Team Gone To State Tourney

Quite an exodus of Bronte residents was underway Wednesday afternoon and was expected to continue Thursday morning as fans followed the regional champion Longhorns to Austin for the state basketball tournament. Most of the games will be played in Gregory gym on the University of Texas campus.

The Longhorns, by virtue of two victories last weekend at Big Spring, won the championship of Region VI which gave them one of the six berths in the state tourney.

The tournament will open Thursday at 8:45 a.m. with the Longhorns going up against Friendswood, which is located between Houston and Galveston.

If the Longhorns win their first game, they will go up against Darrouzett, champions of the South Plains and Panhandle region. This contest will be played Friday at 9 a.m.

In the other bracket, Kinnard and Prairie Valley will meet at 10:10 a.m. Thursday, and the winner of that game will meet Leuders-Avooca at 10:30 a.m. Friday.

Losers in the second round will play for third place honors at 8:45 p.m. Friday in Travis High School gym.

The championship game will be played in Gregory gym Saturday at 9 a.m.

Coach James N. Raughton, his ten team members and manager, Supt. C. B. Barbee and Tommy Walter left Bronte at 9 a.m. Wednesday. They planned to eat lunch in Lampasas and arrive in Austin in time to get settled before a scheduled workout in Gregory gymnasium at 4:30 p.m. The team will stay in the Driscoll Hotel.

Supt. C. B. Barbee advised fans who travel to Austin to check schedules there, as to the place for some games, since they will not all be played in Gregory gym.

Admission prices will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students to all games except the championship game, which will be \$1.50 and 75 cents.

A large number of fans left Bronte Wednesday afternoon, others will get up early Thursday morning in order to be there for the game at 8:45, and still others are expected to go to Austin later in the weekend, if the Longhorns advance to later games.

Coach Raughton wouldn't make any predictions concerning the outcome of the tournament, but he did indicate that his team members would give their opponents everything they have, regardless of how many games they play.

School Dismissed For State Tourney

School has been dismissed here Thursday and Friday in order for all students and teachers who wish to attend the state basketball tournament.

Easter vacation will be cut short one day to make up for the Thursday holiday, and Friday was already a scheduled holiday because of the teachers meeting in San Angelo.

Youths Caught With Loot Taken From Local School

Two Ballinger youths were apprehended in Ballinger early Tuesday morning driving a pickup containing items taken from Bronte School.

One of them, Milton R. Watson, 19, has been charged with breaking and entering. He is in Coke County jail in lieu of \$1,000 bond. The other youth, a juvenile, is in custody of his parents pending a hearing before Judge W. W. Thetford. Watson was also charged with driving without an operator's license.

Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker said the break-in took place about midnight. Entry was through a door of the school.

Nurses To Canvass For Heart Drive

Nurses of Bronte will make a house-to-house march for donations for the Texas Heart Association, Monday afternoon and evening, March 11, beginning at 5:30 p.m. This announcement was given to the Bronte Enterprise by the Rev. A. S. Masterson, who is chairman of the Coke County Heart Fund Drive for 1968. He added, "The nurses have asked that those who wish to make a contribution should leave their porch light on that evening until a volunteer calls."

Mrs. H. C. Murtishaw is co-chairman of this year's Heart Fund for the east side of Coke County. She stated that the nurses will make an effort to contact residents in the rural areas; however, if anyone is not contacted and desires to make a contribution, he may mail it to "Heart Fund," Drawer D, Bronte, Tex. 76933. She advises that Bronte business firms will not be contacted, leaving the owners free to make their donations at their homes.

Valuable, informative literature relative to the heart will be left at each home where a nurse calls. "Later in the week," said Mrs. Murtishaw, "a volunteer group of boys will go to homes where there are children and offer special 'Heart' balloons for ten cents each.

There is no question that an entirely new frontier on the heart has been opened up with this past year's human heart transplant operations, Masterson said. Research continues in this field re-

McDonald Accepts Hospital Position

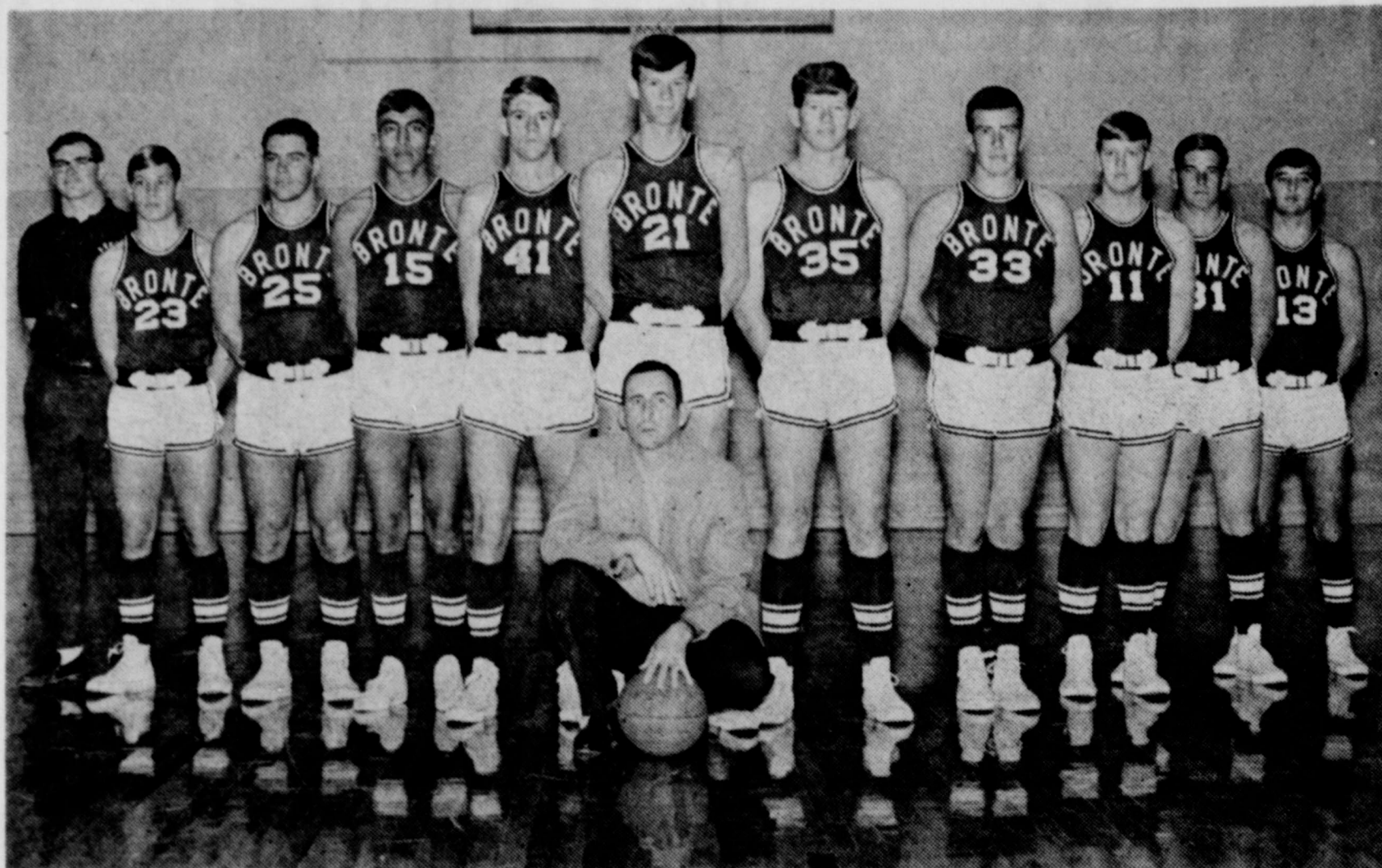

Longhorns Top Roby For Regional Crown

The Longhorns did the impossible last Saturday afternoon when they defeated the Roby Lions 54-53 in the finals at the regional basketball tournament at Big Spring. Standing with an eight point deficit with only 2 1/2 minutes left to play, the local lads never gave up. They shortened the gap to 1 point with 1:45 left. Then a field goal by Davis Corley and two free shots by Charles Masterson put the game on ice, as the clock showed 40 seconds left to play.

With their big 3 point lead, the Longhorns were interested in not fouling their opponents, and the

boys from Roby sank two points to make the score 54-53. After Roby's final field goal, the local lads took the ball and went into a stall to kill the remaining few seconds.

The Longhorns went into the lead at the beginning of the game, but Roby soon caught up and led the remainder of the contest until the closing seconds.

Corley was the big gun for the Longhorns with his 27 points, exactly half of the total. Doug McCutchen's 10 points was the only other double digit scoring. The Longhorns seemed cold as ice most of the game, as they missed shot after shot, but they were playing a team which had a big height advantage.

Coach James Raughton used only two substitutes in the game. Willie Zuniga went in for David Glenn, who was pulled after he got into foul trouble. Glenn went back in at the beginning of the fourth quarter with four fouls but managed to stay the remainder of the game. Zuniga was pulled off part of the time Glenn was on the bench, with Don Hageman taking his place.

The win gave the Longhorns a 27-2 season record to take to Austin.

Down Sands

The Longhorns downed Sands Friday night, 70-64, to gain a spot in the championship game. Corley was high pointer in this contest, also, as he scorched the cords for 28 points. Glenn sank 12 points, while Masterson and McCutchen both made 10, and Randy Barbee went for 6.

In the other Friday night game, Roby downed Paint Rock 63-57. An early game Saturday afternoon for third place saw Paint Rock Indians rock Sands, 57-55.

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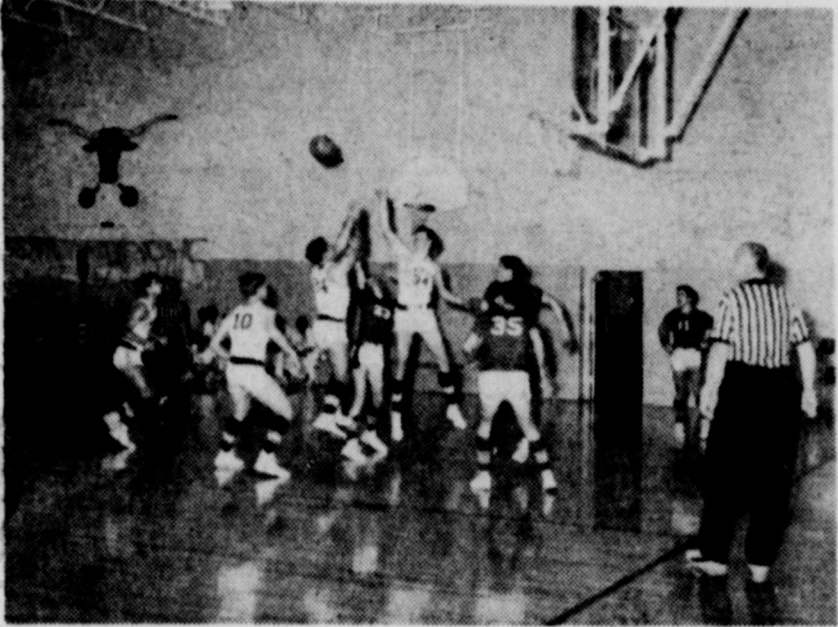
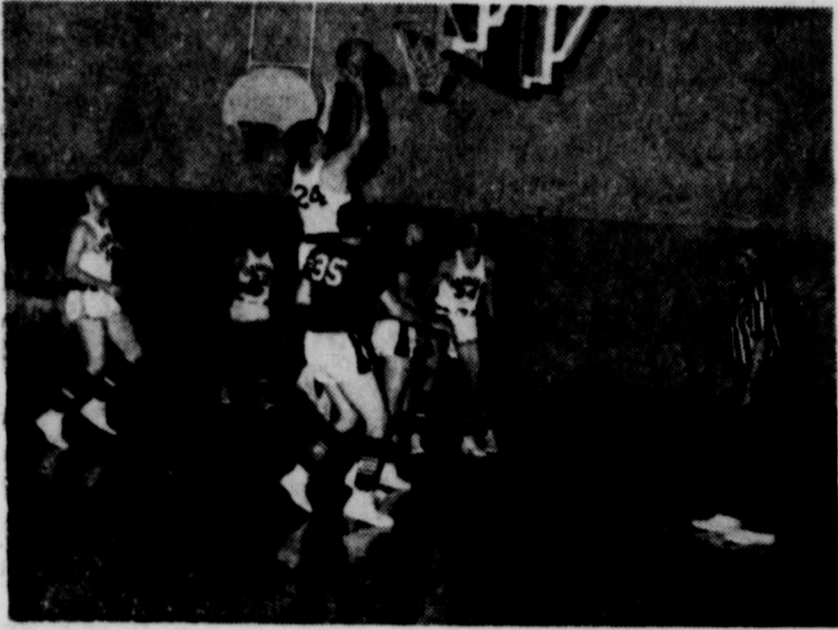

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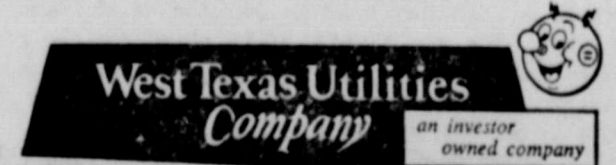

Special guests were her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Pohl of Matador. Twenty-five other guests were present for the occasion.

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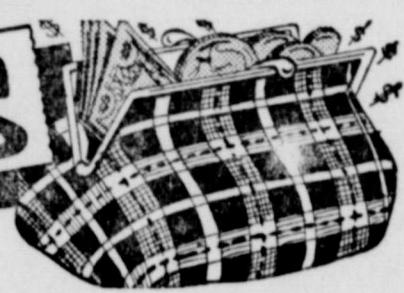
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
