BATES ADVISES STOCKMEN TO **HAVE INPECTION ON SHIPPING** 

O. F. Bates, supervisor in charge of tick eradication in Mason county, was in Mason Tuesday. In speaking of tick eradication work in Mason county, he stated there seemed to be a misunderstanding among local stockmen regarding the quarantine on cattle. He says there are only three specified places in the county that are now under quarantine, and all the rest of the territory in this county is free and it is not compulsory that cattle be dipped in order to be moved, but he says local stockmen would act wisely if they do dip before starting their cattle, as it will be a means of preventing any possibility of scattering fever ticks.

Mr. Bates states that if cattle are driven to Brady and should show ticks upon inspection there, they will be required to dip them and hold them in the county has a local inspector, it is be called upon to inspect them.



From Key West I went to Havana, Cuba on the flying machine, Ponce de Leon, making the trip across the gulf in ninety minutes. The Ponce de Leon is a ten passenger hydroplane, weighing seven tons, equipped with two twin liberty motors of ninety horse power each. It has two propellers and its wings are one hundred and five feet long, yet it handles itself as gracefully as an eagle. We only flew about 1,800 feet high, and from this elevation the sea was very beautiful. It was an indigo blue and apparently as smooth as glass

# STATE WILL SUFFER NEXT T'M

Austin, Texas, May 18 .-- Unless something is done to provide additional money for the public schools of Texas for the coming scholastic year, 1922-23. the educational interests of the State will suffer seriously, according to W. S. Sutton, dean of the School of Education of the University of Texas.

"It is time that the people of Texas were awakened to the situation that confronts them," he said. "There will be many more children in the schools during the year 1922-23 and less money than this year to take care of them. The increase of scholastics last year over the previous year was 63,497; it is safe to predict that the increase will be as large this year. How are these children to be provided with teachers when there is available for the coming year less money than for the current year. It is shown by reports reaching this office that school boards over the State are finding it difficult to make contracts for teachers. Everyone should be interested. The biggest business in Texas is the school business.

YOUNG LADY IS DROWNED SUNDAY IN A TANK

(From San Saba News)


Bethel community is shadowed under the tragic pall of a deep and shocking sorrow. Miss Lorena Knight, 14year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Knight, was drowned while bathing in the tank within 200 yards of the house Sunday afternoop. The mother is prostrate from the shock and the entire community is in deep mourning. The details of the sad accident, as related to a News reporter, are about as follows. Miss Lorena had attend Sunday school at Bethel and had gone home with the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Emmet Taylor for dinner and to spend the afternoon. About 4 o'lock in the afternoon the two girls went in bathing in a large tank only some 200 yards from the house. They were swimming across the tank for sport. When deceased was within a few feet of the bank she screamed for help. A willow limb was reached to her and she caught hold of it, but it broke and she continued sinking. 



Michigan had fewer wolverines than Wisconsin, Minnesota or northern New York in the early days. One finds the term "Wolverine" commonly employed by residents of Ohio about 100 years ago when they spoke disparagingly of the settlers of Michigan. When the boundary trouble was at its hottest in the 1830's they used it most freely and most bitterly.

#### Strange Friends.

It appears from the testimony of many naturalists that the lomechusa and atemeles beetles live in the nests of ants, much as cows live with man. On the sides of their aldomens they have many unicellular glands that secrete a fluid that the ants like as much as we like cows' milk. The beetles, however, have an independent standing in their adopted home and are rather friends and allies than domesticated animals, for they are quite capable of protecting themselves. Besides the fluid that the hosts like so well, the beetle can produce from other glands a fluid of most disagreeable odor, which stupefles the ants, and which is used whenever the ants become troublesome. In general, however, they apparently use it only against strange ants-the enemies of their hosts.

Jenny Lind, Swedish Singer. Jenny Lind, or Madame Goldschmidt, famous Swedish singer, was born at Stockholm October 6, 1820, and died at Wynd's Point, Malvern, November 2, 1887. She first appeared at the Royal theater in Stockholm as Agatha in "Der Freischutz," March 7, 1838. From 1841 to 1842 she studied in Paris. The next two years she spent in Stockholm. From 1844 to 1847 she studied and sang in Germany, going from there to England, where she remained for two years, thence coming to America. She was married to Otto Goldschmidt, conductor and composer, in Boston, February 5, 1852. The last four years of her life she taught singing at the Royal College of Music.

Cream Cookies.-Beat two eggs until

Stir in a cupful of thick cream, two cupfuls of flour, mixed with four teaspoonfuls of baking powder and enough flour added to roll. Roll onequarter of an inch thick, sprinkle with sugar, cut in shapes and bake quickly. Buttermilk Pie .- Take one cupful of sugar, one tablespoonful of butter, two tablespoonfuls of flour, one egg, a pinch of salt, two cupfuls of buttermilk with flavoring to taste. Soften the butter, cream it with the sugar, add the flour and mix again, then put in the salt and an egg unbeaten. Beat these ingredients very light and add the buttermilk and flavoring. Cook the mixture until thick, then pour into a postey shell previously baked.

#### LONDON FOG BACK ON JOB Citizen of Big City Secretly Proud of What Visitors Universally Denom-Inate a Nuisance.

Fowls Are Natural Rangers and Do Not Require as Much as Ordinary Chickens.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Guinea chicks are fed in much the same way as chickens, but they require less feed as they are natural rangers and can be trusted to find enough seeds of weeds and grasses, bugs, insects and green vegetation in the fields to supply much of their living. For the first 36 hours after hatching no feed is required, as the sustenance from the egg is sufficient to nourish them for this period. The first meal may consist of a little hard-boiled egg mixed with bread crumbs, or bread may be soaked in milk, squeezed partly dry, and fed in small bits. Clabbered milk also is very good.

Three times a day is as often as they need to be fed, one feed consisting of clabbered milk or the bread and egg or bread and milk mixture, and the other two of chick feed. If the coop is placed in a field or pasture where green feed is available, the guinea chicks can secure this for themselves; otherwise, sprouted oats, dandellon leaves, lettuce, or onion tops cut fine should be furnished, say poultry specialists of United States Department of Agriculture. Water, grit and fine oyster shell should be before them always.

Coconut Pudding .-- Place a teaspoonful of coconut in the bottom of individual glasses and make a custard of two cupfuls of milk, the yolk of one egg and one-half of a tablespoonful of cornstarch with three teaspoonfuls of sugar. Pour the custard over the coconut after it is cooked and cool. Serve with the white of the egg beaten stiff and a little sugar added, on top.

Lemon Rice Pudding .-- Wash and cook one-third of a cupful of rice in the following sirup: Put the grated rind and juice of a lemon with onethird of a cupful each of sugar and water in a saucepan; when boiling add the rice. Cook until soft. Put the cooked rice with three cupfuls of milk and more sugar if needed into a baking dish, adding a little salt. Bake two hours, allowing it to brown slightly at the last. Serve hot or cold.

Cornflake Macarcons .- Take one cupful each of sugar, cornflakes, ground nuts and two tablespoonfuls of flour, a little salt and flavoring of vanilla. Beat until stiff two egg whites, add the sugar gradually, then the cornflakes, nuts and flour. Drop by teaspoonfuls on a baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven until a delicate brown.
