Recommends Legislation on New and Important Subjects.

He Believes Such Laws Would Curb Growth of Fortunes to Dangerous Proportions.

Washington, Dec. 2.—The notable features of President Rooseveit's annual massage to congress are his appeal for the enactment into law of several bills introduced into congress last winter and spring; his views on the pegro problem; the scoring he gives those whom he terms "preachers of discontent;" the stand he takes for the control of corporations by the federal government under the interstate commerce clause of the stand he takes for the control of carpotations by the federal government under the interstate commerce clause of the constitution, and his recommendation for an inheritance and income tax law.

Many other subjects common to messages of the chief executive are touched upon, but the ones mentioned are by far of the greatest importance. He especially urges the passage of the bill prohibiting corporations from contributing to campaign funds, and also that one which would give the government the right of appeal in criminal cases. Of this he says:

"Another bill which has just past one heuse of the congress and which is urgently necessary should be enacted into law is that conferring upon the government the right of appeal in criminal cases on questions of law. This right exists in many of the states; it exists in the District of Columbia by act of the congress. A considerable portion of the message is devoted to the subject of federal control of corporations in what he refers to the passage at the last session of the rate, meat inspection and food laws, and says that all of these have already justified their enactment, but recommends the amendment of the meat inspection law so as to put dates on the labels of meat products, and also to place the cost of inspection on the packers rather than on the government. "It cannot too often be repeated that experience has conclusively shown the impossibility of securing by the actions of nearly half a hundred different state legislatures anything but ineffective chaos in the way of dealing with the great corporations which do not operate exclusively within the limits of any one state. In some method, whether by a national license law or in other fashion, we must exercise, and that at an early date, a far more complete control than at present over these great corporations—a control that will among other things prevent the evils of excessive overcapitalization, and that will compel the disclosures by each big corporation of its stockholders and of its properties and business, whether owned directly or thru subsidiary or affiliated corporations. not so much to prevent consolidation as such, but so to supervise and control it as to see that it results in no harm to the people. The reactionary or ultr servative apologists for the misus wealth assail the effort to secure control as a step toward socialism. and ultraconservatives who are themselves most potent in increasing socialistic-feeling. The best way to avert the very founded. The best way to avert the very undesirable move for the governmental ownership of railways is to secure by the government on behalf of the people as a whole such adequate control and regulation of the great interstate common carriers as will do away with the evils which give rise to the agitation against them. So the proper antidote to the dangerous and wicked agitation against the men of wealth as such is to secure by proper legislation and executive action the abolition of the grave abuses which actually do obtain in connection with the business use of wealth under our present system—or rather no

Some persons speak as if the exercise of such governmental control would do away with the freedom of individual initiative and dwarf individual effort. This is not a fact. It would be a veritable calamity to fail to put a premium upen individual initiative, individual capacity and effort; upon the energy, character and foresight which it is so important to encourage in the individual. But as a matter of fact the deadening and degrading effect of pure socialism, and especially of its extreme form communism, and the destruction of individual character which they would form communism, and the destruction of individual character which they would bring about are in part achieved by the wholly unregulated competition which results in a single individual or corporation rising at the expense of all others until his or its rise effectually checks all competition and reduces former competi-Inheritance and Income Tax.


