orably known throughout the county. Mr. Schuessler was born in Germany, and at the age of four years, came to this country with his parents. His parents first settled at New Braunfels, Texas, later moving to Fredericksburg. After residing at Fredericksburg a few years, Mr. Schuessler came to Mason at the youthful age of nineteen years. He has been a citizen of this county for 61 years. Immediately after coming to Mason county he was married to Miss Frances Hicks, on December 20, 1859. Mrs. Schuessler died in '97.

Mr. Schuessler can relate many interesting and thrilling stories of the conditions which existed in this country when he first came here. He experienced many difficulties with the Indians who inhabited this section in the olden days.




