Latham Begins Second Year As Superintendent

Hervey H. Latham is in his second year as superintendent of the Robert Lee Schools and fifth year in the Robert Lee System.

Latham came to Robert Lee in 1958 as elementary principal, succeeding P. E. Webb. In 1959 he was promoted to high school principal, and after Frank Coalson retired June 30 of last year as Superintendent of Robert Lee School, Latham was selected to head the school system.

He received his B. A. degree from Hardin-Simmons University and his M. A. degree from Sul Ross State College. Latham has done additional work at Texas Technological College toward an administrator's certificate.

He is a member of two national education fraternities, Kappa Delta Pi and Phi Delta Kappa.

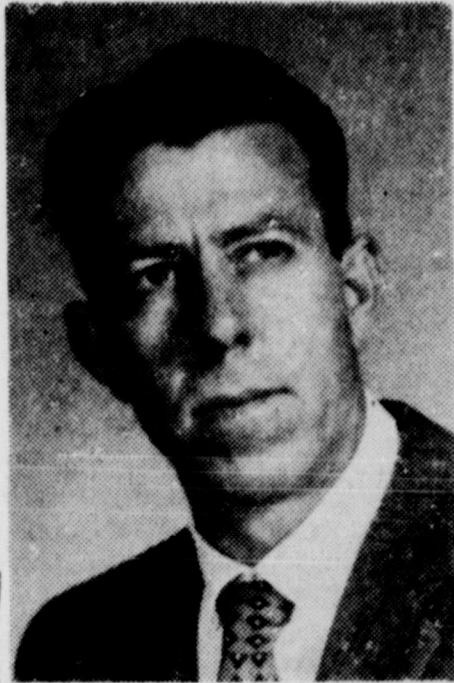
Regular dismissal hours will be at 2:30 for 1st and 2nd grades, 3:00 for 3rd and 4th grades, and 3:30 for all other grades.

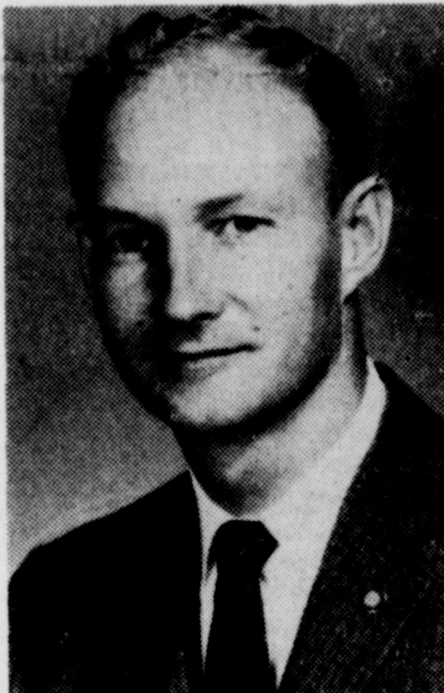
Dean Is Elementary Prin.

Classes to Start Here Monday

A full day's program is planned for the first day of school at the Robert Lee Schools Monday, August 28, at 9 a.m. beginning with an assembly program in the auditorium.

Mrs. Lucille Dean will lead the group in singing "America" and the Boy Scouts will lead the group in the pledge to the flag of the United States of America.

After the invocation, the teachers will be introduced, announcements made, and students will then be dismissed to classes.

A full day of school is planned and lunches will be served in the lunchroom. The buses will run approximately 30 minutes later than usual the first morning and the students will be dismissed at 2:30 the first day of school. Regular school hours will be from 8:30 until 3:45.

Regular lunch hours have been scheduled as follows for elementary school: Grade 1, 11:10 to 12; Grade 2, 11:15 to 12; Grade 3, 11:20 to 12; Grade 4, 11:30 until 12:15;

Grade 5, 11:35 until 12:15; Grade 6, 12:15 until 1:00.

During the summer many physical improvements have been made at the Robert Lee school. The asphalt playground, a cooperative project of the P. T. A. and the school, has been finished. The fourth year vocational agriculture boys and Mr. Harris are to build the basketball goals in the shop. Tentative plans include lining the court with two regulation size tennis courts. Recesses during the coming school year are to be staggered so each of the grades will be able to use the new area.

A new asphalt walk-way was also built connecting the sidewalk to the band hall with the lunchroom. During rainy weather and muddy weather, students have previously had to bog through mud and water to get to the lunchroom.

Grass has been planted on the north and east side of the elementary wings. This will not only enhance the beauty of the campus, but it will help keep dust from blowing into the primary wing of the building.

A large used walk-in type refrigerator has been purchased by the lunchroom for the storing of large quantities of vegetables and other commodities which must be kept under refrigeration.

The football field has been reworked and leveled. The grass should be in good condition for the first home game, September 22 with Melvin.

Regular yearly maintenance work has also been completed by Mr. Sam Fowler, custodian of the local school. This includes scrubbing, waxing, and polishing of all floors in the new building, plus the gym floor and band hall in the old building. The hall way in the old building and the kitchen area in the lunchroom have also been painted. The lunchroom floor was given a coating of gym finish. All the outside doors of the new building have also been given a fresh paint job.

Wheat Vote Will Be Held August 24 At Courthouse

Wheat producers eligible to vote in the 1962 wheat marketing quota referendum to be held August 24, may cast their ballots at the courthouse, according to Clarence E. Arrott, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum are those who produced more than 13.5 acres of wheat in any one of the years, 1959, 1960 or 1961. Producers who signed applications under the feed wheat provisions permitting them to grow wheat for feed use only on their farms for 1961 will not be eligible to vote.

The results of the referendum will determine the kind of wheat program that will be in effect for next year's crop. For this reason, every wheat producer should make his wishes known by casting his ballot at the polling place, the Chairman declared.

Voters in Coke County may vote in the wheat referendum on Thursday, August 24, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the courthouse in Robert Lee.
