## Death is ruled accidental

Lubbock County Justice of the Peace L. J. Blalock ruled Monday that the death of Sherry Dawn Powers last Wednesday was accidental.

Mrs. Powers, 33, received third- and fourth-degree burns over her entire body when an abandoned house south of Easter was destroyed by fire last Wednesday morning. She died at 3:18 p.m.—almost five hours after the fire—in the burn unit of Lubbock General Hospital.

Deputy Sheriff Joe Hoard said the state fire marshal has classified the fire as an "unknown origin" type. He said no evidence of gasoline or other combustible liquids was found at the scene, although there had been some rags, old papers and clothing in the abandoned building.

He added, "There was no evidence of foul play or anything of that nature."

The old house had been vacant 15 or 20 years, Hoard said. The windows and doors all were miss-

ing and the roof was believed to have been partially caved in, he said.

"We had a 15-mph wind out of the southwest that day and anything igniting in that old building would have started a rapidly spreading fire," Hoard said.

Terry Hill of the nearby Bud Hill Feed Yard was the first to arrive at the fatal fire scene.

"Terry found her outside, on the west side, and pulled her away from the burning building," Hoard said. "Joe Perez, who lives across the road, arrived just after Terry did, and those two men turned in the fire alarm."

The fire was reported at 10:34 a.m.

Mrs. Powers was still conscious and coherent when the ambulance and Sheriff's Dept. vehicle arrived, Hoard said.

"She was praying while they put her into the ambulance," Hoard reported. "She also had asked the ambulance attendants not to give her a blood transfusion. She was a Jehovah's Witness and it was

against her religious beliefs."

Mrs. Powers' locked car was parked outside the abandoned house, Hoard said. The keys had not been found.

Mrs. Powers was employed at the Hereford ASCS office. According to her fellow workers, she left the office on her break Wednesday morning, saying she had to run some errands.

Funeral services for Mrs. Powers were held Saturday morning in Rix Funeral Chapel in Hereford. Cremation followed, under the direction of Rix Funeral Directors.

Mrs. Powers was born in Muleshoe and had lived in Hereford 13 years. She married Derk Powers June 6, 1976, in Littlefield.

Survivors include her husband; a daughter, Kami; her father, Boyd Lowery of Rogers, Ark.; a sister, Vickie Tiffin of Earth; and her grandmothers, Emily Clayton of Earth and Flora Lowery of Littlefield.

A Kami Powers Memorial Fund has been set up for her daughter at the Hereford Federal Credit Union.

## DISD board accepts 19-cent tax rate hike

Despite the fact that it could trigger roll back election procedures, a 19-cent hike in the tax rate for Dimmitt's school district was accepted by the school board Monday night, along with the proposed 1989-90 fiscal year budget.

Business manager Gene King said that a public hearing will be held Aug. 31 to receive individual comments on the budget with its suggested tax rate of 87.4 cents, before the school board formally sets the tax rate at their Sept. 11 meeting.

The Castro County Tax Appraisal District set the school's effective tax rate for the coming year at 68.67 cents per \$100 taxable value. Last year's rate was 68.4 cents. The effective tax rate is the amount needed to raise the same amount of tax revenue as the previous year.

With state mandated teacher

raises, last year's revenue would not have been enough, according to King.

"As it is, we didn't replace three staff members who resigned or retired, and we made a 20% across-the-board cut in each departmental budget that was submitted," he said.

Revenue budgeted for the coming year totaled \$6,330,249. Only \$1,733,973 of that is expected to come from ad valorem taxes. Over \$2 million will come from the state, \$679,496 will come from Federal sources, and the rest from miscellaneous sources.

Expenditures are projected to reach \$6,405,374, with 75.2% of that relegated to salaries and salary-related expenses. Correlating revenue to expenses leaves a deficit of \$75,125.

"We can cover the deficit with

reserve funds," King said.

He reported that no major expenditures are planned in the budget other than the \$28,000 set aside for a regularly scheduled bus purchase, "and we may not even do that, according to how things look in the spring when it's time to order buses," King added.

In a move to bring part of the budget closer to breaking even, board members approved increasing the prices for school meals.

At Richardson Elementary lunches will cost 90 cents, at the middle school the price will be \$1, and high school lunches will go up to \$1.10, with adult lunches set at \$1.50. Previously the prices had been set at 80 cents, 85 cents, 95 cents and \$1.25, respectively.

All breakfasts will now cost 50 cents, up from the previous 20 (Continued on Page 8)

## School registration nears

Students in all the Hart schools will register for classes Tuesday, while Nazareth students sign up Aug. 26 and Dimmitt students register Aug. 28.

### Hart

Registration at Hart begins Tuesday with high school students reporting to the library. The seniors will sign up for classes from 8 to 9:30 a.m., juniors from 9:30 to 11 a.m., sophomores from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and freshmen from 1 to 2:30 p.m.

Junior high students at Hart will register in Elsie Black's office at the high school, with eighth graders scheduled from 2:30 to 4 p.m. and seventh graders reporting from 4 to 5:30 p.m.

Pre-kindergarten through sixth grades will register from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the elementary school gym.

The first day of school in Hart is scheduled Aug. 28, with classes beginning at 8:15 a.m.

### Nazareth

Nazareth High School students will register Aug. 26 in Room 8. Senior class registration is scheduled to begin at 8:30 a.m., juniors report at 10:30 a.m., sophomores sign up at 1:25 p.m. and freshmen register at 3 p.m.

The kindergarten through eighth grades will register the first day of school, which is scheduled Aug. 28.

### Dimmitt

Dimmitt High School students should report for registration Aug. 28 at the high school cafeteria. Students should enter the building through the outside cafeteria door, according to school officials.

The bells will ring sounding the start of school in Dimmitt on Aug. 31.

The high school registration schedule begins with the seniors from 1 to 1:45 p.m., juniors from 1:45 to 2:30 p.m., sophomores from 2:30 to 3:15 p.m. and freshmen from 3:15 to 4 p.m.

If the students have not submitted their Social Security numbers before school this year, they will have to have one before they register.

School pictures will be made that day, and a dress policy will be in effect.

Students at Dimmitt Middle School will register Aug. 28 in the afternoon.

Eighth graders will sign up from 1 to 2:30 p.m. and the seventh grade will register from 2:30 to 4 p.m. Both classes will register in the middle school library.

The fourth, fifth and sixth graders will have a general registration from 1 to 4 p.m. in the west foyer of the middle school building. Students can pick up supply lists when they register. Supply lists for the fourth, fifth and sixth grades will also be posted at Perry's, Dimmitt Thriftway and IGA Foodliner.

A general registration from 1 to 4 p.m. will be held for the kindergarten through third grades at the Richardson Elementary School cafeteria. Supply lists for these grades can be picked up from Vicki Yokum during registration. The lists for the kindergarten through third grades will be posted at Perry's, Dimmitt Thriftway, IGA Foodliner, Parsons Rexall Drug and Coleman Pharmacy.

# Rainfall is beautiful!

It was the best rainfall in Dimmitt since May 30, 1988.

The gentle, steady, widespread rain that fell in the pre-dawn hours Sunday totaled 2.9 inches in the city, and totals ranged from 1.5 to 3.5 inches around the county.

By daybreak, the low spots in many fields were underwater, and bar ditches were full to the brim.

KDHN Radio recorded an official 2.0 inches three miles north of the city. But farther north, Rodney Hunter received 3.5 inches and Bob Simpson got 2.5.

"It will just about make the hay-grazer that was planted late," Simpson said. "The carrots are doing real good, and the corn is the best

I've seen in several years. The beets are as good as I've ever seen, too. The cotton is looking a lot better than it did earlier."

"Beautiful, beautiful," is the way Mrs. George Sides described the Sunday morning rain at Bethel, west of Dimmitt. "Generally, we had 1.5 to 2.5 inches in this area."

Easter recorded two inches of rainfall, and at Flagg the rain gauges hit the 1.7 mark. Sunnyside received 1.9 inches, while Hart and Nazareth both got 1.5 inches.

"I've heard two or three of our farmers say it finished off their corn and cotton," said Ricky Kuntz of Flagg Fertilizer. "Some of the

farmers who are growing food-grade corn will have to water again unless we get some more.

"It was the best rain we've had in two or three years," Kuntz added. "The last time somebody figured it up, we had had five inches at Flagg since August of last year."

Most of the county saw a heavier rain last Sept. 14, when up to 5.5 inches fell in the Hart and Nazareth areas. That storm was a disaster, though, because it also brought high wind and hail that wiped out many crops. Dimmitt received an official 2.73 inches during the same storm.

But for Dimmitt itself, Sunday's rain was the best since a good general rain dropped 3.11 inches on the city on May 30, 1988.

Dimmitt got more moisture out of Sunday's shower than it received from January through May combined. The last decent rain here was 1.15 inches June 1 from a front that dropped 1.78 inches in all during the first five days of June.

"I don't think they'll be watering any more in our area," said Scott Rice of Hart Producers Co-op Gin. The corn and soybeans are looking pretty good. The cotton—what's left of it—is looking pretty good, too, but it's a couple of weeks behind, and it needs a late fall. Of course, we lost quite a bit of cotton to the hail earlier."

KDHN recorded another .17 of an inch Tuesday night from a thunderhead that seemed to grow right over the city and dumped up to half an inch in spots within half an hour.

## Hance announces

In formally entering the race for the Republican gubernatorial nomination Tuesday, Kent Hance promised a "new vision" for Texas.

The Dimmitt native launched his campaign at a news conference in the State Capitol, then followed with similar conferences at major cities throughout the state.

The former state senator and US congressman, who now serves as chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, said his "new vision" for the state will focus on three areas—the economy, education and crime.

Borrowing a line from President Bush, Hance said, "To the liberal special interests of this state, read

my lips: No state income tax in Texas."

He pledged to ban both individual and corporate state income taxes.

"This allows us to attract entrepreneurs and businesses fleeing the high-tax states," he said. "Our stand against an income tax will create jobs."

Hance also vowed to "have no mercy" on drug dealers. Citing an "epidemic" drug problem in the state, he said that more than 80% of the state's prison inmates are in for drug-related crimes.

He said he would form "drug

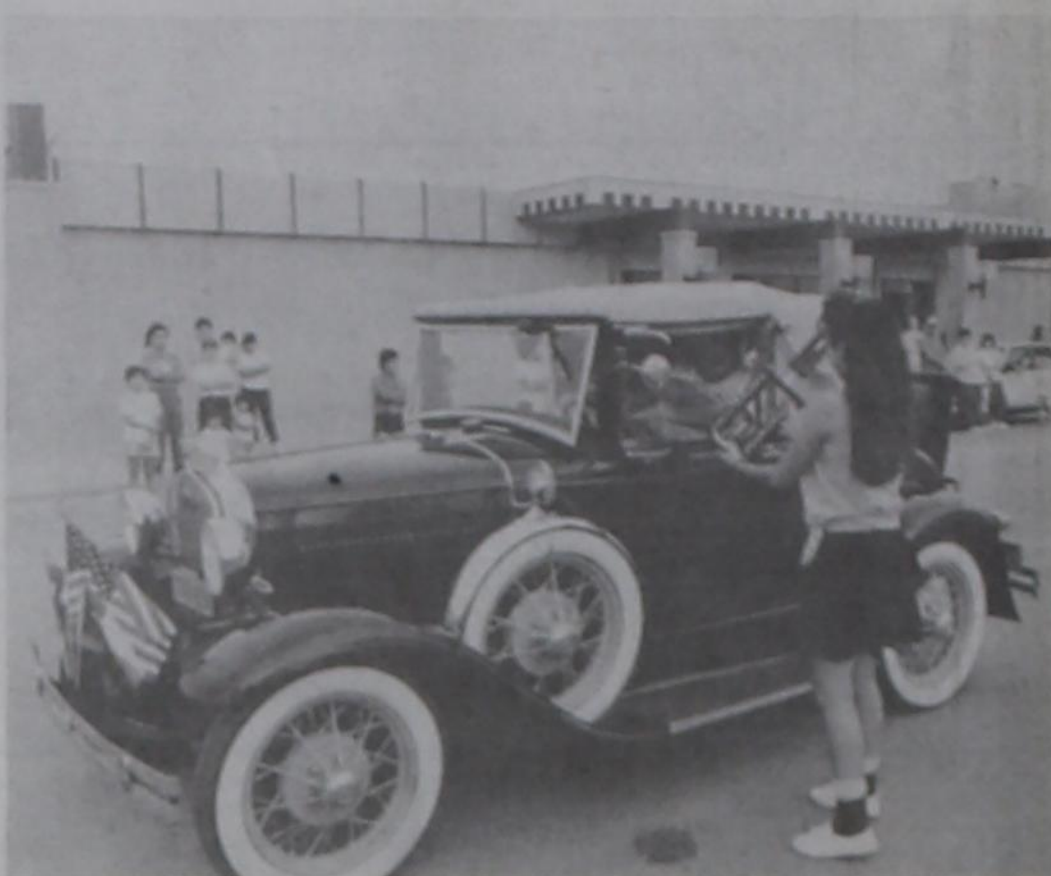

courts" to deal solely with drug-related cases and speed up trials for drug pushers. He also promised to create 25,000 new prison beds over a four-year period.

"We must get tough, stay tough and be relentless in our prosecution of drug dealers," he said. "In my new vision for Texas, punishment means putting criminals behind bars and keeping them there."

On the highly charged issue of abortion, Hance said he hopes to limit abortions to cases in which a mother's life is in jeopardy.

"I am pro-life and I am pro-family," he said. "I stand opposed to the abortion-on-demand crowd and to the various alternative lifestyles that the ultra-liberals condone."

Hance acknowledged that his "pro-life" stance is likely to be controversial, but said, "That's

what I believe."

He said he also hopes to return control of the state's public education system to local school districts.

Hance cited his 15 years of public service: "I am the one candidate who does not need on-the-job training. As your governor, I will lead on day one."

The race for the Republican gubernatorial nomination promises to be both exciting and expensive. Two other candidates announced earlier—former Secretary of State Jack Rains and Midland millionaire Clayton Williams—and Amarillo oilman T. Boone Pickens also is considering the race.

Texas Rangers co-owner George Bush Jr., whom Hance defeated in his first congressional race, also considered running but reportedly has decided against it.

Hance said that he has a base of more than 15,000 contributors across the state—a base he has built in three statewide races—and that he expects to raise more than \$3 million for the campaign.

He said a recent Houston Chronicle poll showed him leading the Republican field with 28%. Bush

received the nod from 21% of those polled, he said, while Rains garnered 10%.

cents. Snack bar prices at the high school will also show increases of 5 cents to 65 cents on various food items.

Those qualifying for reduced-price meals will pay 40 cents for all lunches and 30 cents for breakfasts.

Last year's figures show the lunch room had a net loss of \$81,817.52. The increased prices are projected to reduce that deficit by more than \$11,000.

Board members voted to accept supply contracts with B & S Distributors of Rainbo Bread for the cafeteria bread supply and with Castro Oil & Gas, Inc. for gasoline. No other bids were received.

However, two bids were received for the milk supply contract. Borden, Inc. of Amarillo was low bidder at 13.95 cents per half-pint of low-fat milk and 13.90 cents per half-pint of low-fat chocolate milk. Bids of 14.90 cents for low-fat and 15.40 cents for low-fat chocolate were received from Plains Dairy Products of Amarillo.

Board member Cheryl Pybus said she felt the bid should go to Plains, "because they're local, and we know we can be sure of delivery even in bad weather."

Supt. Robert Ryan said if the low bid is not accepted, the low bidder must be given a chance to speak before the bid is awarded. The vote on the bid was tabled until Borden could be notified.

The board approved continuing the employee health insurance coverage with the same company, despite a hike in rates. By adopting a \$300-deductible plan rather than continuing with the current \$100-deductible, the amount paid by the district will go up only \$44,814.

The district pays half of the employee premium amount for teachers and all of the premium for support staff.

In other business, the board approved changes in the student handbooks, including new absence policies formulated last year.

## Farm workers file lawsuit against Americo de la Paz and DeBruyn Produce Company

On March 20, 1989, a lawsuit was filed by a group of farm workers against Americo de la Paz, a crewleader from Dimmitt, Texas, and DeBruyn Produce Co., a Michigan corporation. The lawsuit alleges that the farm workers were not paid the minimum wage required by federal law for onion planting done during the spring of 1987.

The lawsuit also alleges that other farm workers were not paid the minimum wage. Farm workers who planted onions for Americo de la Paz and DeBruyn Produce Co. in 1987 and who wish to officially become part of the lawsuit must opt into it.

Any farm worker who needs information about this lawsuit or who wishes to join the lawsuit should contact his or her family lawyer for assistance, or contact the United States District Clerk in Amarillo, Texas by writing a letter to the United States District Clerk, 205 E. Fifth, Room 210, Amarillo, Texas 79189-1559, or contact the law firm that filed the lawsuit for the farm workers. 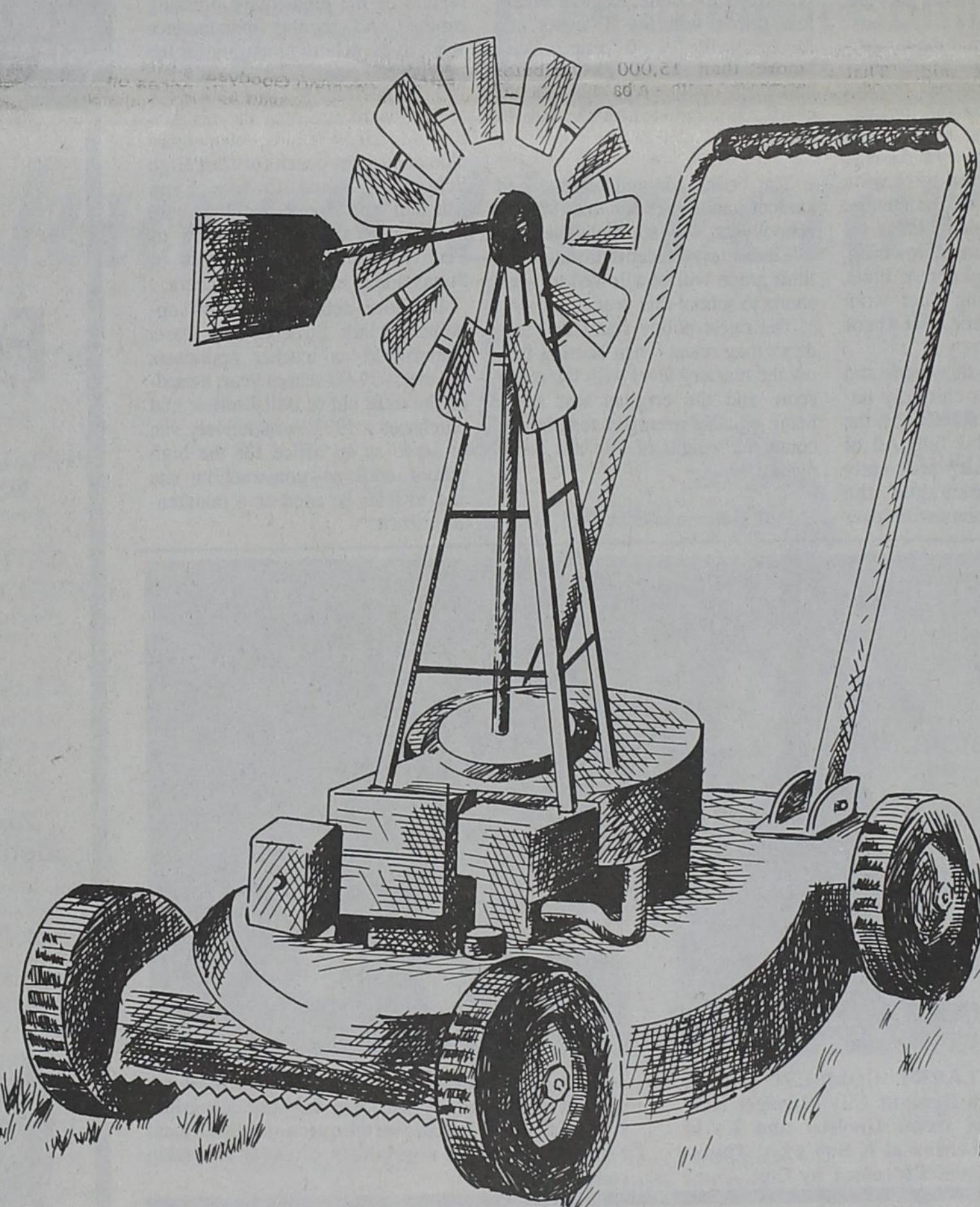

## HISD to install new heating, cooling system in grade school

The Hart Independent School District board of trustees approved the replacement of 16 air conditioning/heating systems in the emergency school at its regular meeting Aug. 7.

The board was afraid the temperature in the classrooms would interfere with the instructional process this fall, so they approved the purchase of the heating and cooling systems on an emergency bid basis.

The bid was awarded to Newton Electric of Dimmitt in the amount of \$44,202.61, which includes removal of the old units, rewiring, installation of new Lennox units, replacing the existing duct work and adding automatic, set-back thermostats.

The board hoped this work and the reroofing project currently underway, will be completed by the time school starts this fall. All of the work was necessary after early summer storms damaged the school. Insurance claims will cover

most of the work.

The board voted to leave the prices for school lunches and breakfasts the same. Regular breakfast prices will be 30 cents and lunches will be 60 cents. Adult lunches will be \$1.35. Reduced breakfasts will cost students 25 cents, while reduced lunches are 40 cents.

The board adopted teacher and student handbooks for the 1989-90 school year, with some changes.

Elementary students through the third grade will be allowed to wear shorts to school this year.

The retest policy states that students may retest when scoring below the mastery level with the retest score and the original test score being equally averaged together to count the weight of one test score overall.

Hart Superintendent Phil Bare-

field reported on the status of the high school addition for science labs, roofing of the high school, tennis court construction, plumbing repairs of the elementary dressing rooms, and regular maintenance work in the school preparing for the new school year.

The board accepted the resignation of Cindy Davis, elementary aide and tennis coach for Hart High School. It voted to hire Lynn Mitchell and Sue Ezziddine, both of Canyon, Connie Osmanski of Plainview and Patti Waggoner of Sunnyside as elementary teachers.

In other action the board appointed Mark Stroebel and Darla Underwood as teacher appraisers for the 1989-90 school year; awarded the milk bid to Bell Dairies; and purchased a 1973 Ford delivery van to serve as an office for the high school addition construction site and to later be used as a maintenance truck.

## Smith feels road funds should be reapportioned

Dear Editor:  
I need your help!  
We have a very unique situation in Castro County. We have one of the most productive counties in the state, but most of the production comes from Precincts 1 and 2. Precinct 1 has the most with Precincts 2, 3 and 4 following in that order. The traffic in the county follows the same pattern, with Precinct 1 having the most and so on.  
The road and bridge maintenance should be in the same order as production and traffic, but this is not the way the "Road and Bridge" fund is divided by your county. Precinct 4 gets more money than 2 and 3. The reason is, the money is now divided according to the number of miles of county roads that are in each precinct.  
The State of Texas tells the

County Commissioners that the road and bridge funds are to be "judiciously and equitably" expended on the county roads to the extent permitted by road conditions. Some other guidelines they use are the tax base, difference in road mileage and conditions, topography, age of road equipment, and square miles in each precinct and traffic patterns. I want Castro County's road and bridge fund to be divided by the state guidelines.

We also need to have something done about liquor being sold or given to minors in this and surrounding counties. These are two situations that I urgently need your help. Anything you will do will be most appreciated.

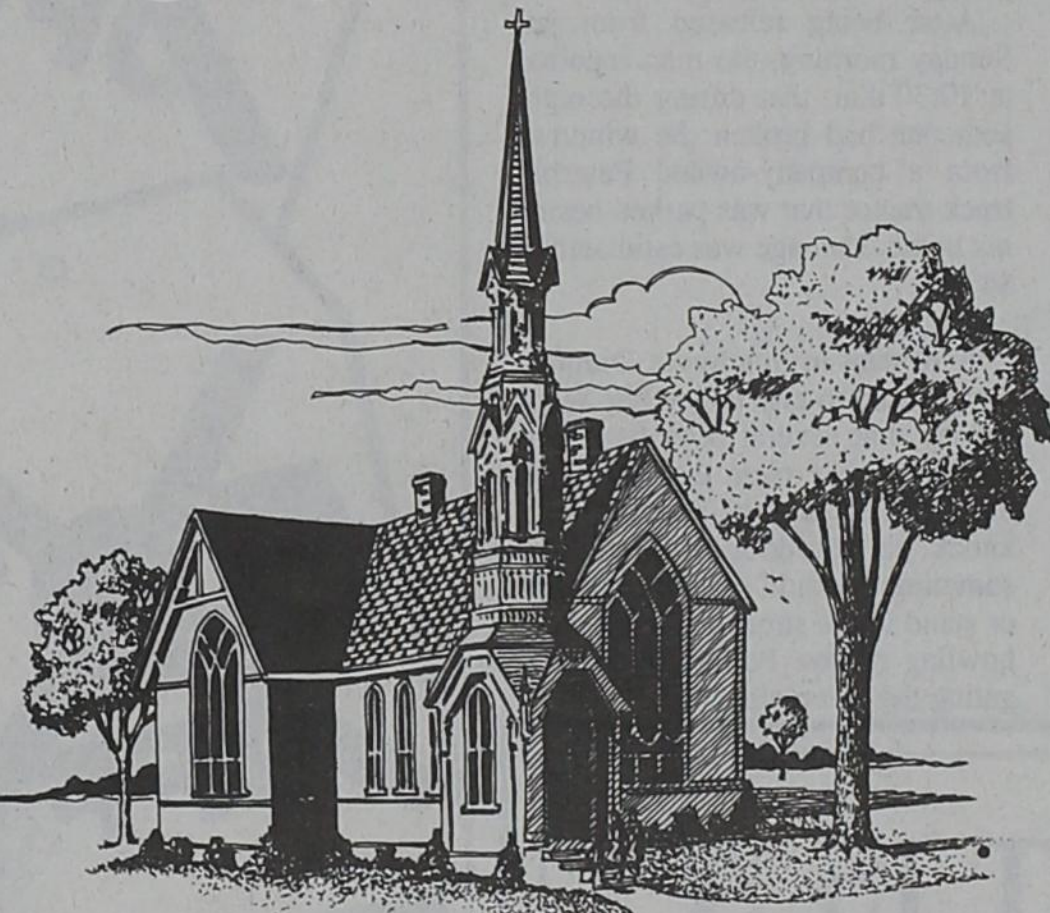

## Commissioners order courthouse generator

County commissioners spent much of their semi-monthly meeting Monday dealing with power and maintenance problems for the courthouse.

They also adopted an order to close Nazareth's city landfill, effective at the end of this month.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos presided at the meeting in the absence of vacationing County Judge Polly Simpson.

The commissioners awarded the contract for a 100-kilowatt emergency generator for the courthouse to Waukesha - Pearce Industries, Inc., of Pampa after opening four bids.

The Pampa firm's bid was \$17,786 for a Kohler generator with a John Deere gasoline engine. It was the lowest of four bids received; other bids ranged from \$19,117 to \$21,925 by firms in Amarillo, Odessa and Dallas.

The emergency generator will be installed in weatherproof housing outside the courthouse. The State Commission on Jail Standards ordered earlier this year that an emergency generator be installed for the county jail, and commissioners decided to buy one powerful enough to operate all courthouse systems.

The Waukesha - Pearce bid includes installation, housing, basic controls and tie-ins.

A roof leak has developed in the southwest corner of the new section of the courthouse, and the commissioners' court is weighing its options: Should it order a less expensive patch job with no guarantee, or spend a lot more money to have the entire new section re-roofed and get a warranted job?

The commissioners wanted to move quickly on the problem, and

even considered declaring an emergency so they wouldn't have to go through the time-consuming bidding process.

Several of them trekked up to the roof to look it over Monday, but when they couldn't get in touch with the only local roofer who has submitted a price proposal, they decided to postpone action two weeks pending further study.

County Tax Assessor Billy Hackleman told the commissioners that the state has authorized counties to hike their vehicle registration fee from \$5 to \$10. Vehicle owners pay the fee with their annual state registration.

"Several counties are considering it, but I don't know of any that have passed it," Hackleman said, adding that Castro County received \$40,000 through the \$5 fee last year.

The commissioners voted to table the issue pending completion of the 1990 budget.

The order to close the Nazareth landfill was a formality, since the landfill could no longer meet new State Health Dept. requirements. The City of Nazareth is negotiating with the City of Dimmitt to accept its garbage at the Dimmitt landfill.

In-service training for substitute teachers in the Dimmitt schools will be held Aug. 25 from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. in the middle school library.

## Police Calls

A car that was reported stolen was involved in two traffic accidents Saturday night before it was found abandoned east of Dimmitt.

Ramon Banda reported to city police at 1 a.m. Sunday that his 1974 Chevrolet Monte Carlo had been stolen from the Thriftway Supermarket parking lot while he and his wife were at the Mr. Burger nearby. He said the theft had occurred more than an hour earlier, at about 11:45 p.m. Saturday.

Banda told police that he left the keys in the ignition and that when he and his wife returned to the Thriftway parking lot, they saw their car heading south on South Broadway.

At 11:50 p.m. the car struck the right rear of a 1983 Ford driven by Brett Sheffy, then sped away, according to reports. The accident occurred in the 600 block of South Broadway and caused moderate damage to both vehicles, police said.

Then, 35 minutes later, the same car — reportedly going without headlights — struck the left rear of a 1977 Buick driven by Adrian Falcon. Police said the driver of the Monte Carlo was attempting to pass Falcon's car on Highway 194 at the time of the accident.

Damage was listed as moderate to both vehicles.

The wayward car later was found 1-1/4 miles east of the city on Highway 86, police said.

The investigation is continuing.

A Dimmitt woman reported to police at 1:12 a.m. Monday that her husband had come to her home and beaten her and slapped her daughter. About half an hour later the man went to the Sheriff's Office and said he wanted to turn himself in because he had beaten his wife. Officers said the man was intoxicated. He was jailed for investigation of aggravated assault.

After being released from jail Sunday morning, the man reported at 10:30 a.m. that during the night someone had broken the windows from a company-owned Peterbilt truck tractor that was parked beside his home. Damage was estimated at \$475.

A woman in Southwest Dimmitt complained to city police last Wednesday that several boys had been harassing her over the last three months. She said the youths would knock on her door and run, and sometimes would yell obscenities or stand in the street and make loud howling noises. Police are investigating the complaint.

The dance, which is free to the public, will be held from 9 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. Those attending are asked to bring blankets or chairs for their own comfort.

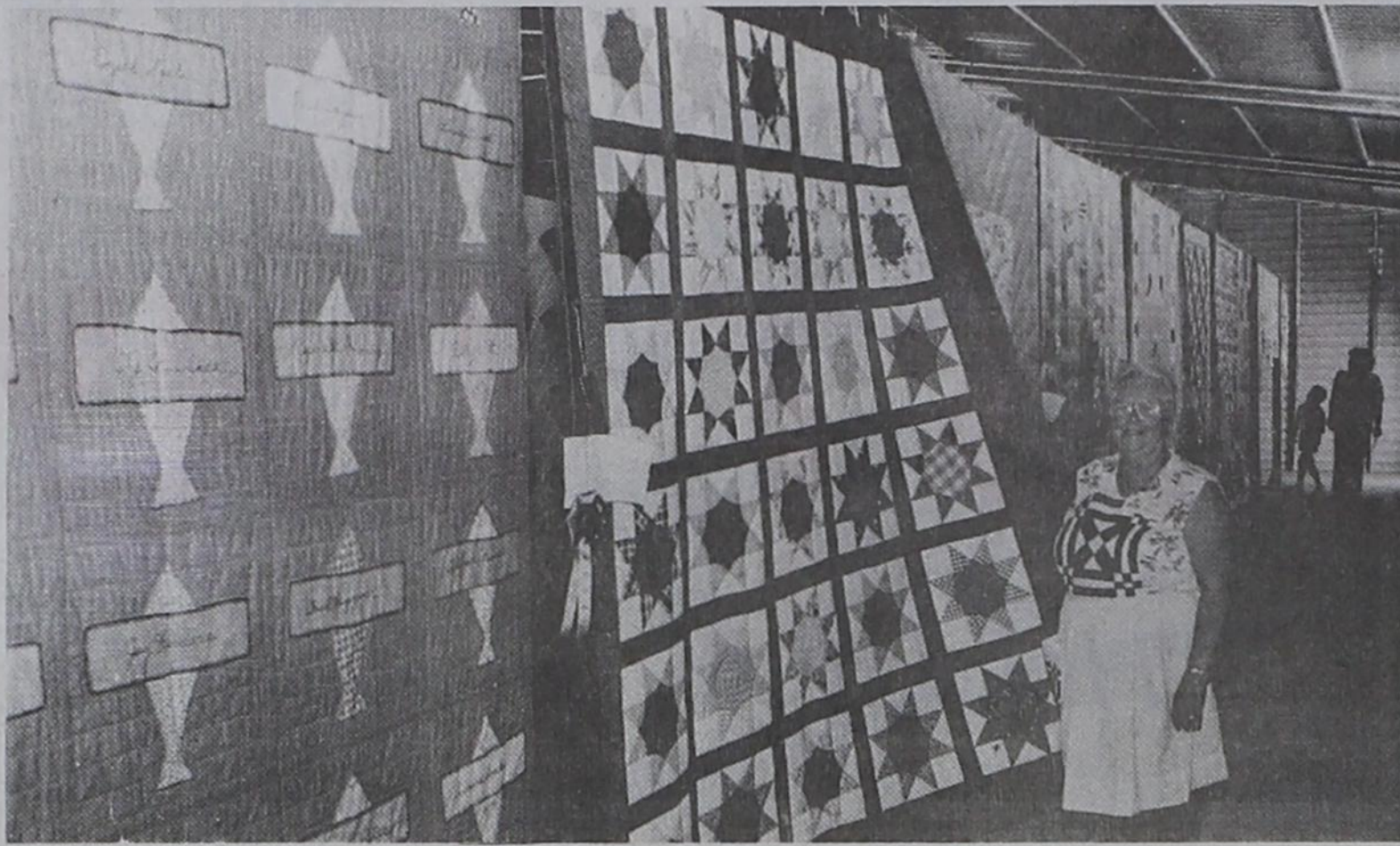
## Early settlers plan reunion

## Mammograms to be offered at Harvest Days health fair

The mobile breast cancer detection unit from Odessa will be in Dimmitt at the Expo Building Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the health fair during the Harvest Days celebration.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifica-

tions, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do

monthly breast self-exams and have regular breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule: A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39; a mammogram every one or two years between the age of 40 and 49; and an annual mammogram for women 50 and older.

## Children must be immunized before school starts this fall

With the new school year just around the corner, the Texas Medical Association encourages parents to check their child's immunization records. Although outbreaks and epidemics of killer diseases like polio and diphtheria don't pose the threat they once did, infectious diseases can still spread among us.

Children are not born immune to infectious diseases, they must be immunized against them. More than any other preventive health-care practice, immunizations started in childhood and kept up to date can save money, misery and lives.

In Texas, proof of vaccinations for six communicable diseases including polio, tetanus, measles, rubella (German measles), mumps and diphtheria, is required by law for all children registering in day care or public schools. Pertussis, or whooping cough, vaccines are required for children less than five years old in day care and public schools. The Texas Medical Association recommends the pertussis vaccine be extended for children through age six.

Because of vaccinations, only two cases of diphtheria and one

fatal case of polio have been reported in Texas in the past 10 years; however, some preventable diseases persist because parents allow the original vaccinations to expire without getting the necessary follow-up booster shots. In 1988 the Texas Dept. of Health recorded outbreaks of measles, mumps, rubella, pertussis and tetanus. About 3,000 cases of measles were reported during an epidemic in Texas in late 1988 and early 1989. Victims of these diseases included unimmunized children as well as adults who had allowed their immunizations to lapse.

Parents should follow their physician's advice in scheduling the necessary vaccinations and boosters, and in keeping accurate records for each child. Parents who are not sure if their children's vaccinations are current should update their records now, to be ready for the upcoming school year.

The Texas Medical Association reminds you to immunize your child. Although outbreaks of vaccine preventable diseases are now less frequent in Texas, the diseases can still spread among us.

## TAES field day set

Ongoing efforts of scientists to improve the area's agricultural mainstay, cotton, will be presented at the 80th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Sept. 12 at Halfway.

Trailers will transport visitors along research sites at the High Plains Research Foundation, which is located 14 miles west of Plainview on US Hwy. 70. Tours will be conducted from 1 to 4 p.m.

Enhancing cotton fiber quality is a major effort at the research facility, said Dr. John Gannaway, TAEX cotton breeder. The development of F2 hybrids and glandless varieties will also be discussed on the tour. Other cotton research areas include Ascoshyta blight resistance and earliness. The public will also be able to view performance trials of the latest commercial varieties, strains and hybrids under development by TAES, Gannaway said.

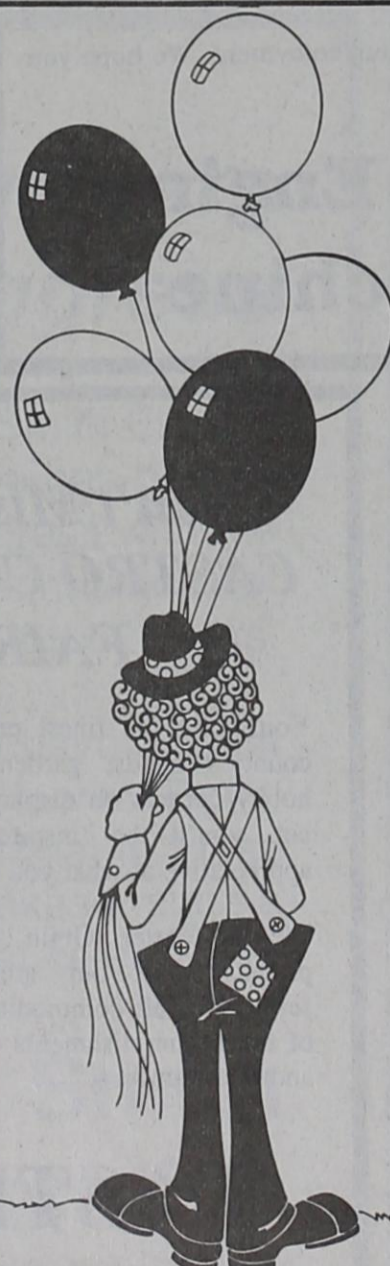

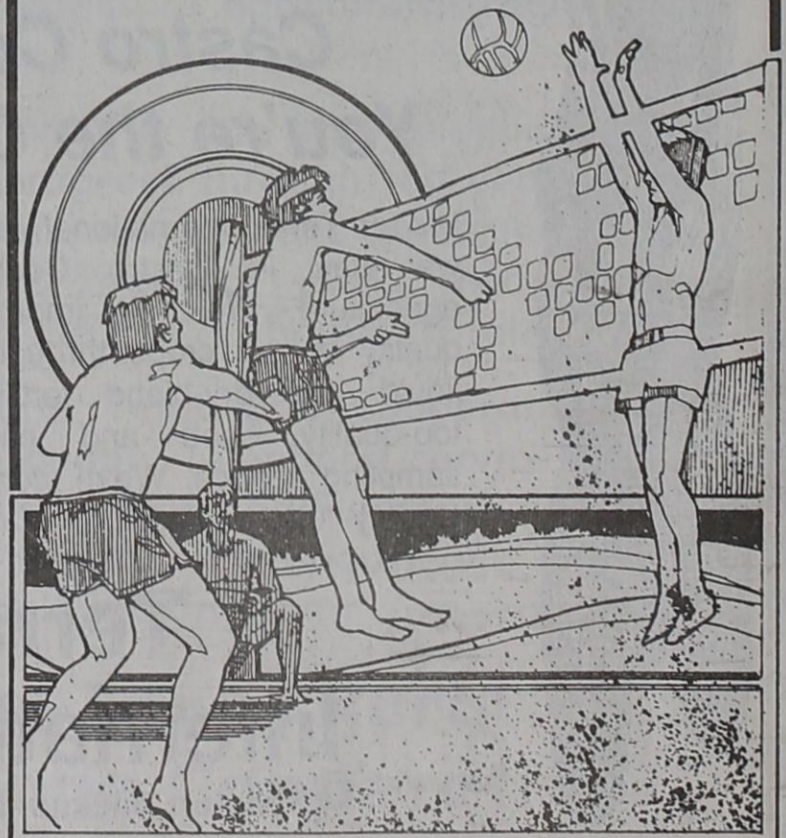

## Chili cook-off to spice up Harvest Days

The 1989 Castro County Harvest Days celebration will be "spiced up" this year with the addition of a new event—a chili cook-off.

The chili cook-off will be held Saturday, at the Expo Building, and chili cooks are invited to register for the contest from 12:15 to 12:45 p.m. that day.

The cooks will have a meeting at 12:30 p.m. and the showmanship competition will follow from 1 to 2. Entries must be turned in to the judges at 3:30 p.m. and the judges will rule on the best at 4:30.

Detailed rules about the event, entry forms and other information can be obtained at the office of Marshall Young, Castro County Justice of the Peace, in the courthouse; or the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce office at 115 W. Bedford in Dimmitt.

Individuals entering the chili

cook-off should bring a cooking stove and fuel, such as "Coleman-type" propane or white gas; a cooking pot, cutting board, knife, water, cooler (for meat and liquid refreshments), paper towels, spoons, can opener and matches; meat (hand cut or chili grind), spices, and other chili ingredients; a table and chairs for cooking and sitting. Cooking spaces are usually 10X10 feet. If you are competing in showmanship, you should also bring props, costumes and other gear.

The chili must be cooked on site the day of the cook-off. It must be prepared from scratch, using no commercial chili mixes. It must contain no fillers such as beans, macaroni, rice, hominy, etc. The chili must be prepared in a sanitary a manner as possible and the cook must be willing to taste his or her own creation. The cooking con-

ditions are subject to inspection. The chili must be prepared in the open, not in a motorhome, tent or other enclosed area.

The chili competition is blind judged on aroma, consistency, red color, taste and aftertaste.

Only one judging cup per chili pot can be turned in for judging. Each head cook must bring the judging cup, 2/3 to 3/4 full of chili, to a designated place at a set judging time.

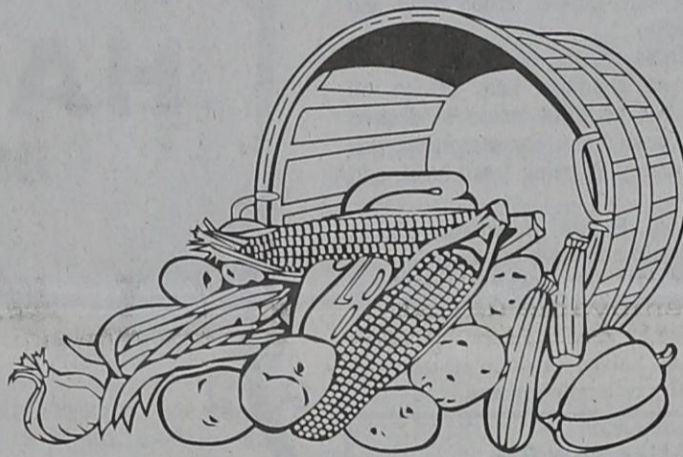

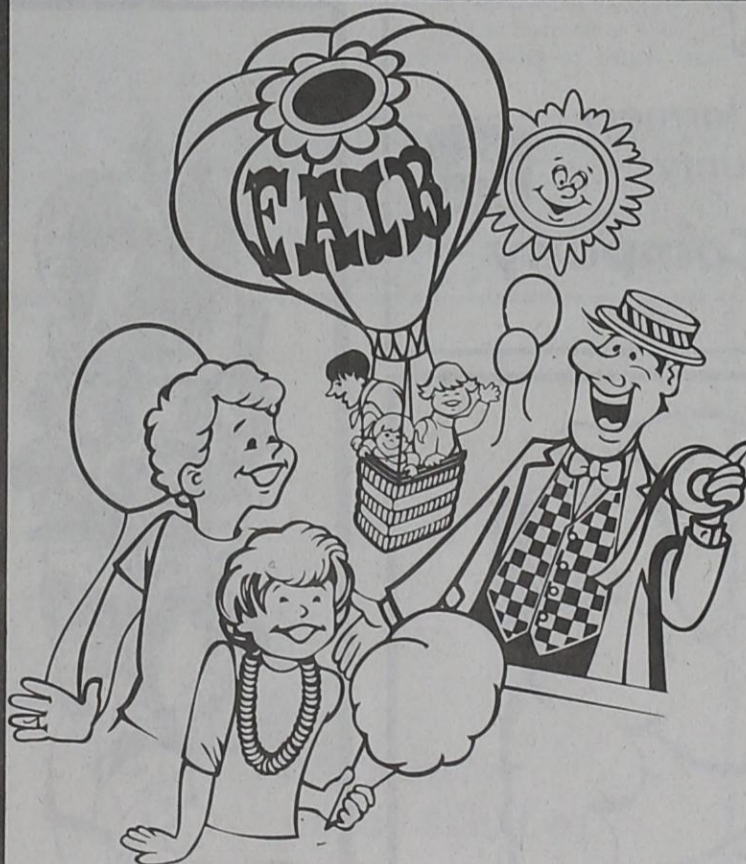

## Preserve tomatoes for full flavor all year

If only some of the juicy ripe tomatoes that weigh down summer vines could be stored through winter. The pale, cardboard imitations marketed then bear little resemblance to the full-flavored, intensely red tomatoes enjoyed for a brief few months of the year.

But, alas, ripe tomatoes won't keep like turnips in a root cellar. They must be eaten in their time. The most you can do is try to preserve their essence. One simple, rewarding way is to make sauce.

Basic tomato sauce freezes well, with little loss of flavor. It's a boon to cooks who like to "eat Italian" in all its Neapolitan robustness. For some, that means a simple plate of spaghetti. For others it's a cheese-laden lasagna or manicotti or a hearty sausage and pepper hero. As Italians know, many of the best dishes start on the tomato vine.

For making sauce, Carol Guthrie, Texas Dept. of Agriculture home economist, recommends buying tomatoes that are ripe and feel heavy. If you must wait a day or two before cooking, choose some that are less ripe. To prevent spoilage,

place the tomatoes stem-side down and away from direct sunlight and warm areas of the kitchen.

Tomatoes should be peeled and seeded for a smooth sauce. To peel, blanch whole tomatoes in boiling water for about 10 seconds. The skins will slip off easily. To seed, halve the blanched tomatoes and squeeze until the seeds fall out. If necessary, remove the remaining seeds with your fingers.

Sauce for pasta requires a few basic ingredients in addition to tomatoes—olive oil, garlic and onion.

"Bell pepper and carrots can also be used," said Guthrie. "Carrots add sweetness that counters the acidity in the tomatoes. They also boost the sauce's nutritional value. Herbs and spices should be added according to taste."

A light tomato sauce will cook in 20 minutes, not including prepara-

tion time. For a thicker sauce, simmer 45 to 60 minutes. To make tomato paste, continue cooking several hours until the sauce is reduced by half and sticks to the back of a spoon. Paste can be frozen in ice cube trays, emptied into freezer bags and stored until time to use.

Finished sauces make versatile accompaniments for fish and chicken as well as pasta.

### FRESH TOMATO SAUCE

- 2 T. olive oil
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 minced garlic clove
- 1 medium bell pepper, seeded and chopped
- 6 medium, fresh tomatoes, peeled, cored and coarsely chopped
- 1-1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1 tsp. dried or 1-1/2 T. chopped fresh basil
- 1/2 tsp. dried oregano
- 2 T. minced fresh parsley

Heat oil in heavy saucepan or Dutch oven. Add onion, garlic and bell pepper. Cook and stir over medium heat just until vegetables are soft but not brown. Add tomatoes, salt, pepper, dried basil and oregano.

Cook, stirring occasionally, over low to medium heat 50 to 60 minutes or until sauce is desired thickness. Taste for seasoning. Stir in parsley. If using fresh basil, add now.

Cool. Freeze, if desired. Makes approximately two cups.

NOTE: This recipe yields a chunky sauce. Sieve mixture for a smoother sauce. Every ingredient can be halved or doubled to make smaller or larger batches.

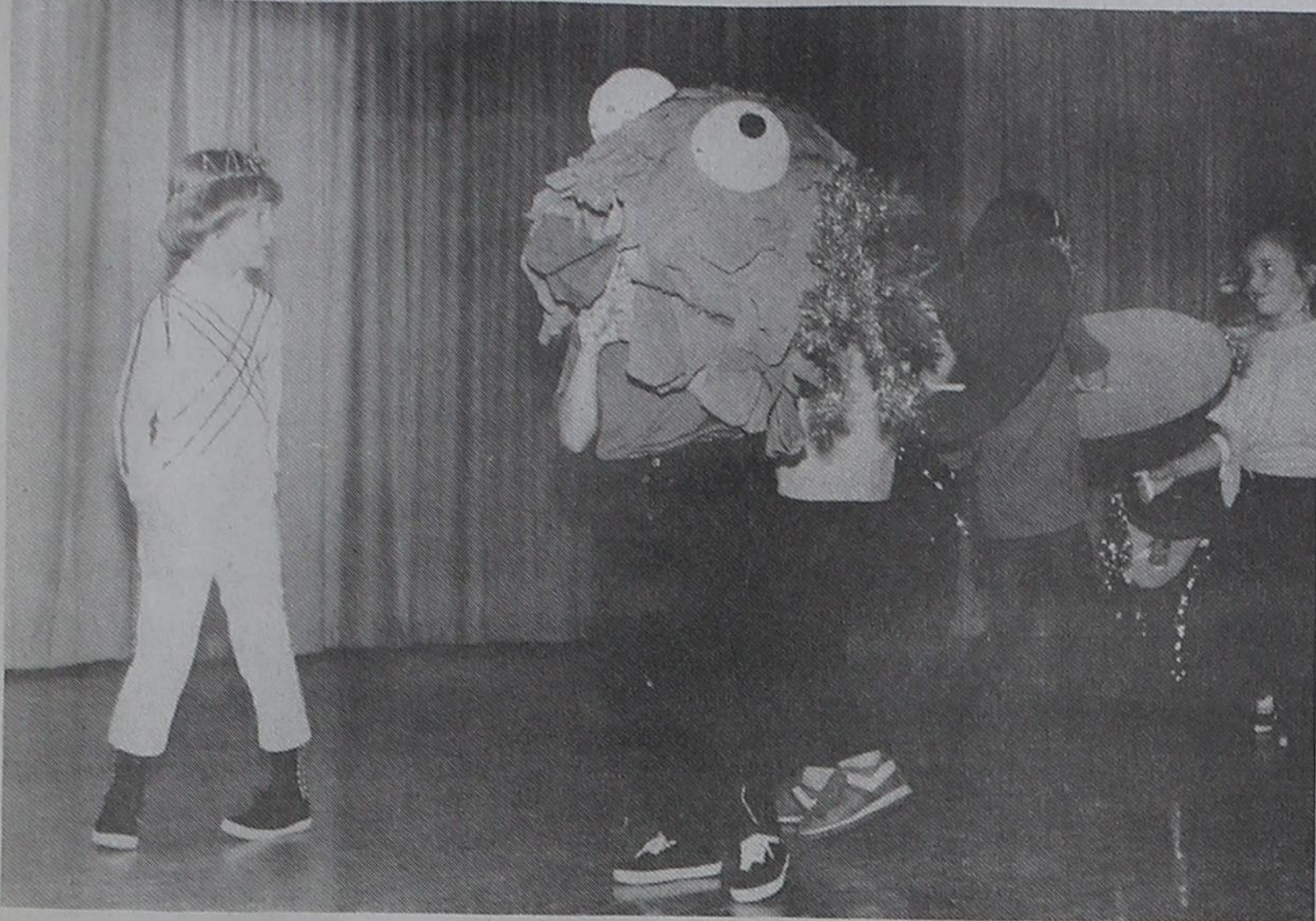

## Social Security in Castro County

A person who applies for disability benefits under either the Social Security or Supplemental Security Income programs may be considered for services offered by the state vocational rehabilitation agency.

These services include counseling and guidance, medical and surgical treatment, physical therapy, training in the use of prostheses, and job training and placement.

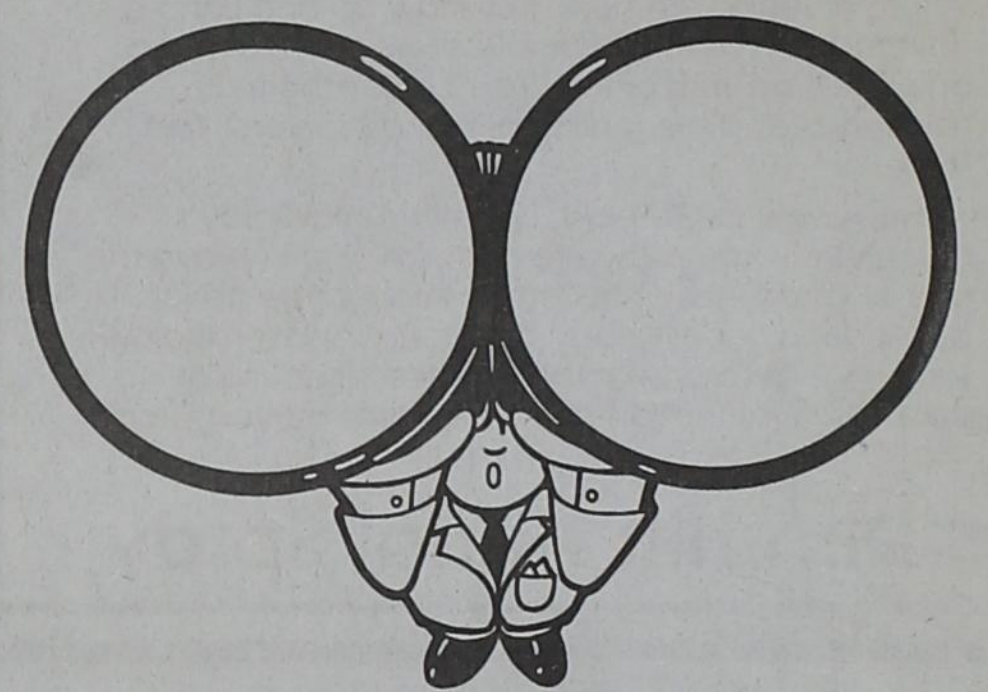
Applications for disability payments are sent by Social Security to the appropriate agency in the State in which the applicant lives. It is this agency that determines whether the individual is disabled, or blind within the meaning of the law. If it is determined that the available vocational rehabilitation services would assist the applicant in obtaining employment, he or she is interviewed by a counselor. Payments cannot be made if vocational rehabilitation services are offered but are refused by the applicant without good reason.

Although disability checks usually stop shortly after a person's condition improves to the point that he or she can once more work, an exception applies to beneficiaries

who were disabled at the time they started an approved vocational rehabilitation plan, but who medically recover before the program is

completed. In such cases, payment may continue if it is believed that the vocational rehabilitation services will permit a return to work.

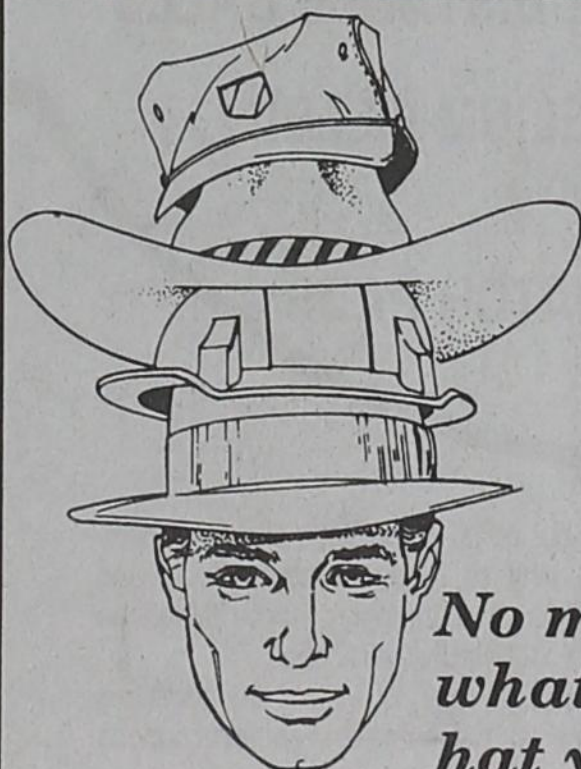

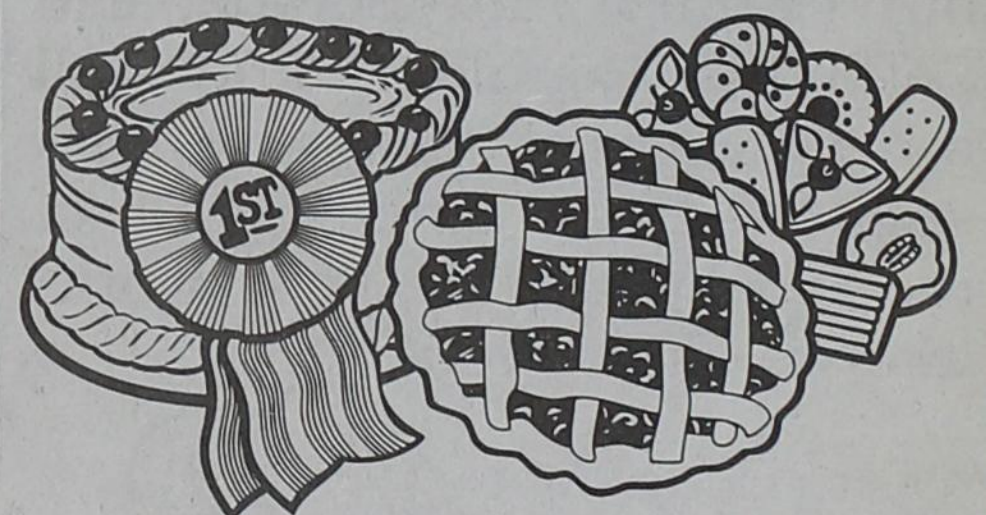

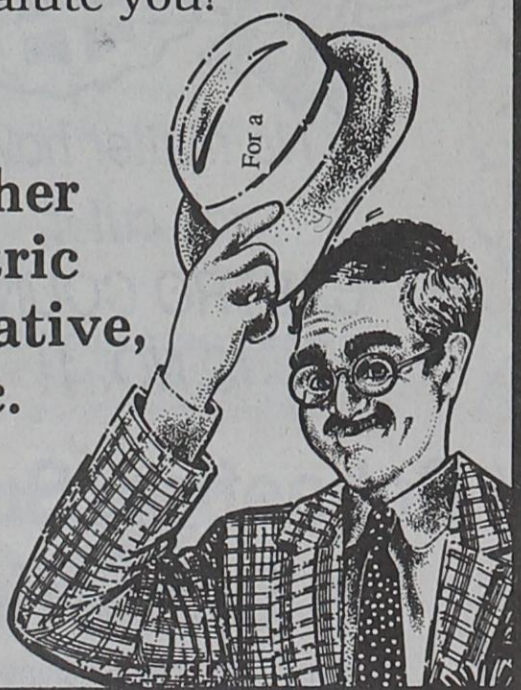
