The quaint ceremonies with which King Edward VII was prelaimed at va
rious points of the metropolis exactly followed anclent precedents. The off clals purposely arranged the function
an hour ahead of the published anouncement, and the inhabitants whe hey awoke were surprised to find the
entire way between St James and the city lined with troops. About 10,000 soldiers, lifeguards, horseguards. ootguards and other cavalry and in antry regiments had been brought after midnight. All the officers had lept on their arms and the drums and
brass instruments were shrouded with brass instruments were shrouded with
crape. The troops in themselves made an Imposing sepctacle, but they wer
entirely eclipsed by the strange spec entirely eclipsed by the strange spec
tacle presented by the officials of the lacle presented
