He was an uncle to Mayor Royce Lee, Clyde Lee, Mrs. Dorothy Kiker and Mrs. J. W. Martin, all of Bronte.

Cold Weather Plagues Area

Cold, dismal weather has been the rule in this area the first of the week. Area residents awakened Monday morning to find everything coated with ice and snow.

The cold weather started over the weekend when a norther blew in about noon Saturday to set the stage for some of the season's lowest temperatures.

Some thawing took place Monday afternoon, and by Tuesday afternoon most of the ice and

snow were gone. Skies were cloudy again Wednesday morning but by mid-afternoon, a welcome sun was peeping out from behind clouds which were clearing.

However, weather forecasts Wednesday afternoon gave little hope for continued sunshine.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said that he did not think the cold weather had caused much absenteeism in Bronte School, other than as a contributing factor to illness.

More students than usual were absent Tuesday when 19 high school students did not attend classes, and Wednesday when 14 did not show up.

Barbee said most of the students absent were ill with flu, colds, etc. He added that Bronte School's attendance is usually about 95 per cent, while this week it has been between 85 and 90 percent.

We feel that perhaps there are citizens of this community who would really like to have some small part toward helping the center over this rough spot, and have a part in the continuation of its work in relieving human suffering.

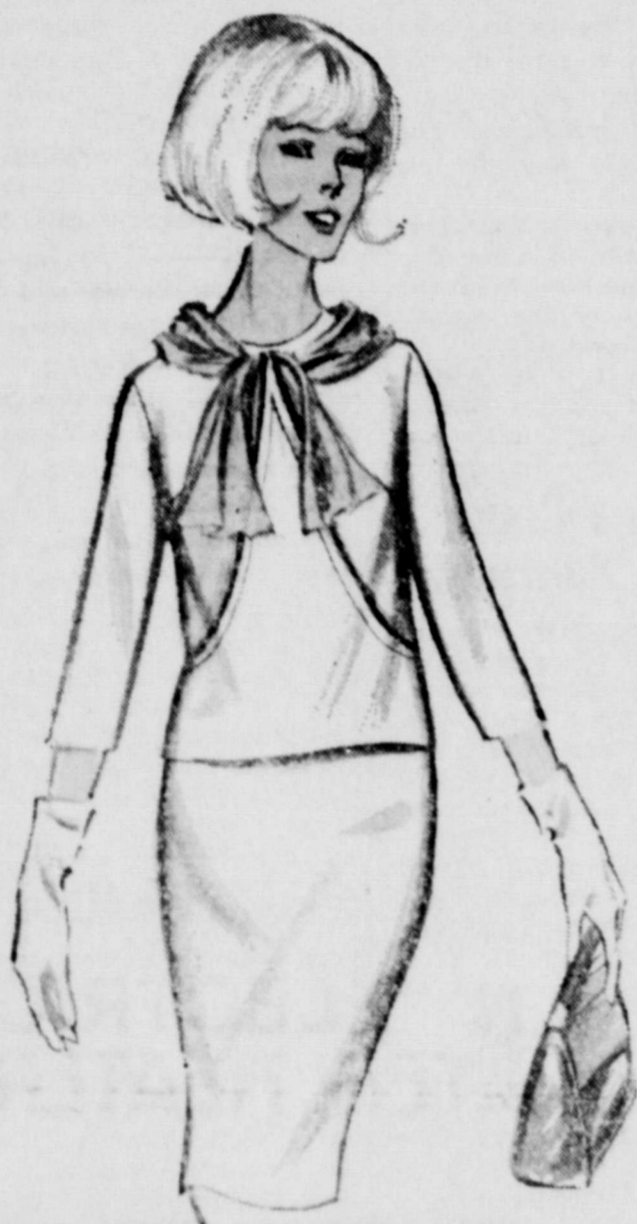

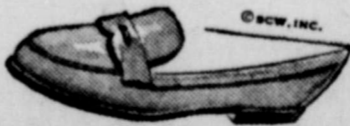

Frank C. Dickey Seeks Re-Election As County Atty.

Frank C. Dickey is announcing that he is a candidate for re-election as County Attorney of Coke County. In a statement for the press, he said:

"I am indebted to you people of Coke County and West Texas for the nice practice, and I thank you one and all."

"I offer myself for re-election and will strive to serve you, if elected, for another term efficiently and diligently.

Mr. Dickey is a native son of Coke County, having come from pioneer stock. His father ranched in the southwest part of the county and was also a traveling dentist. His grandfather came through Coke County before the Civil War and was one of the first settlers in this area.

Mr. Dickey worked as a ranch hand as a young man, and volunteered soon after war was declared with Germany in 1917. He served as a General Headquarters observer in the Fifth Army Corps in France.

He received his law degree from Baylor University in 1926 and was admitted to the bar the same year.

Mr. Dickey practiced law in Waco and Ballinger for 20 years. He returned to Coke County in 1946 and opened his office in Robert Lee.

His wife is the former Myrtle Hill, whom he married in Dallas. They have two sons: Jimmy, who resides with his family in Dallas, and Frank Jr., who is a practicing attorney in San Angelo, and 51st District Attorney. His district includes Coke County.

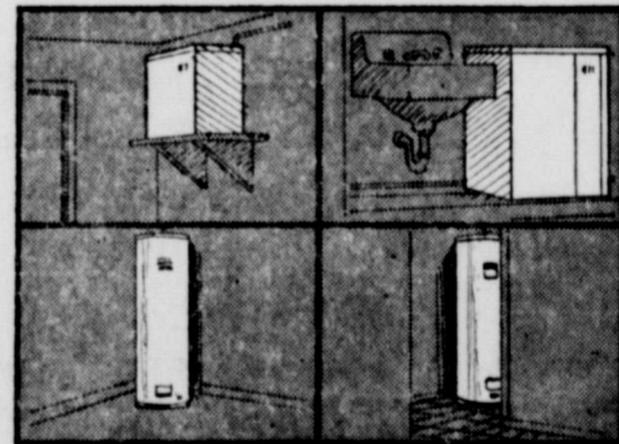

Brock is a Democrat and his candidacy is subject to action of voters in the May 4 Democratic Primary.

A native of Bronte, Brock was employed in the market of Sims Food Store before he became constable. Prior to that he was a longtime employee of I. M. Cumble when he was in the grocery business.

Brock is married to the former Nedra Bell and they have six children.

Brock's statement to Precinct 2 voters:

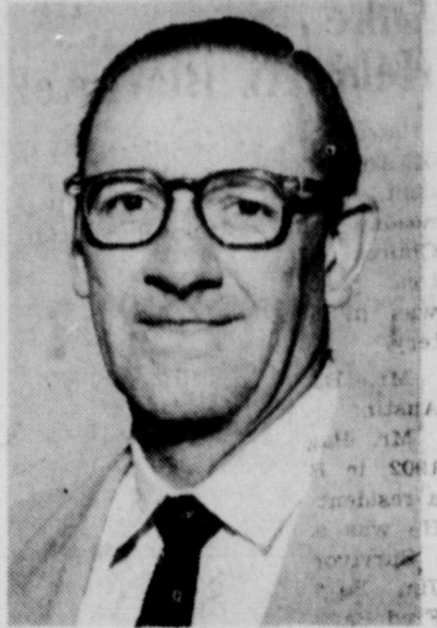
