Hi, —

After reading the last issue of The Enterprise, I felt compelled to write about Viet Nam.

As for being a Hawk or a Dove, I've never really considered myself one or the other. I'm just a believer in doing what has to be done.

Many people near and dear to me have been or are still in Viet Nam. Among those is one now "missing in action." We are waiting now for the Army's decision whether to list him as dead or still missing. So I can't consider myself untouched by the sorrow of this war.

However, after much soul searching I still cannot say we are wrong in being there. I certainly do feel that much more could and should be done to bring it to a conclusion.

"All wars are for nothing but to fatten bank rolls.?" Not so! What in the world has happened to our belief that all men should be free? Is this opposed to certain only to the individual?

World War II caught me at an age too young to begin to understand it. I can only put together what seemed to be by reading everything I could get my hands on about the period of time leading up to the war. Aren't we playing that same record that we did then? Stay out of it. It's not our war or our business. It took Pearl Harbor to shake us loose then. Must the enemy beat at our very door every time before we realize they must be stopped?

The Bible also says "Love Thy Neighbor." Exactly how much love do we measure out to our neighbor so that we stop just short of getting involved enough to help him when he is being run over.

No Christian wants to kill, but let's be realistic. If your child were being murdered, would you stand there and ask, "Please stop," or would you take that drastic step to kill to protect that life?"

I find it more than difficult to believe that 90% of our boys are in Viet Nam by force. Aside from the great number of Army men that are there because they asked to be, what about the Air Force, Marines and Navy? That "dirty draft law" doesn't have much to do with those branches.

Yes, I wave a flag and I'm proud of our country. A T.V. program once started with the words that "Democracy is a very poor form of government but it is so much better than all the rest."

To me the question is "What government do we want and how much are we willing to do to maintain it?"

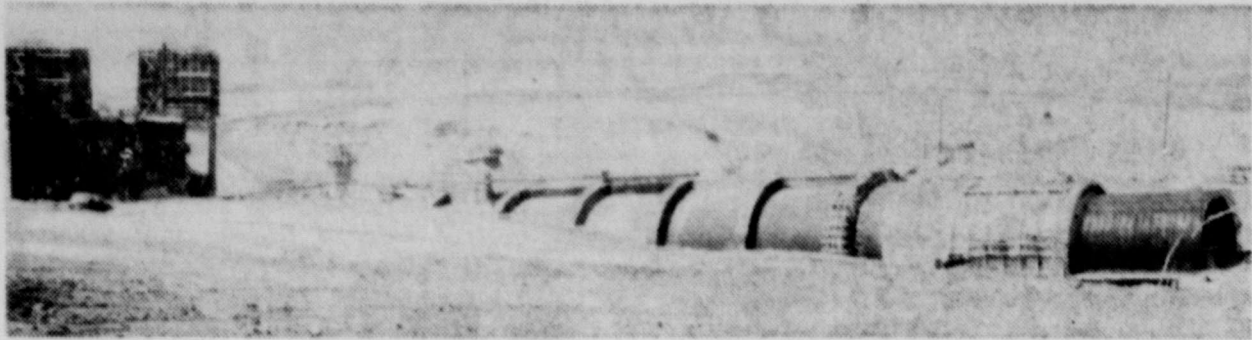

Visitors were greeted at the entrance to the area and given brochures describing the project and relating some of the impressive statistics which apply to it.

The \$8.7 million project is being built for the Colorado River Municipal Water District by Clement Bros. of Hickory, N. C.

Dozens of the giant earth movers being used on the project were lined up in the area Sunday afternoon. The equipment, as well as the structure itself, told the story of the immensity of the dam and the amount of work which is going into it.

When filled the lake will cover 23 square miles and will hold 159.2 billion gallons of water.

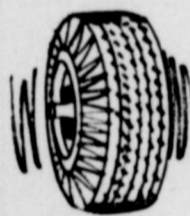

Omar Burleson Makes Announcement Regarding Candidacy For Congress

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress subject to the Democratic Primary on May 4 and in the General Election in November.

"The people of Coke County responded most generously to my campaign two years ago when I had an opponent and when the area was new to the District," Burleson said in his opening statement. Coke County was placed in the 17th District by the State Legislature in 1966, and he began officially representing it at the beginning of 1967.

The 17th Congressional District is now composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

"With this tremendous area, and the fact that Congress is in session almost continuously, it is pretty difficult to see and know people as I think their Representatives in the Congress should," Burleson said in his comments. "I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system," he said.

In his statement, Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my action in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by

the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said. Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service. His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the second position to the Chairman of the powerful Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice Chairman of the other.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones."

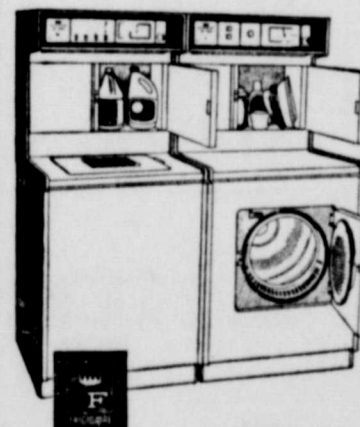
