Rites Held For Mrs. Leta Stroud In Robert Lee

Mrs. Leta Annie Stroud, 58, former Robert Lee resident, died last Friday noon in Shannon hospital in San Angelo. She had been a patient the past eight days while receiving treatment for a heart ailment, but her death was unexpected.

The body was brought to the home of her brother, Earl Roberts, here Saturday and funeral services were conducted at the Robert Lee Baptist Church at 3 p.m. Sunday, with the pastor, the Rev. Bennie Smith officiating. Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery under direction of a San Angelo funeral home.

Pallbearers were Alfred Lofton, Bailey Russell, Roller Page, Sam Williams, Ben Alfred Boykin and Linzy McDorman.

Leta Annie Roberts was born May 17, 1899, at Sweet Home, Tex. She came to Coke County 54 years ago with her parents, the late Green and Emma Roberts. She grew up in the community across the river southwest of Robert Lee where her parents resided for many years.

Mrs. Stroud had lived in San Angelo the past 30 years and maintained her home at 108 W. Abe St. She had been employed by Monarch Tile Co., since it started nine years ago. She was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include two sons, Julian C. and Delmar H. Stroud, both of Midland; two brothers, Earl and Artell Roberts, both of Robert Lee; and three sisters, Mrs. Corena Davis and Mrs. Leona Wallace, both of Robert Lee, and Mrs. Alice Benton of Hanford, Calif.

She was preceded in death by two brothers, Eddie and Lee Roberts, both of whom resided in Robert Lee.

Livestock Show In Robert Lee Monday, Jan. 6

Coke County's annual Livestock Show is scheduled for next Monday, Jan. 6, at the County Park in Robert Lee. The event alternates yearly between Bronte and Robert Lee.

The show barns have been moved from the former location, and other facilities in the park will be used including the community center where Home Demonstration Club and 4-H exhibits will be displayed and where a refreshment stand will be set up.

County Agent Sterling Lindsey states 4-H boys and girls will enter about 80 lambs, seven fat calves, 20 barrows, 25 head of breeding swine and 20 breeding sheep.

Dawson Coleman, vocational agriculture teacher at Miles, will judge the show starting at 10 a.m. Auction sale of the animals is set for 2:30 p.m. after the judging has been completed.

The 1958 show is being dedicated to the late Fred McDonald, Jr., an officer and booster of the Livestock Show for many years. The public is urged to turn out and encourage the young livestock owners in their efforts.

Robert Lee may get a new post office. At any rate the Post Office Department is hoping that some property owner will construct a new building and lease it to the government.

V. E. Bell of Lubbock, real estate officer for the Post Office Department, has asked for bids to be submitted to his office up to and including Jan. 21, 1958, to furnish quarters suitable for post office services in Robert Lee under a lease. Provisions of the standard form lease at a stated price per annum include heat, light, power, water, toilet facilities, vault, and plumbing, heating and lighting fixtures for a term of ten years. Floor space of 1,200 feet is desired.

Important considerations are a reasonably central location, good daylight, and accessibility to rear or side entrance for mails.

General building requirements, equipment specifications, and form of proposal, together with information concerning provisions of the lease, may be obtained from the postmaster in Robert Lee or from the real estate officer whose name and address are indicated above.

The Post Office Department reserves the right to negotiate further with proponents for better terms, to reject any or all proposals, and to readvertise for new proposals. Offers which do not include heat, light, power, water and sewage services will also be considered.

Postmaster H. S. Lewis, Jr. has been requested to give this matter publicity in the local newspaper, and to furnish forms and blanks to persons desiring to submit proposals to lease quarters.

Mr. Bell states he will come to Robert Lee as soon as possible after Jan. 21 and confer with all interested property owners and examine buildings offered.

For a number of years the Robert Lee post office has been located in a corner building owned by R. C. Russell. The structure is 25 feet wide and 40 feet long, providing floor space of 1,000 feet. The rental is \$40 per month.

EARLY RESIDENT DIES

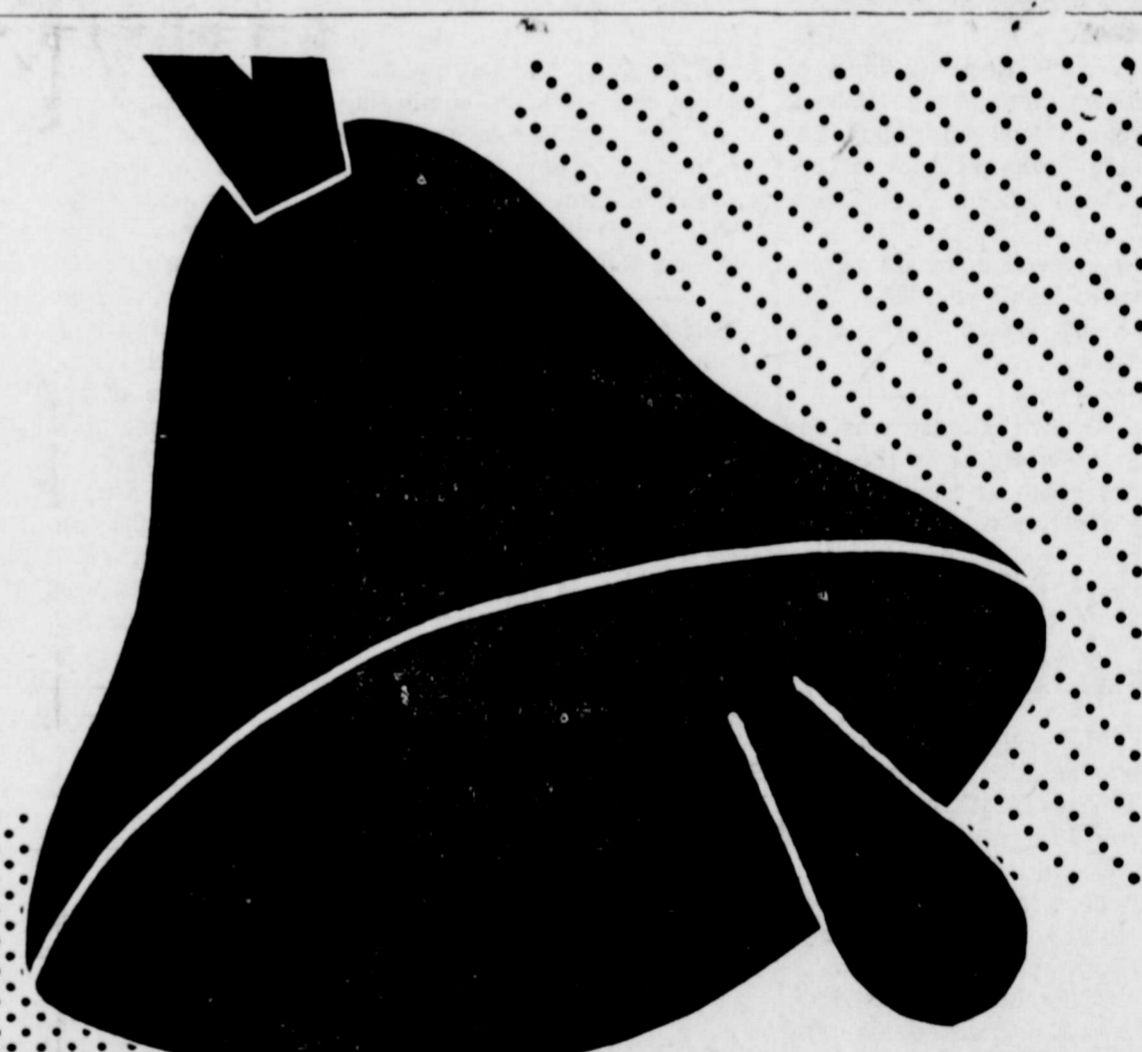

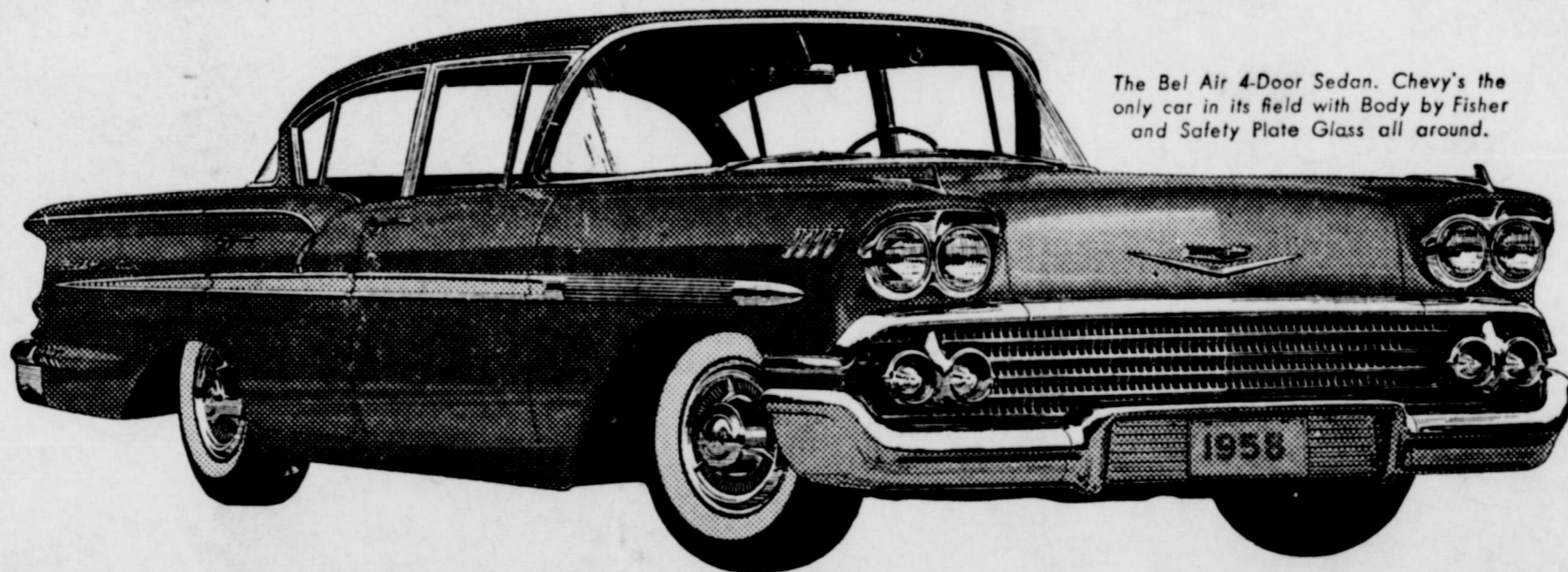
