Bronte Housing Authority Sets Nov. 22 to Take Applications

Friday, Nov. 22, has been set as the date for Bronte area residents to begin making application for the new housing units which have been under construction the past several months. Applications will be taken at Bronte city hall from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Directors of Bronte Housing Authority pointed out that first consideration will be given persons who now reside in commissioner precincts 2 and 3 of Coke County, or who have a Bronte mailing address, since the purpose of the project is to improve housing conditions in the Bronte community.

Anyone who is unable to make

application on Nov. 22 will be able to fill out the necessary papers later, as applications will be taken each Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 until 11 a.m. at Central Drug by the local authority's executive director, Norman R. Kiker.

It is estimated that the project is now 90 per cent complete and estimated date of completion is Dec. 1. It will be several days after completion before residents of the new units will be permitted to move in, however. Necessary inspections and an open house for the public is planned before the houses are occupied.

Bids on the housing project were opened March 12, when Herman Bennett Co. of Brownwood submitted the low bid of \$209,890. The houses are of brick construction and are furnished with heating equipment, kitchen ranges and refrigerators.

Royce Fancher, chairman of Bronte Housing Authority, urged any person who feels his family might be eligible for one of the units to make application.

Included in the 18 units are eight one-bedroom homes for elderly persons, six two-bedroom units, and four three-bedroom homes.

Bufs Come From Behind To Tie Longhorns, 18-18

Bonte Longhorns racked up an 18-18 tie with favored Forsan last Friday night, after having the Buffaloes down 18-0 in the third quarter. The Bufs steamed back, however, for one counter in the third period and two more in the last quarter to tie the score. The Horns crossed the double stripe in the first, second and third quarters.

First Quarter

Jackie Willis kicked off for Forsan to start the ball game. It went to Manfred Thompson on the 15 and he ran it to the 41. Ronald Cooper and Nicky Arrott made 9 yards in three tries, and brought up 4th and 1 on the 50. Randy Barbee got off a fine punt which rolled dead on the 12 yard line.

Clayton McKinnon went for 5, then a recovered fumble lost the Bufs about 10 yards. Fumbleitis continued on the next play, but this time, Cooper recovered for Bronte on the 8. Arrott went for 4 on 1st down and 1 on 2nd, and on the third try he went over the left side to make the first touchdown of the ball game. Try for extras failed and the score was 6-0, with 8:11 remaining in the quarter.

Willie Zuniga kicked off for the locals to Davis on the 18 and he was stopped on the 38. Larry Tolson called signals for the Bufs and handed off to Bobby Davis for 4. McKinnon added 2 and a pass to Marlin Medlin was good for a 1st on the Bronte 36. The Bufs moved on to the 26 before the Horns tightened their defense. Cooper threw McKinnon for a 5 yard loss, Bobby Skelton almost intercepted a pass and Roger Graves trapped Tolson for a 15 yard loss to bring up 4th and 30. Garry Irwin punted to Arrott who was downed on the 16.

The Longhorns couldn't go, however, and Barbee punted on

4th down to McKinnon on his 45. After three tries the Bufs punted, but a fumble gave them the ball on the Bronte 19. McKinnon moved the ball 7 yards to the 12 as the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Once again the Horns tightened up and the 3th down try on a keeper by Tolson was inches short and gave Bronte the ball on their own 9 yard line.

The Longhorns began a 91 yard march that was to end in their second touchdown of the game. Cooper, Arrott and Keith McCutchen moved the ball down to the 15, and from there Arrott went around left end for the counter without being touched. A timely block by Tony Holland paved the way for Arrott's run. A conversion try failed and the score was 12-0.

Zuniga's kick went to Leon Hobbs who was pulled down on the 29 by James Vaughn, Holland and Barbee. Bronte and Forsan exchanged 5 yard penalties on the series. On 3rd down, Garland Richards and Graves clobbered Tolson for a loss of 4 to bring up 3rd and 11. A pass seemed to be the only thing, but McCutchen was waiting for it and returned it 20 yards to the Buff 30.

Arrott had to fight for every inch of his 9 yard gain to the 21 and McCutchen went 2 more yards for a 1st on the 19. Cooper made 5 and then the Longhorns went to the air for three incomplete passes, so the ball went to the Bufs on their 14.

The Bufs failed to make the needed 10 yards on three tries so Irwin punted to Barbee at mid-field. The Longhorns were penalized 15 yards for holding during the series and were not able to overcome the loss, so Barbee punted and Forsan took over on their 32.

Forsan was penalized 15 for

clipping on the punt return to bring up 1st and 25. Scott and Graves added to their misery by pushing Tolson back 5 more to make it 2nd and 30 just before the half ended.

Third Quarter

Zuniga kicked off to start the second half of the ball game. It sailed to the 10 where McKinnon took it and returned to the 34. After three tries, the Bufs faced a 4th and 5, so Irwin punted to Arrott on the 32. Cooper made a couple of nice gains but the Horns had to kick, and the Forsan lads took over on their own 49. First play of the series gave the ball back to Bronte, as Bobby Skelton intercepted a pass on his 43.

Steady gains by Cooper, Arrott and Thompson moved the ball to the Forsan 19 where the Bronte lads had a first down. Cooper battled his way for 7 on the next play, then Arrott followed a key block by Richards to move the ball to the 4 for another 1st. The play was called back, the Longhorns were fined 15 yards and the ball was moved back to the 19. Arrott carried again, and with timely blocks by Holland and Richards, he was able to go all the way across the double stripe for the third Bronte tally of the night. Score was 18-0, following a failure on the PAT.

Holland pulled Hobbs down on the 35 after he took Zuniga's kick. Tolson lost 5 yards when Scott broke through and nailed him. A pass to Medlin was good, but not good enough, and the Bufs had to punt. The kick was fumbled by Bronte and set up the visitors for their first counter of the night. Taking over on the 33, Tolson tossed a pass to Medlin for 28 yards and a 1st and goal on the 5. McKinnon carried for the counter and after a try for extras failed, the score was 18-6.

Arrott took Willis' kick on the 14 and was scuttled on the 34. The following series of downs was unfruitful and Barbee went back in to punt formation, and the Buffaloes took over the ball on their 30. They moved to a 1st on Bronte's 45 as the third quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

A pass to McKinnon moved the ball to the Bronte 30, and then a fumble was recovered by Arrott to give the Longhorns the ball on the 31.

The Bronte lads were heavily defended and Barbee had to punt. The kick was almost blocked and went straight up to give the ball to the Bufs on the Bronte 41.

Graves and Zuniga got through to trap Tolson for a 9 yard loss on 1st down. On 2nd, however, he tossed a long one to Medlin who went over the goal line to give his team their second touchdown. PAT failed and the score was 18-12.

Willis kick went to Barbee who was dropped on his 41 after a nice return. The Longhorns moved the ball well, with Arrott and Cooper doing the leg work. They made 1st downs on the Forsan 49, 34 and 15 and the next series saw the inspired Forsan defense rise up to stop the threat as the ball went over on the 12 yard line.

Tolson was pushed back to the 2 in a rush by Zuniga, Scott and Graves. The visitors were not able to overcome the loss and had to kick. Bronte took over on their 38 yard line.

Moving up to within 6 points of the Longhorns had put some starch back into the Buffaloes, and they stopped Bronte before they could make a 1st down. Barbee's punt went to the Forsan 27 where the visitors put the ball in play.

A long pass to Medlin gave the Bufs a 1st on Bronte's 42. Tolson lost a yard when he was hit by Graves and Scott, then a pass to McKinnon was good for 6. A penalty against Bronte put the ball on the 19 and gave the Buffaloes a 1st down.

Tolson threw an incomplete pass, then he was trapped by Zuniga for a loss of 9. The third try however, was not so bad, as Medlin took it for a 1st on the Bronte 9. The first play of the new series saw Tolson toss another aerial to Medlin in the end zone for the tying touchdown. Extra point try failed and the score was 18-18.

The Bufs kicked off and Bronte was able to run one play before time ran out.

The passing attack of the Buffaloes is what saved them from disaster, as the Longhorn defense

held them to a minus 45 yards on the ground.

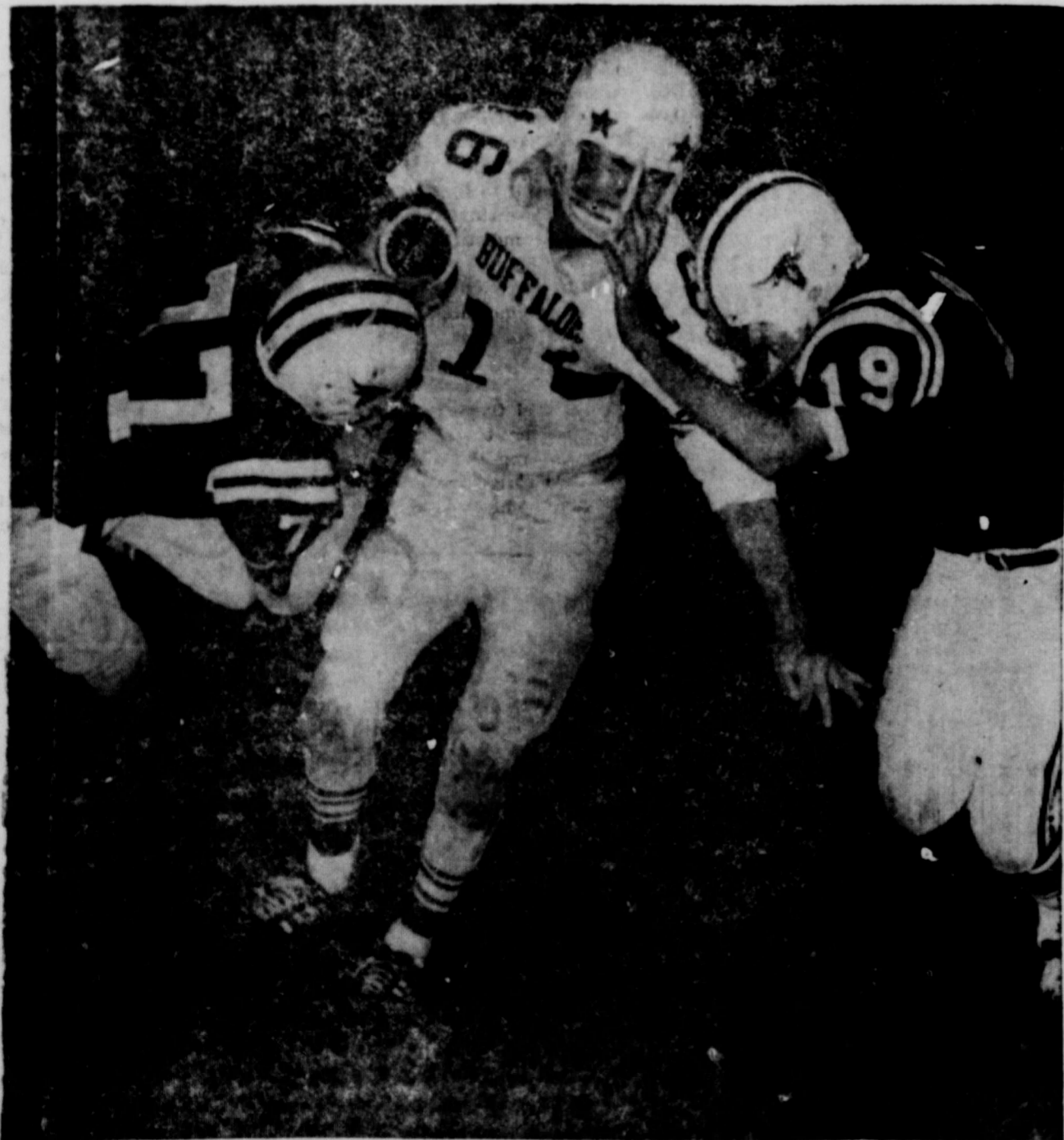

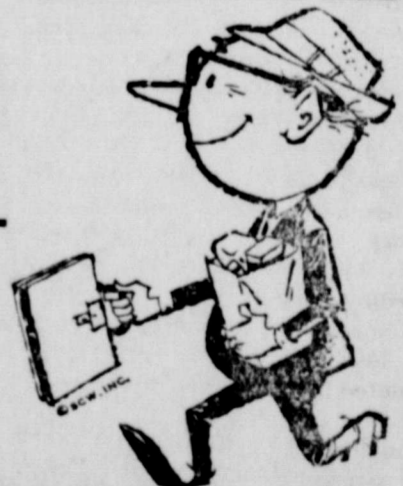

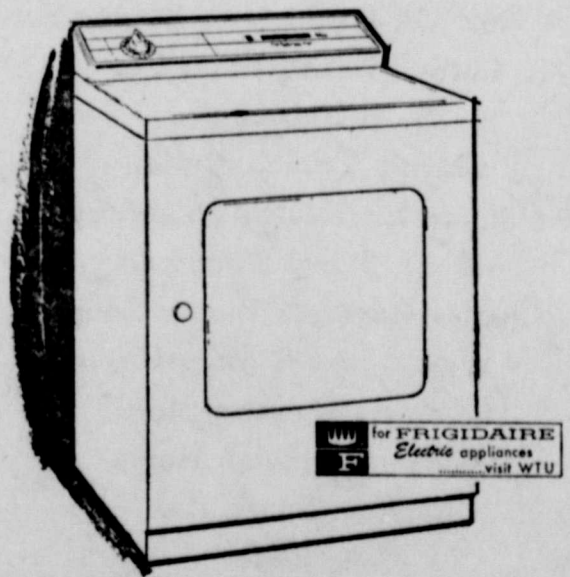

DPS Seeking New Recruits to Train

Patrolman Robert Sanders of Bronte has announced that the Texas Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified young men for the position of Patrolman with the Department.

Sanders said "All interested men between the ages of 20 and 35 who are of sound physical condition, have at least a high school education or equivalent, have vision of not less than 20/40 and have high moral standards should contact him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately."

Sanders said there are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited — Driver License, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection and Highway Patrol. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from an 18 week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the Academy, he will receive a salary of \$500 a month while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms and many other subjects.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation, 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern retirement privileges and travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

Patrolman Sanders urged interested young men to get their application today and take the examination before all vacancies are filled.

Katharyn Duff Speaks to Club

"We need all the wisdom we can muster to deal with the problems and complexities of our times," Katharyn Duff, assistant editor of the Abilene Reporter News, told members of the Sorosis club and their guests last Thursday night when they met in the home of Mrs. Clark Glenn. She mentioned poverty, civil rights, Vietnam as examples.

Miss Duff, who covered the National Democratic Convention in August for her newspaper, spoke more specifically on the confrontation there between protesters and police. She emphasized that society "must listen and communicate with the youth movement and help them work toward their goals within the established Democratic process." She pointed out that many young people are concerned, involved and impatient with progress in the fields of poverty, civil rights, politics and others.

She told the group that most of the young people who were in Chicago with their candidates, McCarthy, McGovern and others, were clean-cut, intelligent persons, some of whom had given up a year of college to become involved in politics. Some were caught up, however, and used, in the frenzy and confrontations created by the militants, Miss Duff said. These people, she said, were seasoned street fighters, older than the young politicians, and they came to Chicago for the sole purpose of wrecking the convention. In this, she said, the militants failed; mainly because of the restraint of the Negro population of Chicago, upon whom they had counted for riots, etc., to help their cause.

Miss Duff brought with her several underground newspapers she had bought in Chicago, showing the planning of the confrontations, where the police and television cameras would be, with lists of items needed for street fighting.

She made the point that she can find no answer for the young people who ask her why they are too young to vote, when they tell her they are old enough to serve in the armed forces and perhaps be called upon to die for their country, and when they are old enough to work and pay taxes.

A question and answer and discussion period followed the program.
