## Railroad Outlook

### Burlington and Others Pointed this Way

Last week's issue of the Stamford Tribune gave an account of a visit to Stamford, Texas, by the officers of the Burlington lines, looking for a temporary terminal, pending the final connecting of the Stamford & Northwestern which is built as far as Dickens City, on to Tucumcari and to the great coal fields round about Dawson.

The Albuquerque Journal in its issue of the 28th gives a full account of the plans of the Burlington to enter Dawson by way of Tucumcari. The matter of right of way, for example, has already been arranged for between the Burlington interests and the Phelps-Dodge people for the entire route of the connecting link between Tucumcari and Dawson.

The question is, will our people of Portales allow this road to go through Texico or Clovis? Or will we get busy, present our superior advantages and get this road? What do you say, neighbor?

Another railroad Portales could easily get is the road which taps the T & P at Roscoe and is built to Snyder, Curry County, and is projected to Lubbock and to Plainview. But a glance at the map will show even the casual observer how this road could lead a branch into Portales and never have to cross even a creek or a sand hill and also how such a road would connect us with a straight direct line to Fort Worth.

Now what are we going to do with the propositions? Are we going to drift along and let these roads leave us high and dry? Or shall we not rather, organize our Commercial Club and get busy and stay busy till we get one or both of these lines.

### Prosperity of Dry Towns.

From one of our exchanges we clip the following statement of the result of a study of conditions in wet and dry towns. The saloonists complained that some comparisons were unfair because they were between towns in different sections. Accordingly two California towns twelve miles apart were selected, San Bernardino and Riverside, the former having been wet since 1900 and the other dry during the same period. The comparison follows:

It is important to act with hearty cooperation with the Board in this matter in order to promote public health and save our town from heavy financial loss.

**Charles Woodcock Leaves**  
 After a residence in this vicinity for almost ten years, Mr. and Mrs. Chas Woodcock and little William left Saturday, the 22nd on the north bound train for Corpus Christi, where they will reside temporarily, pending permanent settlement. Coming here at a very early date, before there was any town, and when the country round about was given over to the cowboy, the saloon and its attendant evils, and when there was but one store, viz, that of Uncle Josh Morrison's, Mr. Woodcock built a small store house where the large establishment of Blankenship-Woodcock Mercantile Company now stands and began to gather trade. As there were no hotels in those days in Portales, many, many times he has cleared off the counters and the floor of his store, called every blanket and comfort he had in stock into the service of the cowmen who literally crowded his store house to the limit and changed it, for the time being, into one huge sleeping apartment.

But the tide of immigration turned this way, hotels were built, the people were not long in discovering the business genius of Chas. Woodcock nor in rewarding the hospitality and kindness of him and his good wife. The little store was soon doubled in size, then a side room added on and some three years since the huge ware house and fenced enclosure which occupies acres of ground, was found to be a necessity. And the little "one-horse" store on the corner, meantime, has grown into a thirty-thousand dollar stock company which gathers trade 100 miles to the west, 100 miles to the south and at least 75 miles to the east and which does a quarter of a million dollars business annually.

Mr. and Mrs. Woodcock have witnessed and helped to bring about equally great changes in the lines of religious work and intellectual advancement in Portales community. In the upper room over one of the saloon buildings Mrs. Woodcock taught her Sunday school class regularly and upon one occasion a spread was placed over the bottles of whiskey and the fixtures in one of the saloons and the minister delivered his sermon to the assembled audience, being none the wiser. But Mr. and Mrs. Woodcock lived to see these days pass and to help in the erection of a Methodist, a Baptist, a Presbyterian, and a Disciples church house in Portales and to see the saloons driven out forever.

They were equally good helpers and promoters of intellectual improvement in the community, Mrs. Woodcock giving music lessons in piano and voice all times of the day and night in those early days and rejoicing with the community when the days of our splendid public school came on as well as joining in with the Woman's Club which has literally helped on every good thing in Portales. In the homes and social life of our little city, in all the movements for intellectual advancement, as well as in the churches, Sunday schools, banking institutions and commercial life of Portales, we will miss this excellent man and woman and little man and wonder how and by whom their places will be filled.

## "Not Guilty."

This was the verdict in the case of the Territory vs. Dr. O. C. Boone, recently tried in court at Portales on a charge of "practicing medicine without a license." As is doubtless well known there is a supposed law in the Territory providing that no person shall be permitted to do scarcely anything toward the relief of the sick and afflicted unless he is armed with a "Medical Doctor's sheep skin" and signed by the board known as the Allopathic board. Those who are endeavoring to relieve suffering humanity without the use of poison medicines; but from a thorough knowledge of the human system in all its details and the logical use of nature's own means of relieving suffering, suggested an applied by the patient afflicted, himself, are designated as outlaws by this sort of statute.

It was on a charge of relieving the sick by this system of non-medical healing that Dr. Boone was tried. It was shown in evidence that there was a sign on his residence as follows "Dr. O. C. Boone, Healer." It was further shown that numbers of persons had been cured by this system and in no instance was there ever shown to be an injury done to any one.

A young lady testified that the best medical doctors in a large city had said that she would not live unless a dangerous operation was performed. Doctors in other places told her the same thing. She had taken treatment of Dr. O. C. Boone and not only did there not seem to be any necessity for an operation; but she had improved wonderfully and was practically well.

A jury of six of the best citizens of Roosevelt county were empaneled to try the case. They heard the testimony and the argument. It was shown that the Supreme Courts of other states had held practically similar statutes unconstitutional; in fact there was very little difference in the statutes as they all seem to have come from the same source.

A great crowd of citizens came in and filled the court room, showing the interest the people felt in a case of this kind, where a citizen of good reputation was being prosecuted for relieving the suffering of his fellowman.

Attorney T. E. Mears, of Portales, defended Dr. Boone and made a splendid argument. Great credit is due him for winning the case so readily as it is the first of the kind that has ever been won in the Territory. The jury was not out over five minutes until they returned with a verdict of not guilty and numbers of the crowd rushed up and shook hands with the jury and congratulated them on the justness of their verdict.
