Bronte Longhorns will travel to Eden Friday night for their second game of the 1968 football season. Still smarting from last week's defeat at Eldorado, the local lads will invade the Bulldog town with the intention of making their season record 1-1.

Eden is a newcomer this year to District 8-A and the Bulldogs also have a new coach. They have

seven returning lettermen from the 1967 squad. Last Friday Wall shellacked the Bulldogs, 40-0.

The Longhorn squad was strengthened considerably this week when four new men were added to the team. They are Steve Williams, Randy Caperton, Otis Rolls and Tony Barrett.

## Reward Money Offered For Info on Dog Poisoner

Substantial reward money has been put up for the person who can give information which will lead to the conviction of anyone throwing out poison in the City of Bronte.

Mayor Royce Lee said that a substantial amount of money has been pledged by interested citi-

zens to make up the reward fund. He said the city's goal for the reward is \$500 and they have not yet reached that figure but expect to soon.

Lee added that anyone who would like to make a pledge toward such a fund should contact the city hall.

Cecil Kemp, who had a puppy poisoned several days ago, is running a notice in this week's Enterprise that he will pay a \$100 reward for information which will lead to the arrest and conviction of the person who poisoned his dog.

Mayor Lee expressed the sentiment of most Bronte citizens when he said, "This sort of action is completely out of line with the type of community we have here. There are small children in most sections of town, and while it has not happened, one of them could well pick up and eat food which has poison on it."

The mayor added: "It is my opinion that there is absolutely no excuse for promiscuously throwing poison out on private property, and I am happy that the City of Bronte is sponsoring this reward fund which will be given to anyone who has enough information to convict the person or persons involved." It is a felony charge.

A number of dogs have been poisoned within the city in the past several days, some of them valuable animals.

## Immunization Set Today at School

An immunization day will be held at Bronte School today (Thursday). It will be sponsored by the Texas State Health Department and personnel of John Harris Clinic will administer the vaccines.

Polio Trivalent vaccine will be given on sugar cubes to all students and adults who wish to take it. All persons who have not had polio vaccine within the last three years are urged to take it, according to Dr. John R. Harris, who owns the local clinic and is city health officer.

Measles vaccine also will be available to anyone who is not participating in the polio program. Also available will be third DPT shots to those who have had the first two.

Polio and measles vaccine will be furnished by the State Health Department.

"All area residents are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to obtain immunization vaccine where needed," Dr. Harris said.

## Longhorns Take Licking in Season Opener

The Bronte Longhorns lost their season opener last Friday night, 42-8, against a tough Class A Eldorado Eagle team. The rain soaked Longhorns never gave up and were fighting a zero on the scoreboard until the closing seconds of the game. A steady rain fell throughout most of the game.

### First Half

Randy Barbee kicked the football to get the game underway. It went to Quarterback Bob Page who brought it out to the 30. James Vaughn and Willie Zuniga got a couple of timely tackles to force the Eagles to punt on their first series of downs.

With Keith McCutchen doing the quarterback chores for the Longhorns, they wound up with a 4th and 5 to go in spite of a 9 yard gainer by Barbee, thanks to

a 5 yard penalty. Barbee punted after getting a bad snap from center and Eldorado took over on their 46.

James Larry Davis and Mickey Clark were the big guns for the Eagles as they marched down the field for a 1st on the Longhorn 15. Barbee broke up a pass and then Clark went 7 yards before he was stopped by Garland Richards and Zuniga, making it 3rd and 3 on the Bronte 8. Roger Graves clobbered Keith Williams on the next play and it was 4th and 4. A mighty effort by Davis was stopped short of the 1st down by the Longhorn defense and the Longhorns took over on their 9 yard line.

Barbee made 9, but a fumble on the next play gave the ball back to the Eagles on the Bronte 19. A 15 yard penalty and a recov-

ered fumble put the Eagles back to the 37. Then Page faded to pass, failed to find a man open, and worked his way through the Longhorns defenders all the way for the first TD of the evening. Archie Nixon, Eldorado's sharp freshman, kicked the conversion and the score was 7-0.

Barbee took the kickoff out to the 32. Ronald Cooper and Barbee carried a couple of times, but failed to make yardage. McCutchen tried to pass, but Eagle defenders got through and pushed him back to his own 20. Barbee's punt was short and Eldorado took over on their 39.

A first down on the Longhorn 43 apparently was the field position needed by the Eagles, for Davis went all the way from that point for the second Eldorado touchdown. Conversion try failed

and the score was 13-0.

Barbee made a beautiful return of the Eagle kickoff out to the Eagle 40. On the first play of the series, however, a wet slick ball was lose on the field and Jimmy Robledo recovered for the Eagles on the 40.

Vaughn, Richards, Cooper and Nicky Arrott were shown on game notes as doing timely defense work, but in spite of their efforts, the Eagles carried the ball down to the Bronte 22 before they were really slowed down. The Longhorn defense allowed only 6 yards in four tries and the local lads took over on their 16.

Once again the wet ball got loose but it was recovered with a loss of 7. Manfred Thompson was pushed back 3 more yards, and Barbee tried a quick kick on

3rd down. It was partially blocked and the Eagles had the ball on the Longhorn 27.

The Eagles again were in good scoring position, and carried down to the 4 for a 1st down. Vaughn and Tony Holland allowed only a yard gain on two plays, but Page kept the ball on 3rd and went around the right end to cross the double stripe. Nixon kicked the point, and the score was 20-0.

Thompson took Nixon's kick and made a fine runback to the Bronte 48. A pass to Barbee was good for 9 and Thompson made almost a yard. McCutchen kept on 3rd down and made the 1st on the Eagle 40. McCutchen threw a long pass intended for Zuniga, but Paul Page intercepted to give the Eagles the ball on the Eagle 18.

**County Agents  
News Column**

Coke County reported two cases of screwworms last week. Both cases were found in the Silver area. One case was reported by M. C. Hendry, southwest of Silver; the other case by Foster Sims Price which came from southwest of Silver, also.

During the weekend all of south and southwest Texas received some moisture. The rain was wonderful, but it could add fuel to the screwworm situation.

Everyone is encouraged to check their livestock regularly through the fall season. The fall months are normally the worst screwworm months anyway. With the situation as it is now, one case missed would magnify the danger of a larger buildup.

Spraying is a good practice to help control screwworms. A good spraying to control horn flies and ticks could give added protection to the screwworm control program.

Avoid causing open wounds during the fall if possible. Branding, docking, dehorning and castrating need to be delayed if possible. Treat all wounds you make or find.

The two to three months ahead are critical ones in the screwworm control program. The program authorities are doing all they can do to guard the overwintering zone to the south and at the same time spot treat the cases above the control zone. We hope this plan can be maintained until cold weather arrives. Should the situation get out of hand above the overwintering zone, we may have to rely on the cold weather to break the buildup. The authorities believe the overwintering zone must be guarded and held as free of worms as possible. The sterile fly drops would have to be concentrated in that zone.

We hope that no cases are allowed to get by, and that no further cases are found in this area.

Individual plant treatment methods using basal pour of kerosene or 2,4,5-T mixed in diesel oil should be applied when the soil is dry enough to allow penetration of the material to the bud zone, report range specialists of the Texas Agricultural Service.

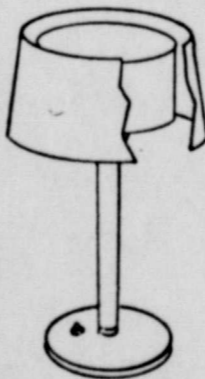

For the third time of the night, the Eagles drove down deep into Bronte territory, only to have the Longhorn line stand firm and deny them a counter. Good defensive work was turned by Bobby Skelton, Vaughn, Cooper, Richards and Graves.

Barbee drove down the field a couple of times for a total of 14 yards and a 1st down. The next series of downs failed and a bad snap made the punt impossible. Eldorado took over on the Bronte 9.
