Baird High School girls track team won 5th place, with a total of 32 points, in the Regional Girls Track Meet held at Mason Saturday.

Roma Gamble, who won 5th in the 220-yd. dash; Mile relay team of Ada Black, Vicki Griggs, Jo Lynn Whitehead and Wilda Williams won 3rd with a time of 4:30.6; the 880 relay team of Black, Whitehead, Williams and Gable won 4th with a time of 1:55.2. Donna Abernathy placed 5th in the discus throw and 2nd in the high jump to qualify for the State meet, to be held in Abilene May 10 - 11.

Voters To Decide Issues Saturday

May 4 Primary will finally arrive this coming Saturday and voters in Callahan County will go to the polls and end the suspense that has plagued the candidates since early January.

The most interesting races are always the local politics and the race for Commissioner of Precinct 1 and the Sheriff's race has held the spotlight from the start. The Commissioners race drew almost as many candidates as the Governor's race from the Democratic Party, in which nine men and one woman seeks to be elected Governor.

Below is a short re-run of some of the candidates and in the order their names appear on the official ballot:

For Commissioner, Precinct 1
S. N. DUNLAP, JR.
54-year old Callahan County native; owner and operator of Dunlap's Texaco Service Station for the past seven years. Graduate of Baird High School and married to the former Frances Matson and the father of two children. He pledges to serve the people of Precinct 1 to the best of his ability with honesty, dedication and integrity.

For Sheriff:
GRAYSON MILLER
Native of Callahan County and a 47-year old resident of the Eula Community. He is married to the former Jerraine Smedley and the father of three sons. He announces that if it be the will of the people to elect him sheriff, he will do his very best to justify the confidence and fulfill the obligations to the best of his ability.

J. W. "Wes" PATTON
A 14-year experience man as deputy sheriff, of which three was spent as deputy in this county; Prec. 1 Commissioner for two terms. As a former County Commissioner, he has a working knowledge of county government. The Callahan County native will do his very best in serving in the office of County Sheriff.

HOMER PRICE
Veteran lawman of Callahan County, of which 14 years has been spent as Sheriff. He seeks to serve the people for a 5th term. He believes that his experience in this administrative office renders him capable of serving you completely, if you see fit to re-elect him for your Sheriff.

The race for State Representative from the 53rd District, is also of great interest to the county since one man from this area is a candidate in the race, former County Judge Byron Richardson of Cross Plains.

20th Annual Rodeo Starts Three Day Run

Three former and reigning champions of the professional rodeo world are among cowboys who have indicated early they will compete in the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo in Baird May 2, 3, and 4.

Three rodeo performances are scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings.

Sport fans will see arena action in saddle and bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling.

The contestants, all members of the Rodeo Cowboys Association, and ride and rope for an estimated \$6,000 in prize money.

Last year there were 172 entries who competed for shares of \$5,934 in prize money.

Champions indicating they will be at Baird this year are: Freckles Brown, Soper, Okla., a 47-year old who won the 1962 national bull riding title, surviving a broken neck in the process, and who rode the bull, Tornado, an animal never ridden in some 250 attempts at the 1967 National Finals Rodeo; Glen Franklin, House, N. M., the 1965 and 1967 calf roping titlist who set a record last year for the most money won - \$31,268 - in any single event in one year;

Hil Kornell, 24, Clarksville, Texas, the 1963 national bull riding champion and pro rodeo's Rookie of the Year, and the youngest man at 19, to ever win a riding championship.

Brown won the bull riding here last year, pocketing \$468; Cantrell won the calf roping, worth \$744; while Franklin finished second, snaring \$465; Paul Mayor, Grinnell, Ia., the 1966 bareback bronc riding titlist, won the event here, worth \$372; and John McBeth, Atlanta, Kans., was winner of the saddle bronc riding and \$260.

Also indicating they will be here:

Jerry Peweto, Orange, Texas, a school teacher who in 1967 competed the full year and finished in fourth place nationally in steer wrestling; Tim Prather, Post, Texas, who last year pocketed \$12,134 in steer wrestling and calf, team and steer roping;

Marvin Cantrell, Brady, Texas who finished 12th for the 1966 calf roping crown; Lee Cockrell of Panhandle, Texas, who was 10th for the 1966 calf roping title and winner of that year's National Finals calf roping average at Oklahoma City; Jack Nolan, Sherman, Texas, calf roper; and Jim Wise, Loveland, Colo., who finished 11th for the 1966 saddle bronc riding title and who has been kept from closer title shots because of a string of injuries.

As one of more than 500 rodeos approved annually by the R.C.A., money won here will be added to cowboy's previous earnings in races for the 1968 championship crowns.

There was 537 R.C.A.-approved rodeos last year across the United States and Canada, paying a record \$3.6 million in prize money. In the last 15 years, pro cowboys have won nearly \$47 million.

Roy Gilbreath, secretary-treasurer of the Sheriff's Posse Rodeo, said cowboys' arena entries close at 6 p.m. Wednesday.

Rough and tumble rodeo livestock will be provided by Walt Alsbaugh of Aalamosa, Colo.

Bud Townsend of Abilene will announce the three night rodeo during each performance.

A 5 p.m. parade will begin down Market Street with cowboys and cowgirls, floats, candidates, automobiles and clowns to kick off the Rodeo, to start at 8 p.m. in the local arena.

A good show is in store for you, as the special attraction will be the Zoppe Indian Spectacular, and the rodeo clown, Wright Howington.

Alsbaugh provided rodeo stock for the H-SU rodeo just completed last weekend and the stock proved too much for the cowboys, so that goes to show he's got the stock, let's produce the fans.

BROTHERS CHARGED WITH BURGLARY OF PUTNAM STATION

Sheriff Homer Price has announced the apprehension of two brothers, Bruce Wood 20 and Tommy Wood 18, of Hamby, on charges of burglary. Both men were charged in Justice of Peace Garvin Jones' Court with the burglary of Cunningham's Mobil Station in Putnam on the nights of April 25th and April 27th. Sheriff Price stated that the two had also apparently entered a cafe and grocery store in Putnam, and burglarized Soude's Grocery in Cross Plains and tried to enter Cox Grocery in Cross Plains.

In each instance the cigarette machines were broken into and cigarettes and money taken. Several hundred dollars in merchandise had been stolen in this county alone. Investigation of the case has led officers to believe that these two are responsible for other break-ins at Rising Star, Tuscola, Lawn, Moran, Pioneer and Cisco.

Ed Paynter Asks Voters For District Attorneys Post

I use this means of formally and publicly announcing that I am a candidate for District Attorney of Callahan, Jones and Taylor Counties, 42nd and 104th Judicial Districts. The Texas Legislature has recently combined the prosecution in the 42nd and 104th Judicial Districts composed of Callahan, Jones and Taylor Counties. This offers a unique opportunity for service to the citizens of these three counties in a vital area - that of capable, fair, impartial prosecution of criminal matters, and this is what I offer to the citizens - impartial administration of justice without regard to race, color, creed, wealth, or social position. My office has been instrumental in bringing to this area "Operation Teen-Age," which is an educational program from the Texas Prison System, with particular emphasis on narcotic usage.

In making this announcement, I hope that I am known personally to many of the citizens of Callahan County, as well as Jones and Taylor Counties. Except for time spent in the U. S. Navy and schooling and two years practicing law in Dallas, I have spent my entire thirty-three years in Taylor County. I have served as a City Attorney in Abilene and since January, 1967, have served as 42nd District Attorney, having been appointed by Governor John Connally at that time to serve an unexpired term.

In qualifying myself for the post sought, I attended McMurry and Hardin-Simmons in Abilene, and graduated from North Texas State and Southern Methodist University School of Law. I maintain membership in the State Bar Association, the Taylor County Bar Association, and the District-County Attorney's Association.

I was born in Abilene in 1934, attended public school there and graduated from Abilene High School in 1953. My father's family settled in Taylor County near the Hamby community shortly after the turn of the century. My mother, the former Ethel Nixon, is a native of Jones County, having been born and reared near the 8th community in the southern part of Jones

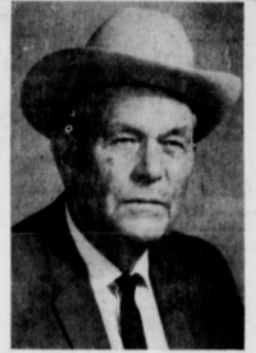

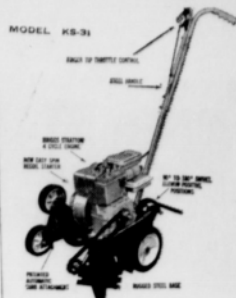

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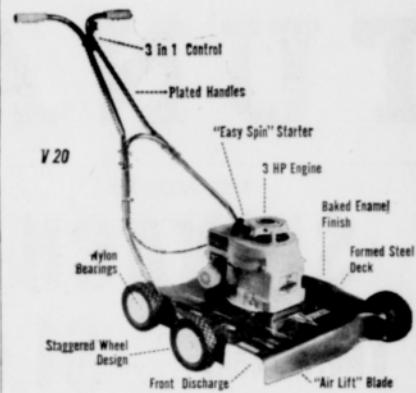

Burke Musgrove has been called Texas' most energetic Representative



LSD HEARING —Explaining the need for action to curtail the abuse and availability of LSD and other dangerous drugs, Burke Musgrove testifies before the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee as a large group of interested spectators look on. 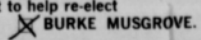
