Using locally grown grain in the ration, Dimmitt Feed Yards is feeding 40,000 head of cattle. The feed yard is located on the Clovis Highway west of Dimmitt.

The feed yard was constructed in 1966 and began feeding 10,000 head. The pen space was increased twice to reach the current 40,000 head capacity.

"The feed yard uses an average of 100 acres of local grain daily in the feeding process," Ike Brandon said.

The feed yard has an average of 430 employees. Key personnel are Ike Brandon, manager; Delynn Smith, head bookkeeper; Jack Templar, head cowboy; and Bob Ellis, head mill man.

"When cattle enter the feed yard, they are started on a weak ration concentration and are gradually fed up to a higher ration concentration," Brandon said. "We use three ration concentrations, reaching the highest about a month to six weeks after entering the feed yard."

"The average pen is fed for 150 days or five months," Brandon continued. "Each animal will gain 400 pounds and eat two tons of feed during that time."

Brandon said a big portion of the beef coming out of Dimmitt Feed Yards goes to the area meat packers.

Dimmitt Feed Yards is a member of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.
