REFORMS NEEDED IN TERRITORIAL AFFAIRS

We have noticed for some weeks past that the democratic papers throughout the territory, headed by the Albuquerque Morning Journal, have made charges that many territorial officials appointed by ex-Governor Hagerman have been removed for the benefit of "the machine," and that a reign of graft and corruption has recommenced in the territory under Acting Governor Reynolds, advised by the republican leaders and the republican organization. In looking over the field we find that this charge is absolutely untenable and made out of the whole cloth for evidently extremely partisan purposes and to injure republican leaders and republican officials. The only important appointments since Hagerman's exit made by Acting Governor Reynolds to fill vacancies up to date are two: J. H. Vaughn, territorial treasurer, for eight years under republican administration and cashier of the First National bank of Santa Fe for over twenty years, has succeeded Levi A. Hughes, who resigned, but whose resignation was not called for. If any newspaper or anybody else call this case a removal, he is either an idiot or a liar.

The second important appointment was the one of Col. G. W. Prichard as Attorney General to succeed W. C. Reid. The latter had not only openly and notoriously vacated his office, but had gone to Roswell to perform the duties of district attorney of the court in session there and had also tendered his resignation. Col. Prichard is a well known and able lawyer, a clean man, against whom no charges of improper official conduct have ever been made. This can certainly not be considered a removal.

Acting Governor Reynolds has filled some minor offices in which original appointments were necessary, but has absolutely asked no resignations and has not removed so far, although we think he ought to.

For instance, W. G. Sargent, the present territorial auditor, first appointed by ex-Governor Otero and then reappointment by ex-Governor Hagerman, although according to the Albuquerque Morning Journal and the other democratic papers in the territory, he was a member of the gang that is charged by these papers with the most awful corruption and the most shameless dishonesty, should go and there should be no halting upon the order of his going. This man, according to official legislative report, converted \$23,000, allowed his office for official contingent expenses, to his own use, and yet he was reappointed by Hagerman, because he had a vote in the assembly and gave it for Hagerman measures. If this was reform on the ex-Governor's part and if Sargent is a reformer, we want none of it and none of him.

Certainly the important super-

intendent of the penitentiary and his assistant ought to go. New Mexico would certainly be in a bad way if it had not citizens of its own for official position. These two men, Trelford and Sample, were imported by ex-Governor Hagerman and should make room for citizens of the territory and we think that plenty of such who are competent and deserving can be found. We hear that the present management is not at all a success and that a change would be welcome and should be made.

Coal Oil Inspector Duncan should not be retained. While we believe that there is a good deal of humbug in the coal oil inspection law, still, as long as it exists and as long as there is good pay connected with it, we think deserving republicans ought to be recognized and there is enough in the office to go around for the coal oil inspector and for several deputies. Mr. Duncan has had very soft snaps under republican administrations, and went in with Hagerman because he wanted another one. There should be a change.

There are several members of the board of penitentiary commission that should be given the grand bounce. Two or three of these are fossils who have had no experience in public affairs and who were simply recognized and appointed because they had helped the Hagerman plan in the assembly and in the elections of last year. They are not the right kind of men and should be turned out immediately. We think that the commission should be non-partisan and that there should be one or two democrats on it, but as far as republicans on it are concerned it is our idea that good citizens, intelligent men and deserving republicans should be honored with these positions. There is considerable responsibility attached to them and in looking carefully and diligently over penitentiary affairs they can do the people good service.

Of course there should be a speedy change in the Bureau of Immigration, as at present constituted it is a farce and a detriment to the territory. At least four of the members should be kicked off the board at the shortest possible notice and Col. Max Frost, who has managed its affairs for about fifteen years and that remarkably successfully, should be reinstated as secretary. We have hundreds of settlers in Roosevelt county who were brought to this section by the literature prepared and distributed by Col. Frost, and railroad passenger agents are of the united opinion that Col. Frost's work as secretary was of the highest order and that it was a public calamity to lose his services from the bureau.

There are other matters connected with the administration and its officials, which the Times will discuss later on. If Acting Governor Reynolds does not act, certainly Governor Curry, after his inauguration, should lose no time in doing so. The people take no stock in these alleged reform movements and in their loud and vociferous professions by democratic newspapers that they are all for reform and honesty in territorial affairs and for nothing more. The republican administration of this territory for the past ten years has not been corrupt, has not been dishonest and has not been injurious. Quite the reverse, it has raised the territorial credit in the financial world, so that now the territory's bonds are above par; the financial condition of all the counties and their administrations are better than ever before; the best laws upon the statutes of our territory

have been passed by strong republican legislatures and signed by republican governor in the 33d, 34th, 35th and 36th assemblies; better men have been selected for territorial and county offices and the people of the territory are increasing in number. There is more prosperity than ever before and with the exception of those who howl "thieves, corruption and knavery" in territorial administration and its affairs, in republican counties for their own purposes to hoist themselves into official jobs, to get on top and the democratic papers who do this for party sake and for party success, the people as a whole and of all political parties are pretty thoroughly satisfied.

We have not seen a single objection to Governor Curry's appointment and this speaks very well for President Roosevelt and for the benefit that the people of all sections and of all parties entertain that Captain Curry will make an excellent governor, that his administration will be creditable and honest and that the good work commenced in 1897, with the incoming of the republican administration, will continue and be carried on until they come into the union and the people elect their own government. Then it will be up to them.

Waterworks System Assured.

The Portales Water Works and Electric Light company, of which Coe Howard is manager, is making arrangements to go ahead and put in a system of water works as soon as all arrangements can be perfected. It is proposed that the system be put into the business district to start with. This is badly needed, especially for fire protection and will be one of the most desirable improvements that could be made in the town. It will make a great saving to the property owners and business men in decreasing the cost of insurance.

Practically all the owners of property on the square and Main street have taken stock in the enterprise to the amount of \$2.50 per front foot of their lots. This gives the company the financial support needed to put in the system. The company has been incorporated and the articles of incorporation were published in the Times three weeks ago. The names of the incorporators are Coe Howard, W. H. McDonald and Joe Howard. The capital stock is fifteen thousand dollars and each property owner who subscribed takes stock to the amount of his subscription of \$2.50 per front foot. The stockholders have not as yet properly organized by electing officers. Another thing which will likely delay the enterprise is the scarcity of pipe on the market.
