A motion was made by James Kindle and seconded by Terry Pollard to permit the students and their sponsors to go to Denver, with the classes raising as much money as possible to offset the cost, but to report to the board at the Nov. 9 meeting.

Retooling for the future

MISD upgrades computer classes

Advanced technology is being introduced to Muleshoe I.S.D.

Although computers have been used in Muleshoe schools since 1989, a new program will take technology education to the next level.

"We are starting a unique approach to teaching. We call them technology labs," said Don McElroy, technology coordinator for Muleshoe I.S.D.

Each technology lab will be equipped with modules each designed to teach a different subject.

Students will have worked at each of the modules by the end of a school year. In each module they will have a specific project to finish before they can move to a new one.

Subjects include numerics, aerospace engineering, robotics, desktop publishing, and multi-media operations.

There will be technology labs in the elementary, junior high and high schools. The labs will increase in difficulty and diversity as students progress each year.

"The elementary students are learning keyboarding now. This will give the students a basic knowledge and understanding of computers," said McElroy. "It's amazing to watch the elementary kids in these labs. They are so eager to learn," he said.

A technology lab will be set up in the junior high school this summer. The high school labs will be installed as soon after that as possible.

"We want to get the community involved," McElroy

said. McElroy believes that these technology labs will better prepare the students for the future.

"Whether the student goes to college, a trade school, or immediately begins working on the family farm, he or she will need to understand technology," McElroy said.

The labs will also help students make choices about what they would like to study after high school.

"I think these labs are a good idea for the kids," said Darrell

Mason who farms near Lazbuddie with his three sons. "The computer is here to stay. It sure won't hurt them to learn about them," he said.

Muleshoe is predominately an agricultural community. Technology in agriculture is becoming more advanced, and farmers are having to keep up. McElroy wants to offer classes for adults to teach them computer skills.

"The new tractors, cotton strippers, irrigation systems, they all involve computers these days," said Sheldon Ma-

son. "By learning to use technology as a tool, we can make our farm more productive," he said.

"I still think you need to use your own mind and think, but I believe things will keep getting better with the use of computers," Darrell Mason said.

"A lot of people are afraid of technology replacing us, but someone has to tell the computers what to do," McElroy said. "I hope this new curriculum will teach the students just that."

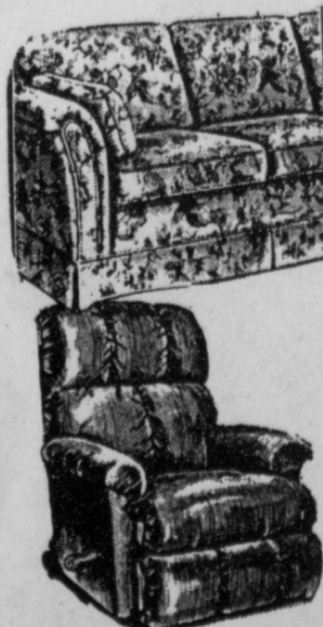

Hooten, who was sponsored for membership by Buck Johnson and her father-in-law, Robert Hooten, said that being in Muleshoe is different from living in bigger cities.

"You have to *make* a life for yourself here by getting involved," said Hooten, who has lived in Dallas, San Antonio and Houston.

"That's right," agreed Martin, who was sponsored by her employee, Ronnie Holt, for membership in the club.

"I started getting involved in the community (after moving back to Muleshoe from Springfield) by going to football games. Joining the Lions gives me something else to do."

Hooten said Muleshoe feels much safer than Houston, where razor wire was used as a security measure at her condominium, making it look "like a maximum security prison."

Hooten said living in Houston, where she had to drive an hour just to get to work, made

her wonder "if the money you make is worth what you have to go through to make it."

The two new Lions club members already are armed with tickets for three rifles for a drawing at the Lions' breakfast at the beginning of pheasant season on Dec. 9. And they're talking excitedly about getting up at 2 a.m. to help with the preparations.

About being a Lion, Hooten protested, "I want a rule book! I want to know how to act—and when they are just pulling my leg."

Membership in the Muleshoe Lions Club is open to anyone in the community, according to its president, Stacy Conner, who said he looks forward to the enthusiasm and service of the two women.

"Our club has had an open gender policy for quite some time, but we had never been approached by women wishing to join our club," Conner said.

Rotary Club News

The Muleshoe Rotary Club met on Nov. 14 at noon in the Bailey County Civic Center.

Mike McDearmon called the meeting to order and asked Lonnie Adrian to lead the group in prayer. Thurman Myers led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mark Morton introduced his guest, Doyle McAda.

Robert Lepard brought the program for the day. Lara Adair, an archaeologist from the Museum of Texas Tech University, discussed activities of digs at the Lubbock Lake Landmark area.

This area was discovered in 1936 when dredging activities were underway in an attempt to revitalize an underground spring. A large number of bones were uncovered.

Exploration began 1939. The area consists of 300 acres of which less than five percent have been explored. Remains of ancient buffalo and prehistoric bear have been uncovered.

Most of the activity currently is in the Archaic Zone.

Artifacts discovered include many stone tools and animal bones. Flint and pottery remains have also been found indicating a flourishing trade among people.

The site is open and during the summer time dig activities can be observed. Displays of finds are also open for public viewing.

The meeting was closed with James Bell being selected as the Polio Plus winner of the week.

Spade shot 52 percent (27-for-52) from the field. And during timeouts, the Eagles looked winded.

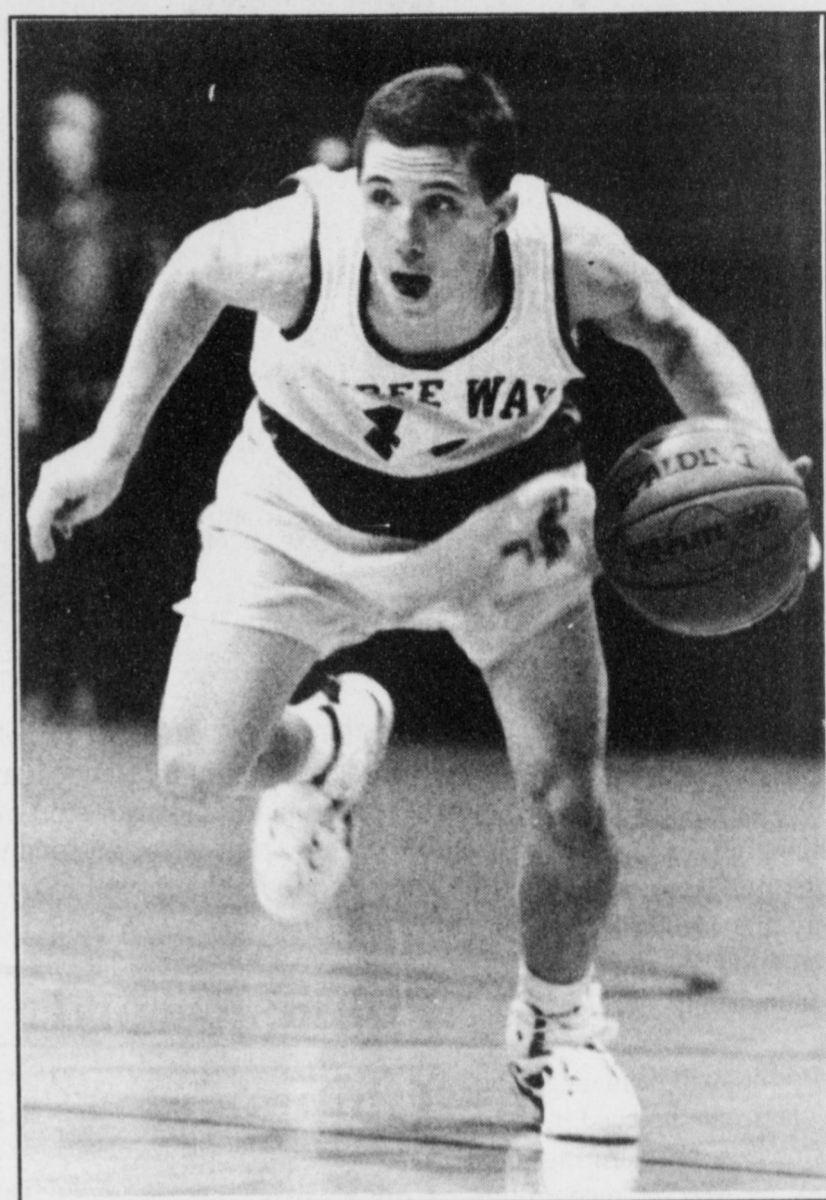
"We're going to be a run and press team, it's just going to take a little more time to get into basketball shape," Turner said.

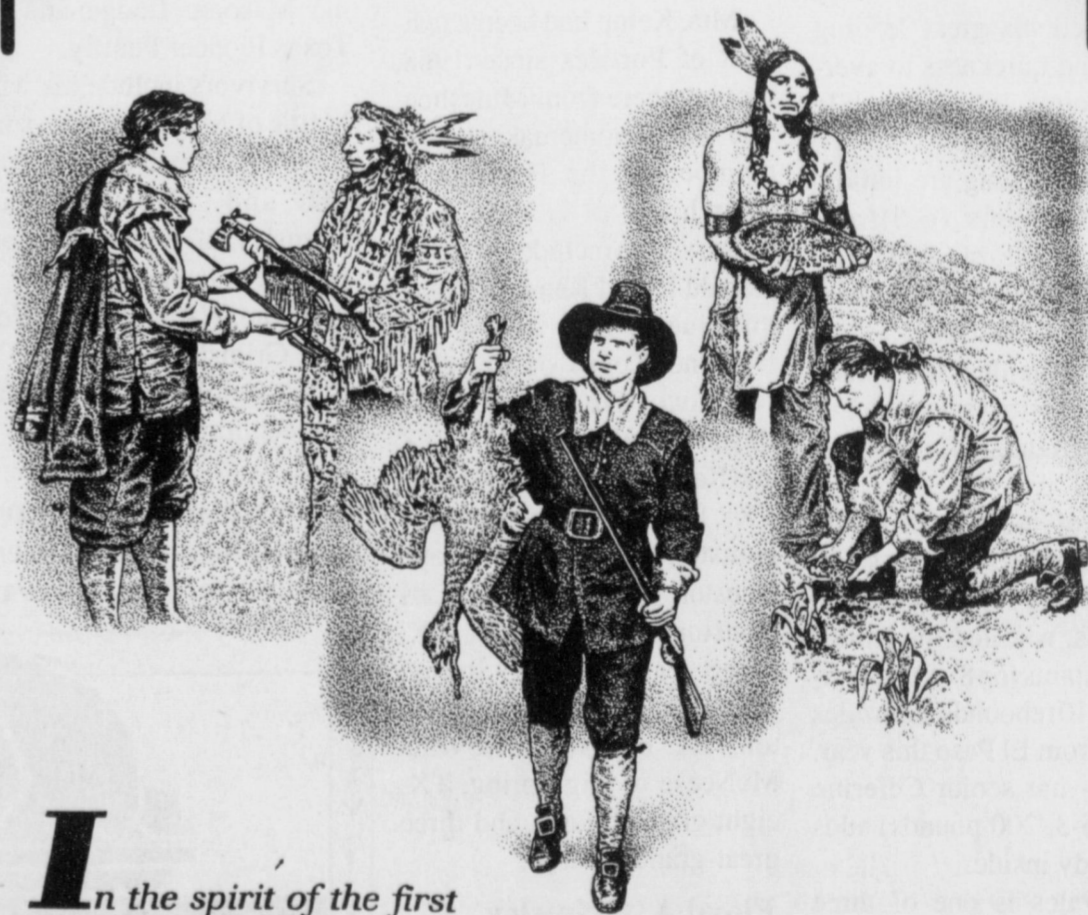

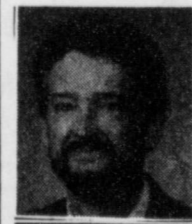

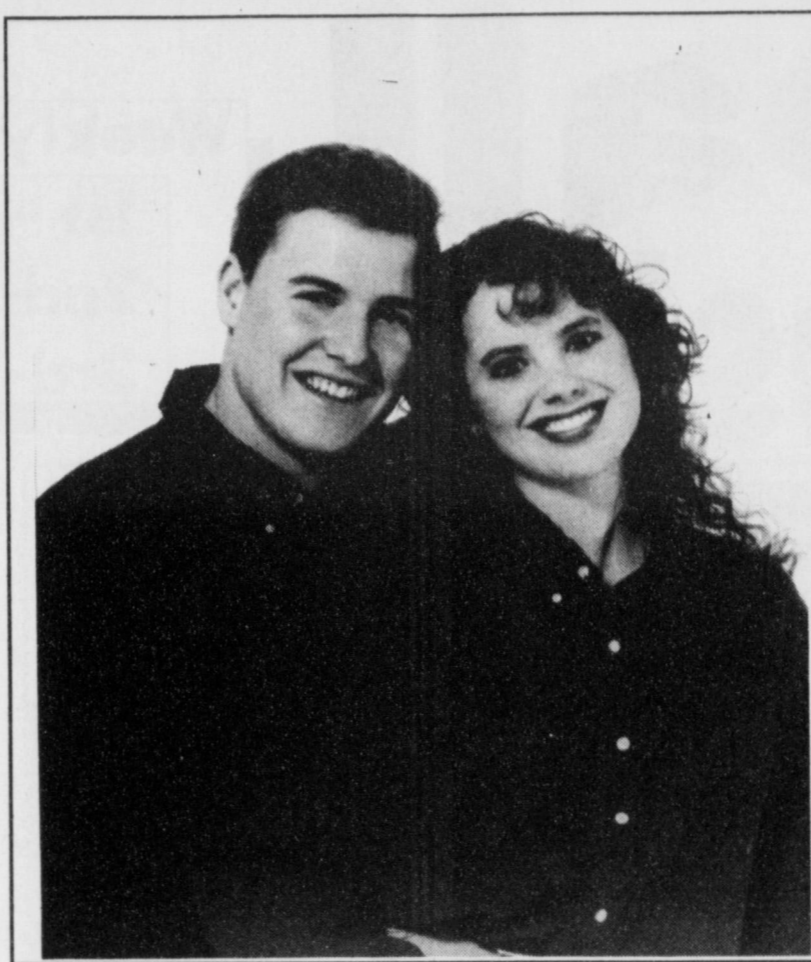

a very common one. Ten men, all afflicted with leprosy, stood at a distance. Very likely, they stood at that same place day in and day out begging. Certainly, they always "stood at a distance," away from those uninfected with the disease that bound them together like a cruel chain.

That phrase says a lot about their plight. From the time the boils and white patches on their skin, leprosy's calling card, appeared, they stood at a distance, forever separated from family and friends, from society in general. The only thing which could have separated them farther from society would have been death itself. Death would have been kinder.

of DeShazo's cafeteria, got 17 years of experience at the high school cafeteria before asking to be transferred to DeShazo when the manager's position became vacant.

She orders the food for DeShazo as well as heading up the cooking of breakfast and lunch. She describes being a lunchroom lady as "different days—different things." The hardest part, she said, is getting started. "I like the little ones, and I've always liked to cook."

Beth Webb, in her first year at the cafeteria, is the meat cook. She said the work is harder than she expected because of "so many big pans—a lot of lifting."

But it's also a lot of fun she said. "I enjoy the people I work with—and the kids."

Pam Martinez, who usually handles the salad bar, got her

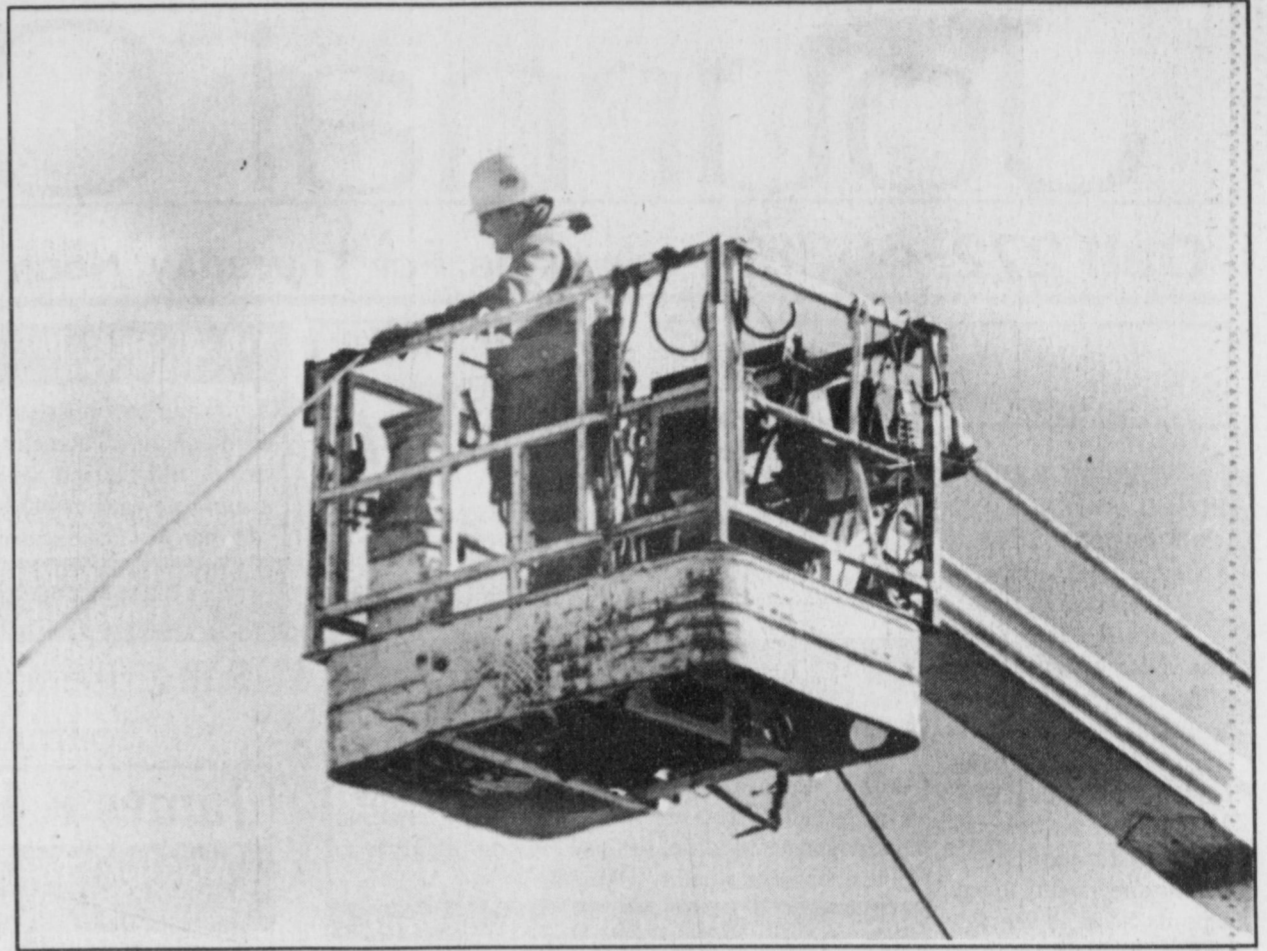
training at Connie's Place in Muleshoe. What does she like about her job? "I enjoy the people, and the work I do."
