Russia probably did more toward enlightening the free world about its capabilities when it launched its earth satellite than any other one thing could have possibly done.

It came as a jarring truth to most Americans that Russia is no longer a long Volga River with boatmen along its banks pulling ropes tied to grain barges.

Russia, once a backward country utterly devoid of technological accomplishment, has caught up and surpassed every other nation in at least one major field.

It might be time for us to consider the Russians as human beings and a really potent force in world affairs.

Our foreign relations with Russia have been anything but good and there's little hope for improvement until another election time rolls around.

Whichever nation gets to the moon first, or who can launch the most satellites on any given day, it is our bet that now the two major powers in the world will be scared enough of each other that we will finally have a lasting, if nervous, peace.

We have learned many things during the past few weeks. The Little Rock situation has taught us that we are not nearly so smart and culturally advanced as we thought we were.

Next to this column are pictures of three hospitals in towns of this area. Possibly the most modern is the one at Friona, which was recently completed.

A study of these hospitals will bring out one major detail—they are all of brick construction and made to endure.

There are many who agree. For perhaps the tenth time we again broached this subject last week and there have been dozens of people who called and stopped us on the street agreeing.

We will continue to stress our need for a new hospital from time to time during the next few months. We may be hollering down a well so far as we know, but it is a task that must be undertaken.

The big need at the moment is direction. A nucleus of a movement must materialize because people, as individuals, are impatient when it comes to accomplishing a community goal.

Our present hospital plant is undesirable. To remodel it would be throwing good money after bad and would eventually prove to be an unwise investment.

Final Rites Held Here Tuesday for Francis Jackson

Final rites for Mr. Francis Lee Jackson, 29, were held here Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Church of Christ with Morgan Sturgess of Tulla officiating.

Mr. Jackson, a local businessman, had resided in Dimmitt since early youth and had attended Dimmitt Schools. He returned to Dimmitt in 1946 after serving with the Merchant Marine during World War II. On September 15, 1949, he married Miss Twila Ruth Kirby and to this union were born two sons, Kimberlee Francis and Jimmie Eugene, and one daughter, Marsha Gail.

The family moved to California in 1952 and lived there until their return to Dimmitt in 1956. While in California, Mr. Jackson was stricken with a rare disease known as Lupus Erythematosus, which left him in poor health until his death Sunday. He entered Plainview Hospital and Clinic Saturday.

Since returning to Dimmitt, he had operated the Jackson Ditching Service. He was born May 2, 1928, in Dickens County.

Mr. Jackson is survived by his wife and three children; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. U. Jackson of Dimmitt; two brothers, Kenneth of Dimmitt and Meredith.

Interment was in Memorial Gardens under direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

Quonset Buildings Up for Bid Sale by U. S. Government

Four 40x100-ft. Quonset buildings in Dimmitt and three in Hart have been offered for sale on a bid basis by the United States Government.

The Quonsets in Dimmitt have been used in the past for storing grain and for exhibiting farm commodities during the annual Castro County Fair. They were described by Charles Hill, ASC secretary for Castro County as in relatively good condition.

Minimum acceptable bids on the buildings are \$3,383.95 each and the structures must be moved from their present site within 60 days from date of purchase unless the buyer obtains written consent from the owner of the land on which they are located to permit them to remain thereon for a longer period of time, and which will release Commodity Credit Corporation from any further responsibility under their rental contract.

The structures may be inspected, additional information and bid forms obtained by contacting Mr. Charles E. Hill, County ASC office manager, Box 667, Dimmitt, or telephone 61, prior to November 1, 1957.

Bids will be accepted on one or more of the structures. The Government reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

Bobcats to Start Conference Play Against Dalhart Friday

The Dimmitt Bobcats make their first plunge into Conference I-AA play Friday night when they tangle with one of the most powerful class AA high school football machines in the Panhandle.

They will journey to Dalhart and attempt to hand the Wolves their second defeat of the season. Dalhart lost last Friday to a spirited Perryton team, 25-28. Perryton is a powerhouse that last year scored 360 points to 118 for their opponents and is considered a top-quality team this year.

Dimmitt coaches have placed Dalhart on top of their worry list ever since the season started. The Wolves have one of the finest backfields in area high school football and a good line.

The Bobcats are gaining a reputation that Dalhart would like to disintegrate. The local team was rated by Amarillo Daily News sportswriters as the number two team of Panhandle Class AA football this week. Dalhart is rated as number five. Dimmitt has managed to run up 123 points to opposition's 38 in their first five games of the season and their only loss has been to Lockney, holder of the number one place in the top ten.

The Bobcats will leave shortly after noon for their game Friday night and will travel in private automobile instead of busses. Game time will be at 8 p.m.

Highest Maize Yield Of 6,899 lbs. Made On Nazareth Farm

Anyone entering the wheat contest should bring one quart, threshed. Any variety may be entered.

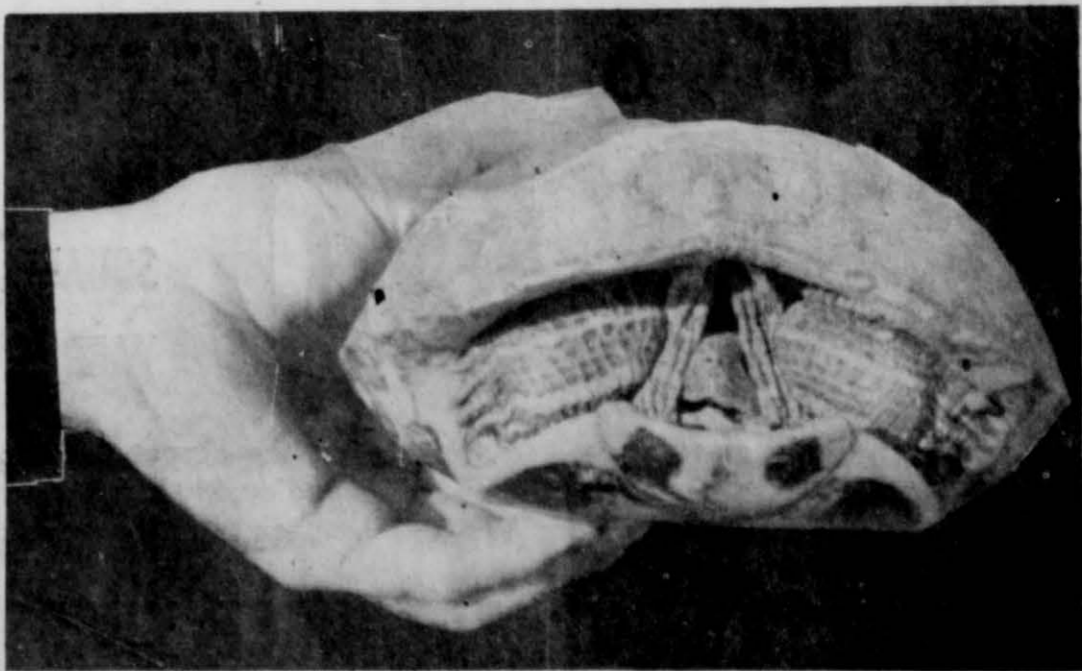

LIVESTOCK MARKET REPORT

Receipts total 3,370 cattle and calves at the Amarillo Livestock Auction this week, 1,524 head less than last week's supply. Improved moisture conditions locally and over much of the southwest were largely responsible for the reduced volume here, as well as at other major markets south of Kansas City. Rains were also the major factor stimulating and broadening the demand for stocker cattle and calves, which in turn prompted generally higher prices throughout the area. At the Amarillo market, yearling steers and calves sold fully 50c to \$1.00 higher, a liberal share at the full advance with instances up more over last week's much less active trade. Steers and heifers of feeder flesh and weight were in rather light supply and sold mostly 50c higher, with some feeder steers fully \$1.00 above last week. A high percentage of the stocker and feeder cattle graded Good with a moderate showing of Choice and Medium grades. Cows comprised near 20 percent of the week's supply and found broadened stocker outlet, with prices change, and bulls sold unevenly steady to 50c higher with the best price \$1.00 above last week.

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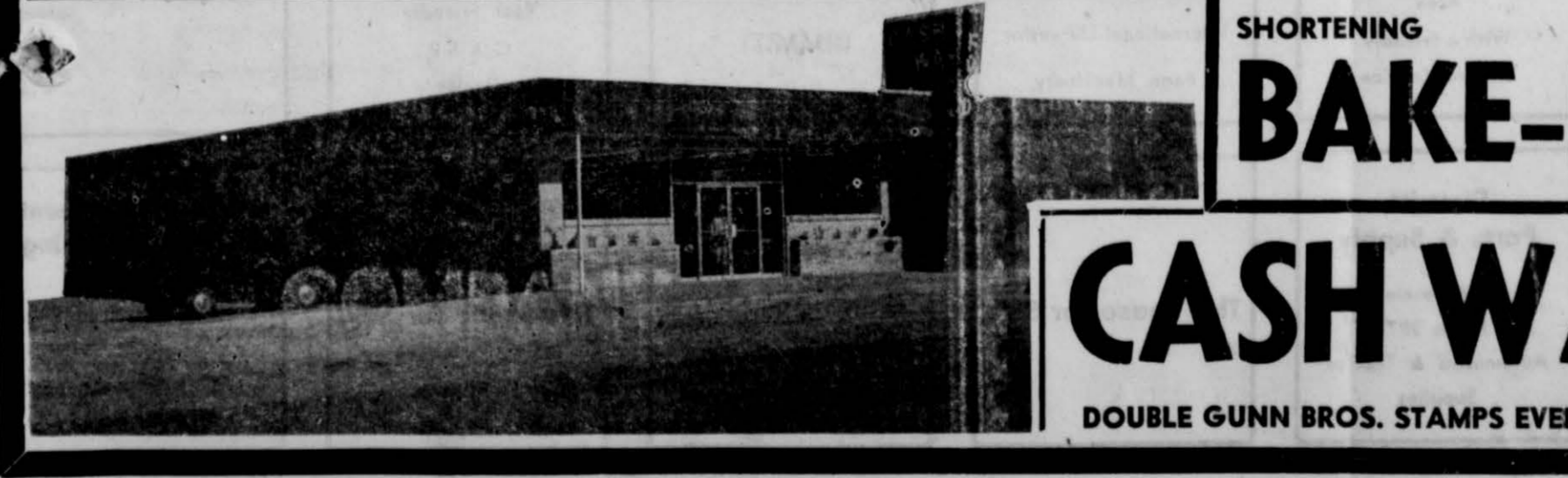

First it is a long range cost share program based on a plan of operation.

It will assist in carrying out all needed conservation practices on a given place. A sound cropping system that will improve and maintain soil conditions and fertility to a high level will be emphasized. The Great Plains Conservation Program of the Department of Agriculture but will be in addition to all other programs. It is strictly for the Great Plains country.

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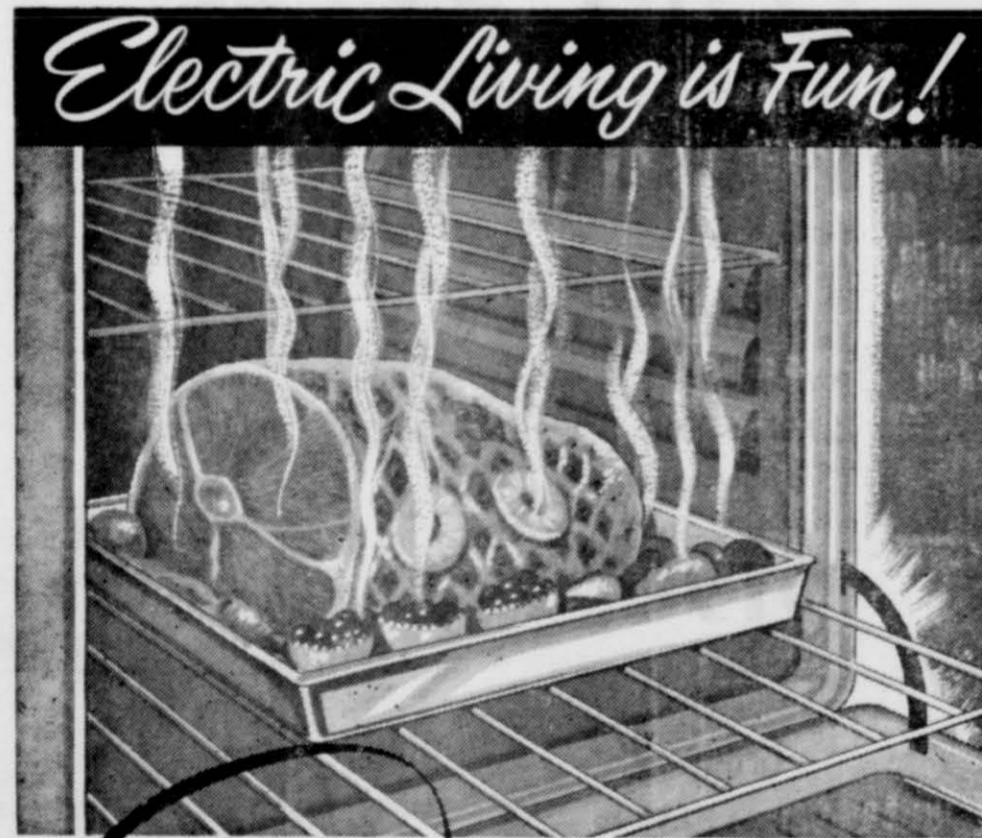

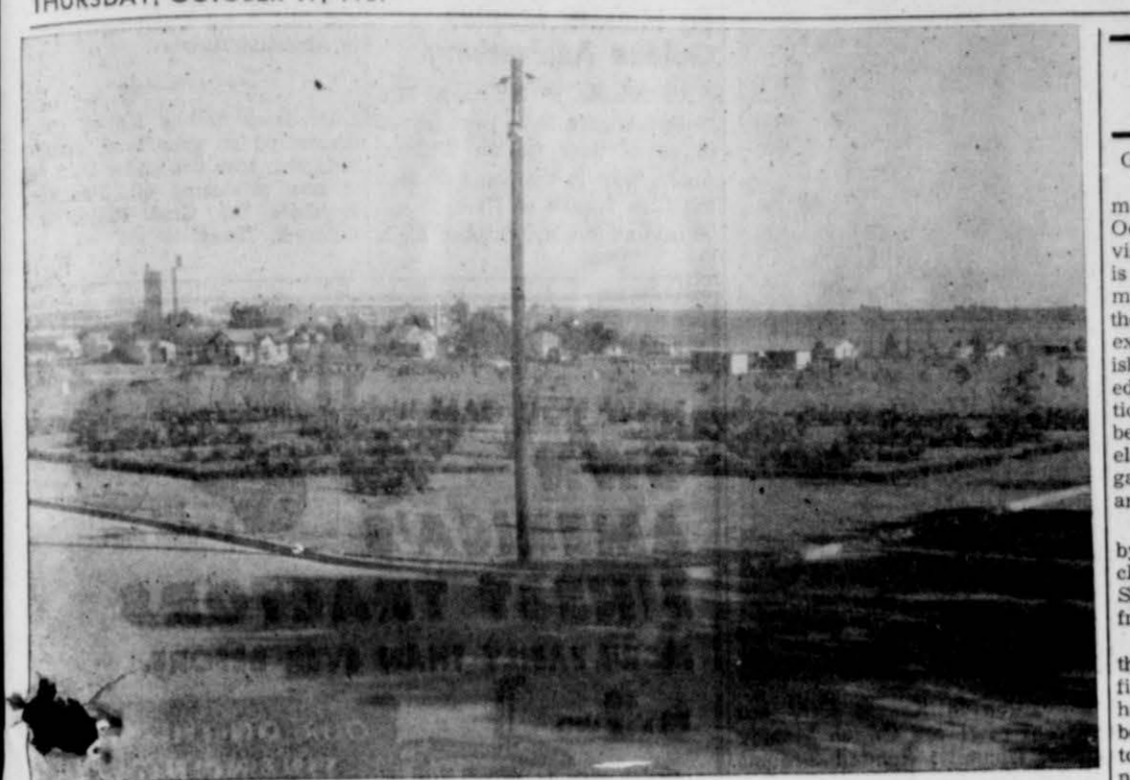

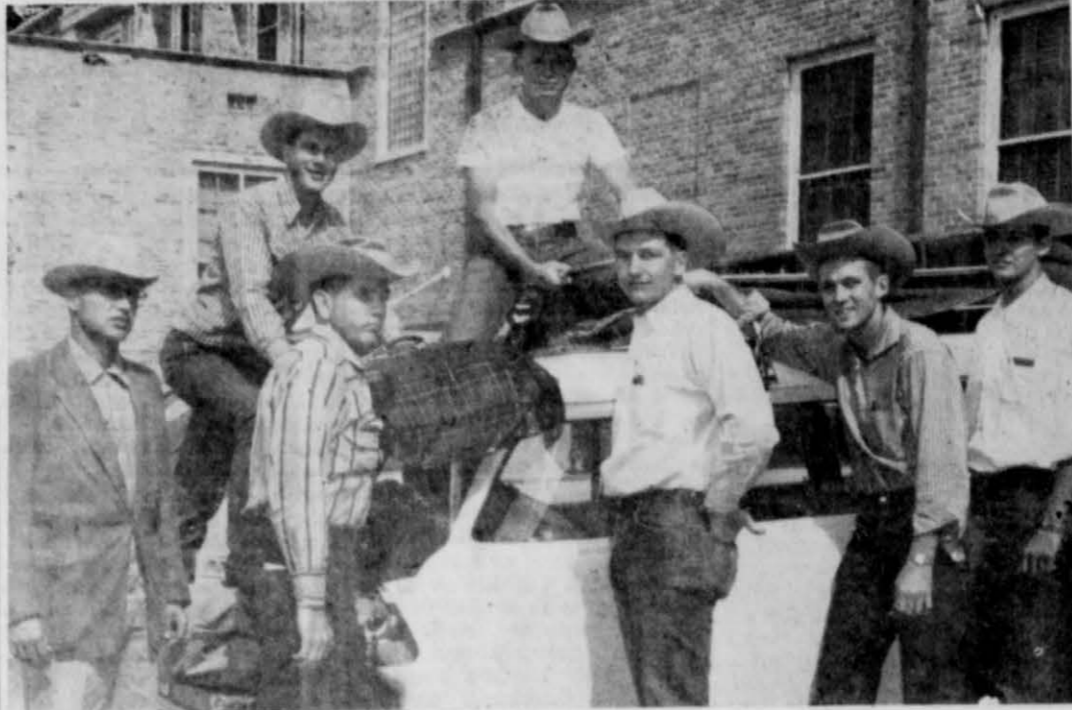
