

After supper a few games were played, then the Rah. Rah! Rah! for the Y. P. M. S. was given by the crowd.





"Voted bonds for school purposes-Cisco has recently voted \$250,000 for building new schools; Dalhart, \$125,-000; Stephenville, \$100,000; Wichita Falls, \$300,000; Mineral Wells \$45,000; Haskel, \$75,000; Weatherford, \$200,-000: Electra, \$125,000: Stratford, \$40,-000; Abilene, \$300,000; Paris, \$200,000,

Does this list indicate that the people of the larger towns have realized, that any community which has the best schools must secure them by voting upon, itself bonds to build houses, and a tax for maintenance purposes. Good schools can not come any other way. Also, before a community can have the best of schools, it must provide the best buildings and enough of them, and then equip each building with the best equipment. The best workman in any line can not do the best work without the best equipment, and it would not be expected of him in any line except

### **NATION'S FARMERS** SEEKING NEW LAWS

#### A "Get-Together" Meeting of Various Organizations Is Called.

Washington.-A "get together meeting" of farmers' organizations represented at Washington was announced for April 14 Monday, at which time, it was said, an effort would be made to unite upon an agricultural program for recommendation to President Harding and congress.

Lower freight rates, tariff and reveaue legislation, more liberal extension of credits, regulation of future grain exchanges and extension of the co-operative and marketing associations are some of the matters which, it was said, will probably be considered.

The movement to get together was said in agricultural circles to have been "spontaneous," although partly an aftermath of the airing of differences before the house banking and currency committee during the last session of congress.

The American Farm Bureau federation has announced a meeting of its executive committee and one member from each state in Washington, beginning April 11, when a legislative program will be discussed. The National Farmers union has called a meeting in Washington for April 20. The National Grange, the Pennsylvania State Grange, the Milk Producers Association, grain and live stock men, cotton growers and other farmers' organizations are expected to meet in Washington about the same time, as well as participating in the joint conference.

#### Cardinal Gibbons Passes.

Baltimore, Md.-James, Cardinal Gibbons, archbishop of Baltimore and senior prelate of the Catholic church in the United States, died Thursday, passing away so quietly that even his nurse, a Bon secours nun, could not be sure that it was the end. The change that betokened death was slight, almost imperceptible, and five minutes passed while she leaned above the slight, still form, watching. Then from the house where he had lived and worked, in the shadow of the Cathedral of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, went forth word of his death. His grave will be a niche in the north wall of the crypt under the high altar of the cathedral. A slab of marble carved with an inscription in Latin will mark his resting place.


