FIRST SIX THOUSAND ACRES SIGNED FOR

More Than Two Thousand Acres Subscribed On Second Plant!

Most Intensely Enthusiastic Meeting Ever Witnessed in Portales. Fifteen Hundred and Twenty Acres More Subscribed. Uncle Josh Morrison, Uncle Joe Lang, Mr. Holmes, and Mr. C. H. Rittenhouse himself, also Mr. Neal were among the new ones who subscribed 80 to 200 acres. Mr. Joe Howard gives a Stetson Hat to two new subscribers. Coe Howard gives a Pair of Shoes and a Hat to Mr. Sanders, who subscribed 100 acres and who was further rewarded by a nice dress for wife from Mr. W. I. Luikart.

The People are Working over Closing of Proposition and Working for Another Six Thousand Acres.

Things are moving in Blank Water Draw (about eight or ten miles away). The farmers in that vicinity have subscribed over 1,000 acres to our irrigation plant and believe themselves able to get three or four thousand acres subscribed shortly. And they are ready to petition the Western Construction Company actually to include them in the proposition, but to build a trolley line from Portales to Melrose. What do you say, Melrose? Do you know of anything that will help to build your town like this proposition which the farmers are urging upon you? Wake up, get busy, speak out and let Portales know what you will do.

OVERESTIMATING NEEDS

Many of the Requirements Can be Met Without Cash. No Room for Discouragement. Banks Ready to Help When Farmers Have Done Their Best.

There can be no doubt that scores of farmers are overestimating the amount of cash actually needed to come into the irrigation project. The fact is there are not half a dozen men who have subscribed land who cannot arrange with well and drill men to put down the required well for some stock, some feed or produce, or for work in return, or for some part of your land, without the necessity of digging up the cash, unless you have the cash to go that way. Then again, why may you not use your own teams to the horse power in drilling the wells, also make a hand yourself while the work is going on, and thus save at least half the expense of your well. Then these men in town who are building the casing for your well, they have to live and may be able to use other things you have besides the cash. And who knows, every one else wants a piece of this irrigable land, maybe one of them would like a few acres of year land, which can be turned into the hands of almost any week. Again, why may not you be able to get busy at your odd times and haul your gravel or crushed rock, practically without cost, to build your concrete dam, weir, and foundation for motor. The fact is, in digging your motor pit—which you can also do by yourself, at least by exchanging work with some neighbors—and in sinking your well, you will pull half enough gravel out of the well to construct this concrete work. Then make Brother C. W. Morris some of your extra grain for enough cement and hire you a head man, at the proper time, and go to work and build these concrete works yourself. "WHO SHALL BE OUR MOSES?"

Address Delivered by Hon. J. E. Cockrell of Dallas at Banquet Given to Gov. Harmon.

The following are the remarks of Hon. J. E. Cockrell at the banquet to Gov. Harmon. Mr. Cockrell said in response to the toast, "Who Shall Be Our Moses?"

"Mr. Toastmaster and Fellow Democrats: My subject implies that the hosts of Democracy are under the thralldom of the Pharaohs of wealth and are seeking a Moses to deliver them from the bondage. Repeated failures in efforts to escape from the Egyptian darkness and attain the light of freedom have bred a spirit of pessimism in some, and no star of hope brightens their horizon. These believe that we have only reached the stage of the bullrushes in the search for our Moses. Some of us endeavor to take a more optimistic view of the situation and feel that even if we have not reached the stage of the burning bush beckoning to our Moses and disclosing his identity, yet the people are chafing under the unequal burden of taxation, and are ripening a revolt against present conditions.

"The trustmasters who are our taskmasters, harden their hearts more and more to the woes of an overtaxed people. They demand an undiminished tale of bricks, and that without straw. The campaigns of our great leader for the last dozen years have been almost as irritating to the pampered favorites of protection as the plagues of Egypt, and at last they became so terrorized by the fear of losing their mastery that they solemnly pledged themselves to give relief to the people by a revision of the tariff laws. So soon, however, as they secure by false promises a renewal of their power, they stiffen their necks in their pride and again demand the full count of brick. And now their Pharaoh is traveling over the country with an army of retainers trying to make the people believe that he has cured them of all their ills.

"There are limitations to what an intelligent people will submit to, and it is upon this idea that we may justly hinge our hope of a revolt.

"We have an issue that presents an opportunity for victory, but we need not only a Moses to lead us, but we need an united and harmonious army. The tariff is the only National issue left to the Democracy. On this we must present a united front in order to win, and unless we can do so we shall scarcely deserve to win.

"We have troubles here, too. The promised land looks so far away to some of our people that in their hunger they are tempted by the flesh pots of Egypt to leave the line of march, forgetting the final goal—the absolute destruction of the protective tariff—and seek to satisfy their greed by demanding protection on the articles in which they are immediately concerned. They thus yield the principle. Our people are taught by some that if we must pay a protective tariff on the manufactured products of lumber, hides or wool, for example, then lumber, hides and wool must also be protected. Those who thus say 'if we must pay on these manufactured articles know full well there is no 'if' about it; under present conditions it is a case of 'must,' and the true statement of their argument is: 'Because' we must pay a protective tariff on the manufactured products of lumber, hides and wool, therefore it is right to pay a second protective tariff on the raw products also." But I digress. These matters will be settled by the constituted authorities and the issue will be properly presented in the platform. Who shall carry the banner?

"In this it is not so much a question of principle as of expediency. We of the South will present an unbroken front, regardless of the leader, but we ask one who will take us across the waters of the political Jordan, however much they may be swollen by the flow of the bankrupt campaign funds of the protection barons. We have been often led to the top of Pisgah and permitted to look over into the promised land; but next time we want to cross over. We have shown our loyalty by following the same gallant leader three times to honorable defeat. While he has not proved to be our Moses, yet we will hail him as our high priest of Democracy; he is our Aaron; he is the chosen spokesman for our Moses. Were the choice of a leader left to Texas, with one glad acclaim we would show our delight in honoring Charles A. Culberson. If, however, expediency, sectionalism or tariff divisions in the South preclude him, many eyes would probably turn to that rising star of the Central West, Governor Marshall of Indiana. Perhaps, however, his newness to public life and his want of a National reputation may render him unavailable. We hesitate to turn to the East or to New York, where they give us a Democratic majority of 100,000 today when we don't care, and tomorrow when we do care give a 400,000 Republican majority. This would seem to exclude that section. The lamented Johnson is no more. Our leader should be a man of National reputation, experienced in public affairs, of exalted character and recognized ability. Since the South is probably not to be considered at this time, he should come from what is known as the great West. He should be a vote-getter, trusted and honored by his home people, and by them vouched for to the Nation as a true and tried Democrat.

"If Ohio shall again show her wisdom by electing her present Chief Executive to a second term, then by affirmative reasoning as well as by the negative process of exclusion, there will be nothing logical for us except to say to our distinguished guest of the evening, 'Thou art the man.'—Dallas News.

Alcohol a Foe to Human Progress.
(By Morning Journal Special Leased Wire.)

Washington, Nov. 7.—Alcohol and alcoholism are two of the real
and substantial enemies of moral, artistic and commercial progress
of the human race, according to the report of the United States
delegates to the Twelfth International Congress on Alcoholism,
made public by the State Department today. The delegates were
appointed by Secretary Knox as one of his official acts. The con-
gress was held last July in London, and twenty-five governments
were represented, the delegates of each country in the general
opinion that alcohol not only was unnecessary to human life and
in fact but was inimical to both.
The departments of the United States Government were
represented by the State, Navy and Treasury. Twelve
representatives were named by all of them, and they signed
a common declaration, the signing of which is to continue
being regarded as dangerous to public health and morals, and
obstacle to national moral, commercial and military greatness.
While the congress urged the necessity of imposing the most
rigorous restrictions on the sale and traffic in alcoholic liquors, it
regarded as equally important the need of educating the younger
generation to a true knowledge of what alcohol is and what its
effects upon the human system are. The delegates believe that
the numerous recent discoveries as to the harmfulness of drunken-
ness and even of modest drinking, also, should be set before chil-
dren in order that they may see the danger of the practice. The
American delegates sum up this phase of their report by saying:
"Increased teaching as to its character and influence should be
provided, to conserve industrial efficiency in the commercial
competition of nations, as well as to promote two of the chief ob-
jections of government, the public health and morals."
The value of this method of combatting the growth of the
liquor habit is emphasized in the report. While acknowledgement
is made that the organization of associations of juvenile abstinence
is useful, it is declared, the chief reliance should be placed on
scientific temperance education in the public schools as a means of
reaching the public mind of errors about the effects of alcohol and
substituting the facts that science is declared to have evolved as to
the use of the beverage, even when taken in small doses.
The United States, according to the report, made an unusually
good showing in its exhibits. Germany also was to the fore with
its scientific collection of colored charts showing the effect
of alcohol on the family and upon society. Especially
effective it is said, were the stereopticon slides of the National
Temperance League of Great Britain.
These stereopticon pictures, the report goes on to show, were
largely reproductions of municipal posters that are being issued
by the city councils of about 100 British boroughs. The posters
lead in a popular way with the deleterious effects of alcohol on the
human system, and are posted by order of the regular officials of
towns in which the sale of intoxicants is licensed. This fact, how-
ever, does not prevent the official from warning the public against
the use of alcohol.
The relations of drunkenness to crime was a subject that re-
ceived much attention at the congress. The Chief Justice of Eng-
land, Lord Alverston announced that in his belief 90 per cent of the
crimes passing under his observation were due to drink.
Judge W. F. Pollard, of St. Louis, Missouri, who presides at the
Second District Police court in that city declared that of the cases
passed upon by him fully 85 per cent of those convicted could charge
their degradation to the use of alcohol. Lieut. Col. Hardy of
Edinburgh, Scotland, coincided with Judge Pollard as to the per-
centage of crimes occurring in the former Scotch capital.
Judge Pollard won the support of the delegates from twenty-
three countries for the adoption of his plan to send sentences
in the case of any first offender who is brought into court
charged with drunkenness. This involves such best of
the temperance cause for the first year, the sentence is
to be suspended, and the offender may be released on condition
that he abstains from drinking until he can obtain a prison sen-
tence. The plan is to be put into effect in the next year, and
had it been settled, the penalty to be imposed to keep faith
with the temperance cause, several of the delegates, arguing in
favor of the temperance cause, were of the opinion that the
principle, however, was regarded as admirable, and 100 delegates urged its adoption
by the various governments of the world.
While the congress took no action looking to international or-
ganization for work, the meeting resulted in the organization of
two new auxiliaries. One is the International Prohibition Federa-
tion which proposes to wage an educational campaign among adults,
and the International Abstaining Teachers' Union, a society
composed of teachers in the public schools and universities who will
pledge themselves to promote the temperance education of youth.

manent Committee on Temperance of the Presbyterian church
of the United States; George F. Cotterhill, Seattle, National Grand
Chief of the Good Templars; Dr. T. D. Crutcher, Hartford, Con-
necticut, secretary, Society for the Study of Alcohol and Narcotics;
Edith Smith Davis, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, superintendent, Society
Temperance Instruction Society of W. C. T. U.; Dr. Reid Hunt,
of the United States Marine Hospital and Public Health Service; G.
Rowland Munroe, Newark, N. J., of the New Jersey Anti Saloon
League; Surgeon F. L. Pleadwell, U. S. N.; Judge W. F. Pollard of
Saint Louis, Mo.; Charles Scanlon, Pittsburg, secretary Permanent
Committee on Temperance of the Presbyterian church of the
United States.

and build a good one with your own hands. And certainly you can grab your land, break it, make your main ditches and laterals and level the ground for the water. Then what is left? The cash, my men, for the suction and discharge pipe. Then you will need something for seed. How much? That depends upon what you want to plant. For garden and row stuff it will not be very much. For alfalfa it will be more. For alfalfa about \$2.00 to \$2.50 an acre. But couldn't you make out and do well without putting your entire 40, 50 or 100 acres in alfalfa the first year? But suppose you wanted to start an orchard, sow some alfalfa, plant a good garden—allowing half your irrigated land for all this—and putting the other half in general crop, would it take more than \$1.25 to seed your 40 or 50 acres? Then wouldn't \$250 to \$300 be plenty with which to launch into the irrigation of 40 acres under our plan? And might you not get right down to business and make some turn or other and get hold of a part of this? Anyhow, never get down flat on your back and beg until some man who is a stronger man than you puts you there, and then give him such a tussle that he'll think he has been in a fight before he gets you there. And when you've made every turn you know, give some man a chance to buy you out in part. If this fails—and it will not fail if you don't get your sights too high—then come to the banks and tell them the straight thing, and see if they don't help you. Now, don't lie down flat on your back and whine. Get up and get busy; turn over your end of this valley and find a way or make a way to get into this proposition. The Herald has agitated this proposition in season and out of season and worked at it day and night that these poor people might have a better day and at least get a decent price for their land, if they could not come into the plant. And now this better day has come, and with it comes the question: Are you going to lie down and give it up, sell your land for what you can get and hustle? No, and we don't believe you will do it. But we want you to get busy so that when the roll is called you'll be there.

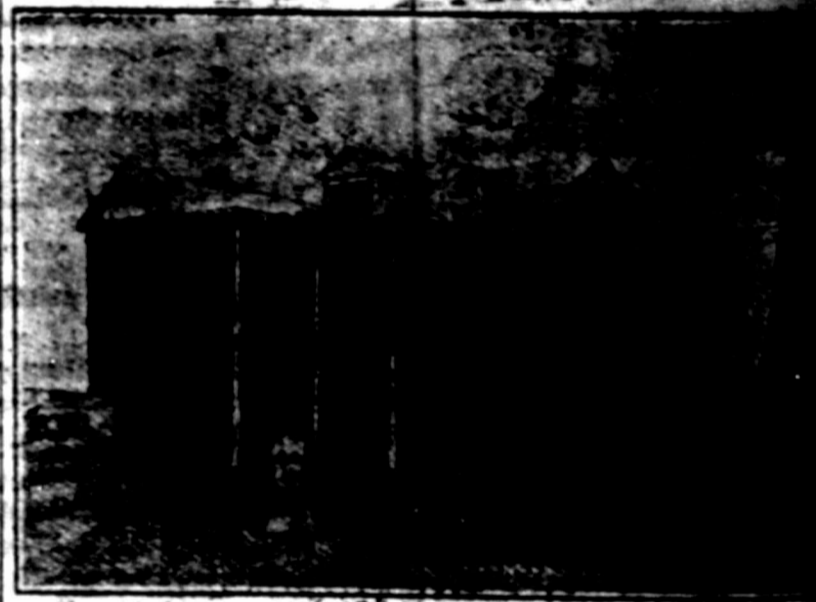
this proposition to the attorney general; he referred my question to the commissioner of the land office at Washington, D. C. The answer that I got from him is this: "A mortgage by the entryman prior to final proof, for the purpose of securing money for improvements or for any other purpose not inconsistent with good faith, is not considered such an alienation of the land as will prevent him from submitting satisfactory proof. In such a case, however, should the entry be canceled for any reason prior to patent, the mortgagee would have no claim on the land or against the United States for the money loaned."

Any bona fide settler under the preemption, homestead, or other settlement law, shall have the right to transfer, by warranty against his own acts, any portion of his claim for church, cemetery, or school purpose, or for the right of way of railroads, telegraph, telephone, canals, reservoirs, or ditches for irrigation or drainage across it; and the transfer for such public purposes shall in no way vitiate the right to complete and perfect the title to his claim (as amended by act of March 5, 1905).
