Democrats Winners in Coke

Democrats made a clean sweep from the top to the bottom of the ballot in Coke County, in the general election held Tuesday. A total of 1113 ballots were counted in the five voting boxes and in the absentee box.

Coke County voters approved of only three of the 14 constitutional amendments which were on the ballot. They okayed one, nine and 14 and turned thumbs down on the other 11.

Hubert H. Humphrey and Ed-

mund S. Muskie received 563 votes in their race for president and vice president, while Republicans Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew received 387 and American Party candidates George C. Wallace and Curtis LeMay received 208.

Democrat Preston Smith won handily in his race for governor with 849 votes, compared to Paul Eggers' 278.

Ben Barnes received the greatest majority of any opposed can-

didate in Coke County. In his race for lieutenant governor, he received 952 votes to 162 for Doug DeCluitt.

Crawford Martin, seeking reelection as attorney general had 898 votes to 179 for Sproesser Wynn.

Residents Warned Of Fire Danger

County Judge W. W. Thetford said this week that Coke County Commissioners Court is deeply concerned with the possibility of fires during the coming months when vegetation will be dry and highly inflammable.

The commissioners discussed the matter in their meeting Monday and went on record as requesting all citizens to be extremely careful particularly during the forthcoming deer hunting season, when there will be more activity than usual in rural areas of the county.

The commissioners said heavy grass cover in most areas, combined with lack of rain have increased the possibility of starting fires in pastures and fields. They requested that anyone who sees a fire report it immediately to law enforcement officers and the fire departments in Bronte or Robert Lee.

Make It with Wool Contest Now Open

SAN ANGELO — The Home Economics Department of Angelo State College again will sponsor the District 4 "Make-It-Yourself-With-Wool" competition which is conducted annually on a state and national basis by the Women's Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers Association and other organizations.

The district contests will be held at the college Dec. 7, Dr. Allena K. Pace, head of the home economics department, has announced. Deadline for entering is Nov. 23.

Entries will be various garments made by girls and women who wish to compete. Competition will be held in four divisions — sub-deb (10-13 years of age), juniors (14-16), seniors (17-21) and adults (over 21), Mrs. Pace said.

Fabric used in the costumes must be of American wool although it may contain up to 5 per cent of some other fiber. Mrs. Pace explained. Also, trimming, linings and interfacings may be of some other fiber.

Each contestant must model her own garment before judges at a district fashion show to be held as a climax to the competition. The garments first will be judged on their makers and then will be examined carefully for inside construction and durability.

Judging in all four divisions will be based on coordination of design and fabric with the individual, beauty of design, fashion, workmanship and appearance.

Prizes will include a two-week trip to Europe, college scholarships and other gifts, Dr. Pace said. Entry blanks may be secured from fabric departments of various stores, home demonstration agents, and schools which have home economics departments.

District 4, for which the Angelo State competition will be held, includes Upton, Brown, Sterling, Coke, Coleman, Runnels, Comanche, Glasscock, Concho, Tom Green, Nolan, Irion and Reagan counties.

State competition will be held Dec. 14 at Texas Tech and the national finals will be Jan. 16, 1969, in San Francisco.

Longhorns Roll Over Loraine; Now Lead District 7-B Standings

The Bronte Longhorns were on fire again Friday night when they racked up a 39-6 score against the Loraine Bulldogs in a game played at Stephenson Field. The local lads scored 7 in the first quarter, 24 in the second and 8 in the third. Loraine's lone tally came in the second period.

First Quarter

Willie Zuniga kicked off to start the ball game. It was short and went to tackle Joel Atkins, who was downed on his 43. Terry Brewer went for 7 yards on first play from scrimmage. Roger Graves stopped him for no gain in the next play. The Bulldogs got a good drive to going with Tim Hamilton, the quarterback, and Stanley Hackfield doing the ball carrying, as Brewer was shaken up early in the contest. They drove to within 23 yards of the double stripe. Then Brewer came back in but Keith McCutchen tackled him for a 3 yard loss to bring up 4th down and 10 on the 26. The visitors tried a field goal but it was wide to the left and the Longhorns took over on their 20 yard line.

Nicky Arrott ground out 5 yards, and a pass from McCutchen to Zuniga ended Bronte's move upfield, as Tanis Moreno recovered a fumble for the Bulldogs. Loss of the ball evidently irked the Longhorns a little because three plays later the visitors were faced with a 4th and 15 situation, thanks to good defensive work by Zuniga, David Scott, James Vaughn and Manfred Thompson. Randy Barbee got a nice runback on the punt to the Loraine 27. The Longhorns went on to the 22 before fumbleitis hit again and the Bulldogs got the ball on their 18.

Hackfield went for 9 and Hamilton tossed a pass which McCutchen intercepted to give Bronte the ball on the Loraine 48.

Arrott went for 3, and on 2nd down McCutchen tossed a long pass which Zuniga stretched to get, and went in for the first touchdown of the night. Scott kicked the extra and the score was 7-0.

Zuniga's kick went to Madrid who was pulled down on the 30 by Bobby Skelton. Brewer was back in and made 4 yards before Garland Richards and Arrott stopped him. Ronald Cooper stopped the Bulldog ball carrier for a loss of 1, to bring up 3rd and 7 as the first quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Hackfield quick kicked on 3rd down and gave the ball to the Longhorns on their 19 yard line. Arrott went for 5 and Cooper made 6 for the 1st on the 30. Cooper made 3 and Thompson went for 7 for another 1st. Arrott then made 13 yards for a 1st on the Loraine 46. Another 2 yards by Cooper, then McCutchen tossed the long one deep downfield where Barbee and two Bulldogs were waiting. Barbee snagged the pass, reversed his direction and went

in untouched for another counter. Arrott went around left end for 2 and the score was 15-0.

Zuniga's kick was a long beauty and gave the ball to the Loraine boys on their 9 yard line. A penalty moved it back to the 4. An incomplete pass and good defending by Cooper and Richards set up 3rd and 14, so Hamilton quick-kicked to the Bronte 44.

Cooper dashed 17 yards for a 1st on Loraine's 39, but the drive stalled and, with the help of a penalty, the Longhorns were forced into a punting situation. However, a bad snap caused Barbee to have to run for it, but he was downed on the Loraine 49 where the Bulldogs took over.

The Longhorns got slipped up on when Hamilton threw to Robert Finley who had worked his way behind all the Bronte defenders and had a clear field to the double stripe. PAT try failed and the scoreboard said 15-6.

Hamilton's short kick went to Zuniga who was tripped up on the Bronte 47. Arrott went 14 yards to the 33, then Cooper drove for 12 more to the 21. Bronte drew a 5 yard fine, then Arrott sailed through for 10 yards, followed by 4 yards by Cooper. McCutchen kept to make the 1st on the 9. Arrott outran his pursuers on the next play as he went around left end to cross the double stripe at the flag. A pass from McCutchen to Thompson was good and the score was 23-6.

Zuniga kicked the ball almost to the goal line where Madrid took it and was downed on the 20. Hackfield went for a 1st on the 39. Loraine was penalized 15 and after short gains drew another 15 yarder. The losses gave the ball to the Longhorns.

A pass to Thompson was almost good enough, but a Bulldog pulled him down on the 1. McCutchen took it over on a quarterback sneak on 2nd down. Arrott made 2 extras as he went around left end to make the score 31-6.

Zuniga kicked to Madrid and a couple of plays later the half ended.

Third Quarter

David Denman took the kick-off and was tackled on the 50. McCutchen started on the 1st down play, ran into trouble and pitched the ball to Arrott. The play covered 18 yards down to the 32. Cooper went for 9 and Arrott made the 1st on the 20. Cooper carried twice and made another 1st on the 10. Arrott felt this would make a good spot from which to score, and went around the left to paydirt. A pass across the middle to Zuniga was worth 2 points and the score was 39-6.

Hackfield took the kick and with the help of a penalty against the Longhorns moved out to midfield. Additional gains by Hackfield carried to the Bronte 35, then another fine against the Bronte lads gave Loraine a 1st on

the 20. Hamilton called a pass play, but it was a fruitless effort, as Arrott was on the 5 yard line and intercepted.

The Horns bogged down and Barbee punted out on the Bronte 44. The Bulldogs moved down to the 32 yard line, then Richards broke through the Loraine line and tackled Hackfield on the 40. One play later Bronte took over at that point. The Longhorns couldn't move, however, and were in a punting situation when the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Barbee punted to Hackfield and Thompson pulled him down on the Loraine 44. Loraine moved the ball well down to the Bronte 24, but there the defense tightened up. Madrid lost 5 on a reverse play, and Hackfield was stopped with a loss of 2 by Cooper. Thompson almost intercepted a 3rd down pass try, and on a similar effort on 4th down, he did snag the ball for the Longhorns on the 25.

Cooper and Arrott carried the ball to the Loraine 48 yard line and then got bottled up and Barbee had to punt. Four plays later the Bulldogs had to return the kick.

Most of the starters were pulled out as the clock ticked toward the end of the game. Skelton took over the quarterbacking chores and he and Danny Cooper did the ball carrying on a series of downs. However a fumble gave the Bulldogs the ball on the Bronte 39.

The visitors were moving the ball well when the clock ran out, with the scoreboard still reading 39-6.

H D Agent's News Dept.

It's time again to think of your Thanksgiving dinner. If you are like most American homemakers, you will buy the traditional turkey within the next few days. Do you know what's available in turkeys now? Do you know what to look for in the turkey you buy? Do you know how much to buy? Here are a few suggestions that may help you.

Size of the ready-to-cook bird may range from 4 to 24 pounds and larger — from fryer-roasters to large toms. Practically all turkeys retailed are young (3 to 6 months), quickly grown and suited to such methods of cooking as broiling, frying or roasting. In some areas, halves and quarters may be available. Turkey parts—legs, wings, etc are found in some markets. Boneless turkey is increasing in volume — boned and rolled, both uncooked and cooked. Boneless cooked turkey rolls are a real convenience item.

The following suggestions for buying are based on the number of servings you can expect to get from various-sized birds. When

buying whole ready-to-cook turkeys under 12 pounds, allow $\frac{3}{4}$ to 1 pound per serving. For larger birds allow $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ pound. With uncooked boneless turkey roasts allow $\frac{1}{4}$ pound per serving. The following is a guide for turkey size and number of servings:

Ready to cook wt. Whole turkey (lbs)	Number of Servings
5 to 8	6 to 10
8 to 12	10 to 20
12 to 16	20 to 32
16 to 20	32 to 40
20 to 24	40 to 50

In most cases, large turkeys are more economical and they are excellent for use in future meals.

The majority of turkeys are sold frozen, and thawing requires special care. There are two recommended procedures for thawing: (1) Thaw in the refrigerator in the original wrap on a tray. This requires one to three days, depending on the size of the turkey. (2) Thaw the bird, still in its original water-tight wrap under cold running water or immersed in cold water, changing the water frequently. This procedure requires 6 to 7 hours for larger sizes.

Thawing at room temperature is not recommended because of the possibility of contamination.

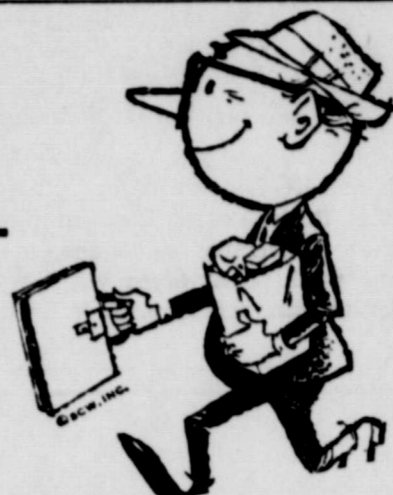

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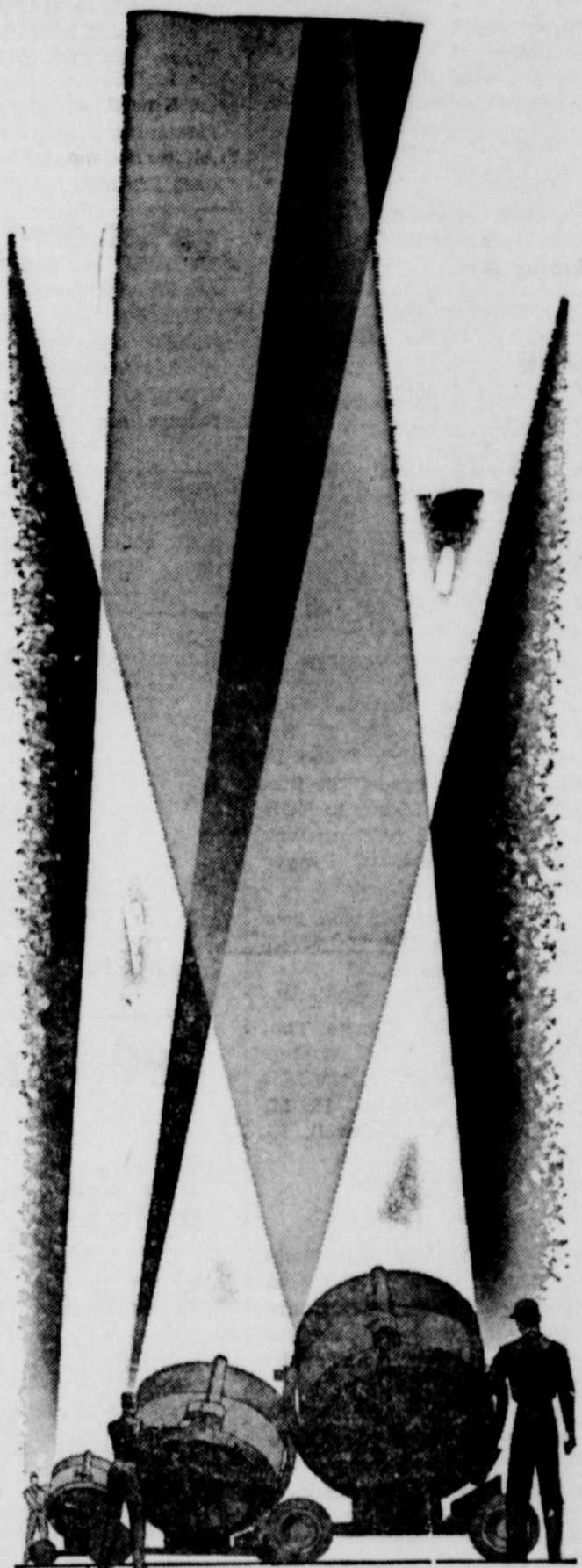
