The order opening the Portales forest reserve takes effect in ninety days from the issuance, which will be about June 16th. The reserve was established in October, 1903, but owing to the large amounts of land in this territory set apart as forest purposes, it was impossible to handle all of it, owing to the lack of funds, so this reserve was restored to the public domain and opened for settlement.

Quite a blunder was made in the new educational law and it is too late to remedy it now. Under a section of the law recently passed the election of school directors takes place on the first Monday in April of each year. That day falls next Monday and it is impracticable to inform boards of school directors and county superintendents of the change, hence it is presumed that the boards of district school directors now in office and elected June last, will remain in the position until new elections can be had on the first Monday in April, 1908. This is not right but there seems to be no way out of it.-New Mexican.

ALLE COLORS OF THE STATE OF THE

The anti-gambling bill recently territory of New Mexico contains the following provisions: "That any person within the Territory of New Mexico who deals, plays, carries on, opens, or causes to be opened, or conducts, either as owner or employee, whether for hire or not, any game of faro, monte, roulette, lasquenet. rouge et-noir, rondo, fantan, poker, seven-and-a-half, twenty-one, chuck-a-luck, slot machine, or any banking or percentage game played with cards, dice, or any other device, for money, checks, credit, or any other representative of value, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$1,000, or by confinement in jail for not more than one year for each offense." PROOF OF PLANT MEMORY.

Plant memory is a problem for the inquisitive botanist. In 1901 a plant allied to the squash and pumpkin was taken to New York from the desert of Sonora, in Mexico, and since then it has been kept-without watering—in a strange climate 3.500 miles from home. During the six weeks of rain in the desert the plant grows its leaves and flowers and perfects its seed. Then it dries up and leaves only a water-filled gourd, which a thick, hard shell seals against animals and evaporation. The transplanted specimen still remembers the rainy season of six weeks. It wakes, sends out rootlets, stems and leaves and then dries

up again until the following year.

COURT IN SESSION

Grand Jury Returns Several Indictments

Work of Term Being Transacted With Great Dispatch

The regular April session of the district court of Roosevelt county convened in Portales Monday morning, Judge Wm. H. Pope, associate justice of the supreme court and judge of the fifth judicial district, presiding. Other court officers were present as follows: S. I. Roberts, clerk; C. H. Spencer, assistant district attorney; A. L. Hull jr., stenographer; J. A. Fairly, deputy clerk; Joseph Lang, sheriff.

Local attorneys G. L. Reese, W. O. Young, J. S. Fitzhugh, Sam J. Nixon and W. E. Lindsey were on hand. Besides these, attorneys from other places were here looking after cases as follows: K. K. Scott, Roswell; Harry L. Patton, Texico; M. C. Brown and O. Askew, Melrose; J. A. Hall, · Elida; J. J. Dodson, Hereford.

Not all of the regular venire of grand jurymen were able to serve, some being excused for good and sufficient reasons, so six additional members of the grand jury were drawn as follows: W. W. 
