OPINION ON HERD LAW.
In view of the conflicting opinons among la wyers as to whether or not cattle, grazing at will upon the public domain and without herders or guards, could be arrested and distrained for damage done to unfenced growing crops, the following opinion rendered by Judge Mann, associate justice and judge of the sixth judicial district, comès at a very opportune time. This is the first opinion to be handed down from the district court of this territory in which this subject has been raised and its importance is thus greatly enhanced. In Roosevelt county especially, has this question be come a very important one, by reason of the large acreage unfenced crops and their almost total loss from the depredations of range cattle. On account of the seriousness of this heretofore unsettled question and the imthe following opinion, Judge W. E. Lindsey, at his own expense had a transcript made and furnished the Times for publication, that both, the farmers and the stockmen, might be cognizant of their rights. under the law, thus avoiding misunderstanding and trouble.

Compiled Laws of 1897, Secs. 145 to 152, inclusive, provided a remedy for upon growing erops and laid down the process by which such damages migh be collected, in which it was provided that the stock might be turned over to the justice of the peace, who should
keep them in custody and issue his writ of execution, upon which the aninals committing the damage, or such portion of them as was necessary to pay same, might be sold. Section 152, or the breach mentioned in preceding sections could be collected, it: must be proved that the enclosure was a legal ence, and then proceeds to describe what shall be considered a legal fenc
under the laws of this Territory. nder the laws of this Territory
nained the law of the Territory upon the subject until 1901, when Sees. 145 o 151 , inclusive, were repealed spec ically by chapter 92, of the Laws of 901, which provided another remed or danuage or injury done to any field
own to grain. It will be noted, ever, that Sec. 152 , supra, which provided that such damages: or breaches could only be collected in case of a legal fence, still remains in force and was apparently purposely so left by the remedy was changed for collecting the damages, yet the damages for trespass might only be collected where the le al fence described in Sec. 152 was aiantained.
The legislature of 1903, by enacting chapter 73, again provided that al damage or injury done to any cultivated
feld sown with grain, corn, videyard, field sown with grain, corn, vineyard,
orchards, altalfa, or other sown do nestic grasses and to all lands fenced his Territory, shall be paid for by th owner of the animals committing such amage or injury, after such damage shall have been appraised, etc., and then provides a remedy by taking up
sueb animals and turning them over to the justice of the peace to be sold upon xecution for such damage.
This provision was amended slightiy, y the legislature of 1905, adding 73, Laws of 1903, which does not effect the question at issue, but only the remdamages.
The lengnage of SeC 1 of ehapter 73 , above quoted, is peculiar in that it proides that "all damage or tnjury done a any oultivated fields, etc., and to all ands fenced and enclosed as now re quired by law in this Territory shall baid," etc, It will be noted tha fields" and "fenced lands," "eultcivate felds" and "Ienced lands," "tc., is used only one class of lands is intended to protected, to-wit, cultivated and fenced Neither by the statute of 1903, nor the amendment of 1905 , or any other law of any kind or nature whatsoever, has the legislatare seen fit to repeal the pro-
ision of section 152 , with reference vision of section 152 , with reference to construction of all these statutes re maining in force would indicate tha it was the intention of the several leg. it is argued by counsel for the deonse that section 98 of the Compile Laws of 1897, has some bearing upo passed in 1882, nine. years substion wa to the law of 1873, of which See. 152 i a part, and provides that "from and eer line passage thereof it shall no this Territory, or for any owner or wners of large stock to allow the same o rup at large during the months of March, April, May, June, July, August, eptember or October, or under any pretext whatever to have them at large upon their ranches or herding ranges, nless they shall have them under cus ady during the months above testified; violate the provisions of this Act shall affer a fine and costs as provided by the lawe in force in this Territory." Whether or not this section ts of any orce is immaterial to the lisues involved in this case. I may say fr-passoo penalty whatever for tis violation no penaity whatever for its violation,
and it is ainatter of common knowledge
that no one pretends to follow its pro-
visions; and it may well be said to bo visions; and it mey well be sald to be forced for want of a penalty for its vio tion. But be that as it mey, it car sasue; that is, whether or not animals may be taken up and sold for damages sommitted by them upon growing crops, because if it provided anything itas a penalty in the nature of a fine ond costs, and not providing for com pensation to the parties damaged. Counsel argued with considerable Complled Lections 1823 and 1824 of the Complied Lawe, as amended by chapter
5 of the Laws of 1905 , show a legisle ive construction that a herd law pre ailed in this Territory; but a law of such a nature, which would deprive ne of his property in a summary maner cannot be taken by intendment nd no such law can be enforced unless he intention of the legislature is plain $t$ is contrary to the long establishec oustom of this country, and to the comon law as it prevails here, or at the me of the pastage of the organic act, are intended to overthrow the custom f generations and to enä̀ct laws such a prevail in the states farther east, they would at least make their intentions plain enough so that there could be no isunderstanding.
Taking this view of the statutes Cois Territory, and the decisions of tb Courts with reference to this and sim larly situated states and territories, m of the opinion that stock cannot be satrained for trespass upon cultivated fence, as provided by law. | A New Way to Kill Rabbits. <br> G. A. Lav, a prominent citizen who lives near Portales, reports a new method of killing rabbits, and from his experience is a very successful one. His method is to put out a little salt with slithe stryohnine mixed with it. He used six parts of salt to one of strychnine and puts out about a tableapoonful in a place. <br> Mr, Law says he has tried all kinds of schemes for poisoning rabbits, but he has not seen any plan that killed as many rabbits as this. One wouldn't suppose that rabbits would eat salt, but it seems they have an appetite fer it, the same as catfle and sheep. Of course one must be very careful and not put out the salt and poison where stock can get it, <br> Mr. Law lives two miles northeast of town, now owning and living on the Deitz place. He had out a grove of 5100 small black locust trees some distance from the house. A few weeks ago he went out to the grove and it looked like it ghould look in the winter time, as the foliage had all been stripped off the little trees by the rabbits.
