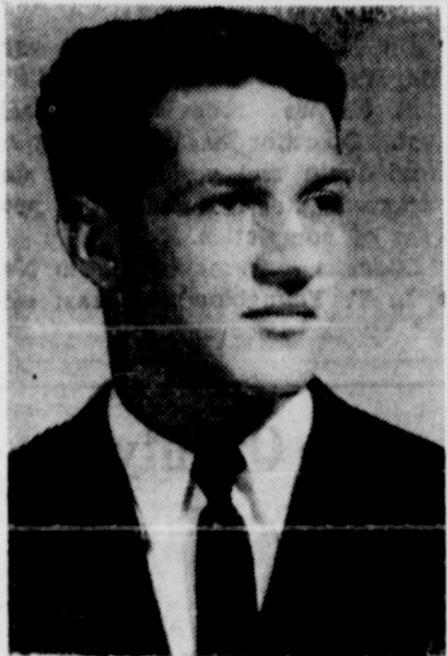

The Robert Lee F.F.A. Livestock judging team participated in the Texas Tech contest at Lubbock last Saturday. The team placed 9th in the overall contest out of 152 teams. They placed 6th in Area II competition. The team won first in beef cattle grading division of the contest.

The team qualified to enter the State judging contest to be held May 1 at Texas A&M University, at College Station.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

The situation was worse than might appear, however, since Mike was already wearing a splint on his right arm, which he broke three weeks ago in a fall while running hurdles.

Other Robert Lee participants who placed in the big regional meet were Rita Tillman, third in science; Melinda Percifull, fifth in prose reading; the golf team composed of Gary Sam Williams, Jeffrey McCabe, Buddy Thomas and Charles Vandiver placed fourth.

The debate team, made up of Rhea Jean McCutchen and Marsha Dodson, lost to Barstow, whose team went on to win first in the region.

Entrants in the regional meet stiff competition, as the best contestants from 10 class B districts representing 54 West Texas schools, are entered.

A check of the Observer files shows that Vandiver is the third Robert Lee boy to go to state in poetry interpretation. Garland Davis, local high school principal, went in 1952 and placed near the top. John Walker of Silver participated in 1960 and won 4th place in the state.

The state Interscholastic League meet will be held May 6, 7 and 8 on the University of Texas campus at Austin.

Money, Pledges Needed For Addition To Hospital

The board of directors of West Coke County hospital hit a snag Tuesday afternoon when bids ran about \$10,000 higher than they and their architect expected.

R. B. Vandiver, hospital administrator, said hospital officials were disappointed with the low bid of BDK Construction of San Angelo. The firm's bid amounted to \$214,370 for the base proposal, which does not leave enough of the \$234,000 available for architects' fees, contingencies fund, furnishings and other miscellaneous items.

The bids were opened in the courtroom in Robert Lee Tuesday afternoon, with the BDK company the apparent low bidder. The bids are subject to review before fi-

nal acceptance, however. A total of 11 bids were received, ranging from the \$214,370 low up to a high offer of \$242,650.

Vandiver said he believes the best way to make up the \$10,000 needed is for friends of the hospital district to make up a fund for buying part of the furniture and equipment. He said memor-

ial gifts are very popular all over the country, and are most appropriate as gifts in memory of deceased loved ones. Gifts in honor of persons still living are also appropriate," he said.

HILL BURTON OFFERS \$7,500 ADDITIONAL

R. B. Vandiver, West Coke County Hospital administrator, told the Observer late Tuesday that the hospital district was offered an additional \$7,500 in federal funds after the bids were opened and available money was not sufficient to build the hospital. The only hitch to the federal offer, Vandiver said, is that it has to be matched with local funds. He urged everyone who is interested in contributing toward raising this money to contact him.

Allen to Attend Hearing on UCRA

Gerald C. Allen, Robert Lee banker and president of the Upper Colorado River Authority, said this week that he will attend a legislative committee hearing in Austin Monday when enlargement of the UCRA will be considered.

Proposed legislation to be considered at the hearing would increase the size of the river authority from its present size of Tom Green and Coke counties to include eight other counties in this area.

The hearing was originally scheduled for April 26, but was postponed because of the crowded condition of the committee calendar on that date. The hearing will be at 7:30 p.m. in Room 346, just above the House Chamber.

Allen said that some other directors of the UCRA have indicated they will also attend the hearing.

BCD Meeting Held Tuesday at Noon

Regular meeting of the BCD was held at noon Tuesday with 17 members and six visitors present.

Hospital administrator R. B. Vandiver told those present that Paul Haraleson, who is working toward construction of a nursing home here, phoned Monday night that his loan had been approved and the home will be built.

Mayor Robert Vaugan briefly discussed a sewer system for Robert Lee, and noted that if the city had a system at the present time, it would save from \$5,000 to \$11,000 on construction costs of the new addition to West Coke County Hospital.

Adult Welding Short Course Set May 10-13

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held May 10-13 under the sponsorship of the Robert Lee high school vocational agriculture department, according to Supt. Dorman Thomas and L. R. McDaniel, teacher of vocational agriculture.

C. B. Edwards, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing for the course.

The short course is to begin at 7 p.m. Monday, May 10, in the vocational agriculture building at the school. Other meetings will be held May 11, 12 and 13. During the dates the short course is in progress. Edwards will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction.

There will be a limited enrollment of 14 to 16 members, and these will be accepted according to the order in which they sign up for the course.

Individuals interested in attending should contact McDaniel. An entry fee of \$5 will be charged. Farm welding certificates will be presented to each person who attends all the training sessions.

The course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but will also cover such subjects as safety in welding, factors controlled by the operator in running a bead, striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardsurfacing and pipe welding.

County Agents News Column

Coke County will have several judging teams participating in the District 7 eliminations on the San Angelo College farm and campus this Saturday. The Junior and Senior Soils Judging and Junior and Senior Livestock judging teams will be participating.

The soils teams are made up of members of the Robert Lee senior and junior 4-H clubs. C. L. Sparks, Gaylon Pitcock, Lynsey White and Doyle Robertson make up the senior team. Darrel Pitcock is alternate for the team.

The junior team members are Alton Stillman, Mark Matlock, Edwin Lindsey and Salvadore Longoria.

The junior livestock team is composed of Sharon McCutchen, James Fields, Doug Burns, Maxie Evans, John Service and Jay Lynn Service. Senior team members are Sharon Walker and Kathy Service of the Robert Lee club and Jerry Parker of Bronte senior 4-H club.

The screwworm has made his way into the state. Five cases were found in South Texas last week. Two others were reported during the weekend. Since the drop or buffer zone is in Mexico now, we must remain watchful for possible cases. A serious outbreak could occur north of the buffer zone if some cases are missed.

Futures trading in beef cattle, considered by many in the beef industry as a new marketing tool, is off to a good start and is expected to get a further boost on April 20 — the first contract delivery date. Trades are now being negotiated at an average rate of more than 100 contracts per day, reports livestock marketing specialists at Texas A&M University. "In my opinion, futures trading is the hottest thing that has happened to the cattle business in 150 years," said Ed Uvacek, one of the marketing specialists.

Deferred grazing is one of the best practices available to stockmen for improving the condition of ranges. The removal of grazing livestock from a pasture for a part of or preferably the entire growing season to allow the forage plants to resupply food reserves in the root system, make top growth to produce food, and produce seed for natural revegetation can pay dividends if we get some moisture.

Ranges in much of the state have declined in condition during the past two growing seasons due to a lack of moisture. Most range forage plants need an opportunity now to reestablish themselves and deferment will give them that chance.

Deferment of rangeland is recommended not only after a drouth but also should follow brush and weed control, seeding and fire.

Coupled with deferment, attention should be given to the balancing of livestock numbers with the forage being produced in order to get the best use from the forage. Proper use of the forage results in an accumulation of litter on the soil surface which is not wasted forage but an aid to more efficient water use, soil stabilization and improved soil fertility.

Larry Lindsey of Silver Doing Practice Teaching In Dallas Junior High

Denton—Larry Lindsey of Silver is among some 672 North Texas State University students serving as student teachers in Dallas-Ft. Worth-Denton area schools during the spring semester.

Some are teaching in area schools all day for nine weeks and others are training half a day for 18 weeks. A third group previously spent the first nine weeks of the spring semester teaching all day.

Gracing the spring scene are all types of beautiful fabrics—in colors ranging from coral pinks to mint greens, and a wide range of blues and other colors.

Before buying a garment, check it over carefully to be sure that you are getting high quality.

A wise shopper always checks the construction of a garment carefully to see if the seams are at least one-half inch in width and that the stitches are close together.

There are many kinds of fiber used in making the interesting materials, so be sure to read the labels and hang-tags carefully to know what the fabric is made of and how to care for it. Be sure to file the labels and hang-tags for reference later — lest you forget how to take care of the garment.

Correct care is important to keep new garments looking new. Professional launderings and dry-cleaning assures that your garments will stay new looking with proper care in the fabric field.

Choose Shoes Wisely

Consumers are spending an average of \$22 a year on leather shoes — and an additional \$7 annually on other leather goods. Non-leather items are not included in this national average.

Compare these figures with your individual expenditures. If your shoe cost is higher than you think it should be, you may need to check your present shoe management.

The management practices include the selection, care and repair of shoes. Selecting the right

style, color and material — plus the proper care and upkeep — are all-important in the total shoe cost.

For consumers who wonder where their shoe dollars go, here's a breakdown by U. S. Department of Agriculture economists, who have studied costs involved in a pair of shoes which retail for \$9.95.

It takes about three square feet of leather to make a pair of shoes. The raw leather costs about 50 cents. By the time the leather is tanned and gets to the factory, the cost is about \$1.50. Add \$1 for materials for soles and linings, and another \$3 for labor, profit, overhead and the manufacturer prices the shoes at \$5.50. At the shoe store, add \$2 for salesmen and \$2.45 for overhead and profit. The price to you then is \$9.95.
