Voters who want to vote a straight party ticket may mark a square at the top of the column of candidates, while those who want to split their vote must mark each square alongside the name of the candidates of their choice.

In addition to candidates for various offices, Texas voters will cast their ballots to decide the fate of 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

Funeral Held for J. T. Sanderson, 93, Blackwell Pioneer

James Thomas Sanderson, 93, longtime resident of Blackwell, died at 1:30 a.m. Tuesday in Edgcliff Manor in Sweetwater.

Mr. Sanderson was born Sept. 19, 1875 in Athens, Ala. He started the trade of blacksmith in Hill Co. in 1899. He moved to Blackwell in 1910 and continued in his trade until he retired after 60 years in the same business.

He married the former Laura Youree in 1900 in Hill Co. She died in 1937 and in 1942 he was married to Flora Patterson at Blackwell. He was known to his friends as Daddy Jim.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in Blackwell Methodist Church with the Rev. Cecil Tune of the Loraine Methodist Church and the Rev. Ross Tipps officiating. Burial was in Blackwell Cemetery under direction of Cate Spencer Funeral Home of Sweetwater.

Robert Lee Steers Roll Over Longhorns, 30-15

A dejected bunch of Bronte Longhorns and fans found the 12 miles home pretty far last Friday night after the Robert Lee Steers took a 30-15 ball game from the locals.

The Longhorns did all their scoring in the first half and were leading, 15-14, at intermission. The Steers, however, came back and completed their night's work to add another 16 points and doubled the score of their opponents.

First Quarter

Robert Lee won the toss and elected to receive. David Scott kicked the ball to Joe Key, who was downed on his 38. Key, Roy Blair, Jacky Preslar and Mike Mumford carried the ball for four 1st downs, the last on the 7 yard line with goal to go. Robert Lee's work horse, Roy Blair, toted the ball for 5 yards on 2 tries, then Mumford, on a keeper, went around left side to end the 62 yard drive and make the first counter of the game. Andy Cole was set up to kick the extra, but a fumble caused Mumford to have to try a pass, which failed. Score 6-0.

Willie Zuniga was stopped on the 41 after taking Cole's kick, but was penalized back to the 36 for a 1st and 15. The second play saw another try at the same play as Quarterback Keith McCutchen dropped back and threw a long pass to Nicky Arrott for a TD. Scott kicked the extra and the Longhorns led 7-6.

Blair took the kickoff and was tripped on the 37. The Steers then drew a 15 yard penalty and were unable to make their 1st. Mumford quick kicked and the Longhorns fumbled. Preslar recovered on Bronte's 43.

Key and Blair moved the ball to the 31 for a 1st, and then the Steers bogged down and Mumford was forced to punt. It went into the end zone and gave the Longhorns the ball on the 20. The Longhorns got backed up to the 12 on 4th down and Randy Barbee's punt went to Mumford on the Bronte 48. Blair made 5 before the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Blair went for 9 more and a 1st on the 33, and then the Steers drew a 15 yard clipping penalty, to bring up 1st and 25. Mumford tossed an incomplete pass, then Arrott intercepted for Bronte on the Steer 44.

Ronald Cooper went for good gains and Steve Williams added a 7 yarder, only to lose back to the Bronte 37 following a clip. The Longhorns were unable to overcome the loss and Barbee punted out on the 28.

Key picked up 5 for the Steers, Blair went for the 1st on the 40. Blair then carried twice for 6 yards to bring up 3rd and 4. Blair got loose on the next play, went over Bronte's left side and went the entire distance for another Steer counter. Mumford's pass to Darrell Pitcock was good for 2 and the scoreboard said 14-7.

Cole's kick went to Manfred Thompson who returned to the 40. Williams lost 3, Barbee caught a pass for 6 and 18 yards for a 1st on the Steer 39. Arrott took McCutchen's pass for 3 and Thompson picked up nice yardage but the Longhorns drew a penalty for illegal procedure giving them a 2nd and 2 on the 41. Cooper sneaked his way through the Steers for 11 and McCutchen went the other yard on a quarterback sneak for the 1st on the Steer 28.

Cooper made a couple, and Barbee caught a pass for 6. The next try was no good, but Cooper made

the needed yardage on the next play for a 1st on the 16. Arrott caught a pass from McCutchen for a yard, Cooper lost a yard and the Longhorns were faced with a 3rd and 10. McCutchen called for a pass play and flags went down as officials called pass interference against the Steers, to give Bronte a 1st down on the 9 yard line. McCutchen tried two unsuccessful attempts with passes to cover the distance, but the 3rd down throw was a different story, as Barbee snagged the ball in the end zone to give the Longhorns 6 points. McCutchen tossed another one to Arrott for 2 extras and the Longhorns led 15-14.

Scott got off his kick, but a Steer receiver fumbled and Thompson was there to recover. The Longhorns tried three incomplete pass tries in an effort to widen the gap before the clock

Baker Speaks To Coke Lions

George Baker, Fort Stockton candidate for the Texas Legislature's 13-county 66th district, was guest speaker Tuesday night at both the Bronte and Robert Lee Silver Lions clubs. They scheduled their meetings to permit him to drive from one town to the other between meetings.

His talks were on two major subjects — the importance of voting on proposed constitutional amendments, and aspects of the proposed school reorganization plan as they apply to the West Texas area.

Baker had a busy week's schedule with six speaking engagements in four days. He spoke Monday night to the Imperial Lions Club. Wednesday he was scheduled for a reception at 10 a.m. honoring Ray Howard, Midland Democratic candidate for another House seat, and Gus Muttscher.

Baker was to address the Monahans Rotary Club at noon Wednesday and Monahans Kiwanis Club Thursday at noon, with a talk Thursday night in Imperial to the Permian Basin Tax Officials Association.

"The Governor's School Study Commission devoted a great deal of time and effort to the school study, and many of its provisions are needed to improve the quality of education in our state," Baker said. "There are several areas, however, in which our part of the state, with low population density and vast distances, would suffer real hardship unless reasonable exceptions are provided in the school program."

He emphasized the need for careful study of the program, and regard for the position of the smaller towns in drafting any new school legislation.

Increased emphasis on vocational education is especially needed to help equip more people for the skilled jobs created by increasing industry in Texas and the growing use of mechanized equipment in all areas — agriculture, business, transportation and services, Baker pointed out.

Blair made 5 on 1st down, was stopped cold on the next 2 tries. Faced with a 4th and 5, Cole was called on to try a field goal. The 27 yard kick went between the goal posts and Robert Lee led 17-15.

Cole kicked to Thompson who was swarmed under on the 12 for no return. The Steer defenders held and on 3rd down, McCutchen threw a long one to Arrott for 23 yards and a 1st on the 35. The next series didn't wind up as happily, however, and once again the Steers would not be contained and once again Beall blocked Barbee's punt, this time on the 33.

Key, Blair and Mumford each carried and totaled 10 yards for a 1st on the 23. Key made 3 more and a personal foul against Bronte gave the Steers a 1st on the 9. Larry Sockwell made 4 and then Blair pushed hard through the middle for the touch-down. Cole kicked the extra point and the score stood at 24-15.

A short low kick was snagged by Garland Richards on the 38. From there the Longhorns went nowhere and Barbee's punt gave the Steers the ball on their 37.

A Mumford quick kick on 3rd down pushed the Longhorns back to their own 22. A personal foul against the Steers gave the local lads a 1st on their 43. A pass to Zuniga was good for 4 and Arrott picked one out of the air for a 1st on Robert Lee's 28. The quarter ended with the Longhorns having a 2nd and 12 on the 39 yard line of Robert Lee.

Fourth Quarter

A pass to Barbee was good for 6, but two pass failures gave the ball to the Steers on the 24. Blair made 4 and Key added 12 for a 1st on the 40. A loss prompted another quick kick which went 47 yards and was fumbled by the Longhorns to give Robert Lee the ball on the 15.

Blair toughed it for a yard, then Mumford on a nice keeper play went 9 yards for a 1st on the 5 yard line. Blair was stopped again for 1 and then Mumford went around the left end for the final tally of the ball game. PAT failed and the score was 30-15.

McCutchen took the kickoff and was dropped on his 46. Next play gave the ball back to the Steers as Preslar intercepted a pass on the 19. The Steers pushed to midfield before the Longhorn defense forced a punt. Mumford's kick went into the end zone.

Taking the ball on the 20, Cooper went 14 for a 1st down. A personal foul penalty against the Steers gave the Bronte lads another 1st on the 45 and a McCutchen to Zuniga pass was good for 25 yards to the 35. Two more passes to Thompson and Barbee netted 10 yards and another 1st down. The passing attack hit a snag on the next series and Robert Lee took over on their 16. The Steers worked their way up to the 47 before Zuniga shoved Blair out of bounds as the clock ran out.

Postmaster Gives Info on Mailing

Postmaster Noah Pruitt has announced some schedules and instructions that should be followed by local patrons in mailing Christmas packages and other mail intended to reach its destination by Dec. 25.

Mail to armed forces members serving overseas should be sent on the following schedule:

Surface: Oct. 14-Nov. 9; SAM: Oct. 21-Nov. 23; PAL: Oct. 28-Nov. 30; Air Mail: Nov. 30-Dec. 11.

All mail to overseas should be wrapped strongly and a slip should be enclosed showing the contents, and the name and address of both the sender and the addressee.

Domestic parcel post to distant states should be mailed before Dec. 2, and parcel post to local and nearby addresses should be sent before Dec. 14.

Cards to distant states should be mailed before Dec. 11 and to local and nearby places by Dec. 16.

Pruitt added that the return addresses should show the ZIP code of the sender, and of the addressee, also, if possible.

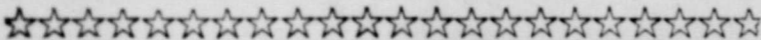

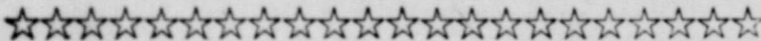

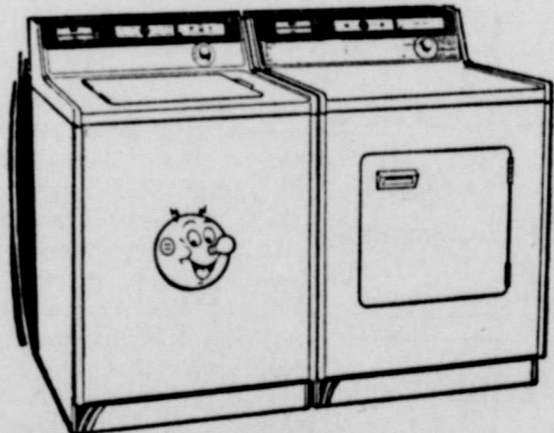

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

Most of you read daily some article about the screwworm situation in Texas. We cannot emphasize too much nor too often the threat of still greater screw-worm numbers in the State. Luckily, freezing weather is not too far away, and, too, to date no large build up has occurred in this area of the State.

Coke County has spawned seven cases to date with the last case reported coming about two weeks ago.

We still need to be watchful for possible cases. The time left until the weather lends a helping hand could prove to be a long period.

Some operators may be basal spraying mesquite with a knapsack and hand spraying rig. This is a good practice and one we hope many operators will be able to use for spot treatment to control mesquite.

But, we do want to mention one point. Best results are usually obtained when basal spraying with 2, 4, 5-T when the application is made in the summer or winter. There is a period during the time the tree sap is going down that basal spraying has not given the results anticipated.

This likewise can happen during the early spring when the sap is rising.

This period of physiological change in the tree is difficult to pinpoint exactly. But, during the late fall this transition of tree fluid can make a difference in the results received from basal treatment of mesquite with 2,4,5-T.

4-H CLUB OFFICERS

The Coke County 4-H Club Council held their first meeting of the year recently, electing officers for the year and making tentative plans for 4-H programs.

The four delegates and alternate delegates, along with Joy Cervenka, secretary of the District 4-H Council, represented Coke County in the District's first council meeting of the year held in Ballinger Saturday. The group assists with various 4-H events held on a district basis and provides leadership for the Counties participating.

A young man with just a few minutes' instruction quickly pulled the wool from a sheep in a

recent demonstration at USDA's Beltsville, Maryland, research center. The sheep had been dosed with an experimental chemical previously used mainly in cancer therapy. This innovation was made possible by biologist Dr. Ethel H. Dolnick and colleagues in USDA's Agricultural Research Service.

Larvae of the most important pest of peaches, the peach tree borer, feed on the inner bark of the trunk of the peach tree. Their presence may be detected by the masses of gum mixed with brownish grass or sawdust which exude from the trunk of the tree. The larvae usually feed in an area 2 to 3 inches below the surface of the soil to 10 inches above.

When the peach tree borer is not controlled, it will kill peach trees within a few seasons. Control of this insect can be obtained from October 20 to November 15 when soil is dry and soil temperature is above 55 degrees. Paradichlorobenzene crystals (P-DB) are placed on the surface around the trunk of the tree. For 2 and 3 year old trees, use 1/2 ounce of crystals; for 4 to 5 year old trees, 3/4 ounce; for mature trees, 1 ounce.

Parcel Post and catalog rates go up effective October 19. The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents per parcel. The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel post delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents. Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under the present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post.

There will be a 15 cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4.00, and 20 cents on parcels now charged over \$4.00. Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the parcel and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth class mail, on a break-even basis.
