DEATH CAME AS SHOCK TO COM-MUNITY-WAS OPERATED **UPON SUNDAY**

Died, Monday morning, May 9th, at 6 o'clock at his home in Mason, Mr. E. H. (Doc) Manning, aged 28 years, 1 month and 7 days.

Seldom is it our duty to chronicle such a sudden and untimely death. The news of Mr. Manning's death was a great shock and caused a dark gloom to spread over the entire city. His illness was of but brief duration, something like a week. On Sunday morning, local physicians operated upon him for appendicitis, and on Sunday afternoon the report was given out he was getting along splendidly.

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven \$(\$.07) cents on the \$100 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.



Every person subject none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.




