Youngblood Day Proclaimed

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Mayor Royce Lee welcomed the crowd and the Rev. Austin Masterson gave the invocation. A string band headed by Jack Denman of Robert Lee provided music before and after the meal.

After everyone had finished Mayor Lee went to the platform and read a proclamation honoring L. T. Youngblood, Bronte banker and civic leader, who had been called to the platform.

The proclamation reads:

Whereas Mr. L. T. Youngblood has demonstrated great leadership and ability, advice and wisdom, which has helped make our community the fine outstanding

community that it is today; and Whereas through his ideas and ideals Bronte and this area will be even more outstanding in the future; and

Whereas Mr. Youngblood's accomplishments and contributions to society in this area and in Bronte particularly, are too numerous to mention, this recognition is only a token of our appreciation;

Now, therefore, I, M. Royce Lee, Mayor of the City of Bronte, Texas, do declare Labor Day, Monday, September 2, 1968, as

the Official Recognition and Appreciation Day for L. T. Youngblood.

Funeral Held for R. E. Johnson, 67

Funeral services for Reynold E. Johnson, 67, of the Oak Creek Community northeast of Bronte, were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in Spill Funeral Home in Winters. The Rev. Virgil James and the Rev. Lester Carter, both former pastors of his, officiated. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery.

Mr. Johnson died at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday in Winters Municipal Hospital after apparently suffering a blood clot earlier at his home.

He was born April 28, 1901, in Carlton, Minn., and moved to Odessa in 1939, where he and his brother operated tourist courts. He married Eula Mae Virden June 4, 1941, at the home of the bride's parents in the Oak Creek community. Since 1949 he had farmed in that community. He was a member of Wilmeth Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; two brothers, Oscar W. Johnson of Odessa and Judge E. J. Johnson of Carlton, Minn.; two sisters, Mrs. Jennie Berquist of Duluth, Minn., and Mrs. Myrtle Adraham of Cloquet, Minn.

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New Residents Eligible to Cast Ballot In Forthcoming Presidential Election

Voters who have lived in Texas as less than a year must apply for a ballot during a 15-day period beginning Friday, Sept. 6, if they want to vote for President and Vice President in the coming general election, County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop announced today. Applicants must appear in person at the county clerk's office.

This will be the first time that

persons having less than a year's residence in the state will be able to vote in a presidential election, Mrs. Waldrop said. A law passed by the Texas Legislature last year permits a voter who moved to Texas from some other state less than a year before general election day to vote for President and Vice President, but for no other offices, if he will have lived in Texas at least 60 days on election day.

In order to vote, he must possess all the qualifications required of electors under Texas law except the ordinary residence requirements, and it must also be shown that he was either a qualified elector in another state immediately before his removal to Texas or that he would have been eligible to vote in the presidential election in the state where he formerly lived if he had remained there until election day.

Mrs. Waldrop said that a person who had been issued a voter registration certificate, voter identification card, or other document showing that he was a registered voter in the state from which he moved should take this document with him when he goes to the county clerk's office to apply for a ballot. If he does not have written proof of his registration, it will be necessary for the clerk to obtain verification of his voting eligibility from the voter registrar or other appropriate election official at the place of his former residence before he will be accepted for voting.

Applications must be filed with the clerk by 5 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 20. However, the voters will not actually vote until the period of Oct. 21-Nov. 1, when they will return to the clerk's office and cast their ballots. Mrs. Waldrop said that each applicant will be given written notice informing him whether his application has been accepted after the clerk receives a reply from the voter registrar in the state of former residence.

Persons voting in the presidential election under this special procedure need not be registered as voters in the county where

they now live.

Mrs. Waldrop emphasized that this voting procedure applies only to persons who will have lived in Texas less than a year on election day. If a person moved to Texas before Nov. 5, 1967, he must be registered with the county tax assessor-collector in order to vote in the general election on Nov. 5, and he will vote in the regular manner on election day. However, only those persons who became residents of Texas after Oct. 1, 1967, may register at this time, and they must register by next Oct. 5 in order to vote in the election on Nov. 5. Registration for persons who became residents on or before Oct. 1, 1967, closed last Jan. 31.

It was reported in an area daily newspaper Wednesday morning that the Runnels County School Board is still being besieged with petitions concerning the now defunct Norton School District.

County Supt. W. E. Elkins reported he had received three petitions in the last few days, besides one last week.

The one received last week asked that part of the district be detached from Ballinger and annexed to Winters. Two of the more recent petitions requested that no action be taken on the first petition.

The third petition received was signed by 21 persons in the southwest part of the old Norton District and requested that area be detached and annexed to Bronte School District.

Elkins said a meeting would be called in the next few days to consider the petitions.

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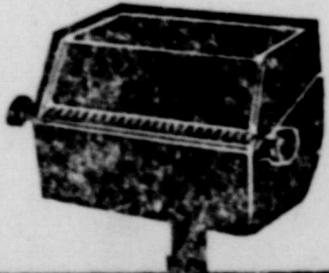

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DOVE BREAST A LA COLEMAN

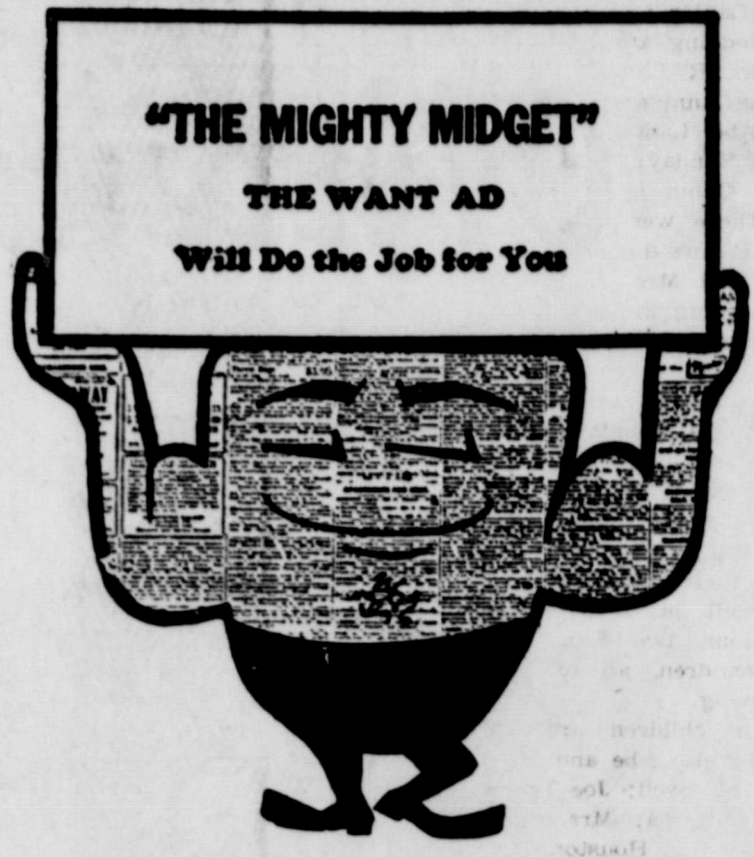

How Does Your Food Measure Up

Aging folks need "growing food" just like the kids do. One grows "old" when he ceases to produce new body cells, so you can totter at 60 or be a young 80, depending largely on how well you eat to repair yourself.

To a large extent, you can control aging by persistent good "or bad" habits.

Many older citizens need better diets. For a recognized standard that provides information for choosing the right food, use the "Daily Food Guide" available from my office.

There are two angles to this growing-older problem. One is physical, and the other is mental. Food has a lot of bearing on both angles. Some of the old ideas must be discarded if the good protective foods are going to be eaten regularly.

Don't get food-cranky about what you eat. Don't try to live on "tea and toast" or "bread and butter." Don't let vitamin pills suffice for food unless your doctor prescribes them.

Don't be a "meal-skipper." Don't refuse to try new textures in food. If chewing is difficult, cube-it, chop-it, mash-it, or grind-it to help the work of your teeth. Don't be a snacker. Three "squares-a-day" can add the variety in foods necessary. Don't be an over-eater. We need less food as we add years.

Fall Fashions in Short

For women who sew, the feminine look is easy to achieve with a new offering in piece goods: fa-

abric with matching trims. Color lineup for fall: Gray is the leading shade, often sparked with bright colors. White and cream are elegant accent touches. Brown in wide range of tones from chocolate to softened camel is back.

If you are planning to sew with flower-printed fabric, here is a tip. When you lay out the fabric for cutting, fold it lengthwise with the right side out. Make sure the motifs on the under layer of fabric are directly under the ones on the top layer. Try to match the largest flower designs at the seamlines, not the cutting lines.

Homemaking Tips

If you are planning to serve ham steaks be sure you buy a whole ham or a half ham so you will have nice center slices to use. If you buy the shank or butt portions the center slices have already been removed.

Do you ever get to the picnic area and find the kids want to dig into those mouth-watering hot dogs the moment the car stops? With a little preparation you can have them ready without stopping everything and starting a fire. Before you leave home, put a bunch of hot dogs into a wide-mouthed vacuum bottle and fill it with boiling water. By the time you reach the picnic spot, the franks will be ready for the youngsters to add the mustard, relish and a bun with no waiting.

Looking for a new luncheon sandwich idea? This Western Egg sandwich is sure to be a hit. Beat eggs with milk and season to taste with salt, pepper and any favorite herb or seasoning such as thyme or basil. Then fry or bake with diced ham and diced green pepper, in plenty of butter. Place on toasted bun and serve with relishes and tall glasses of refreshing milk.

Milk a la Mode

Want to serve your family and friends something refreshingly different? Make it Milk a la Mode. That's simply milk, plus ice cream, plus your favorite flavoring, jelly, jam, sauce or fresh fruit. For example, mix up Orange Chocolate Shakes for a teenage crowd. In a mixing bowl put 1 quart softened vanilla ice cream. While beating the ice cream blend 1 can (6 oz.) frozen concentrated orange juice, thawed, and 1/4 cup confectioners sugar. Gradually add 1 quart chocolate milk. Pour into tall glasses, top with additional scoops of vanilla ice cream. Makes about 7 cups.

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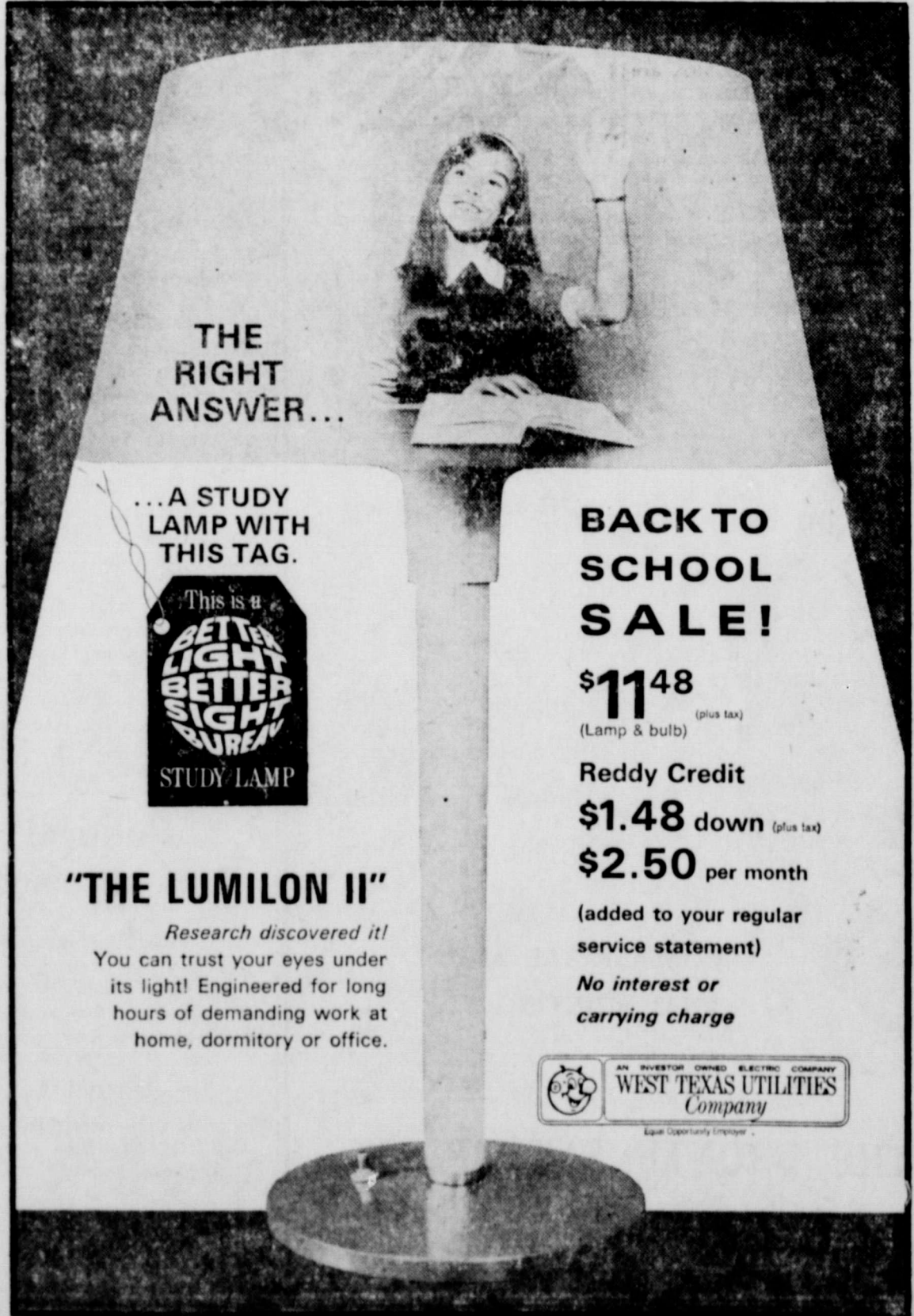
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Blackwell Couple Celebrate 70th Wedding Anniversary
