## FFA Chapter Conducting Team in State Contest

Bronte High School's junior chapter conducting team will leave Friday for Huntsville where the members will participate in the statewide contest to determine the best in Texas.

The contest for the Bronte FFA boys will be at 1:45 p.m. Saturday.

J. T. Henry, chapter advisor, will accompany the group to Huntsville.

Members of the team and their positions are: president, Bobby Skelton; vice president, Lynn Law-

hon; sentinel, Rance Brunson; reporter, Bruce Pruitt; treasurer, Mike Arrott; secretary, Matt Caperton.

The boys won a berth in the state contest when they took first place honors Nov. 23 in the area contest at Lubbock. Competing against six other district winners, the Bronte boys scored 918 points out of a possible 1,000, some 23 points above the number two area team.

The team placed first in a district contest held Nov. 14 in Eldorado with a 927 out of 1,000, which was 111 points above their nearest competition.

The state contest will be held at Sam Houston State College, with teams competing from the 19 areas which make up Texas.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at a Big Lake Hospital after the accident in which some pipe and a lock line broke and fell on him. He had reported to the new job with Cactus Drilling Company Friday afternoon.

He was born June 23, 1943, in Louisville, Ky., and came to Coke County in 1950. He was a former student of the Bronte schools and also attended Sul Ross College at Alpine. He was a veteran of the U. S. Navy.

He is survived by his father, J. E. Scott of Bronte; his mother, Mrs. Berniece Shields of Midland, and a daughter, Tonie Lynn Scott of Alpine; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Morley of Bronte and paternal grandfather, J. E. Scott of Clyde.

## Hospitality Table Is Easy Way To Create A Holiday Atmosphere

The very word hospitality has an easy charm. It implies a spontaneous welcome which is in no way dependent upon elaborate fixings or lengthy preparation. This is the kind of gracious atmosphere every homemaker will want to create during the holidays when friends drop in. And it is simple enough, from the standpoints of both time and money.

For your "hospitality center," use the dining table or an occasional table in the living room if you have one large enough. Start early in the day to set it with holiday linens, cake plates, eggnog bowl and cups, and your prettiest silver. Bring out the fruit cake. Everything is ready, and all that remains for you to do later is serve the eggnog at a moment's notice. This can be prepared ahead of time and brought to the table as needed. Everybody will enjoy such a casual but warm welcome, ready and waiting.

Christmas tablecloths are so dramatic these days, they need little decorative assistance from other props. Even the most elaborate designs are intended for the washer, so use them often. Choose red or green napkins for a white cloth, or pale pink napkins for a gold cloth if you like a more sophisticated approach. Add a tiered stand to hold small goodies, or a single silver or crystal candleabra to add a pretty glow. Or your piece de resistance might be

a silver bowl filled with fresh fruit, combining the reds and greens of apples, grapes, and cranberries. Silver table pieces will shine brightly, throughout the holidays, without need for repeated polishing if you wash them often with hot soap or detergent suds and rinse, then buff with a lintless cloth.

Holiday-design china — it may be plastic, of course — is inexpensive and serves a decorative as well as utilitarian purpose. Be sure to choose a tablecloth and plates or punch bowl set with regard to their motifs and colors, in order to have the table one complete harmonious picture.

In addition to an easy way of entertaining, there is also an easy way of caring for those holiday linens. Cloths, from lace to linen, are now available with soil release or stain resistant finishes. Machine washing removes those stubborn stains and machine drying eliminates the need for ironing.

### Safety Check

A fire in your home can take the merry right out of Christmas. So, double-check the following safety points for a joyful Yuletide.

—Place base of tree in pail of water or wet sand.

—Use only decorations that are fireproof or flame-resistant.

—Never put lighted candles on a tree.

—Do not hang metallic icicles over wires or light bulbs.

—Before stringing lights, check for worn insulation or loose sockets. Don't plug too many lights into one electrical outlet. It can cause overloading and a short circuit.

—Electric trains can throw sparks, too; so keep them away

from the tree.

—Gift wrapping should be thrown away promptly. It can flame up quickly.

—Keep a fire extinguisher handy at all times.

—As soon as tree shows signs of drying out, remove it from your home.

### NASA Space Program-Demonstration Scheduled for Dec. 17; Public Invited

A NASA Space Sciences lecture-demonstration is planned for the Bronte Schools next Tuesday, Dec. 17. The program will be at 10 a.m. in the school auditorium.

Sponsored by NASA Headquarters, the NASA Spacemobile is a lecture demonstration used as a teaching aid for the space sciences and as a means to acquaint large numbers of the educational community and the general public with the major accomplishments and future objectives of the space agency.

The program will be conducted by professional science educators who are authoritatively informed on the space sciences and the activities of the NASA.

The lecture-demonstration will

last about an hour and will include discussions and demonstrations of aeronautics, rocketry, propulsion systems, satellites, probes, orbits, communications, human factors and manned spacecraft.

The public is invited to attend.

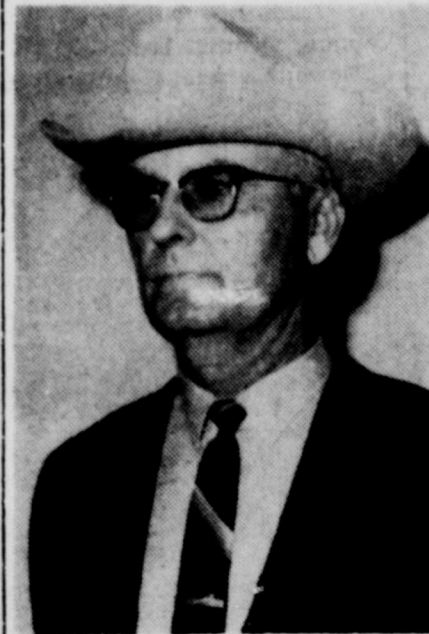
### Heart Association Presented Award

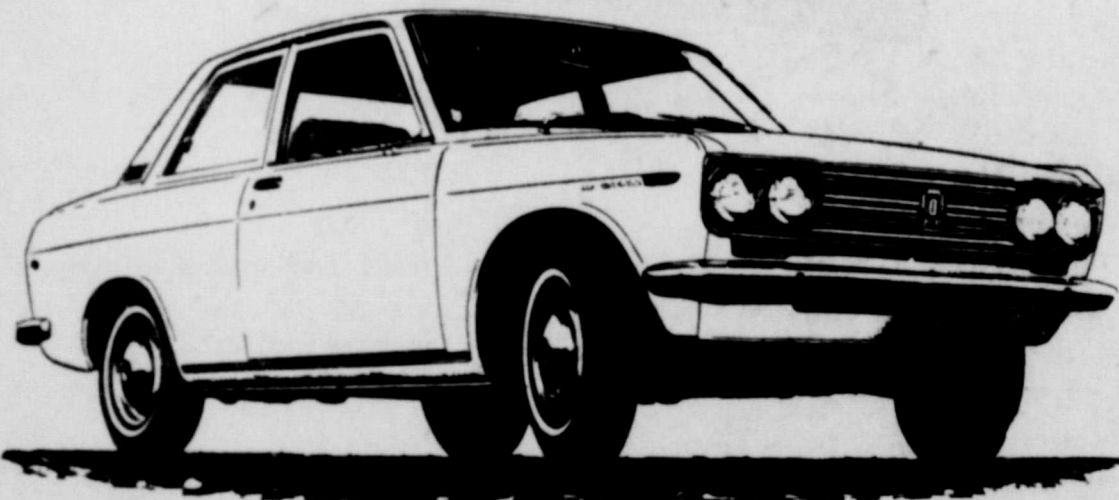

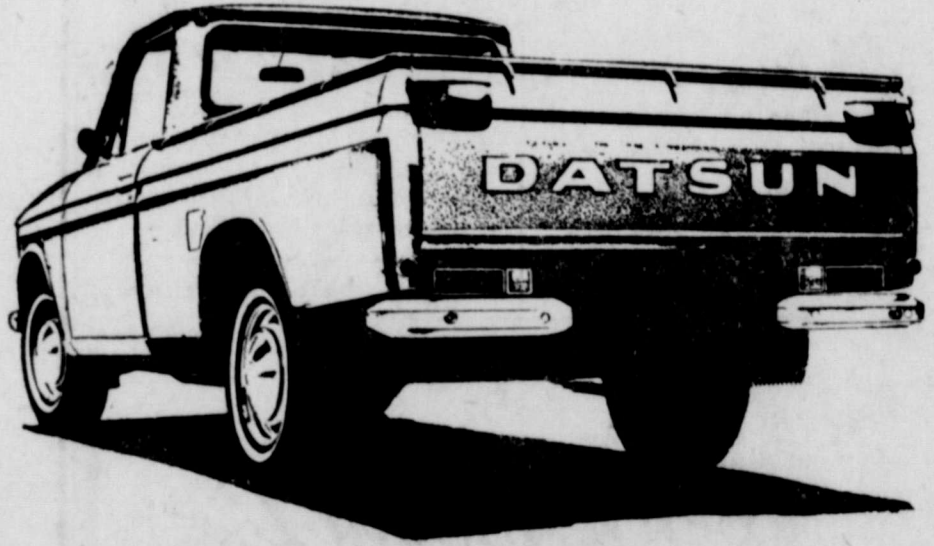

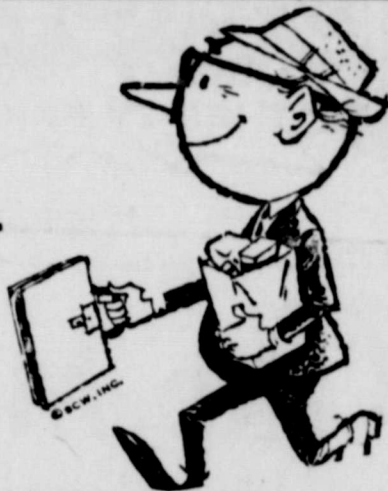
