Someday there's going to be an accident in front of the post office. That's a simple ungarished truth—either some pedestrian will be hospitalized or somebody's car will be reduced to junk.

For some strange reason that particular locality seems to be completely outside the rules of courtesy, good driving and general safety practices.

We know the situation is unfortunate—we know the post office should never have been placed where it is and that the entire situation offers no easy solution.

But that is no excuse for flagrant violation of traffic laws. Everyone who goes to the postoffice has seen scores of cars parked on the wrong side of the street, near-collisions, and traffic jams. Naturally most of it happens because a patron doesn't want to walk an extra fifty feet.

Just because there's plenty of reason for griping doesn't mean we shouldn't follow the law. The solution is not in giving traffic tickets, either. Anyone who considers himself adult enough to drive a car should consider himself adult enough to follow the rules.

In a few months it will again be time to pay our yearly income taxes. With most of us this is a period of feeling that the Federal Government has gone too far in dipping into our finances. But this year will be different for those taxpayers who understand fully the predicament that has evolved for Castro County and the rest of the nation.

We have always shielded ourselves from international affairs with the cushioning explanation to ourselves that we can't personally do anything about these things anyway.

So the man driving a tractor on a Castro County farm or another who sells nuts and bolts in town doesn't feel like it is important that he makes an effort to understand our international situation—and he will gripe about high taxation next March. Perhaps for this reason alone it would be worth our while to study what is going on around us.

The eventual destiny of every American rests on the nation's scientific drawing boards and the scientists who design and create weapons of destruction. It is a deplorable situation, but it was forced upon us. Like Noah who built the Ark to survive the floods that were not of his making, we must build rockets of destruction to maintain our nation and our ideals for posterity.

The entire problem, and one that has been kept from the American people, is that we are at least two years behind the Russians in the development of guided missiles. This means that when the Russians develop a system of aiming their Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles with an accuracy of plus or minus five miles over 5,000 miles we will be at their mercy and we won't be able to retaliate. Think about that for a while and remember the main thing that has kept these two nations out of war thus far is the fear each has of the other's retaliatory powers.

Russia began first full-scale missile development in 1948 after previously rounding up hundreds of top German missile scientists and pouring any resources they needed into the project. The United States started a limited missile program in 1953—five years later.

We have overcome some of that gap. At first we were five years behind the Russians, now we are only two or three. But that, in itself, remains a grisly situation.

One evening two weeks ago the Senate Preparedness subcommittee listened in awe while Allen W. Dulles, chief of the Central Intelligence Agency, told them what he knew of Soviet Russia's missile program.

Among other nerve-racking things, he said his agency had tried to interest the National Security Council with what had been learned, but this powerful body had turned a deaf ear. The entire nation, in fact, turned a deaf ear.

Huge long-range radar screens in Turkey had counted the missile firings in Russia beginning in early 1955. They knew that at least eleven of the first Soviet intermediate range missiles (6,000-1,500 miles) had misfired, but since then more than 100 such rockets have been sent upward. We have fired a small number, five or six, of our similar weapons—the Army's Jupiter and Air Force's Thor. And in the missile business, the continued firing of rockets and experimenting remains the only way of advancing in that field.

No one is safe from these things. Consider what would happen if the Russians aimed an ICBM at Amarillo Air Force Base and there was an infinitesimal error in calculating the range. It could land right on the Court House in Dimmitt and reduce Castro County to rubble.

So a big chunk of our income tax dollars will go to pay for additional Atlases, Nikes, Thors, Jupiters, Vanguardis, Redstones, Corporals and Polarises. The United States (Continued on Page 12)

## County ASC Makes 1500 Grain Loans

About 1500 grain sorghum loans have been made to Castro County farmers, according to Charlie Hill secretary of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

Normally some 100 of these government loans are processed each day with Tuesday holding a record of 150. There were 900 loans processed last year because many farmers sold their grain on the open market for a price higher than government loan. Net to farmers through the loan program is \$1.66 at present which is higher than market price. There will be an estimated 2,500 to 3,000 loans processed this year. The ASC office in Dimmitt does not write cotton loans.

Castro County farmers, 320 strong, went to the polls Tuesday and voted approval to the Cotton Quota Referendum by a margin of 292-28.

In the seven voting places over the county, Easter voted 29 for and one against; Flagg, 44 for and 6 against; Hart, 32 for and 6 against; Arney, 19 for and none against; Sunnyside, 58 for and none against; Nazareth, 15 for and none against; and in Dimmitt, 95 for and 15 against.

## Trees Available For Planting Here

Limited quantities of trees for windbreak and ornamental plantings are again available through the County Agents Office from Texas Forest Service. Species available are: 1. Austrian pine, 2. Chinese elm, 3. Ponderosa pine, 4. Red cedar.

Price of the trees are \$3.00 per hundred prepaid. No order of less than one hundred of a specie will be accepted.

Application blanks are available at the County Agent's Office now and will be accepted until March 1. It is suggested that trees be put out by March 1, at the latest.

Payment will be made for planting windbreak trees under the ASC or Great Plains Programs if certain requirements are met. Details on these payments may be obtained from the County ASC or Soil Conservation Service.

It was organized and sponsored by the agents themselves and is no part of the Texas Extension Service. Purpose of the Association is to sponsor professional activities and services in all areas served by home demonstration agents and to study improvements which may be made in extension work.

Mrs. Stringer's next official function will be at the Spring Board meeting in Houston on February 12 and 13. Other officers elected are Miss Adell Hale of Sulphur Springs, vice-president; Myrna Holman, Rankin, secretary; and Tom Joyce Cunningham, Breckenridge, treasurer.

Mrs. Stringer, Home Demonstration Agent here for the past four years, is a graduate of Canyon High School. She holds a B.S. degree from Texas State College and has done graduate work at Texas Tech. She took advanced study at A&M College this summer. She is a native of Hall County and a member of the Methodist Church. A widow, Mrs. Stringer's husband died on June 19, 1956.

Mrs. Stringer has been with the Texas Extension Service for seventeen years. She started in 1940 as Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent in Wheeler County. In 1941 she went to Swisher County for five years as County Home Demonstration Agent. She served in Hemphill County for six years and then went to her present post in 1953. Prior to her extension service she taught school at Canyon and at Stratford.

She is also a member of the National Home Demonstration Agents Association, American Home Economics Association, Texas Home Economics Association, Epsilon Sigma Phi and Kappa Omicron Phi. She received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Home Demonstration Agents Association in 1956.

Mrs. Stringer is a Charter Member of the County Home Demonstration Agents Association of Texas and has held many posts within the organization.

"Everyone in the county is extended a cordial invitation to our bank opening Saturday," Mr. Dudley said.

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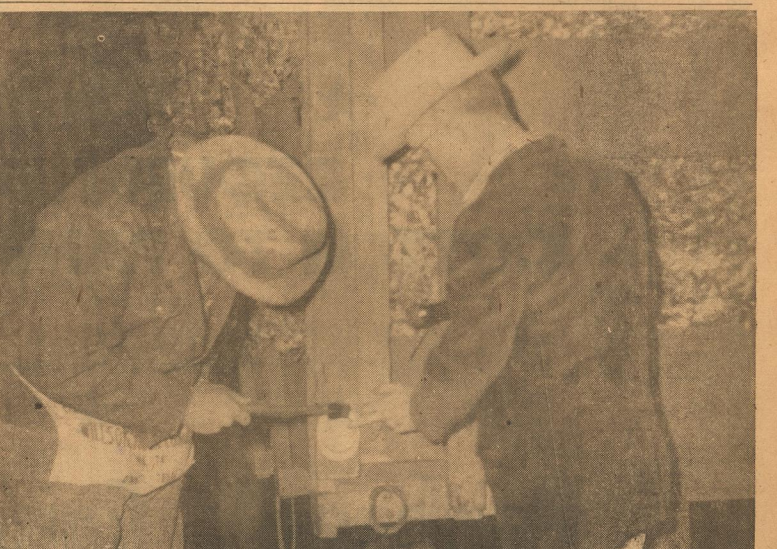

### Science Department Plans Science Fair

Students who like to dream up scientific projects in or out of class will have a chance to win prizes and, perhaps, national recognition when the Texas Panhandle Science Fair is held in Amarillo, March 21 and 22. A local fair following the general regulations of the Area Fair, will be held early in March. Dimmitt students are asked to prepare exhibits in their special fields of interest.

A group of Amarillo businessmen is sponsoring the Fair. Exhibits will be displayed in the Commercial Exhibits Building at the Tri-State Fair grounds.

Dr. Joseph M. Ray, president of Amarillo College, is chairman of a 21-man committee in charge of arrangements. Joseph B. Davis, dean of the college, is vice-chairman of the Fair council, and Edgar L. Neal, college faculty member, is chairman of the academic committee which will work closely with teachers and their students who plan to enter the competition.

"Students in grades one through twelve throughout the Panhandle area have been invited through the school superintendents to participate in the event. With national attention focused on scientific achievement we certainly want to do everything we can to encourage our own young people to consider scientific careers," Dr. Ray explained.

The Fair, open to students in grades one through 12 in a 26-county area, will be held in cooperation with the National Science Fair. The first and second place individual Panhandle winners and their teachers will be sent to the national competition at Flint, Mich., in May, 1958.

Awards will be given individuals or groups who place first in each of the four levels in each of the following divisions:

1. Physical Sciences.

A. Principles of physical laws: chemistry, electricity, heat, light, sound, fusion, fission, and others.

B. Applications of physical laws in: communication, speech, telephone, telegraph, radio, radar, television, photography, printing, and others.

C. Raw Materials and their processing.

D. Transportation and distribution principles.

2. Physiological Sciences.

Astronomy, geology, meteorology, physical geography, conservation, mineral collections.

3. Biological Sciences.

A. Plants and animals, relation to environment, structure, and function; research in effects and influences upon living matter.

B. Medicine: human body; preventive and curative procedures.

On November 25th the bride was complemented with a beautiful shower and tea in the lovely home of Mrs. La Verne Martin of Hart.

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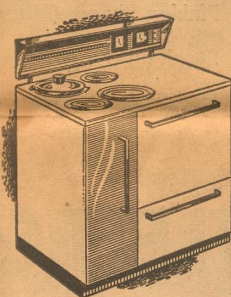
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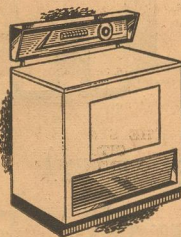
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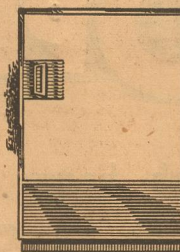

# SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



## OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

The Great Plains Conservation Program in Castro County is ready to move.

Approval by State Program Committee of a list of soil-stabilizing moisture-saving practices for the county was announced today by Virgil Henson, who as leader of the Soil Conservation Service staff is chairman of the Castro County Program Committee.

Also approved were the rates at which the federal government will share the cost of installing the practices.

These rates, based on average cost of the work in this county, range from 50 to 80 percent of the total cost of installing each. Cost-share rates for Castro County had been worked out by the county program committee and submitted to the State Program Committee which is headed by State Conservationist H. N. Smith as chairman.

Henson said that the approval of practices and cost-share rates clears the way for first applications.

The purpose of the Great Plains Conservation Program is to develop an agriculture that resists the weather extremes that are a constant hazard in the Plains area. This will contribute to a more stable economy.

"The county Program Committee is looking forward to enthusiastic response to this opportunity," Henson said. "We have moisture now and that means an opportunity to make a good start on this program. Our records in this country show that there's drought somewhere in the Plains every year. When moisture is good is the time to get ready for the years when

conditions are less favorable. "We have received several applications already and expect several more in the near future," he added.

Foundation of the program is a complete soil and water conservation plan for each farm or ranch. The farmer or rancher agrees to establish all needed measures in his plan within a period of not less than three nor more than 10 years.

When the farmer or rancher becomes a party to the contract the money for the government's share of the cost is set aside for his part of the program.

Congress, in providing for the launching of the program, authorized \$150,000,000 for a 10-year period, but specified that not more than \$25,000,000 will be spent in any program year. Appropriation for the first kickoff year was \$10,000,000.

A total of 233 counties in the 10 Great Plains States has been designated by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson for the program.

Members of the County Program Committee, in addition to Chairman Henson are: Jim Elder, chairman of the County ASC Committee and Ralph W. Dent, Farmers Home Administration Supervisor. Also participating in the committee's work are: Marvin Simms, County Agent; Charlie Hill, ASC office manager and Elvis Burch, Fred Axe, M. L. McFarland, and Gardner Sanderson, all supervisors of the Running Water Soil Conservation District.

The list of practices with cost-share rates for Castro County are as follows:

1. Range or pasture seeding, putting cultivated land back to grass—80% for seeding the grass and 50% of the cost on fencing if it is needed.
2. Re-seeding on range land where most of the good grasses are gone—80% of the cost.
3. Planting of trees for farmstead wind breaks or for wild life habitat—80% of the cost of setting the trees, 50% of the cost of fencing.
4. Establishing water ways—80% of the cost of shaping and seeding the waterway, 50% of the cost of fencing.
5. Terrace construction—70% of the cost.
6. Constructing diversion terraces—70% of the cost.
7. Chiseling or pitting non-crop grazing land—50% of the cost.
8. Constructing spreader ditches or dikes—70% of the cost.
9. Concrete pipelines for irrigation—50% of the cost of the complete system including valves, vents and other items in the line.
10. Land leveling—50% of the cost.
11. Constructing, enlarging, deepening or lining dams, pits or ponds for irrigation water—50% of the cost.
12. Lining irrigation ditches—50% of the cost.
13. Constructing wells for livestock water—50% of the cost.
14. Constructing, enlarging, deepening or sealing dams, pits or ponds for livestock water—50% of the cost.
15. Installing pipelines for livestock water—50% of the cost.
16. Constructing permanent fences on grass land—50% of the cost.

has come to the point where it is imperative that a full-scale missile program be put underway with no consideration for the costs involved.

Experts consider the United States to be in one of the most crucial periods in its history. Our future, they say, depends on luck, what the Russians decide to do and the abilities of our scientists and industrialists.

Incidentally, last week's failure of the Vanguard to get off the ground with our earth satellite is not considered particularly discouraging, scientifically speaking. Failures are necessary when build-rocket for rockets can be constructed for practical operation only through trial and error. No radically different new machine was ever perfected without going through a period of experimentation and failures—and that is just where we stand today. The shattering aspect was of a propaganda vein because we publicized Vanguard as being capable of doing a tremendous job and when it failed we lost face. It was simply a case of overexaggeration and never doubt but that the Soviets will make great political hay of it.

New fuels, new metals, designs and motors through practice and experimentation will have to be the nation's creed from now on in the missile race. We are still using "crude" fuels like mixtures of alcohol and oxygen in some of our rocket motors and we are using

metals that will not work efficiently with present designs. Man is approaching a new frontier full of more danger and intrigue than ever before in our history—and we must pay for it, willingly if not gladly.

One happy, if obscure, point: The United States still leads Soviet Russia on across-the-board scientific development—we just let them get ahead in the missile field.
