CONTRACT LET FOR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

SIX BID CONSIDERED; AUSTIN MAN IS AWARDED CONTRACT: WORK STARTS IN 30 DAYS

The board of school trustees for the Mason Independent School District let the contract for the erection of a modern high school building and for repairing the present occupied building, on last Wednesday afternoon, C. D. Mc. Millan, secretary of the board, stated six contractors bid for the work, but the contract was awarded to Mr. Richard Schmidt, of Austin, whose bid the board considered most favorable.

It is stated the contract calls for actual work to begin within the next hirty days and calls for the building's completion by August 1, 1922, provided weather conditions do not interfere with building progress.

A seventy-five thousand dollar bond issue was carried in the Mason Independent School District last summer for the erection of a new and modern high school building and for remodeling the present building for a grammar school. Mr. Schmidt's bid was to take over the \$75,000 worth of bonds at par to be considered separately in the build ing costs. He stated he would use local labor in doing the work, provided he could secure laborers "willing to hit the bail" and accomplish the work.

The site for the new building has not yet been secured, but Secretary McMillan informed the News that the Board was to definitely decide on the site this week, as several locations have been under consideration.

Dick Harris was accompanied to Sonora by Mrs. Harris, who was a witness to the fatal shooting. With H. S. sister of Dick Harris was a fifth member of the party. A number of friends of the Harrises from Valley Mills were in Sonora for the grand jury investigation, **History of Case**

Elizabeth Dorothy Harris, 20 years old and Nelson McNeill, 28, came to their death Saturday, May 21, southwest of Sonora as the climax to a chase and H. S. Harris.

Miss Harris and Mr. McNeill eloped Sonora the two parties met. After a race of 11 miles, the McNeill car broke down and he and his finance ran for ris was dead and McNeill had been wounded. Sunday morning he was his throat cut, lying in a pool of blood.

The two Harrises were finally arrest-The evidence had been so destroyed that the calling of a spcial grand jury was considered useless. The coronor's verdict was that McNeill was a suicide and that Miss Harris had met her death from gun shot wounds inbicted San Angelo Standard.



\$600000 ROAD BOND ELECTION INMCCULLOCH CO. ON DEC. 20TH

Acting upon the petition of Jas. T. Mann and 445 other qualified tax-paying voters of McCulloch county, Commissioners court late yesterday evening orderel a county-wide election to be held on Tuesday, December 20th, to determine whether or not McCulloch county shall issue its bonds in the sum of \$600,000 for the "purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof." The bonds are to bear 51/2 per cent interest, and are to run for a period of thirty years. Following the calling of the election, the court voted adjournment for the November term.-Brady Standard.

BOLL WEEVIL CONTROL

Bool weevil continue to feed and raise young after the cotton is picked and now, since the weather is beginning to get cool, is the best time to destroy the greatest number of them. By destroying the hibernating places and the weevils at this time, one need not increase the cotton acreage for next year, but can increase the yield per acre. We need acreage reduction and yield per acre increase.

Flat breaking in the early fall is a good control emasure, but should not be delayed too long, as the weevils will have gone to hibernating palces mas gifts. Here is one dressed up like and cannot be destroyed in this way.

If possible, pasture the stalks and bound with narrow satin ribbon for a then cut and rake in wind rows and burn, burn all grass and timber in the fields. Put the burning of stalks, grass. etc. off as late as possible as most of the weevils will then be destroyed. Af ter burning and plowing it is well to lise land once or more to destroy any vegetation that the weevils may live on through the winter.

> Preserve all birds where possible, as quail, kiddie and nighthawks help de stroy many weevils.

> Last, though not least, to effectively control the weevil, one must get his neighbors to co-operate with him in control measures, as what weevils one's neighbor's do not destroy will more than supply next year's crop.





forests were cut down. Starvation often stared them in the face, before they learned to raise good crops. Many of the people did not know how to work. Building materials were to be gotten out of the woods and

Had it not been for such men as John Smith and Miles Standish the Colonist would hafe faired still worse. The ladies of Colonial times were all heroines. So patiently and perservingly did they learn to adjust themselves to the hard, though interesting conditions of their new homes. At first the houses were made of logs and it required very hard labor to hew down and get them ready for building purpose. The cracks between the logs had to be plastered with mud. A rude kind of shingle was split from the logs which was used for roofing. Pieces of waxed paper served for windows and skins of animals were used for doors.

Gradually, however, these conditions improved. Then the houses were better and comfortably made. It is surely a pleasure to read of the old Colonial mansions Compare in your minds the difference between the Colonial houses and our modern houses of today.

Still the home life was generally busy, but happy. And you have only to read "Snow Bound" by one of our early poets to know all about this




