Christmas Seals Arriving in Coke

Christmas Seals are now being delivered to residents of Coke County. The mailing marks the annual Christmas Seal campaign kickoff throughout the 32 West Texas counties of the Big Country Area of the Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association.

According to Mrs. Billy Joe Lockett, BCA board member from Bronte, the slogan, "There's More to Do—Give More Christmas Seals," is especially fitting. Donations from the seals "give the gift of life and breath in the year round fight against emphysema, tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases. In addition, the seals spread good cheer in the holiday season through their uses on holiday cards and packages."

Mrs. Lockett noted that monies received are spent generously in research and health education. Emphysema, a chronic respiratory disease, is second among disabilities for which workers are awarded Social Security benefits. Bronchitis, emphysema and asthma combined rank ninth among causes of disease deaths, with emphysema being the fastest growing cause of death in this country. Mrs. Lockett urged everyone to contribute liberally when seals are received.

Rich Anderson is sure Texas doesn't need another Sharpstown scandal.

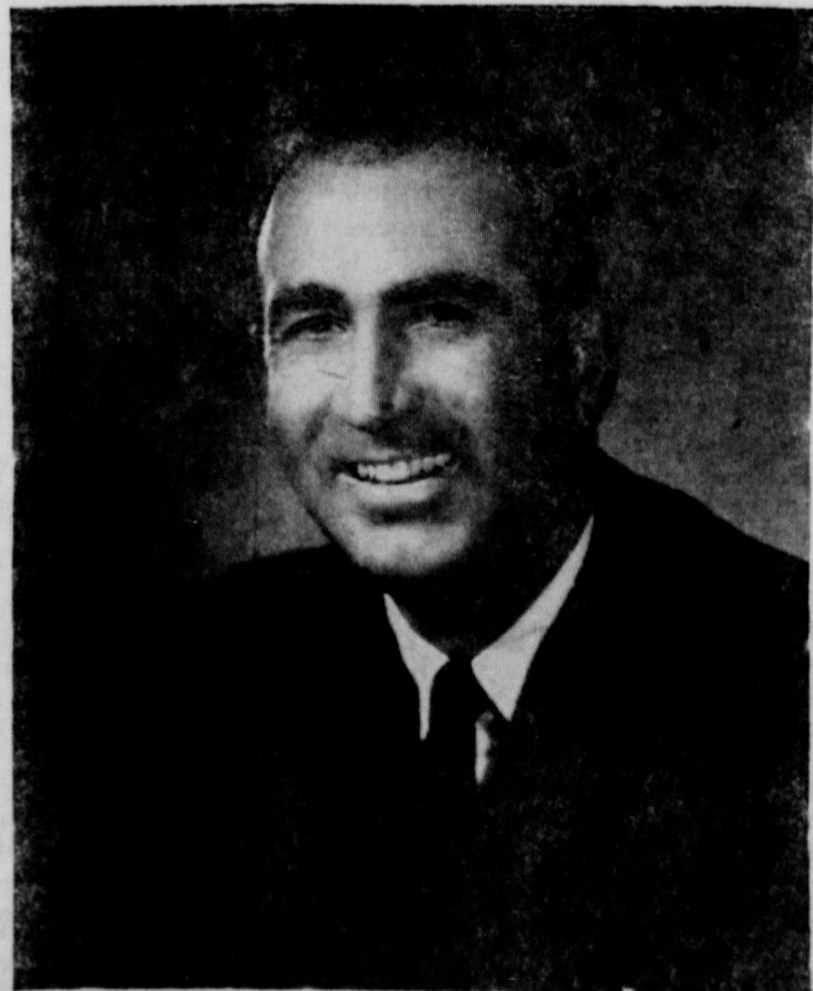

In many sections of the state Texas voters have already determined to change the way the state's being run from Austin. "Power politics" and "power politicians" hopefully have had their day.

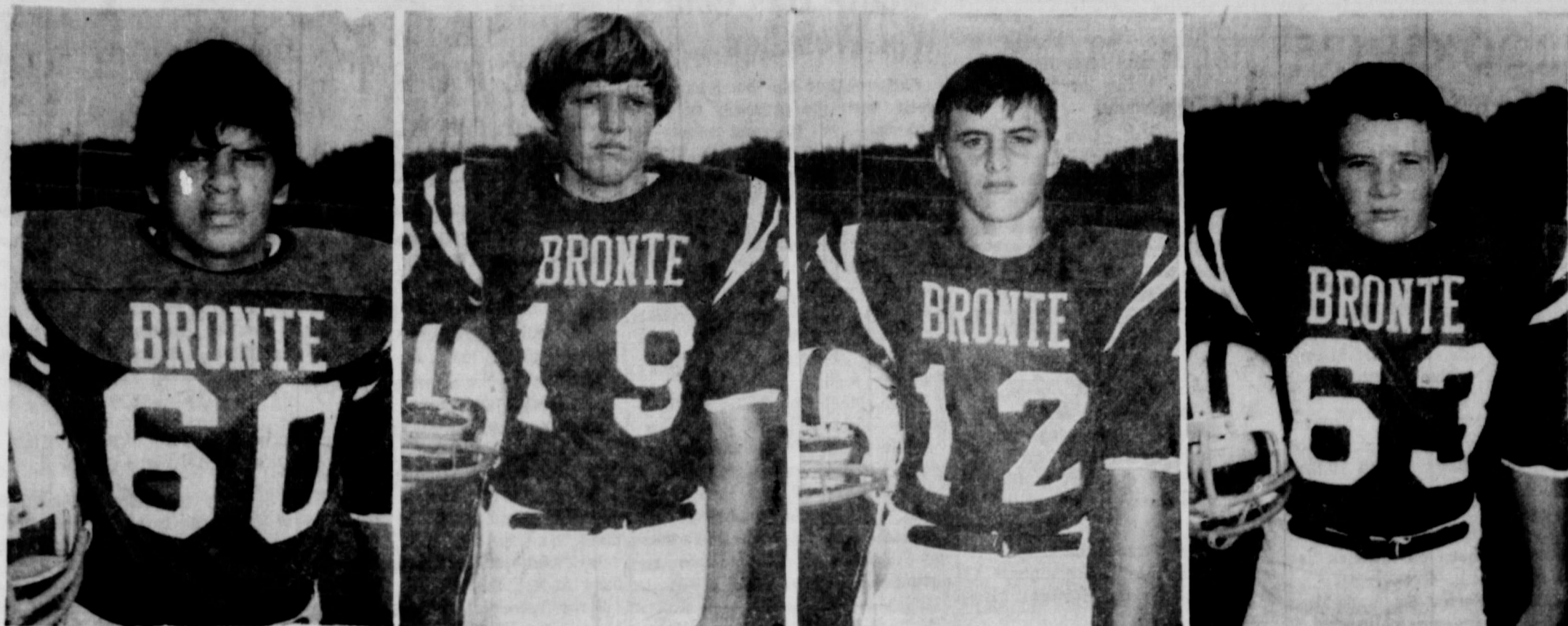

Longhorns Drop District Game to Roby, 21-8

The Bronte Longhorns, unbeaten in District 3-B play, were handed at 21-8 defeat last Friday night on a rain soaked field at Roby.

First Quarter

Although Louis Martinez recovered a fumble on the third play from scrimmage after the Lions returned Alan Barbee's kickoff to the Roby 30, the first series introduced trouble. Barbee lost a yard and two of Nelson Coulter's attempted passes to Jim Dan Raughton fell incomplete.

Bronte held on the next series and took possession of Roby's punt on their own 45. Barbee and Coulter could get only 9 yards so Barbee punted to the Roby 10. Roby made three consecutive 1st downs although handicapped with a 15 yard holding penalty. The drive was capped with a 60 yard scoring pass from Donnie Stephens to Mark Kiser. Robert Morgan converted and it was 7-0, Roby, with 3:00 showing on the clock.

The Longhorns got their first

1st down when Coulter threw from his own 29 to Randy Gibbs for 10. Two runs and an incomplete pass called for a punt which Barbee sent to the Roby 27.

Second Quarter

Roby made three more 1st downs before Davy Chapman recovered a fumble on the Bronte 27. The Longhorns couldn't move and Barbee's punt slithered off the side of a wet foot to the Bronte 40.

A Roby holding penalty moved the ball back to the Roby 45. The Lions tried two runs and one pass and punted to Bronte's 27.

Robert Morgan intercepted a 3rd down Longhorn pass to give the Lions possession on the Bronte 20. A 15 yarder moved it back to the 35. Roby picked up 1st downs 8 and 9 before Jimmy Reed threw to Frank Carter for a 6 yard gain that was nullified with an illegal motion penalty. On the next play Reed threw to Carter again. This time it stood up. Morgan converted and the score-board read Roby 14, Bronte 0, the same score the Longhorns carried to the dressing room at halftime.

Third Quarter

The wet weather, the sloppy field and the 14 point deficit did not discourage the Longhorns for they came back to play the type of ball they have played most of the season.

Although Roby put together another long scoring pass play, the Longhorns pretty well stayed on the ground, and Mark Duncan, Barbee and Danny Carper moved it downfield to the 2 yard line. From there Carper plunged over on 3rd down. Barbee ran the conversion and the final score of 21-8 was set.

Fourth Quarter

The Longhorns took to the air in the 4th quarter but passers and receivers were falling victims to the playing conditions. The big play was a halfback pass from Barbee to Gibbs that carried to the Roby 12, where it died when a siege of incompletions set in.

The defense generally looked good, but the offense often sputtered and spewed. No serious injuries assures that all of the Longhorns should be ready for

the Loraine Bulldogs in the Saturday homecoming game.

The Longhorns are in it and still have a chance to win the district title.

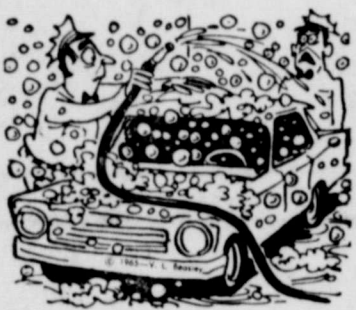

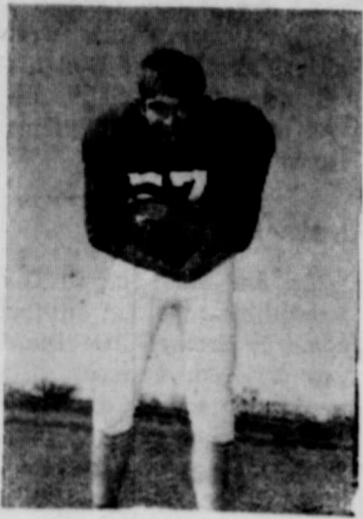

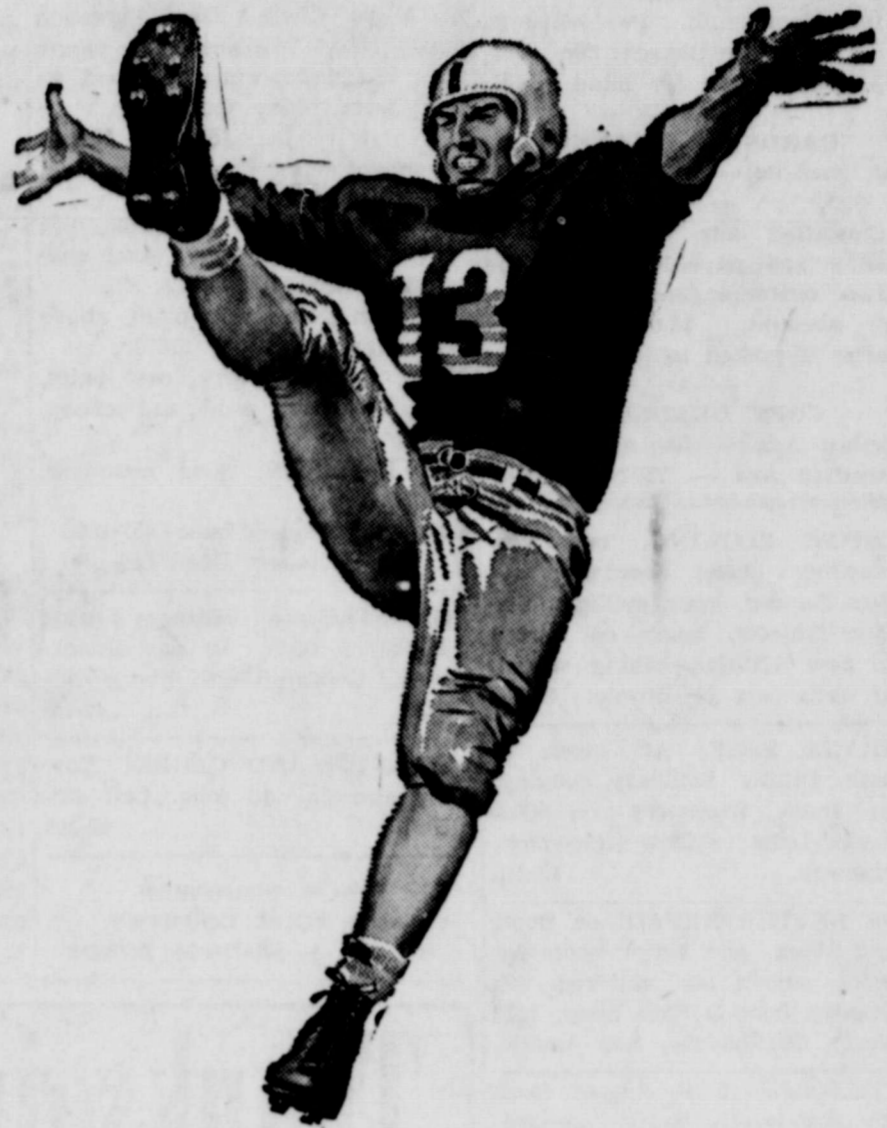
