## 3 Longhorns Sign With Texas Tech

An unusual happening occurred Tuesday morning in the office of High School Principal James L. Golson.

Three Bronte High School senior boys signed letters of intent to play football for Texas Tech. Future Red Raiders are Doug McCutchen, Brian Richards and Davis Corley.

Coach Grant Teaff of the Tech coaching staff was here to accept their applications. He told The Enterprise that he felt he had a good day's work before 8:30 a.m. to be able to take back let-

ters of intent "on three such fine prospective Red Raiders."

All three boys were named to the Class B All-State team.

Coach Cecil Toliver said so far as he knew, it was the first time that three players from a Class B school have been signed to play football for a major college in one year. "I'm proud of these boys; in fact I'm proud of the whole team because it was the great team effort and performance which made all this possible," the coach said.

McCutchen has been one of the most sought after high school backs in the state this year, with all Southwest Conference members trying to sign him. Corley and Richards also received a number of offers from other colleges, but decided on Texas Tech.

McCutchen announced his intention to sign with Tech last week, but Corley and Richards did not agree to sign up until Monday night. Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock was the first moment when letters could be signed by players and their parents.

## Golson, Raughton Get New Contracts Effective Till 1970

Two important items of business were taken care of at Tuesday night's meeting of Bronte School's board of trustees.

Contracts of High School Principal James L. Golson and Elementary School Principal James N. Raughton were extended one year. They now have contracts to fill their present positions until June 15, 1970.

### Election Called

Another major item of business was the calling of a trustee election for Saturday, April 6. Two trustees will be elected, to fill positions now held by Wayne Arrott and A. E. Bell Jr. The Enterprise has not learned if either of them intends to seek re-election.

A new procedure in hiring other professional personnel of the school was begun Tuesday night when the board also extended the contract of Coach Cecil Toliver for another year. Prior to this year no class room teachers, including coaches, were hired until the March board meeting. Toliver's new contract extends until June 1, 1968. Other teachers will be voted on at the March meeting.

### Barbee Contract Extended

The contract of Supt. C. B. Barbee was extended when the school board convened for its January meeting. It runs until July 1, 1971.

The board this week changed its regular meeting date in April from the 11th to the 9th, since the original date conflicted with Easter holidays.

## Longhorns Stay In Basketball Race With Win Monday

Bronte Longhorns basketball team managed to stay alive Monday night when they defeated Forsan 59-56. Forsan is the only team in the district which has defeated the Longhorns, and now Bronte is the only team in the district which has defeated the Buffaloes. Result: a playoff is almost a sure thing, depending upon the outcome of the Bronte-Garden City game Friday night.

### Girls Lose

The local girls played a whale of a ball game, but went down, 72-59, before a superior team from Forsan. The victory gave the Forsan lassies an 8-0 district record and undisputed possession of the title. Norma Pruitt was high pointer for Bronte with 29, Jolene Vaughn was second with 11 and Kreta Kiker had 10. Melissa Lee got into foul trouble early in the game and had to sit out a good portion of the contest, but still sank 9 points. Molly Condron made 33 and Gloria Dodd 28 for Forsan.

The boys contest was a bone chiller, as the Longhorns took the lead from the first and held it all through the game except for one time when the Buffs got a one point lead. In spite of the almost constant lead, the visitors were breathing down the necks of their hosts throughout the game.

Doug McCutchen's 16 out of 19 free shots saved the day for the Longhorns, and gave him scoring honors with 26. Others scoring in double figures were Davis Corley 14, and Charles Masterson 11.

Bronte School officials and coaches have enough faith in the Longhorns' chances for downing Garden City that they are already making preliminary plans for a playoff game. Supt. C. B. Barbee said Forsan officials will be here Friday night to make plans, if Bronte emerges the victor. He said in all probability, the contest will be played Tuesday night at a neutral site along Highway 80.

The games with Garden City here Friday night will wind up the district play.

## Freezing Rain, Sleet Cover Area

A treacherous ice coating covered everything in the Bronte area Wednesday morning. Local residents were greeted with slippery streets and sidewalks which made any kind of movement hazardous.

Rain started falling here Monday and up to .7 inch had fallen by Wednesday morning.

Temperatures Wednesday hovered around the freezing mark. However, more heavily traveled streets and highways were showing some signs of thawing at noon.

Weather forecasts offered little relief from the cold and freezing rain until up in the day Thursday. A thorough freeze over was predicted for Wednesday night.

Bronte schools were dismissed Wednesday because of the iced road conditions.

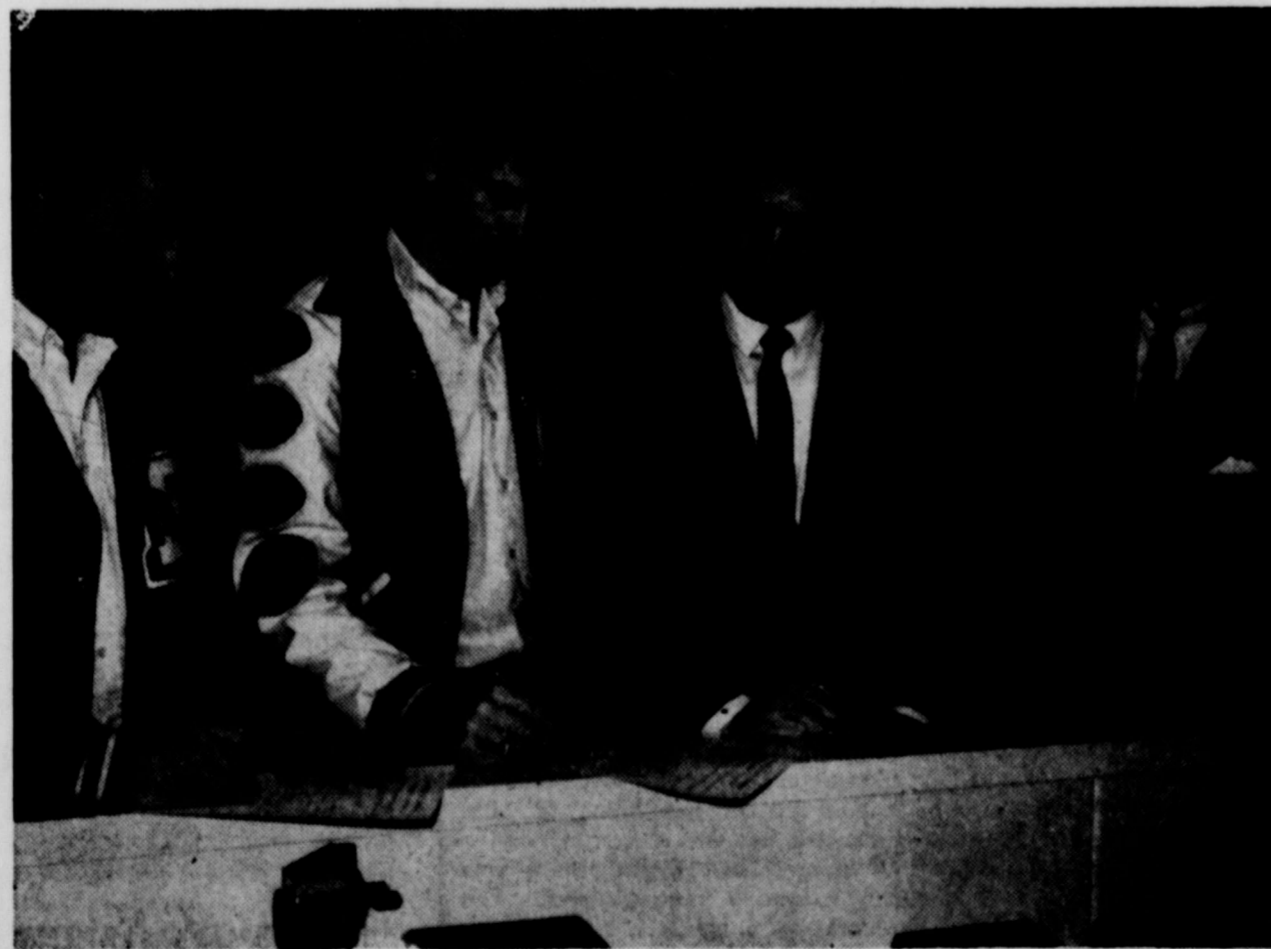
Elmer Hurley, chairman of the Dimes drive, said he was well pleased with the result, which brings the total for the east side of Coke County to \$666.48.

### Cherry Pie

Whether Washington chopped down his father's tree or not, he did share in making the cherry famous.

So much, in fact, that most Washington's Birthday celebrations feature a cherry pie. But winter months always make an especially fine time to enjoy tempting, hot desserts. So, what could be better than a slice of hot cherry pie enhanced with an ample topping of ice cream?

Perhaps you will select canned red tart cherries for your pie? You can expect high color and good flavor from canned cherries that have earned the U. S. Grade A or U. S. Fancy label. Many processors use the grading service of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service as a means of establishing quality control of their pack.

**CHERRY PIE:** You'll need 2 1/4 cups canned red tart cherries well drained, 3/4 cup cherry juice drained from the cherries (you may need to add water for full measure), 3/4 cup sugar, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup cornstarch, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons butter, a pinch of nutmeg, red food coloring if desired, pastry for an 8-inch double crust pie and an 8-inch pie pan.

Combine sugar, salt, and 1/2 cup cherry juice in a saucepan and heat. Combine cornstarch and remaining cherry juice and stir into first mixture. Cook until thickened. Remove from heat and add lemon juice, butter, nutmeg and coloring. Carefully stir in the cherries. Let cool while preparing pastry. Line pie pan with half the pastry and fill with the cherry mixture. Roll out remaining pastry, cut into 1/2-inch wide strips and use to make lattice top for pie. Trim off excess pastry and crimp edges. Bake in 425-degree F oven for 30 minutes. Serve hot with ice cream.

### Consumer Clips

What's the difference between the round inspection mark and the shield-shaped grade mark on the poultry you buy? The inspection mark indicates wholesomeness, while the grade mark indicates quality. The inspection mark protects your health while the grade mark protects your pocketbook.

When you sunburn, your skin turns red, but when a potato burns, its skin turns green. Too much light — natural or artificial — will cause potatoes to turn green. Discard the entire green portion on potatoes. Otherwise they will taste bitter.

Have you ever driven through the rolling Palouse Hills of eastern Washington and northern Idaho? Did you ever see so many fields of peas? This area produces about 95 percent of the nation's dry edible peas. What a big crop was harvested last season. That's why dry split peas are so plentiful now.

Serve turkey for George Washington's birthday. Turkeys are plentiful. About 370 million pounds of turkeys are in storage now. This is about 170 million above normal.

### Bill Allen Heads Easter Seals Drive

Bill Allen will serve as Easter Seal representative and treasurer for the 1968 Easter Seal Appeal in Coke County, it was announced by Dr. Robert W. Milam, of McAllen, president of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Coke County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning March 1. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide disabled persons and their families treatment and service adapted to their specific community needs, will be conducted until Easter Sunday, April 14.

Allen is one of 169 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the state-wide program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 per cent of all funds raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the state.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1968 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen or his family in Coke County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Allen at Robert Lee State Bank, who will refer the request for services to the Easter Seal Society. A determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance will be made.

Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

Dr. Milam stated that funds received as a result of the annual Easter Seal Appeal now aid 17,622 disabled Texans but that there are many more not currently being aided. These disabled citizens and especially those in Coke County who contact Allen can now be guided to the proper sources of assistance. They or their families are urged to contact him or the Texas Easter Seal Society in Dallas, regardless of age, race, cause of disability or financial status.

Dr. Milam added that the Texas Easter Seal Society annually spends more money on direct services to patients than it raises in the Easter Seal Appeal.

### 4,200,000 Cars Yet To Be Inspected

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety reported Monday that more than 4,250,000 vehicles still remain to be inspected for the 1968 sticker before the April 15 deadline.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director, said that only 1,574,397 cars had been inspected so far this year. The total number of vehicles inspected during 1967 was 5,702,862.

Garrison urged motorists to have their cars inspected as soon as possible in order to avoid the long lines which will undoubtedly develop as the inspection period draws to a close.

Garrison reminded car owners that under new provisions of the law the inspection will include front seat belts where the anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment, steering, and wheels and rims.

"Those motorists who wait until the last weeks of the inspection period to have their cars inspected may find that they will need to install seat belts," Garrison said. "And with the last minute rush, there may not be enough seat belt kits in supply to take care of the demand. Dealers will have no way of knowing how many sets to have on hand,

so to be on the safe side we urge all owners to have the work done as soon as possible."

Garrison said the inspection could be completed at any of the 5,336 inspection stations in Texas. Each authorized station displays a standard sign identifying the establishment as one approved by the State for conducting inspections.
