First, I shall expect to fight graft in all its forms, whether county, district or state and work for all measures that promote economy and reduce the burdens of taxation on the people, and in line with this general policy, I would favor

A law requiring the county treasurer to loan the public monies, he now puts in the banks for safe keeping, to the banks that would pay the highest rate of interest therefor on competitive bids, secured by a good and sufficient bond.

Next, I favor electing all county officials once every two years, and allowing an officer to succeed himself, and I would further provide, that any officer be subject to the recall at any time the people felt that he was not doing his duty.

I favor fair salaries for the officers, but do not believe in extravagance, and do not see any reason for paying any officer more than he is reasonably entitled to, taking into consideration the amount of work and the duties of his office. I think the salaries of the district judges should be reduced from \$4500 to \$3000 per year, as they get their expenses paid. This would save the state some \$13,500 per year. Every thing saved in the way of expense is keeping down taxes.

I would favor abolishing the office of district attorney and providing for a county attorney in each county in instead, which in my judgment, would be less expensive and more satisfactory to the people.

Another thing The people of this county have to pay too much fees. For instance every time you or I give a mortgage on a little bunch of personal property, it costs a dollar and a half to record that mortgage, even if we don't borrow over fifteen dollars, and we have to pay of course, fifteen cents is enough to provide for filing it and etc., and the rate might be raised some for large mortgages. There are many fees, including court fees, and costs of litigation, that now make it burdensome for one to assert his rights in court, that should be reduced, and it made easier for one to get justice.

All measures which may with justice be urged to advance our state morally and educate the children of the land, who will soon be the citizens, who control affairs, and all measures which would give us better and cheaper railroad rates and all laws which would help advance the financial interests of every citizen of the state, including any provisions for helping the small farmer and the small stock men, make better homes, I shall expect to work for and stand for with all of my ability and if elected, I will let you hear from me and will render to you an account of my stewardship as your servant, that I trust will cause you no regret that you placed your faith and confidence in me.
