Doss is Miller's atcorney and he phoned Doss to come at latest "find," Barbara Pedford. Broeronce, saying, "I have just killed Tom Benge.

About two or three months ago Benge shot and killed Will Bryant, rural mail carrier out of Paint Rock and son-in-law of Sheriff Miller, while Bryant was delivering mail at the Benge home.

Prior to that time Sheriff Miller arwested Benge on a charge of violating the prohibition law and since the killing of young Bryant bad feeling has existed between Benge and the sheriff.

Benge was a pioneer stockman of Concho County, owning a large ranch and many cattle and sheep, but reverses in recent years had caused him To lose heavily

Several years ago he killed a Mexian ranch hand, but was acquitted of she charge.

Miller used a winchester, shooting Benge twice over the heart, killing him anstantly. Benge dropped dead without eattering a word. The killing occurred son the streets of Eden, about 5 o'clock. Both men had been in town for some time, but had not met. Friends had observed the men watching each other just before the killing took place.

Miller got in his car and left for his home at Paint Rock, accompanied by a steputy officer, after phoning his atforney here to meet him at Paint Rock.

GUSHER MAY RUN 30,000 BARRELS Well At Mexia Believed Larger Than Western Which Sold for \$1,100,000

Mexia, Texas.-The big gusher of the Kirby Petroleum Company on the Nussbaum farm, three miles west of Mexia, is the center of attraction in Mexia now. The well has with difficulty been gotten under control, although the strong gas pressure blew out the packing around the control head and it is spraying oil from this

The oil from the well was turned into a 1,000-barrel tank today in the presence of the owners and a large num ber of spectators, and after one hour the tank was overflowing. The well flowed through a three-inch line from the six and five-eighths casing and was pinched into one-fourth of its capacity.

John H. Kirby and T. H. Bass, owners and officers of the company, estimate the well good for 30,000 barrels and possibly more. It is admitted by many that this well is larger than the Western Oil Fields Corporation's gusher brought in a few days ago, for which the Magnolia paid \$1,100,000





Thorndale, Milam Co., Tex .- The total number of bodies recovered from flood waters of Gabriel River and Bru by Creek in a tenmile radius of this city is now sixty-one. At least twenty others are reported missing. The local chapter of the Red Cross is doing all possible to relieve distress, which is mostly among Mexicans and negroes. roads Rates on Cattle, Hogs and Sheep.

Washington.-Reductions by Western railroads in rates on cattle, hogs and sheep, in the opinion of the interstate commerce commission, "will prove of material benefit to the Western live stock raisers, who have been heavily affected by the rapid decline in live stock prices since July, 1920."

The commission expressed that belief Thursday in recounting it had authorized the reductions proposed by the carriers which will become effective September 20, and amount to 20 per cent in cases where the present rates are higher than 50 cents a hundred pounds, but in no case decreases the rate below 50 cents a hundred.

Under the new tariffs practically all rates from points west of the Missouri River to Chicago and from all points west of the Rocky Mountains to the Missouri River will be reduced in amounts ranging from 1 cent to 25 cents a hundred pounds. Similar reductions in all other live stock rates now higher than 50 cents a hundred pounds are to be made, the commission said. In many cases, it was stated, the entire increase made in August, 1920, will be eliminated by the new tariffs. The commission estimated that the decreases would mean an annual reduction of revenues for the carriers of \$10,000,000.

The reductions are in line with suggestions made by the commission after hearings on freight rates on live stock throughout the West.
