



## Registration Deadline Near

Deadline is drawing near for voters to register so they can participate in 1968 elections. Jan. 31 is the last day to sign up, according to O. B. Jacobs, county tax assessor-collector.

As of Wednesday morning, Ja-

cobs reported that 1,212 persons had registered at his office. He said he was well pleased with the number, but found it difficult to make a comparison with other major election years, since this year is the first time persons over

60 years of age have been required to register.

### Everyone Has To Register

Jacobs emphasized that everyone, regardless of age, must register in order to be eligible to vote. Young persons who will become 21 during 1968, must register before the Jan. 31 deadline in order to vote in elections which occur after their birthdays.

Persons who find it inconvenient to come by the tax assessor's office may mail in an application. A blank is printed on an inside page of this newspaper. It can be clipped, filled out and mailed to Jacobs, and he will send the registration back to the applicant.

### Deputy at Bronte

A deputy from Jacobs' office was scheduled to be at First National Bank in Bronte Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week for the convenience of voters who live on the east side of the county.

Lots of action is in store for Texas voters this year. A President of the United States will be elected in November, as will other officials on down through state, district, county and precinct level. Democratic Primaries will be held in May; school board and city elections will be held in April. Jacobs pointed out that registration is a requirement to vote in any of these elections.

## Banquet to Fete Longhorn Team

A football banquet, honoring the Regional Champion Bronte Longhorns and their coaches will be held Monday, Jan. 28, at 7 p.m. in the school's old gymnasium. Tickets are now on sale at the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee and downtown at West Texas Utilities Co. Tickets will sell for \$2.50 each.

Grant Teaff, offensive end coach of the Texas Tech Red Raiders in Lubbock, will be the featured speaker at the banquet.

Many local fans, feeling that the 1967 football squad was probably the greatest Longhorn team of all time, wanted to have a banquet especially to honor squad members and their coaches. Supt. C. B. Barbee said that the affair will not necessarily replace the customary all-sports banquet which is usually held later in the year. "If everybody wants to have an all-sports banquet later, I see no reason why we can't have it," the superintendent said.

Honors will be handed out at the banquet, along with jackets to the players, coaches and others.

Last year's Longhorns have already received an abundance of honors, including spots on all-district, all-area, all-West Texas and all-state teams. Coach Cecil Toliver was named Class B All-Area Coach of the Year by the Abilene Reporter-News.

### Outstanding Speaker

Coach Toliver said that Coach Teaff is one of the outstanding banquet speakers of this area, as well as being one of the outstanding coaches of college football circles.

Before going to Texas Tech in 1966, he was head football and

track coach at McMurry College in Abilene. Before going to McMurry, he was assistant football coach in Lubbock Public Schools until 1960 when he became head football coach.

Teaff played high school football at Snyder, graduating in 1950. He enrolled in San Angelo College where he played for the Rams two years. He then went to McMurry where he played a tackle position for the Indians in 1953-54-55. He received his B.S. degree in physical education in 1956, and an M. A. degree in education in 1957, both from McMurry.

During his college football career, he was named a member of the All-Texas Conference team and the All Texas College Team.

Teaff is widely known as an after dinner speaker and as a Baptist lay speaker. He is married to the former Donell Phillips and they have three daughters.

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## Football Statistics Show Interesting Information About 1967 Longhorns

Some interesting statistics have been released by Coach Cecil Toliver on the past football season. Toliver has tabulated figures on various aspects of the games for each contest. Below are listed some of the totals for the season:

Probably most important is the fact that the Longhorns amassed a tremendous 476 points to their opponents' 98.

In the first down department, Bronte made 156 to the opposition's 112. (Editor's Note: Those 30 to 90 yard gains still just count as one first down.)

Yards rushing: Bronte, 3295; opponents, 1795.

Yards passing: Bronte, 1007; opponents, 717.

Passes attempted: Bronte, 127; opponents, 147.

Passes completed: Bronte, 55; opponents, 44.

Passes intercepted: Bronte, 10; opponents, 13.

Punts and average: Bronte, 33 for 31.90; opponents, 54 for 28.65.

Fumbles: Bronte, 30; opponents, 27.

Opponents fumbles recovered: Bronte 16; opponents, 14.

Yards penalized: Bronte 695; opponents, 538.

### Backs and Ends

Toliver also released some figures on the gains of backs and ends during the 1967 season.

Doug McCutchen, the highest scorer in West Texas, compiled a neat record of 39 touchdowns in the 11 games played for 234 points. His extra point efforts added 12 more for a total of 246 points.

McCutchen carried the ball 164 times for 1879 yards, an average of 11.45 per carry. He passed 28 times, completing 8 for 156 and three of the completions went for touchdowns. His passes averaged 5.57.

Quarterback David Glenn accounted for 74 points of the Longhorns' total. In addition to his superb ball handling, he compiled the team's most successful passing record of the year.

Glenn passed the ball 78 times and had 45 completions for an amazing 57.6 percent. His passes covered 931 yards of football field for an average gain of 11.92 yards per pass. In addition, Glenn carried the ball 87 times for 563 yards, to average 6.47 yard per carry.

Charles Masterson, wingback on the 1967 champion team, accounted for 5 touchdowns for 30 points, 9 conversions for 18, to

make a total of 48 points for the season. He carried the ball 109 times for 714 yards, giving him an average of 6.55 per carry.

Manfred Thompson, the other man in the backfield, carried the ball only 10 times, but he made 121 yards, to give him an average of 12.1, the highest average gain of any back on the team. Another amazing thing about Thompson's record is that he made a touchdown on three of his 10 carries.

End Davis Corley was responsible for 60 Longhorn points this past season. He went for 8 TDs for 48, and took 6 conversions for 12 more. He caught 20 passes for a total of 406 yards.

End Randy Barbee chalked up 2 touchdowns on pass completions and snatched 2 more for conversions, to give him a total of 16 points. He caught 16 passes for a total gain of 68 yards during the season. Barbee also had some impressive punting credited to him. He had 65 and 50 yard punts in two games, and in the Regional final with Wilson, he booted the ball twice for a 52 yard average.

## School Census Ends January 31

Bronte School is now in the process of taking its annual census. Object of the effort is to count every school age child living in the school district.

All children who were born after Sept. 1, 1950, and before Sept. 1, 1962, should be enumerated in the census, according to Supt. C. B. Barbee. This includes children who will be six years old, but under 18, on Sept. 1, 1968.

School officials said it is very important that every school age child be counted, since this number is one of the factors used in determining the amount of state aid the school receives.

The cooperation of everyone in the area is asked in making the census complete.

Deadline for getting a child signed up on the census is Jan. 31. Further information may be obtained by going by the school office or by calling the school.

## Jury Cuts Award For Land Needed For RL Reservoir

The condemnation suit appeal which was heard by a six-man jury resulted in lowering an earlier award some \$347,859.84. The appeal, which was made by the Colorado River Municipal Water District, in its suit against Mrs. Helen Harris Wilcockson, et al, for 4,014.43 acres of land needed for the Robert Lee Reservoir, came after a three-man board awarded the defendants \$916,685.95 last September.

The jury's award amounted to \$568,826.11.

According to stories earlier this week in the San Angelo Standard-Times, San Angelo attorney Bill I. Marshall announced that he plans to appeal the county court decision for Mrs. Wilcockson and the other owners of the property.

Marshall did not express objection to the jury's decision but said he did object to the legal tactics of the CRMWD. He said the district amended its original condemnation petition after the September award and before the appeal trial.

CRMWD attorney James Rosser of Snyder filed an enhancement amendment claiming value of the remaining land of the ranch would be enhanced by the presence of the lake. The jury awarded no damages to the remaining acreage because of the lake.

Marshall said the injection of the enhancement amendment by CRMWD created a new issue in the case and constituted an error in the trial.

The jury decided on value of the property as follows:

Surface value to 4,014.43 acres of land, \$441,587.30; one-half of the underground water and water rights, \$75,000.00; damage to 442 acres of land above the reservoir on which CRMWD requested an easement, \$5,747.56; damage to minerals and mineral rights, \$46,491.25; total \$568,826.11.

Testimony began Monday of last week after a jury was selected, and continued into Friday afternoon. The jury was dismissed early Friday to give attorneys time to prepare their charges. When court reconvened Saturday morning, attorneys for both sides made their final pleas, and the jury began its deliberation about 1 p.m. and brought in a decision at 4:15 p.m.

Some of the history of the ranch was brought out in the final arguments. It was purchased in 1936 by Ralph Harris from John Sauls for \$7.60 per acre. John Mark McLaughlin of San Angelo, appearing for Mrs. Wilcockson, said that the family "never intended to sell it."

CRMWD attorney James Rosser brought out the need for eminent domain to construct a lake such as the Robert Lee Reservoir. He also stated that Humble Oil and Refining Co. has the property under lease and will continue the lease, saying that any inconvenience caused by the lake in developing oil will be Humble's and not the owners of the mineral rights. He also brought out that Humble is the main customer for the water whose value was under consideration in the suit.

County Judge W. W. Thetford presided at the hearing.
