Advanced technology is being introduced to Muleshoe I.S.D.

Although computers have been used in Muleshoe schools since 1989, a new program will take technology education to the next level.

"We are starting a unique approach to teaching. We call them technology labs," said Don McElroy, technology coordinator for Muleshoe I.S.D.

Each technology lab will be equipped with modules each designed to teach a different subject.

Students will have worked at each of the modules by the end of a school year. In each module they will have a specific project to finish before they can move to a new one.

Subjects include numatics, aerospace engineering, robotics, desktop publishing, and multi-media operations.

There will be technology labs in the elementary, junior high and high schools. The labs will increase in difficulty and diversity as students progress each year.

now. This will give the students a basic knowledge and understanding of computers," said McElroy. "It's amazing to watch the elementary kids in these labs. They are so eager to learn," he said.

A technology lab will be set up in the junior high school this summer. The high school labs will be installed as soon after that as possible.



Rotary Club News

The Muleshoe Rotary Club met on Nov. 14 at noon in the Bailey County Civic Center.

Mike McDearmon called the meeting to order and asked Lonnie Adrian to lead the group in prayer. Thurman Myers led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mark Morton introduced his guest, Doyle McAda.

Robert Lepard brought the program for the day. Lara Adair, an archaeologist from the Museum of Texas Tech University, discussed activities of digs at the Lubbock Lake Landmark area.

This area was discovered in 1936 when dredging activities were underway in an attempt to revitalize an underground spring. A large number of bones were uncovered.

Exploration began 1939. The area consists of 300 acres of which less than five percent have been explored. Remains of ancient buffalo and prehistoric bear have been uncovered.

Most of the activity currently is in the Archaic Zone.

Artifacts discovered include many stone tools and animal bones. Flint and pottery remains have also been found indicating a flourishing trade among people.

The site is open and during the summer month dig activities can be observed. Displays of finds are also open for public viewing.

The meeting was closed with James Bell being selected as the Polio Plus winner of the week.

Gray finished with a gamehigh 20 points as the Lady Longhorns evened their record at 1-1 in the non-district game.


Melanie McCaul led Three Way (1-1) with 13 points and 10 rebounds.

Longhorns run past Eagles, 74-50

MAPLE - Running at every opportunity and crashing the boards like waves on the beach, Spade High School beat Three Way, 74-50 here Friday night.

With Kenny Trotter (21 points) and Cody Jackson (16 points) leading the way, the Longhorns fastbreak looked like stampede at times.

And when Spade wasn't converting on the break, they were attacking the boards. The Longhorns owned a 52-38 rebounding edge.

Spade first-year coach Bryan Baty had a simple explanation for his team's helterskelter style.

"That's what these guys do best. We have to do something, we're short."

Jesus Perez (16 points) and Kyle Kindle (15 points) led a Three Way comeback in the third quarter that cut Spade's led to seven, 46-39, with 1 1/2 minutes left. Perez and Kindle each scored six points each in the Eagles' 12-4 run.

But Spade (2-0) cranked up its running game in the fourth quarter, outscoring Three Way 24-9 over the final eight minutes.

"All things considered, I saw some bright spots," first-year coach Mike Turner said of the Three Way's first game of the year. "The kids worked hard most of the time. It's a new system. Sometimes, they'd fall back to their old habits, habit we're trying to break them of."

Because of football Three Way had just one week of practice. Friday night was the first time the whole starting lineup played together.

Spade, which doesn't play football, had been practicing for three weeks and it showed. They were a half-step quicker to the boards and loose balls, and their transition game was in midseason form.

Trotter, Jackson and Santos Garcia were constantly pushing the ball up floor and getting behind the Eagle defense, resulting in easy baskets.

Spade shot 52 percent (27for-52) from the field. And during timeouts, the Eagles looked winded.


"We're going to be a run and press team, it's just going to take a little more time to get into basketball shape," Turner

Three Way managed to slow the pace down in the second half, but then appeared to be running on empty the final eight minutes.

Mason hoping for growth spurt

Young and inexperienced, the Muleshoe High School boys basketball team figures to suffer through some growing pains this season.

Hopefully, it's not a case of the terrible two's for Muleshoe second-year head coach Ralph Mason.

"We're going to have to kind of learn as we go along," said Mason. "We were hoping to have three returning starters and some others that played some varsity ball."

But injuries and academic difficulties have pared the number of returning starters to one—at least for a couple weeks.

Senior Josh Slayden was

the only returning starter on the floor when the Mules (0-1) played Denver City Saturday.

Slayden scored 15 points (3 of 7 from 3-point range) in the Mules' 70-63 loss at Lorenzo Tuesday. The 6-1 wing figures to be Muleshoe's most consistent outside shooter.

Senior Daniel Garbarino played against Lorenzo (9 points), but had arthroscopic knee surgery Thursday and is expected to miss 2-3 weeks. Garbarino (6-3) is the Mules' leading returning scorer, averaging 14.8 points and 5.7 rebounds per game last year.

Another returning starter expected back next month is



We Can Learn a Lesson from a Leper

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus . . . was met by ten lepers who stood at a distance. lifted up their voices, and said, 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us'" (Luke 17:11-13).

The pathetic scene Jesus witnessed that day as he entered the village was, sadly,

a very common one. Ten men, all afflicted with leprosy, stood at a distance. Very likely, they stood at that same place day in and day out begging. Certainly, they always "stood at a distance," away from those uninfected with the disease that bound them together like a cruel chain.

That phrase says a lot about their plight. From the time the boils and white patches on their skin, leprosy's calling card, appeared, they stood at a distance, forever separated from family and friends, from society in general. The only thing which could have separated them farther from society would have been death itself. Death would have been kinder.

A leper was a living soul chained to a corpse, his own body rotting away, numb and unfeeling, technically alive but visibly dying inch by inch.

As I thought about their plight, I found myself looking at my hands. How would I face life if they were mangled and leprous, and modern medicine was out of reach?

Then I realized that I was looking at the wrong spot. I should have been looking at my heart, for it is there that all of us have been infected with a leprosy worse even than the terrible disease that afflicted those poor men. A more ponderous chain than physical suffering binds humanity. It is called sin, and its hallmark is the malignancy so deep within us which shouts, "Not Thy will, but mine be done."

If you know the story, you know that Jesus healed those ten lepers. You probably also remember that only one of the ten returned to thank Him.

If you know THE story, the story of the Cross, you know that Christ knelt and prayed, "Not my will, but Thine be done", and died to deal once and for all with the far more serious leprosy which has infected every child of Adam.




