

A Doctrine Scrapped: A Nation Rapped

When our fifth president first announced the Monroe Doctrine 140 years ago, most Latin American nations were in revolt against foreign masters. It was clear that their freedom would make our freedom more secure; that their rule by a foreign power, even one as week and ineffective as imperial Spain, would be a continuing threat to us. Therefore the U. S. declared its opposition to the extension of foreign rule in the western hemisphere.

Now history is trying to repeat itself as nations of Latin America seem on the verge of toppling one by one into the hands of the most ruthless empire since that of Genghis Khan. From Cuba, communist subversion and revolution are reaching over much of South America.

Castro's Cuba remains a bristling base for communist arms; wellinformed Cuban refugees deny all reports of significant reduction in Russian forces on the island. Even more important, these refugees now tell us that 10,000 Red Chinese paratroopers are training in Cuba. It is well known that for years Red China has made Latin America a particular target for propaganda and subversion, and that Castro himself is a great admirer of Mao Tse-tung. Through Cuba, Red China hopes to gain a decisive influence in Latin America.

Russian submarine pens are being constructed, along with powerful antiaircraft defenses, and much modern military equipment is stored in caves. Despite this continuing military buildup, it was recently revealed that all Navy and Air Force reconnaissance flights over Cuba were halted several months ago, leaving this vital responsibility entirely in the hands of the CIA. Apparently the reason for this was fear of "incidents" between Castro's forces and those of our armed services.

Even CIA observation flights have been grounded for periods as long as two weeks to "lessen tensions" such as during the time of the nuclear Test-Ban negotiations in Moscow; this in spite of the fact that little more than a year ago the emplacement of missiles in Cuba able to destroy our largest cities was discovered only at the last moment!

It is plain that whatever "lessening of tensions" bemused State Department officials may think they see in Moscow and elsewhere, there is none in Havana or anywhere in Latin America. Day and night the training proceeds for the purpose of overthrowing neighboring governments and bringing about communist revolutions. No fewer than ten separate camps in Cuba are training revolutionsaries in guerrilla warfare by "Che" Guevara, whom many consider the communist mastermind behind Castro's whole government.

Daniel James, a leading authority on Latin American affairs, and the executive director of the Citizens Committee for a Free Cuba, had this to say about the results of exporting revolution from Castro Cuba:

"Within two to five years, there will be Viet Nams and Laoses all over the Western hemisphere. Unless Washington immediately faces up to the problem of stemming the communist tide, I predict that American combat troops will be fighting in the jungles of Central

It was precisely to avoid such a grim necessity that the Monroe Doctrine was announced. It will be a matter of astonishment for all future historians that we gave it up so easily, with so little awareness of the price. Nikita Khrushchev told us that it was dead and that we ought to forget about it. We did-with scarcely a murmur.

Expanding communism cannot be escaped, because it always follows. If we run away from it in Cuba, it will meet us again in Mexico, Venezuela, or Brazil. Sooner or later we will have to make a decision and will have to re-establish the Monroe Doctrine or

resign ourselves to a long rear-guard struggle and retreat through Latin American jungles. Then we will face the deadliest enemy of all on our own border.

No greater failure and bankruptcy in foreign policy could be imagined; yet this is the course we are following. What if the American people as a whole should ever discover the appalling truth that these policymakers now have no policy regarding Castro's Cubanone whatsoever.

This is not just "waiting until the dust settles;" it is absolute paralysis. The greatest nation on earth stands frozen in fear and uncertainty before a little enemy-held island which could be choked off in a few weeks of naval blockade. The whole history of modern times offers few spectacles to match this.

It is vital that every American understand the true issue posed by Cuba, its Russian and Red Chinese defenders, and the policy it follows. Cuba will not go away or settle down to "peaceful coexunder Castro no matter how much we might wish it. The issue is simply WHERE are we going to meet the communist threat in this hemisphere. Will we meet it in the FIRST Latin American country conquered by communism-Cuba? Or will we meet it in the SECOND, the THIRD, the FOURTH, or the FIFTH?

Twenty-five years ago the great free nations of Europe, Britain and France, confronted the same issue in the Nazis. Hitler, like Castro, would not go away no matter how much the English and French wished that he would. The issue was WHERE free men would stop him. Would they stop him at his first conquest, that of the Saar? They would not. Would they stop him at his second conquest, the nation of Austria? They did not. Would they stop him at his third conquest, the Sudentenland of Czechoslovakia? No. Would they finally stop him at his fifth conquest, that of Poland? By then, it was too late for France. For England, the late decision meant six years of total war.

The menace of Cuba would be dissolved-with little or no bloodshed-by a tight naval blockade, if our policymakers dared. Since they do not dare, we must later draw the line and make our stand somewhere eise where it will cost much more, for us and for the good people of Latin America. Communism will expand in Latin America until we stop it. Sooner or later, an American President and his administration will have to make the decision to stop this advance by force.

There is a deep awareness of these in many Americans. The people know that the present attitude toward Cuba cannot even be dignified by the name of "policy," that it is nothing more than a confession of failure. Everyone admits that we cannot tolerate a permanent communist base just 90 miles from our shores, but we do not take the action necessary to put that base out of business.

In these circumstance, silence and acceptance of the present state of affairs serve the interests of communism. Constant emphasis on the threat from Cuba and discussions of the best ways to eliminate it will help induce our leaders to do their duty.

Every patriot is obligated to do his best to keep the issue of Cuba in the public eye. "Never forget Cuba!" should become a watchword. It is the least we can do, not only for Castro's enslaved millions and those whom his terrorists threaten all over Latin America, but for ourselves and the future of freedom. How much freedom and safety would we have if the enemy controlled all the Western hemisphere south of the Rio Grande?

American patriots can bring about decisive action to remove this cancer and to restore the Monroe Doctrine. It is not too late; but the time to act is now.




