cuted in Texas in the future will read with inferest the report of the master meehanic at Huntsvilie penitentiary
who is in charge of installation of the Who is in charge of installation of the
electric chamber and apparatus is printed below:
"Entering the death house, one finds
himself in a spacions room, well ventihimself in a spacious room, well venti-
lated and lighted. At the south end is lated and lighted. At the south end is
a neat wow of nine cells, which will hold the condemued, and which ar
solidy constructed of brick and steel bars, reinforced with heavy copper screen wire, to prevent passing articles tivough the bars to the immates. The ceis are eight by ten feet long and ten $\mid$ feet high, with a lavatory and toilet in each cell, a heavy rug covering the
thoor, a smail table and chair. An elec tric light with a reflector, is placed in front of each cell, and each light is on an fndependent switch so that the in-
mate may have light all night if he so mate may have light all night if he so
desires, without interfering with the desires, without interfering with the
other inmates. Three dim lights, of other inmates. wiree bept burning in front of the cells nil night. The corridor is covered with rubber matting so that footstepis are muffled and no un-
necessary noise made. Facilities for necessary noise made. Facilities
bathing have not been overlookel. bathing have not been overlookel.
"One of the features of the death honse is a large steel bookcase, which will hold more than 500 volumes of books, especially selected for the con-
demaed. It is apparent that nothing demaed. It is apparent that nothing

"At the east end of the room is a
small, heary, solid steel door, three feet wide an dsix feet high. Through this doorway one enters into the death chamber, which is thirty-five feet long
and twelve feet wide. This room is bare and twelve feet wide. This room is bare
except for the electric chair, which except for the electric at the center of the room and the electric switch panel, which is
four feet from the chair. At the nerth four feet from the chair. At the nerth
end is another door of the same material and dimension as that mentioned above. This door will be used to permit
the prison commissioners, physicians spiritual advisor, relatives and freind of the person condemned, to enter and witness the execution. This does away with passing through the chamber where other condemned persons may be
confined. No more than five relative confined. No more than five relatived
or friends of the person to be executed. may be present. No inmate of the peni-
tentiary is permitted to witness an exetentiary is nermitted to withess an exe
cution. "Alloining the death chamber is a small room containing the generator Just before an execution is to take
place, a thorough inspection of this machine is made with a view of locating any irregularity. Following the inspec tion, the generator is then started, and a test of a series of lights is applied to
the terminals, thus ascertaining that the terminals, enurent of electricity is of a sufficient intensity to cause death. It is then transformed to the electric switch in the death chamber.
"When eversthing is ready, the condemned is led to the chair, his head
shaved closely, as well as his left leg. shaved closely, as well as his left leg,
just below the knee. He is thën seated in the chair. His ankles, wrists, bicep, of his arms, waist and chest are then fastened by a two and one-half-inch istrap. The electrode is then placed on
his left leg, just below the knee, and a his left leg, just below the knee, and a
, heary helmet is placed on his head. heavy helmet is placed on his head,
covering his entire skull to the base. The electrode, helmet and leglett are made ot heary copper wire, and have a fine sponge lining, which is saturated
with salt water just before being used. with salt water just before being used.

nection. The helmet is held in place by nection. stout leather hood, attached to the back of the chair, so as to hold the
head of the subject in a firm position. head of the subject in a frm position. When this has been done, the death
mask is placed over his face and the signal given for the electrocution. "The time required to prepare a demned person, after $h$ is seeated in the chair, is ten seconds, when he will be ready for the first current. "The switch panel in the death chamher has two levers. The executioner
stands immediately in front of it, and at a signal from the electrician the first sfitch is thrown. This is also known as
the "oil switch" which runs the current the "oil switch" which runs the current up to 1,600 volts, and upon application of the second switch, the voltage is in-
creased through a rheostat to 2,200 volts, which is of sufficient intensity t cause instant death."
