### Value of the Birch.

Old writers in mentioning birch trees seldom failed to say solemnly that they were useful to grow branches with which to give boys thrashing. Turner regards the supply of "flexible, pendent branches" for purposes of punishment as the chief merit of the tree. Colwell has based his estimate of the birch chiefly on its use in the supply of rods as instruments of punishment, for he writes: "The civil uses whereunto the birch serveth are many; as, for the punishment of children, both at home and at school; for both an salutary as a punishment upon them to quiet them when they are out of order, and, therefore, some call it make-peace." In ancient Rome the faces of the lictors, with which they cleared the way for the magistrates, were formed of birch, and their influence was usually sufficient to insure a rapid dispersion of men assembled where they would impede the passage of the administrators of the law. From that time to within a comparatively recent period the birchen rod was regarded as one of the most important deterrents of juvenile delinquency.

### English Horse Exhibition.

Annually a public exhibition of work horses is held in Regent's Park. The horses, groomed to the last hair, their manes and tails decorated with gay ribbons, their harness clean and bright, and their wagons and drays sleek and shining, are inspected at the gates by veterinary surgeons, and if they pass they are reviewed by street department and other city officers, and the drivers of the best cared for horses are awarded substantial money prizes. This annual ceremony is believed to have great influence.

### Heavy Demand for Root.

Elihu Root served as secretary of war at a great pecuniary sacrifice. His salary as a government official was a mere drop in the bucket compared to what his income as a corporation lawyer would have been. As soon as it was announced about two months ago that Mr. Root would leave the war department on February 1, letters began to come in asking for his legal services. Retaining fees were forced on him before he even had a chance to talk with persons who sought to engage him. This thing kept up to the day he left the war department. He was obliged to turn down many of the offers he received, and it is safe to say that he could have taken on enough work that came unsolicited to keep him busy for the next two or three years.
