbee's kick, the second of the night, sailed 53 yards and Wilson took over on their 20. A new secret weapon came onto the field in the person of David Lopez. His elusive running was the prime factor in the 80 yard drive which climaxed 17 plays later with the second Mustang TD.

Lopez went 38 of the 80 yards, with help coming at times from Scott, Steon and Crews. Notes indicate that tackles showing down this most potent demonstration of the game by the Mustangs were made by Richards, Corley, Brock, Scott, Glenn, Hageman and McCutchen. Scott carried over from the 3 yard line on a 4th down try to make the score. He passed to David Wied for the conversion, and he score was 28-14.

Keith Wied kicked for the Mustangs with the ball going to Masterson on the 28. He traveled 13 yards to the 41 before he was pulled down, and on 1st down went to the Wilson 49 for a 1st. McCutchen tried a couple of times for 4 and 5 yards, and Masterson went 5 more for the 1st on the 35. Glenn made a yard, and Coach Cecil Toliver sent in his reserves.

Steve Williams made a yard, then Bronte drew a 5 yard penalty, and Cooper kept for 3 to bring up 4th and 10. The regulars went back in and McCutchen tried a field goal. It fell short of the mark, but the Longhorns were kept alive by a roughing the kicker penalty and they knew they had things well in hand because only 10 seconds showed on the clock. Showing real faith in their ability, instead of being satisfied with the 28-14 win, Glenn called for a pass play. McCutchen and Masterson were both downfield, but McCutchen was covered up with Mustangs and Masterson was relatively free of their bother; Glenn threw the ball the 38 yards to the double stripe, plus several extra yards, into Masterson's waiting hands for the last touchdown of the 1967 football season. However, more points were yet to come. Corley was elected to make the 2 extras, and he ran them over. The scoreboard read 36-14, and the clock said 3 seconds remained in the game.

Coach Toliver decided to let his regulars rest the remainder of game, as he sent in his reserves to complete the game. James Vaughn kicked off to G. Moore on the 19 and the Mustang back battled his way to the 46 before he was dumped. The ball game was over, and the Longhorns won the first regional championship in the history of the school by a score of 36-14.

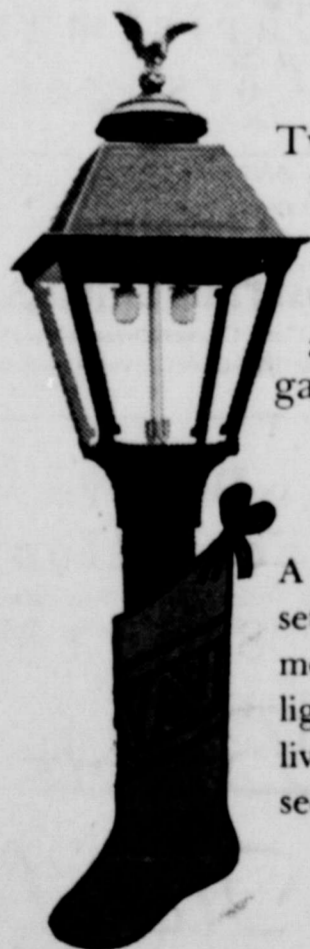

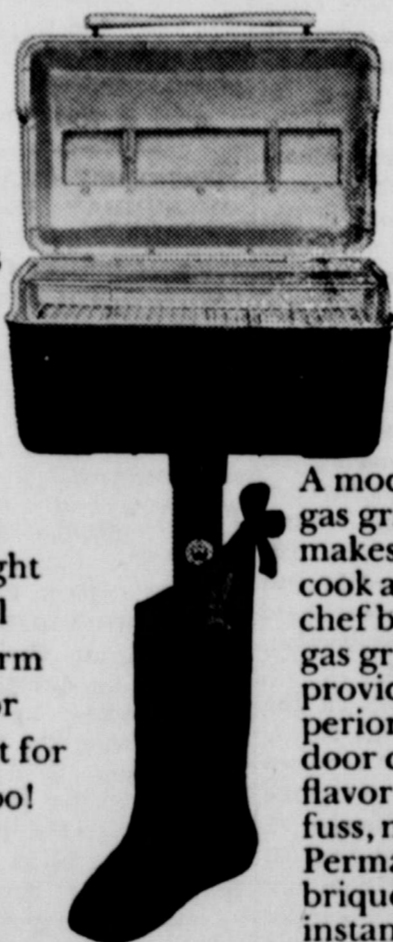
