which postal managers attempt to expeditiously resolve.

The Consumer Service Program reflects Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar's determination that mail services to the public liable.

"Good service is a far broader Postmaster General says. "It is needs, the sympathy and understanding we bring to your own service is all about."

Postmaster Pruitt urged customers in Bronte to bring their inquiries and complaints to the attention of postal people.

To make it easier for a customer to make a suggestion or complaint about postal service, the new consumer service card will be available from route carriers and at post offices.

According to Postmaster Pruitt, the card is two postal cards with carbon paper between them. "One copy goes to me so work can begin on the problem," he said. The other goes to Postal Service Headquarters in Washington for cataloging and analysis. The cards will help management spot problem areas and trends and take corrective action if neces-

The card should take no more than two minutes to fill out. The postmaster also said he and his staff are willing to discuss any problems, including lack of courtesy, irregularities in deliveries or collections, collection box convenience and postal office hours.

"We want you to come to us with your problems," concluded Postmaster Pruitt. "The whole point of this service program is to bring your problems and gripes out into the open where we can attempt to resolve them."






