## THE IRRIGATION PROJECT AROUSES MUCH INTEREST

### HUNDREDS OF CITIZENS SIGN PETITIONS—LETTERS ARE WRITTEN TO MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

These dry days are proving a great boost to the irrigation project. Following the meeting as recorded in last issue, petitions were printed in due form addressed to Hon. F. H. Newell, head of the Reclamation Service and sent to all parts of the valley to be signed by citizens. Hundreds of them have already signed their names to the petition and many others will do so as soon as the opportunity is offered. Mr. C. M. Dobbs has circulated one copy here in Portales and has secured more than three hundred signatures to it.

Numerous letters have been written to Mr. Newell, Delegate Andrews and various members of congress urging immediate action on the bill introduced by Mr. Andrews. Every citizen of the valley ought to write Mr. Newell

and Delegate Andrews as well as any member of Congress known to himself. Aside from a full investigation of this proposition by the Reclamation Service, the best way to make a believer out of Congress on the question is to prove our own intense conviction that the thing can be done and that we can't well get along without it. Sign the petition and then write letters to Washington and let us "stir up the pure minds of the brethren."

Mr. T. J. Molinari has spent a few days in the national capital this week in the interest of the measure, and as soon as a communication comes in from him we will be glad to publish it. Meantime let us be busy working at this, remembering that the difference between thirty dollar and three hundred dollar land is worth a little exertion.

## DRY FARMING CONGRESS Meeting in October at Billings, Mont., One of Much Interest to This Section

The Trans-Missouri Dry Farming Congress will meet at Billings, Mont., Oct. 25-29, this year, and it gives every promise of being a great meeting. We publish below a letter from Secretary H. B. Hening of the Immigration Bureau at Albuquerque. Mr. Hening is making preparation to give New Mexico a good chance and the Santa Fe makes a liberal offer of free transportation for exhibits. Roosevelt county ought to send up a large number of creditable exhibits. Next week we will publish further matter in regard to prizes, etc. Meantime The Herald will be glad to help in any way those who are interested in preparing products for exhibit on that occasion. Mr. Hening's letter follows:

Portales, N. Mex.  
Dear Sir:—The Trans-Missouri Dry Farming Congress to be held at Billings, Montana, Oct. 25-29, 1909, is to be the most important

gathering of the dry farmers since the industry became prominent. An international exhibit of dry farming products will be held in connection with the congress at Billings. It is very important that New Mexico be thoroughly represented at this congress and exposition. We have a greater area of dry farming lands than any other state or territory, and it is up to us to do what we can to see that the people of the country know it. The best way to do this is to send a big exhibit of dry farming products from New Mexico to Billings. We have secured from the Santa Fe railway an exhibit car, with the provision that two cars will be allowed if needed, and the railway has further agreed to carry this car to Billings without charge and to furnish a man to take charge of the exhibit. Therefore, all we have to do is to furnish the stuff. The better your exhibit the better the advertisement for your section. It is necessary to take this matter up now and push it in order to get results. This bureau will appreciate any assistance you can give us, and any activity you can stir up looking to an exhibit from the dry farming lands in your section. Yours truly,

This is dry weather, of course it is. Everybody expected some dry weather but not just like this. Meantime if you are blue don't say a word about it. Don't tell anybody else your troubles. You may find the other fellow feeling as you do, and when you get through with each other you will both be feeling worse. Whistle, if you can, and wait until the rains come and then you'll find this county move as never before.

The irrigation project is one of the greatest questions that ever came before the people here. And it is a realizable proposition if only all the people will work for it. Mass meetings could be held with good advantage at every school house in the valley. The more resolutions, petitions and letters we send to Washington, the sooner we will get a hearing. We are a long way from Washington, geographically and otherwise, and we'll have to make a noise in order to get the ear of congress.

With free transportation offered by the railroad company, there is no reason why we should not send up a good variety of exhibits to the dry farming congress at Billings, Montana in October. Even with irrigation such as we are trying to get now, there will be a great deal of dry farming here, for the probability is that only a portion of each farm within the irrigable belt would be supplied with water, and besides that belt is only limited in area and outside of it dry farming is the only method that is workable. No better advertisement for the country could be sent to that section than a fine showing of our products. Farmers, merchants and real estate men ought to take this matter up and see that something is done.

There is a question too often overlooked about democratic newspapers and their problems in New Mexico. Many sturdy democrats have come from the states, where they were ardent in their party affiliation, only to become inactive and indifferent as citizens of the territory. There are, it is true, some reasons why an honest adherent of the party should be apathetic here. We are cut off from participation in national campaigns and a dominating republican regime puts every possible ban upon democracy. The result is that democracy does not appear in its real strength and democratic papers suffer. That much applies to the rank and file of the party. There is a word which should be said for the benefit of leaders or would be leaders, some of whom are so attracted by tempting republican pie that they allow themselves done up in questionable relationships with the opposing camps until the election season comes around, but on the approach of the said campaign become beautifully loyal to the party and the paper. As the Herald sees the situation, this thing has occurred in far too many cases in New Mexico, and so far as we are concerned we will be found, when those times of reckoning come, boosting for the man who has all the while boosted for democracy—and for us.

**Heavy Filings.**

Santa Fe, June 9.—Sixty thousand acres were filed upon in the land office at Santa Fe during the month of May, according to a report just made public. The report shows among other things that New Mexico is rapidly filling up with homeseekers; that public land is going with a rush, and that within a few years the greater part of the public land in the territory will be growing crops.

Santa Fe is only one of the five land offices in the territory and three of the others do a heavier business. This indicates that within ten years every acre of the 45,000,000 acres of public land in New Mexico will be filed upon, that is, if the May record is kept up, and indications are that it will increase materially this fall.

The Seventeenth National Irrigation Congress will be held in Spokane, Washington, U. S. A., August 9 to 14, inclusive, 1909.

**OBJECTS.**

The four great objects of the Congress are to "save the forests, store the floods, re-claim the deserts and make homes on the land."

We aim to demonstrate to the West, the wonderful development possible through irrigation, drainage, forestry, deep waterways, good roads and home-building; and to show to the East the economic importance to the whole country of this development.

**MEMBERS.**

The personnel of the National Irrigation Congress will be as follows: The permanent officers of the Congress. The President of the United States. The Vice-President of the United States. The members of the Cabinet. Members of the United States Senate and House of Representatives. Governors of States, Territories and Insular Possessions of the United States. Members of State, Territorial and Insular Irrigation and Forestry Commissions.

**DELEGATES.**

**Forest Service Clerk Examination.**

Albuquerque, June, —The United States Civil Service Commission announces an examination June 16, at Phoenix, Prescott, and Tucson, Arizona; Fayetteville, Ft. Smith, Little Rock, and Texarkana, Arkansas; Gainesville, Jacksonville, Key West, Miami, Pensacola, and Tampa, Florida; and Albuquerque and Las Vegas, New Mexico. This examination is held to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill existing vacancies, at \$900 per annum, in the position of Forest Clerk in the Forest Service, and vacancies requiring similar qualifications as they may occur at salaries of \$900 to \$1,200 per annum.

Eligibles from this examination will be subject to appointment in Forest Supervisors' offices on the Apache, Sitgreaves, Garces, Crook and Coconino Forests in Arizona; on the Datil, Gila, Zuni, and Alamo Forest in New Mexico; on the Ozark Forest, Arkansas, and on the Chocotawhatchee Forest in Florida. Many of the places of appointment are very desirable from a residence point of view.  
 The duties to be performed consist of carrying on office correspondence, keeping up books and conducting routine business during the absence of the Forest Supervisor in the field. Forest Service does not furnish either houses or subsistence. Appointees will be expected to report at places of employment at their own expense.  
 The examination will consist of spelling, arithmetic, penmanship, letter writing, copying from rough draft, and typewriting and stenography. Applicants should at once apply either to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or to the secretary of the board of examiners at any place mentioned above, for application form 304.
