Annual Labor Day Observance

Barbecue Set For Monday

First Day Enrollment Hits 316, Down Slightly

Bronte's 1968-69 school term got off to a smooth start, Supt. C. B. Barbee said Wednesday morning. Enrollment at the beginning of the first day Wednesday was 316, down slightly from the 340 enrolled at the end of last year's term.

Wednesday figures showed 101 students in high school and 316

in elementary school.

Barbee said he expects 29.25 more students to enroll by the first of next week, which would bring the school membership up to about the number last May.

The superintendent said he would like to emphasize that the school administration is always happy to have constructive suggestions, and that his office is always open to any school patron who would like to discuss school matters or student problems.

Equalization Board Meeting Attracts Crowd

A good crowd turned out Tuesday afternoon when the Bronte School Equalization Board went into session at the city hall. Cause of the large turnout was the increase in valuations which was announced recently for all taxable property in the district.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said last week that standard form post cards were sent to all taxpayers notifying them of the raise. However, the cards did not specify that valuations on all property was scheduled to be increased. Consequently, a number of taxpayers were under the impression that theirs were the only pieces of property to have valuations upped.

Barbee said Tuesday afternoon that after everyone understood that the increase was a blanket one, there were few complaints. He said the equalization board made a few adjustments on property which was considered to be out of line.

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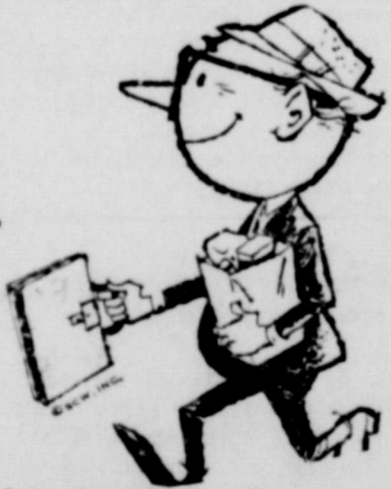

SS Rule Changes May Benefit Some

The children of a deceased woman worker now have the same right to social security payments on their mother's account as they do on the account of the father, according to Ted F. Moellering, district manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo.

Some children, who could not qualify for benefits at the time their mother died, may now be paid. These survivors' insurance payments may continue each month to age 22 if the child remains in school and does not get married.

"This change is the result of a new definition of 'dependency' in the Social Security Act," Moellering explained. "Of course, the deceased mother must have worked on social security jobs long enough to be insured. In some cases, children whose mother died as early as 1947 can now be paid."

"An application for the child's benefits must be filed," he said. "We would like for anyone who believes he may be eligible to receive the payments to get in touch with the social security office without delay."

This applies especially to those whose applications were denied at the time of their mother's death. Detailed information can be secured from the Social Security Administration located at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo, or from the representative when he is in this area.

Board Dissolves Norton School

Runnels County School Board, in a meeting last Thursday, agreed to dissolve the Norton School District and annex it to Ballinger. The vote was 3-2.

A motion was made earlier in the meeting to annex Norton School to Winters, but this move failed. Other business of the board included a provision that an eight grade school be maintained at Norton "as long as it is feasible."

Considerable discussion has been heard in this area about petitioning the Runnels County Board to detach portions of the Norton District and annex them either to Winters or Bronte.

No concrete information on these moves was available at press time Wednesday.

Water Survey Starts in Coke

The U. S. Geologic Survey has assigned a hydrologist to make a study of ground water resources of the county. The survey will be conducted in cooperation with the Texas Water Development Board.

Clyde A. Wilson began the project Wednesday. He said it would take approximately 14 months to complete. Wilson is living in San Angelo.

Purpose of the survey is to evaluate the ground water resources of Coke County. Particular emphasis will be placed on the source, occurrence, quality and quantity of ground water, suitable for municipal, industrial and irrigation use.

Results will be published in a report which will serve as a guide for further development of the water resources. Wilson said a copy of his report will be available to anyone who wishes to see it.

He said he will be checking water wells and any other sources of ground water over the entire county.

Wilson added that he would appreciate the cooperation of land owners in supplying information concerning wells on their property and in allowing him access to them.

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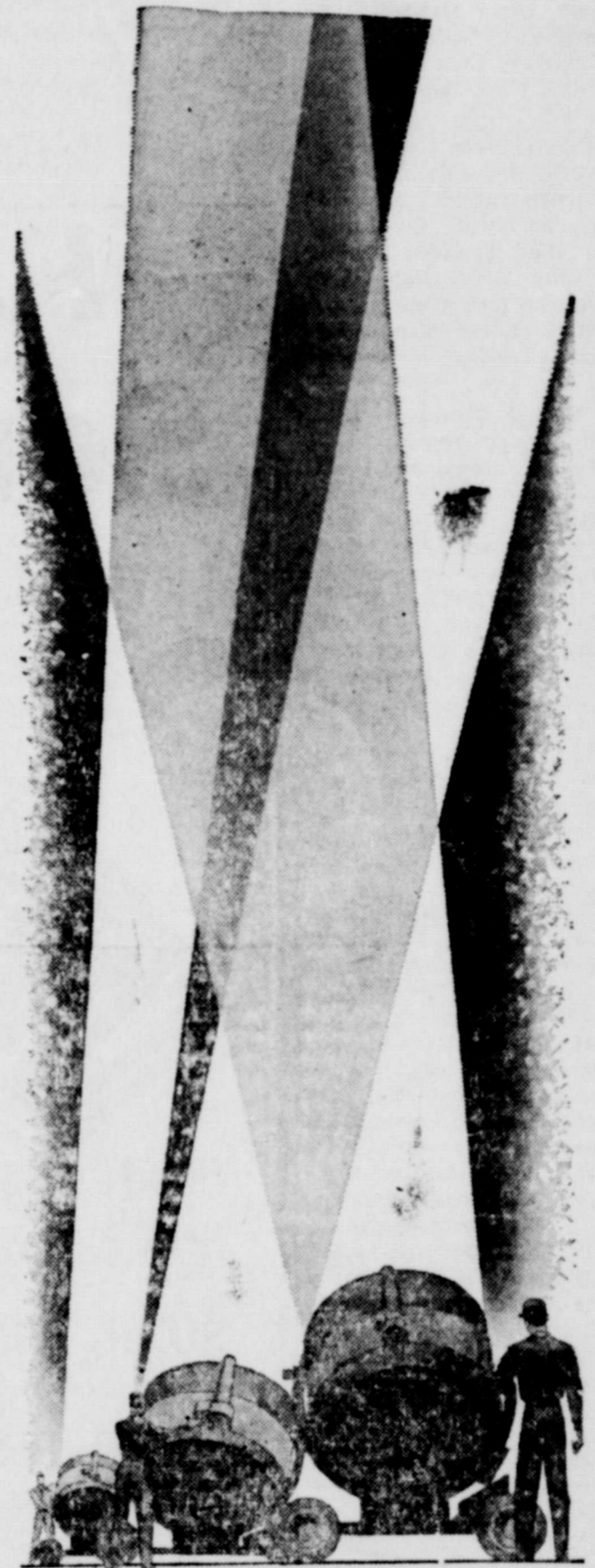

Carpet styles include needle-punched to produce a flat, felted texture that's easy to clean and easy to walk on; tufted with looped or cut-and-looped pile that resembles conventional in-door carpeting in texture; or tufted with a curly, grasslike pile of single filament yarns.

While green is a popular color for out-door use, most manufacturers offer solids, tweeds and even printed styles in variations of blue, red, yellow, brown, and black.

Outdoor carpets are all made of man-made fibers and backing materials, including olefin (polypropylene), acrylic, nylon and polyester. Resistance to mildew, sunlight, moisture and harsh chemicals makes them ideal for patios, steps and porches, decks, poolside, and for work areas inside the home.

Installation can be quick and simple. Often outdoor carpets are cut to fit rather than installed. They may be taped or cemented in place for a more permanent installation.
