Corn Growers meet here today

Two congressmen, the Texas commissioner of agriculture, the US ambassador to Mexico and the executive director of the US Feed Grains Council will make up an all-star lineup of speakers this morning (Thursday) at the ninth annual meeting

of the Texas Corn Growers Association in Dimmitt.

Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the County Expo Building, and the program will start at 10. The meeting is open to all interested persons.

At noon, Sutphen's Barbecue of Amarillo will serve a free barbecue lunch, sponsored by nine chemical companies and several other agribusinesses in the North Texas corn-growing region.

The afternoon session will feature advice on marketing by Dr. Roland Smith, marketing economist with Texas A&M University, and a report on corn insect control by Allen Knutson, Extension entomologist for Castro and Lamb Counties. County Extension Agent Charles Hottel will moderate the afternoon program.

The TCGA's longtime president, Carl King of Dimmitt, will

open the meeting with the president's report at 10 a.m.

Following King's report, Congressman Kent Hance will give a brief update on federal government action affecting farmers.

Delivering the main address will be Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford, member of the House Agriculture Committee and a fellow member of Hance's in the Conservative Democratic Forum, known in Congress as the "boll weevils."

Stenholm will speak on the meeting's main theme, "Farm Crisis of the 80's — Weathering the Storms in Agriculture." He also will update TCGA members on pending legislation that will affect farmers.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown — long a favorite with local audiences — will report on the current state [See Corn Growers, Page 14]

TCGA still gaining momentum

As members of the Texas Corn Growers Association prepared to gather in Dimmitt today for their ninth annual meeting, President Carl King looked back over the accomplishments of the still-young commodity group.

It's a story of struggle, frustration, progress, and some notable coups.

Dimmitt has been the headquarters of the TCGA ever since it was founded here in 1973. And the outspoken King — the Tom Landry of the Texas Corn Growers — is the only president

of the group has ever had.

Other officers are Jim Dowty of Dumas, vice-president; and Harold Bob Bennett of Hart, secretary-treasurer.

The TCGA encompasses 26 corn-producing counties in North Texas; these counties produce 75% of the corn grown in the Lone Star State.

Most of the TCGA's progress has come in the last two years, thanks to a half-cent per bushel checkoff fee that provides a healthy budget. Until growers in the state's seven biggest corn-producing counties approved the checkoff, King ran the affairs of the TCGA out of his pickup.

But now the association has a fulltime office in Dimmitt. [See TCGA Gaining, Page 14]

County judge appointee to run for election

Mrs. M. L. (Polly) Simpson announced this week that she will seek election in 1982 for the office of Castro County Judge.

Mrs. Simpson, who was appointed as county judge two weeks ago, will be a candidate in the Democratic Party primary in May.

She was born in Floyd County in 1927 and was the oldest daughter of M. M. and Aileen Smitherman. The family moved to Castro County in 1937.

She attended grade school at Sunnyside and graduated from Hart High School. She attended Texas Tech University in Lubbock and West Texas State University in Canyon.

She married Charley F. Sanders in 1948. They had four sons, Joe Bob, Billy Frank, Brent and Brad. Mr. Sanders died of a heart attack in 1959.

She married M. L. Simpson Jr. on Nov. 22, 1964, and added Carolyn, Patty, Mark L. and Lisa to her list of children.

Mr. Simpson was elected Castro County Judge in November 1978 as a write-in candidate. He was stricken with cancer last October, and died Dec. 24.

Mrs. Simpson was appointed Jan. 8 to finish his term and was sworn in on Jan. 9.

She is an active member of the Presbyterian Church.

"I feel like I am qualified to serve as your county judge. I have lived in Castro County for 44 years and am proud to call it home," she said, adding, "I am interested in its growth, its economy and in its young people." "I think standing beside M. L. while he was judge will be helpful and that this year's experience will be an asset," Mrs. Simpson said. "My aim is to represent all the people in a fair and impartial way and to make Castro County a better place for my grandchildren and yours. I will appreciate your confidence and support," she added.

Wylie announces for county judge's post

"A county judge must have the capacity to oversee the county's business and to work with the county commissioners," Wylie said.

Active in the Democratic Party both at the local and state levels for the past 15 years, Wylie has served as Democratic county chairman for six years.

"This position has put me in close contact with the elected officials of this county," Wylie said, adding, "I know how important it is to have all departments of the courthouse working in harmony. I pledge myself to work for that harmony."

"As county judge, an understanding of the young people is important as well as a good working relationship with adults. I have demonstrated this ability in my very active support of the Booster Club, where I served as president, and as a sponsor of

"Good government begins at home. This county needs better communications between the citizens of our county and their representatives. I feel that I will be able to work with both. I enjoy working with people and feel very capable of the office of county judge. I solicit your support in the May primary," he added.

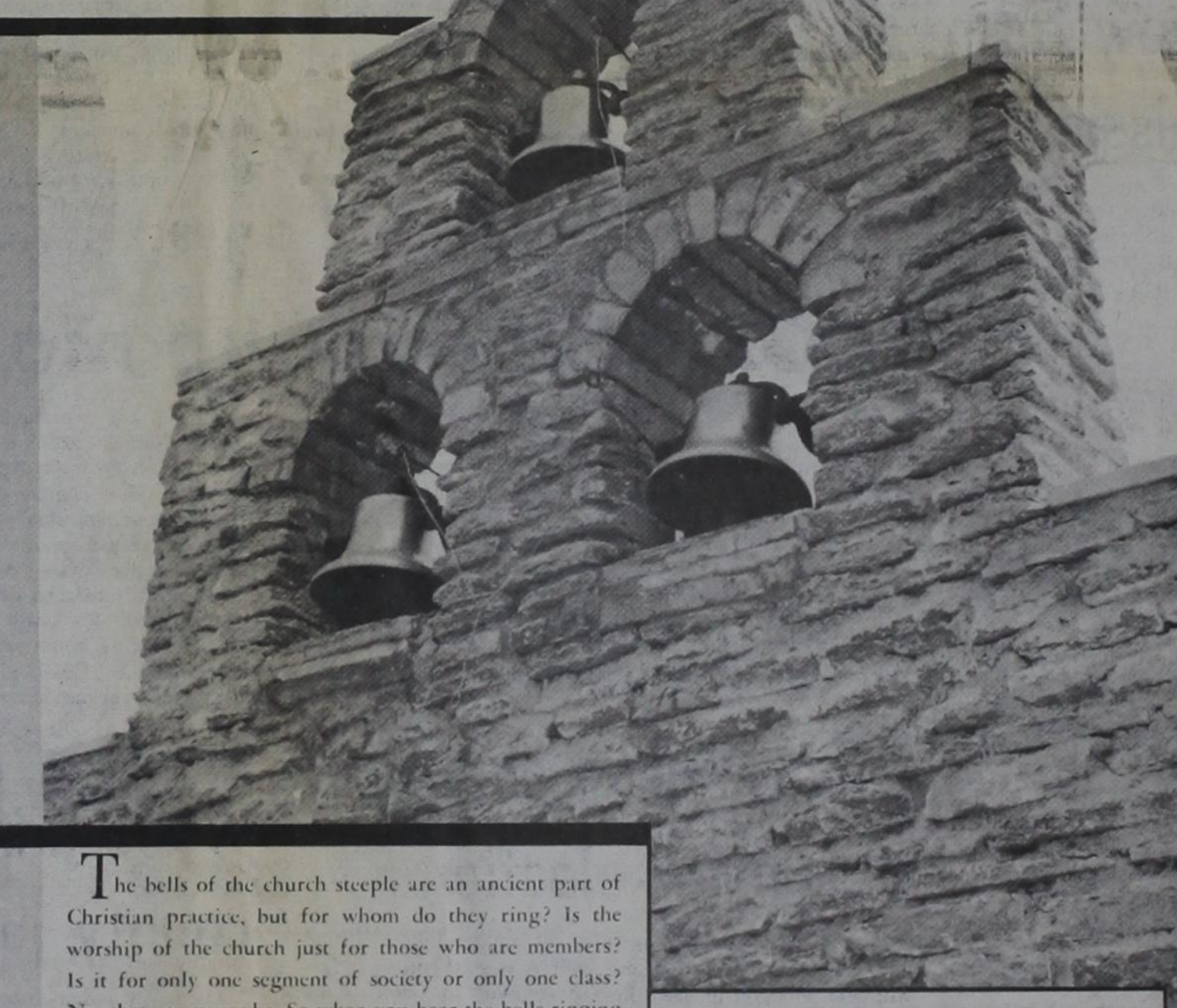

Sarpalius honored at TFU convention

The Texas Farmers Union Friday honored Sen. Bill Sarpalius of Hereford as one of the five outstanding state legislators of 1981.

Mike Moeller, president of the farm group, cited Sarpalius' passage of the gasohol tax credit bill in the last legislature as the reason for the honor, called the Distinguished Service Award.

The bill, the first in the state's history, gives a five-cent-a-gallon tax credit for gasohol made from renewable resources. Proponents of the bill say it will help make the new fuel competitive with unleaded gasoline.

In accepting the award,

Sarpalius remembered the bill's at first rocky, then smooth path to passage.

"The bill died during the regular session because of a filibuster. We went back to the drawing board and drew up a completely new version, which removed the opposition.

"We think there is a tremendous future in this state for gasohol. Times seem hard for agriculture now, but if the Farmers Union and other groups work together, we think we will see a bright future for agriculture as well," the Hereford lawmaker said.

Conservation

Conservation tillage can save money, soil

Conservation tillage appears to be the most cost effective method of controlling erosion of the nation's cropland, Norm Berg, chief of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, said in an editorial in the January issue of Soil and Water Conservation News.

Barney G. Lee, district conservationist for SCS in Castro County, said farmers in the local Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District who use conservation tillage can eliminate as many as four or five tractor trips to produce a crop.

Lee also said more research is needed to learn how to use conservation tillage under all soil and climatic conditions.

"Conservation tillage alone is not the total solution to erosion problems, but leaving adequate amounts of crop residue on the surface year round can reduce sheet and rill erosion by as much as 90 percent," Chief Berg said. "Under some conditions, conservation tillage must be applied as part of a complete conservation system. It must

compliment a system of terraces, grass waterways, diversions, and other needed practices in some areas," he added. The chief speculated that some form of conservation tillage can be applied to every acre of cropland in the United States. He said there is a definite trend away from using the moldboard plow, and US farmers seem to be increasingly aware of the benefits of reduced tillage systems.

Conservation tillage has

grown from 26.7 million acres in 1972 to an estimated 98.8 million acres in 1981. The SCS has spearheaded technical assistance in many areas to get this practice started.

Berg commended SCS field personnel for their enthusiastic endorsement of the activity.

"It is not a coincidence that in areas where conservation tillage is rapidly expanding, we are finding someone who vigorously is promoting this concept," he said.

There are several conservation tillage systems available to farmers regardless of their crop. The foundation for the practice, however, is to leave crop residues on the surface, and eliminate plowing and other soil preparation steps.

Growers interested in conservation tillage systems are advised to consult with their local Soil Conservation office in Dimmitt and with other farmers in the area who have adopted the practice.

1981 crop acreage must be certified

The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981 is now law. Two major provisions affecting Castro County farms are:

(1) Individual program crop bases will be established for each farm in 1982.

(2) Oats will be a program crop. (If you had oats seeded in 1980 or 1981, and do not know if you certified as such, please check with us.)

Producers who failed to certify program crop acres in 1981 may be able to report late-filed crop acreage certifications no later than Feb. 5. There will be a late-filed fee

charged for this service. It will be necessary for those wanting to file late to furnish the County Committee evidence to justify such acreage such as:

(1) Receipts showing sale of crop verifying the sale was a 1981 crop; (2) proof of purchase of planting seed or receipts for cleaning and treating planting seed for the acreage; (3) cancelled check or other positive evidence of payment for custom harvesting; (4) a signed statement from two reliable persons who have knowledge that the crop was actually planted on the acreage; or (5) other acceptable evidence.

Three killed, 54 hurt in 1981 mishaps here

Dept. of Public Safety Sgt. Joe Rex Smith, area supervisor of Castro County, reported that during 1981 Texas Highway Patrol troopers investigated 87 accidents in this county, seven of them in the month of December.

There were three persons killed and 54 persons injured in 31 different accidents, and 53 property-damage accidents.

In District 5B, which includes the top 31 counties of the Texas Panhandle, there were 2,481 accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol.

Capt. Bob Russell reported that Texas Highway Patrol troopers investigated 91 fatal accidents with 104 persons killed, 875 injury accidents with 1,426 persons injured, and 1,515 property-damage accidents.

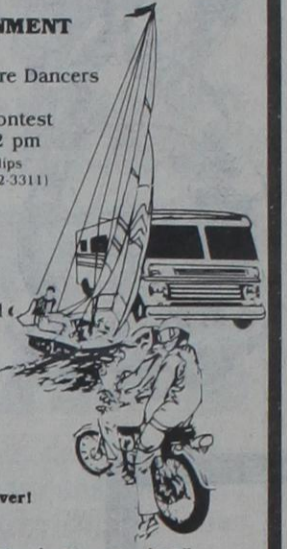

In other libraries, though, things are occurring. For example, the small village library in Haskell, Okla., received \$100,000 from the estate of a long-forgotten former resident who had moved to California during the Dust Bowl days. In the 50 years that went by, the former resident struck it rich and reportedly left over a million dollars at the time of her

death. She willed 10% of it to her hometown library.

In Albuquerque, N.M., they're always doing something funny. The University library entered a pumpkin contest this fall with a pumpkin made up like Miss Piggy reading a picture book titled "The Joy of Sex." It won the "most original" prize but the winner dried up and lost its nose in a couple of days, staff members reported.

At Columbia University they let model airplane buffs fly their crafts inside the Low Memorial Library. Said one, "The big dome is perfect for this kind of thing."

In Plainfield, Ind., the public library staff came to work one day this fall to discover that the city was putting over 40 mailboxes on the library lawn. The post office allowed the city to move the boxes during a street repair project and the library lawn was chosen as a likely spot. However, no one told the librarian. Said Martha McKnight, assistant director, "They're ugly and I hate them!" Though she complained, the mailboxes remained at the library for two months.

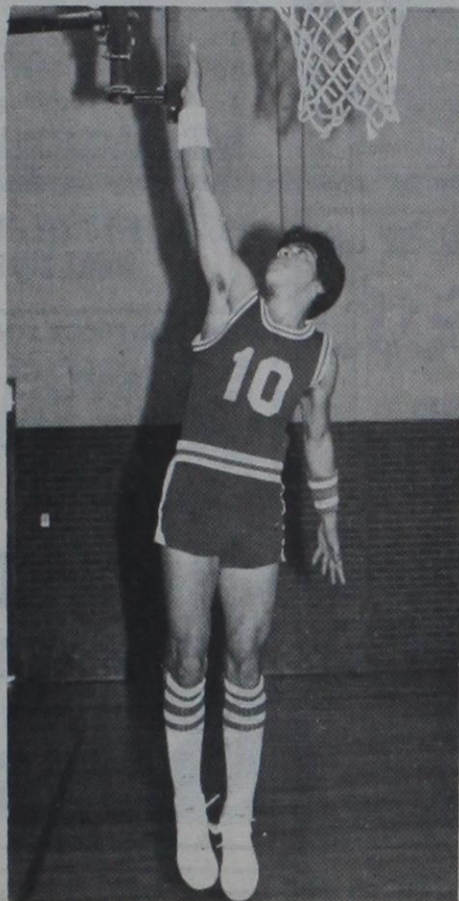

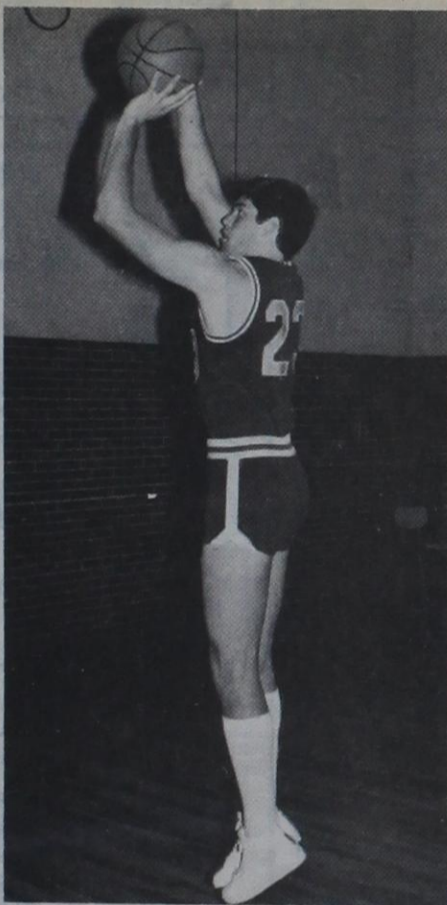

Student work program explained to Kiwanis

Estella Hottel reported to the Kiwanis Monday that the Home Economics Cooperative Education (HECE) class enables students to have both paid work experiences and school credit.

The program, in operation since 1973, is one of two work programs offered at Dimmitt High School and involves between 12 and 20 students each year, Mrs. Hottel said.

A student in the HECE program must be either a junior or senior and at least 16 years old.

"Training is based on an agreement developed by the employer, the teacher-coordinator and the student. Students learn to work in a job setting with adult employees in the field," she added.

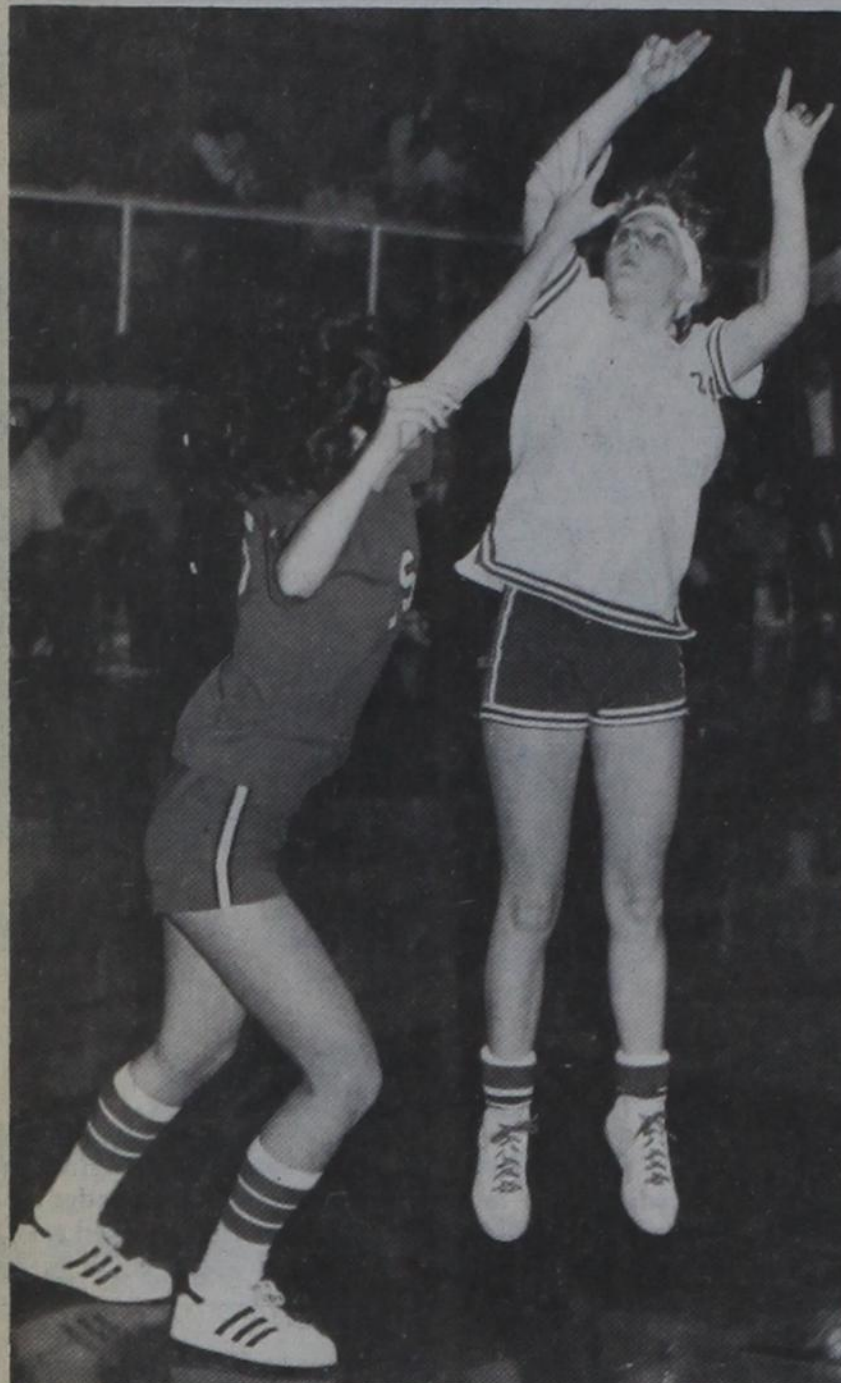

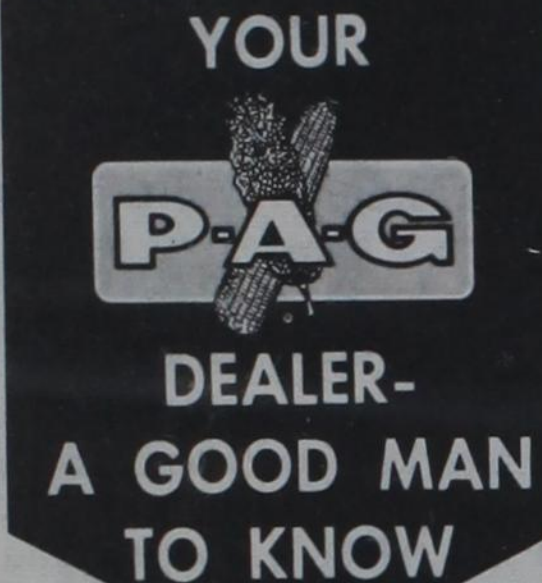

Barlow attended the first through fourth grades in Dimmitt.

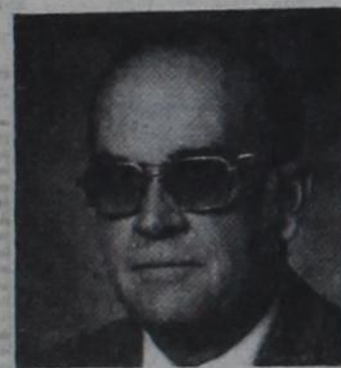
He was also picked as defensive end on the second team at the district level.
