Farm Bureau Presidents Meet Here

A meeting of Farm Bureau presidents from seven surrounding counties was held here Monday night. Known as a "Presidents Seminar," the purpose of the meeting was to help county presidents take advantage of the accumulated experience of the organization on the various areas of their responsibilities.

The seminar was conducted by Buddy Hedges of Olton as a representative of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Besides Castro County president Forrest Collins, those attending were Joe Sooter of Bailey County; Herman Garces, Farmer; Steven Clements, Deaf Smith; R. B. Gist, Jr., Randall; Woodie Boston, Swisher; Oliver Harmel, Hale and Ted Hutchins, Lamb.

Mrs. Collins was hostess to wives of the presidents on a tour of homes of the Dimmitt area.

Mr. Collins said this week that "we realize that the position of president of a County Farm Bureau is not only one of honor, but one with numerous responsibilities and that the extent to which we fulfill this trust in us depends first upon our becoming acquainted with our responsibilities and the tools or methods with which we have to work, and second the plans that we make and execute toward meeting these responsibilities."

Near Record Cotton Harvest For High Plains

The Texas High Plains' gigantic cotton harvest surpassed the one million bale mark during the third week of November and is moving toward the predicted estimated total production of 1,828,000 bales, which would be the second largest crop in history for High Plains farmers.

W. K. Palmer, head of the USDA's cotton classing office in Lubbock, reported November 21 that classings were approximately 1,150,000 bales at the three High Plains offices, Lubbock, Lamesa and Brownfield.

Stripping operations are in full swing throughout the Plains area and farmers in the Southern portion are finishing with harvest operations.

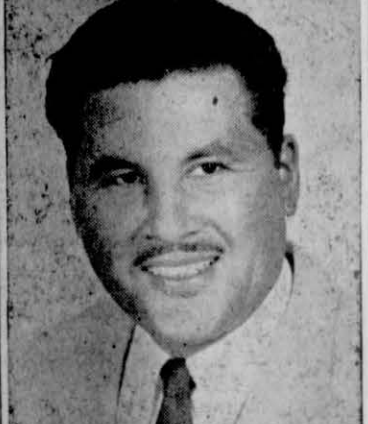
G. W. Pfeifferberger, executive vice president of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., released quality statistics on the Plains crop in the POG's fourth Cotton Quality Report, November 21, which showed a slight improvement in staple length and fiber strength over the third report, issued earlier.

Pfeifferberger pointed out white cotton accounted for about 68 1/2 percent of the crop, representing 911,000 bales as of this report, with 46 percent being middling white and above. Light spotted cotton totaled only 30 1/2 percent and 27 1/2 percent of that was midling light spot and above. Full spots averaged less than 0.1 percent.

Average staple length is 31.1/32 inch with 35 percent measuring one inch and longer. Only 9 percent of the crop fell below 15/16 inch.

Micronaire average is 3.7 with about 67 percent above the tenderable limit of 3.5 and 91 percent of the crop is above 3.0. Pressley fiber strength averaged 75,000 pounds with 45 percent above 75,000 pounds.

Observers estimate that 90 percent of the Plains crop will be harvested by December 1.



Pesina To Graduate From Sul Ross College

Sul Ross State College officials have announced that a total of forty-nine candidates have met the requirements for the Bachelor degree. Among those scheduled to graduate is Mr. Permin V. Pesina of Dimmitt.

Mr. Pesina is a graduate of Melvin High School, Melvin, Texas. He will receive the Bachelor of Business Administration Degree.

Drinking Basis Of Nineteen Local Arrests

Nineteen persons—probably a record number—were arrested over the week end for being drunk or vices connected with alcohol by city and county police officials.

All of those arrested were either Negro or Mexican. One Negro woman was booked for being drunk and disturbing the peace. The arrests took place from Friday night until midnight Sunday.

Three arrests were made for transporting alcoholic beverages in a dry territory. The men were captured in precinct 1 and were carrying their illicit cargo to Tulla, Plainview and Floydada from Precinct 4. They were each fined \$127.50 and released.

Oddly enough there is still some bootlegging going on in the Precinct 4 portion of Dimmitt. This is strictly an after-hours proposition, but it is definitely being done, Sheriff Jack Cartwright said this week.

Week-end arrests involving drinking in one way or another has averaged about five over the past several years. Cartwright said. Last week end, the first that legal whiskey and beer was available, the figure reached ten. This week end it almost doubled.

"And we're getting just a small percentage of those subject to arrest," Cartwright said. "There are many we never hear about." Before an arrest can be made a complaint must be called in by a police official must see the offender breaking the law.

Total fines paid by the nineteen amounted to \$704.25 for being drunk, gambling, common disorder, disturbances, drinking in public, driving on wrong side of the road, transporting, vagrancy and drunk and disturbing the peace.

City Dwelling Farmers Should Get Census Form

"Anyone who has anything to do with farming is required to fill out farm census questionnaires now being distributed by the Federal government," Mrs. Mary Flynn, a Castro County census taker said this week.

"This includes anyone who owns as much as one head of livestock or as many as 20 poultry birds of any kind," she continued. "The program is aimed especially at persons who operate their own, leased or rented land."

Forms have been mailed out to be filled in by farmers. "Anyone who did not receive one of these forms may contact me and I'll see that one is sent right out," Mrs. Flynn said.

"This is an important program and will be a tremendous job," she said. "The results of this program will be the basis for much farm legislation and farm-government relations."

Mrs. Flynn said that the forms had been sent out as boxholders and while all rural farmers probably have them, there are many in town who have not received the form. "I would appreciate it if all city residents who are engaged in farming operations would get these forms from me and fill them out," Mrs. Flynn said.

"I would especially like to urge all farmers to have these already filled out when I, or other census takers, call. That way we will take up a minimum of the farmers' time."

Census taking will get underway immediately.

Three Captured After Dimmitt, Hart Burglaries

They were brought to Dimmitt and questioned by Castro County Sheriff Jack Cartwright and others before being turned over to probation officers. None of the boys were school students.

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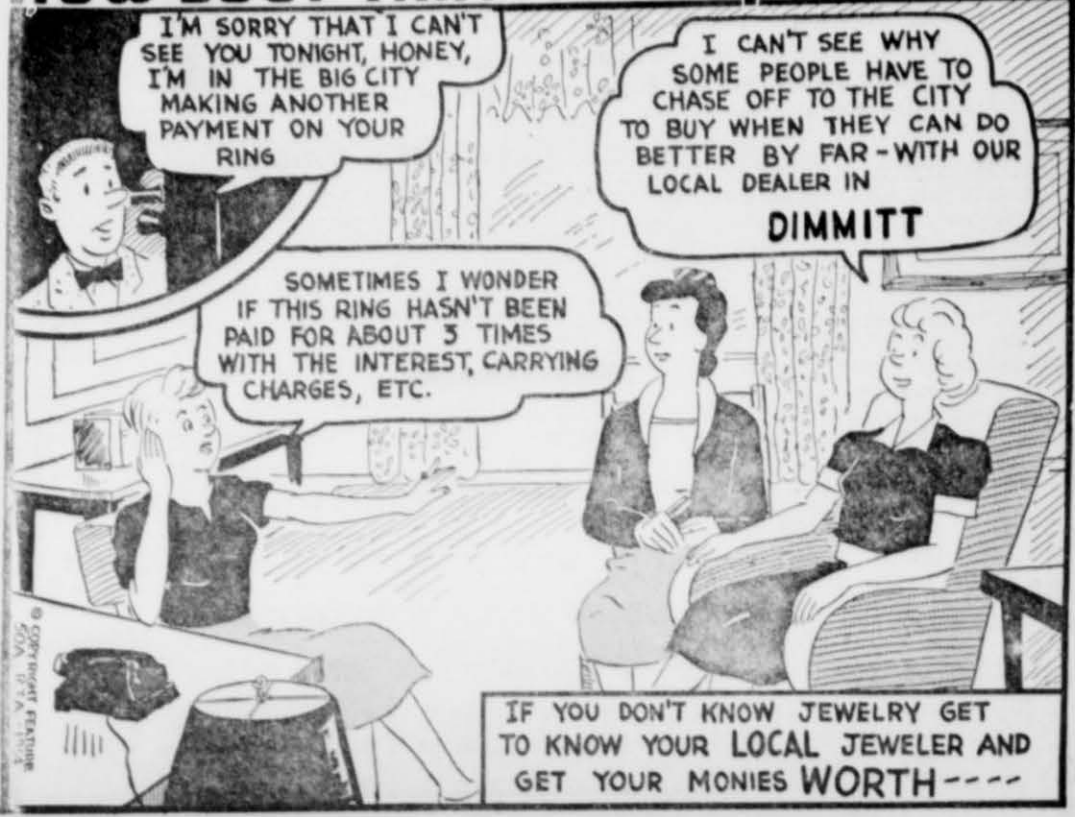
