Further replying to your letter of the of the opponents on the fifteen yard line, '15th inst., which has been held on our and Mason was unable to make the fif- desk file awaiting the opinion of the Attorney General, I shall advise that ing the best opportunity that Mason with respect to husband and wife the Attorney General holds that either Poll Taxes may be paid without the payment of the other, and that one or both Poll gainers, while Willmann and Ko-a's Taxes may be paid without the paymen of the Ad Valorem, but the Ad Valorem Tax cannot be paid unless both Poll Taxes assessed therewith are also paid.

The husband may pay the Poll Tax Club. of his wife and receive a receipt therefor ; in like manner, the wife may pay the Poll Tax of her husband and receive a receipt therefor. No order is required on the part of husband or wife for the payment of the Poll Tax of the other.

The laws of this State now levy a Poll Tax against a woman, the same as against a man and the payment of a woman's poll tax is just as obligatory as that of the man. Article 7620, Revised Statutes, 1911, reads as follows:

American Farm Bureau Committee Adopts Report on Marketing of Meat Animals

Dallas. Texas. Nov. 3.—The farmers' Live Stock Committee of Fifteen appointed by President J. R. Howard of the American Farm Bureau Federation has completed its report on live stock marketing investigation and recommends the organization of a great National Live Stock Producers Organization with the establishment of the terminals of Producers' Live Stock Commission Associations with allied stocker-and-feeder companies: the working out for an orderly marketing program by the Board of Directors of the National Live Stock Producers Association; the establishment by the same agencies of a Transportation Department to co-operate with the American Farm Brreau Federation and the State Farm Bureau; the interpretation of Live Stock Certificates, and co-operation with the American Farm Bureau Federation in extending the macket for meat. Ratification of the marketing plan will be considered November 10, by a meeting of representative live stock men from all over the United

The committee desired early in its investigation that the problems which it needed to consider involved co-operative marketing, orderly marketing. live stock production and marketing information, transportation and finan-



Strike Order After Conference.

for Oct. 30 was averted Thursday of a walkout and officials of the railroad telegraphers' organization announced they would take similar action. These were the only unions which have authorized a strike.

adopted was "that the resolution be declared now effective."

L. E. Shepperd, president of the Order of Railway Conductors, said that the unions had decided to call off the strike because of growing public opinion that the strike would be against the labor board and consequently the government and not against the railroads.

'This railroad propaganda found its way to the United States railroad labor board. This governmental agency told us that it would look on a strike as against it and the government and not against the roads and that the full force of the government would be brought to bear against us if we walked out. Under such circumstances there was nothing to do but annul our orders for the Oct. 30 walkout."

The first announcement of the executives' action was made by Mr. Lee. Rushing to the floor below the hotel meeting room where dozens of newspaper reporters were congregated, he smilingly shouted:

"The strike is off, boys, but I've only got one copy of the resolution and I'll show that to you tomorrow."

All of the union men were smiling as they came out and many of them jocularly pushed and shoved each other down the stairs. To all queries, most of them merely replied:

"It's all settled, see you tomorrow." Union leaders said that the resolution adopted by the labor board announcing that no further wage reduction petitions for any one group of employes would be considered until rules and working conditions for that group had been settled, "was decidedly instrumental" in bringing about the action calling off the walkout."

850 DISASTER DEATH TOLL FOR ONE YEAR

Red Cross Gives \$1,871,000 Relief When 65,000 Families Are Made Homeless.

Forty-three disasters, resulting in the death in the United States of 850 persons and the injury of 2,500 called for emergency relief measures and the expenditure of \$1,871,000 by the American Red Cross during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, says an announcement based upon the forthcoming annual report of the Red Cross. These disasters caused property damage estimated at \$30,000,000, affected stry-seven communities and rendered 65,000 families homeless.

The year's disasters were of varying types, including several which previously had never been thought of as falling within that classifica-The Red Cross furnished relief in seventeen fires of magnitude, five floods, seven tornadoes or cyclones, one devastating storm, three explosions, including the one in Wall street; one building accident, two typhoid epidemics, the most serious being that at Salem, Ohio, which affected 9 per cent of the population; one smallpox epidemic, in the republic of Haiti; one train wreck, the race riot at Tulsa, Okla.; the famine in China, emergency relief in famine among the Indians of Alaska, the grasshopper plague in North Dakota and an earthquake in Italy.

Pueblo Most Serious

By far the most severe of the disasters in the United States during the period covered by the Red Cross report was the Pueblo flood early in June, 1921. The rehabilitation problem confronting the Red Cross in Pueblo was one of the most difficult in recent years. When the first news of the horror was flashed throughout the country, the American Red Cross National Headquarters responded with a grant of \$105,000 for relief work. Governor Shoup of Colorado, appreclating the long and successful experience of the Red Cross in organizing LIFE SAVING CORPS disaster relief work, placed the entire responsibility for the administration of relief in its hands.

In response to appeals from Pres!dent Harding, Governor Shoup and other governors of western states and through local chapters of the Red Cross and other community organizations, public-spirited citizens brought the total contributed for Pueblo's rehabilitation to more than \$325,000.

The terrible havoc wrought by the flood waters is a matter of record. More than 2,300 homes were affected and 7,351 persons were left homeless. Estimates of \$500,000 as an absolute minimum for rehabilitation were made by Red Cross officials in charge of the relief work.

Fast Work in Wall Street

The Wall street explosion was notable in that relief workers of the Red Cross were on the scene twenty minutes after the disaster occurred. The at 7:15 o'clock. race riot at Tulsa also was unique in disaster relief annals in that outside of a small emergency relief fund contributed by the Red Cross, the only relief measures outside the city consisted of the service of social workers, nurses and a trained executive whose object was to assist local forces in directing their own efforts.

In decided contrast with the previous year, only one tornado assumed the proportions of a major disaster. This occurred on April 15, in the border sections of Texas and Arkansas with the city of Texarkana as the center. The significant feature of this disaster relief work was the fact that it covered so much rural territory as to make necessary a large number of relief workers.

The famine in China, necessitating relief expenditures totalling more than \$1,000,000 by the American Red Cross was by far the most serious of the foreign disasters in which the Red Cross gave aid.

In 328 Chapters of the American Red Cross there have been formed special committees to survey the resources of their respective communities and to be prepared in case of disaster. In others of the 3,402 active Chapters, a network of communication has been formed through which instantaneous relief may be dispatched to any part of the United States.

That its work in this field may continued with ever greater effectiveness, the American Red Cross is appealing for widespread renewal of membership during its Annual Roll Call, to be conducted this year from November 11 to 24.

ENROLLMENT 10,000

Growth of Red Cross Life Saving Corps throughout the country continued unabated during the last fiscal year, a summary of the year's achievements by that Red Cross Service shows. There are now 160 Corps with a total membership of more than 10,000 members, of which 1,276 are sufficiently skilled in the work to act as examiners. Among the outstanding achievements of the Red Cross in this field during the last year was the organization at the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, of what is perhaps the largest life saving corps in the world.


