GOVERNMENT HUNTER KILLS biggest arizona grizzly
The biggest and most notorious grizz $y$ bear in Arizona was killed during he first week in June by a Government ver of the United states Depron ofy of the United States Departmen and effort had been spent in trying to capture him.
The skin and skull of the bear were turned over to the predatory-animal in
spector for the district, who them on exhibit for a few days in prominent store in Phoenix, Ariz., and then sent them on to Washington. Thi bear is positively identified as a grizzly although its body was nearly black and its nose and flanks were cinnamo
color. It weighed from 1,200 to 1,500 pounds and its skin measured 7 feet inches from tip to tip. When standing on its hind legs the bear could hav stretched up a distance of 8 feet. The kull is $161-2$ inches long,
The grizzly's persistent preying on
live stock cost cattle owners at least her stock cost cattle owners at least
\$25,000, according to conservative estimates. One man, howerer, upon whose range the bear lived most of the time expressed the belief that the bear had The Biologial Surver ed that the bear killed 12 head of cattle within one week, among them a pure bred Hereford bull weighing 1,800 pounds. Cows and young calves, however, were the bear's favorite food. He
would eat the udder of a cow stomach of a calf and then kill another animal. He never went back to the carcass a second time.

short and they are forced to graze almost exclusively upon oak leares injurious results follow. It is not true that all animals feeding upon oak will be poisoned, but it is true that in the conditions as outlined above a considerable number will become sick and
perhaps die. This has been worked out very carefully in regard to the common scrub oak of Utah and the shinnery oak of western Texas and New Mexico. I am sending with this a copy of Department Bulletin 767 , which treats of the
effect of so-called oak poisoning. I effect of so-called oak poisoning. 1
think if you will read this over, you will see that your animals present
wink your much the same appearance as those which are described in the bulletin. We were inclined to suspect oak poisoning after the original report of Dr. Cole,
but it did not seem wise to make a posibut it did not seem wise to make a posi-
tive diagnosis until we had had an examination of the tissues from the dis eased animals. We find nothing in this
microscopical work that conflicts with the theory of oak poisoning. It is true
then that we have not had definite experi-
ments with live oaks and some of the other oaks of your neighborhood, but we have reason to think that any oak may produce the same effect as those upon which definite experiments were
