LATEST NEWSPAPER LAWS.

Some decisions of the United States Supreme court on this subject are: Subscribers who do not give notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to renew their subscription.

If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publisher may continue to send them until all dues are paid up.

Refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncalled for is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

Under this law the man who allows his subscription to run along for some time unpaid for and then orders the postmaster to mark it "refused" and have a card sent notifying the publishers, is liable to arrest or fine the same as for theft.
