# G. F. HURLEY, 74; DIED STATE PECAN GROWERS PERFECT ORGANIZATION

J. W. WHITE ANNOUNCES ORGAN-IZATION NOW HAS CHAR-TER

The Texas Pecan Growers' Association is now a perfected organiation, having recently been granted a charter by the department at Austin, according to J. W. White, of this city, who is president of the Association.

Mr. White was in San Antonio recently and while there, attended a meet ing of the leading pecan raisers from various parts of the State and he gives out the information that the pecan growers made application for a charter for the organization. He says that recent word from Senator Burkett, who is secretary-treasurer for the association, is to the effect that the charter is granted.

A drive for membership is now being made and Mr. White is of the opinion that 100,000 members will be secured. He stated that necessary blanks would be in his hands within the next few days and parties of this and adjoining counties who are interested, will be furnished any information desired by seeing him or by addressing letters of inquiry to him at this office.

We are informed that the purpose of the organization is to co-operate in marketing the Texas pecan crop and an effort will be made to poor all the pecans with a view of getting the very highest prices for them when marketed. It is Mr White's iden that the crop this year will bring from 15 to 20 cents per pound.

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

PRINCE AFRAID TO RIDE IN CAR Gets His First Glimpse of an Automobile and Decides Not to Risk His

Royal Neck

An automobile party drove up in front of the royal palace in a Chinese province a few weeks ago and sent word in to the ruling prince that they would like to take him out for a ride. But this particular prince, it seems, had never seen an automobile before and was so terrified at the prospect of riding in one that he did not even express his regrets in person. He did his inspecting from a safe distance and then sent out his card.

The appearance of the car, according to a Chung Mei News Agency Dispatch from Peking, caused great excitement through the prince's home town.

"Commander Thomas Hutchins, American naval attache, and E. C. Mc-Pherson, manager of E. W. Frazar & Co.," says the dispatch, "have completed the round trip to Tungling. the Ming Eastern Tombs, by automobile and it is believed that this is one of the first times that this trip has been successfully made."

"In the old days, when it was the fashion to go out on horseback, the trip took some three days one way, at least two nights being spent on the road. By automobile, in spite of the sandy roads, the rivers that had to be crossed by ferry, and the many other difficulties encountered, the entire trip was done in eight hours, and without any mishaps of any kind. A Dodge Brothers car was used.

"The party left the Tsihyamen, or East Gate at 6:00 on Thursday morning; 6:30 saw them at the Pei Ho, and 9:15 at San Ho Hsien. This was the place that was selected in the days of pony travel as the stopping place on the first night, and by automobile was reached in a scant three hours and a quarter. The second night's stopping place, Dischow, was reached at 11 45 and at 2:15 the party rolled into the Fastern Tombs and were me by the Manchu prince's bodyguard. "The old Manchu prince apparently could not screw up his courage to sufficient height to venture the trip in the machine, t'at was offered him. #### Neff Sends Eleven Bills to Secretary

#### FOREIGN DEBT OF MEXICO TO-TALS \$190,166,313

Eagle Pass, Texas.-The secretary upon a lot of things that were original- of the treasury of Mexico has given out the following figures on the Mexican debt. The foreign debt is \$190,-166,313 gold. The interior debt (money owed to the people of Mexico) is \$95,-475,000 and the interest on the various state debts, which, by special agreement, the federal government is to pay, is \$670,996. The total debt therefore is \$281,763,261 in gold. The above figures cover all accounts up to June 30, 1921. It must be remembered, however, that the above debt is not to be paid immediately, that is, its various items will not be due for several years. For instance, the debt of 1904 is not due until 1954, and that of 1910 until 1945. The slight obligation comparatively, that the Mexican government is under may be seen from the fact that the debt from 1904 to 1921, which is to be paid immediately, totals only \$89,593,-091. Besides this is the interest on mortgages of \$12,750,266 and the debt of the national railroads \$2,000,000.
